WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—Explaining their action at last night's caucus when they voted 106 to 17 against any measure providing for universal compulsory military service or training, several Democrats declared today they felt they knew the sentiment of the country on military training better than either the President or their leaders.

SHORTAGE OF 40,000 TRAINED NURSES IN THE UNITED STATES

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—A shortage of 40,000 trained nurses exists in the United States according to the national organization for public health nursing. The organization today started a campaign to interest young women in the profession in the home of enrolling 60,000 workers.

ASSEMBLY SUPPORTS REFUSAL TO DELIVER GERMAN WAR GUILTY

BERLIN, Monday, Feb. 9.—Decision was reached by the committee on foreign relations of the national assembly today to support the government's stand in declaring "the ethical and patriotic indignation of the German people at the allied demand for extradition of Germans accused of war crimes is such that the carrying out made physically impossible and would produce a serious insurrection."

GERMANY TO SUBMIT A COUNTER PROPOSAL
BERLIN, Feb. 10.—Germany is preparing a list containing the names of allied soldiers and high officials who are accused by the Berlin government of violations of the laws of war and plans to submit it as a counter proposal to the demand of the allies for extradition of Germans who are alleged to be war criminals.

FORMER CROWN PRINCE WOULD BE SUBSTITUTE
AMSTERDAM, Feb. 10.—Former Crown Prince Frederick William of Germany has offered to give himself up to the allies in place of the hundreds of Germans demanded for extradition on the list recently submitted to Berlin, according to a telegram purporting to have come from him published in the Handelsblad of this city.

BEGIN GRADING FOR PROPOSED EXTENSION SOUTHLAND CAR LINE

Grading for the Call Field car line extension and work was started Tuesday on the additional switches for the Southland car line, it was announced Tuesday by E. A. Albritton, general manager of the Wichita Falls Traction company.

Through the new switches on the Southland line it should be able to double our service to that part of the town," said Mr. Albritton. "These switches with favorable weather and working conditions, should be ready in about 10 days or two weeks.

"The work of laying the line to Call Field will start as soon as the grading for the line is completed, and will be pushed to completion."

The traction company has also purchased one of the latest types of electric welding machines for use in welding their rails on paved streets, making continuous joints of the track. This machine will be delivered in time to be available at the same time that the city makes the proposed street improvements along the various car lines.

"Extract" Party Is Extricated From Hay and Placed in Jail

Two men and two women arrested by county officials on charges of vagrancy resorted to a very unusual scheme to escape by the aid of officers. It seems that the two couples were enjoying a regular "extract party" on the banks of the Wichita but when the officers approached the four sought refuge in a hay stack "digging in" and throwing the loose hay over them. The party, however, was extricated from the hay and escorted to the city jail. Six empty bottles labeled vanilla extract was carried along as evidence of the "extract party." The four pleaded guilty to vagrancy and paid their fines in Justice Arrington's court.

FLORIDA STRAWBERRIES ARE ON LOCAL MARKET

Strawberries from Florida are beginning to come into the local market. It was learned at the office of the Agricultural Experiment Station that so far there have been only two shipments of this rare berry but another shipment is on the way from the growers and should be on the market in a day or two. These strawberries are said to be of excellent quality. All of the supply that has been received locally so far this season has been sold to the White House Market.

One of the sensations of the wholesale markets in the past week has been the phenomenal drop in the wholesale price of condensed milk. It is reported at local wholesale houses that canned milk, both of the Carnation and Pet standard brands, has declined in price \$1.00 a case for the large size and 50 cents a case for the small cans. The reason for this, according to the Biddle bulletin supplied by an agency in New York, is that the canned milk market is apparently without life and that the increased production of this commodity has not been taken up by an increased demand and a large surplus is being built up. This news is probably very heartening to the ultimate consumer who has seen nothing but increased prices on practically every commodity for human consumption.

The jury in the case of W. C. Flack against the Texas company reported late Monday that they were unable to reach an agreement and asked to be discharged. The jury had had the case under advisement all Saturday. Flack brought suit for \$75,000 damages against the Texas company as a result of the death of a son and the serious injury of another as the result of fire, said to have occurred near Electra in the spring of 1919. Flack contends the fire was caused by the accumulation of gas in a cellar entered by the children, the gas being escaped from tanks owned by the Texas company.

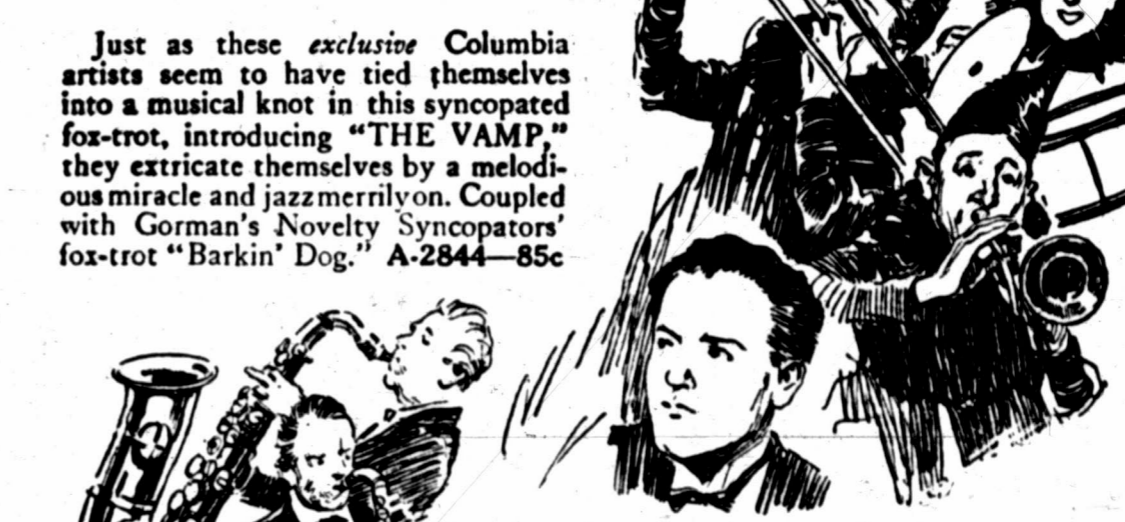

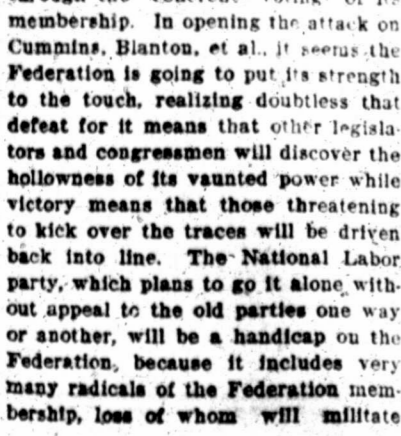

LATE SPORT NEWS

AMERICAN LEAGUE SEASON TO OPEN APRIL 14 AND PROVIDES FOR A TOTAL OF 154 GAMES

CHICAGO, Feb. 19.—The American League baseball season will open April 14 and close October 3, according to the official 1920 schedule released tonight by B. H. Johnson, president of the league. The schedule shows a restoration of the 154 games chart, which was curtailed last season because of the world war. An innovation in this year's schedule is the listing of Sunday games at Washington and New York. This is the first time in the history of the league that this has been done at the time the schedule was drafted, the world war was responsible for this. Last season, games were permitted in Washington and New York, but the schedule made no provision for these.

The four western clubs will open in the west, while the clubs of the east will inaugurate the season at the eastern end of the circuit. The opening games are listed as follows: Detroit at Chicago, St. Louis at Cleveland, New York at Philadelphia, Washington at Boston. Boston is scheduled to close the season before the other clubs. The final curtain for the Red Sox will be rung down on September 28. A double header, with Washington Billings and the opponent, is on the program for that day. The following day, Sept. 29, New York will close its season at Philadelphia. The last of the eastern clubs to quit for the season are the Senators and the Athletics, who meet at Philadelphia on October 2.

The four western clubs are scheduled to close the season on Sunday, October 3. The White Sox will finish at St. Louis and Cleveland is slated to close at Detroit. The schedule, as in former years, calls for three swings around the circuit. Detroit after opening at Chicago will go to Cleveland, and then return home on April 22 for its first game at home with the league champions as an opponent. St. Louis opens at home with Cleveland as an opponent on the same day, following its series at Cleveland and Chicago. New York, after plying the lid off at Philadelphia, will go to Boston for a series and then to the Polo grounds, to play its first home games with the Athletics as the attraction on April 22. The Washington fans will get their first glimpse of the Senators on April 22, when after a series in Philadelphia and Boston, they come home to meet the Red Sox.

Washington has drawn the plum in regard to the greatest number of Sunday games. The Senators have been given 16 Sunday dates. Chicago and Detroit each have 13, while St. Louis, Cleveland and New York have been awarded 12 pieces. Philadelphia and Boston have no Sunday games at home, because baseball is forbidden there on the Sabbath. Boston, Detroit and Washington share alike in the distribution of Saturday games, each being scheduled to

play 12 week-end games at home. The other five clubs have been given 12 Saturdays each at home. Independence Day—July 4—falling on Sunday, the schedule makers have arranged holiday bills for Monday, July 5. Games on that day will be played at Chicago, Detroit, Washington and Philadelphia. Decoration Day—May 30—also falling on a Sunday, enabled the framers of the playing chart, to hook holiday bills for the following day. These games will be played at St. Louis, Cleveland, New York and Boston. The Red Sox have been awarded a holiday bill for April 19—Bunker Hill Day. Chicago, Cleveland, Washington and New York are scheduled to play Labor Day games at home on September 28.

There are four conflicting dates with the National League, and these are in Chicago, on May 9, June 27, Sept. 5 and Sept. 26, when the Chicago club is scheduled to play at home. The Western clubs start their invasion of the east on May 11. Chicago will be at New York, St. Louis at Philadelphia, Cleveland at Boston and Detroit at Washington. The eastern clubs will make their first western trip on June 8, with Boston appearing at Chicago, Washington at St. Louis, New York at Detroit and Philadelphia at Cleveland.

BENNY LEONARD HAS BETTER OF A BATTLE WITH JOHNNY DUNDEE

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Feb. 10.—Benny Leonard, world's lightweight champion, outpointed Johnny Dundee in an eight-round fight here last night. More action was shown by the pair than in any of their previous seven fights. Dundee carried the fight to the champion all the way and set a terrific pace for five rounds, but a left jab and a right hook to the jaw rocked him continually and slowed him up. Dundee tried hard for a knockout but the champion passed up many good chances and seemed to be minus the sleep-producing punch when he did land. Dundee was rocked to his heels several times, but he came back for more.

WILDE TO APPEAR ON MONDAY NIGHT IN N. J. CITY. Jimmy Wilde, world's flyweight champion, is to appear here next Monday night in an eight round fight, promoter Dave Driscoll said today. His opponent has not been selected. Efforts to secure Jack Sharkey for a return bout with Wilde failed on account of the Brooklyn boy's exorbitant demands, Driscoll said.

WHITE SOX RELEASED JAMES AND ROBERSON CHICAGO, Feb. 10.—The Chicago White Sox today announced the release of Bill James and Charles Roberson, pitchers, to the Minneapolis club of the American Association.

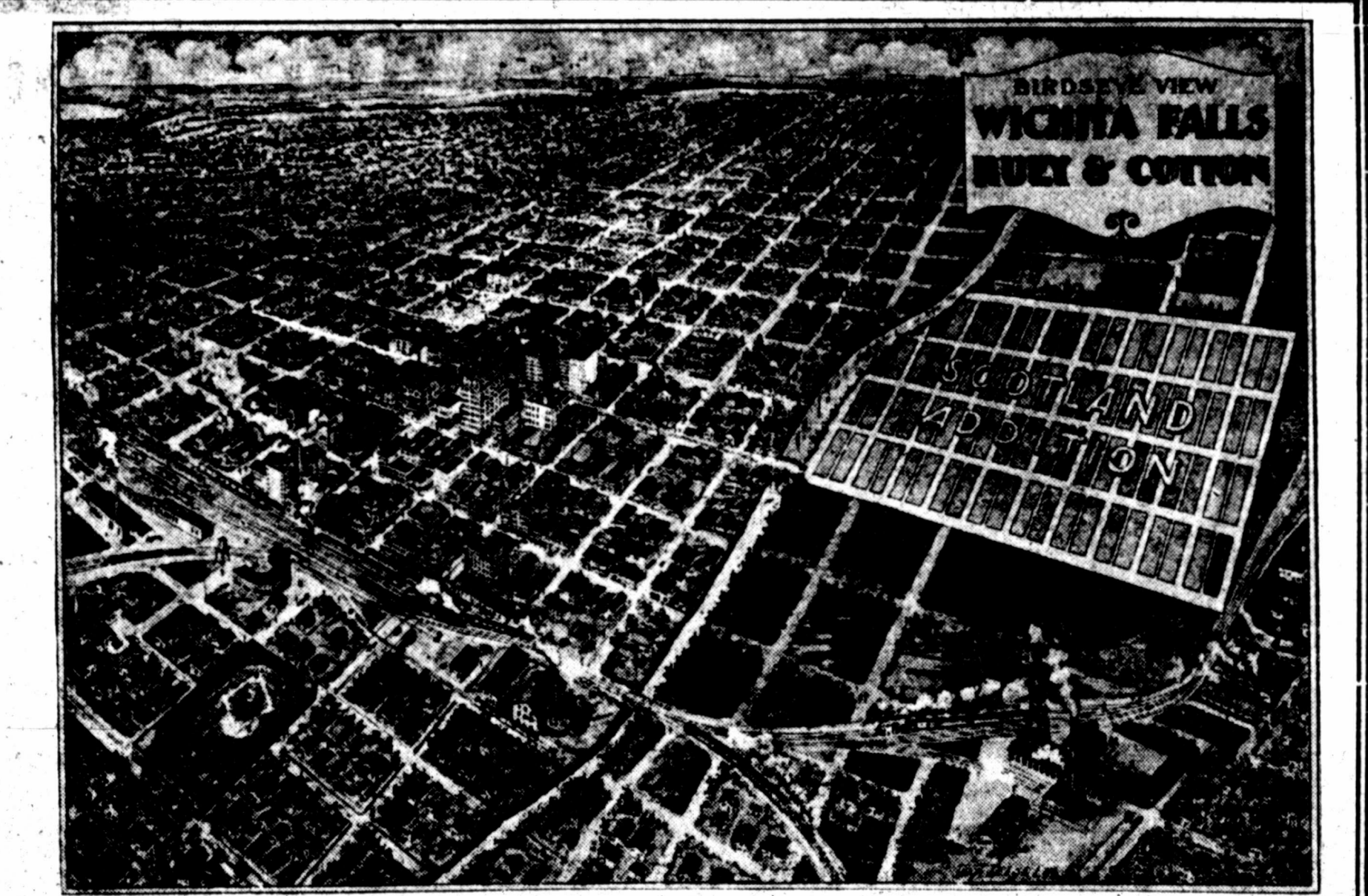

NATIONAL OIL CO. MOVES FROM DALLAS TO WICHITA FALLS

The National Oil Drilling Company has moved home offices from Dallas to Wichita Falls, where they are located at 812 Seventh street. The company formerly operated in the coastal fields, and for the past several months operations have been extended through the Wichita Falls district, where the company has become very well and favorably known. The company is drilling the Curtis Mound Company's test in Tillman county by contract, and drilling a number of contract tests, as well as holding acreage in various parts of the Wichita Falls districts. They have acreage offsetting their lease holdings amount to ten thousand acres scattered throughout Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas. Producing properties include a 46-acre lease in the C. Birk tract, shallow Burkburnett, with eight producing wells, fully equipped with power plant and pumping station.

T. A. Sala, the first vice president and field manager, has been making Wichita Falls his headquarters for some time, and both he and his head driller own considerable stock in the company, which is capitalized at \$150,000. The officers of the company are:

WIRE INDICATES THAT TEXANS STRIKE OIL IN COLORADO

The possibility that Texas operators have struck oil in Colorado was seen in an urgent telegram received here this morning by Charles Steward telling him to "come at once" to the Fountain Valley field about 15 miles south of Colorado Springs. Steward, who has been superintending the deepening of the Gold Leaf well in Block 66, Northwest field, and the drilling of the Dean test in Clay county, is interested in the Colorado Thrift Oil company that is putting down a cable

tool test in the Fountain Valley area. The test is down 1,900 feet, and the nature of this morning's telegram is taken by Steward's friends to indicate that an oil sand worth investigating has been encountered.

Steward is only one of a number of Texas operators who are drilling or have rigs on the ground at Fountain Valley. The field has been producing at a shallow depth for years, but no deep tests ever were made until the Texas started operations there last spring. Wichita Falls oil men control approximately 30,000 acres south of Colorado Springs, and if deep production is found citizens of this vicinity will reap a royal harvest. All of the companies operating in the field were sold out in Colorado, several Colorado Springs banks even "taking a shot" on the possibility of the Texas uncovering a new field.

HOUSTON REPORT ON WEATHER AND ROADS

HOUSTON, TEX., Feb. 10.—Winds on Texas coast. Light to moderate north. Weather conditions and highway bulletin: A mild, but wet norther is blowing into Texas, and precipitation has been more or less general in the Southwest, western and middle cotton belt. Snow occurred in the Panhandle. Automobiles leaving today will encounter rain and, although no impassable roads have been reported, except around Pierce, extended journeys are not advisable.

EXPECT NOCONA TO SHOW IMPROVEMENT, PACKER BEING SET

NOCONA, TEX., Feb. 10.—A packer is being set in the Nocona Oil and Gas company test on the Lemon farm, this tract being out of the Samuel Little survey and about eight miles north-east. This is the well in which about 2,000,000 feet of gas, and oil estimated at 10 barrels were found at 2,340 feet. The well had 285 feet of open hole. The casing was drawn and the well straight-reamed, and since the casing was reset, the well is making considerable water along with the oil and gas. The water is believed to be coming from back of the casing. The result of setting the packer will be awaited with much interest. Those who have taken careful note of conditions at the well, are confident the packer will greatly improve the well, and the hope is it will be a complete success in shutting off the water. In this event, an increase in both oil and gas may be anticipated.

Encouraging word has been received in regard to the shipment of casing for the Red River Valley well. It is expected any day.

Reliable receipt here is to the effect that 25 oil and gas test wells will be started in Fergus and Musselshell counties, Montana, this spring and early summer. This is in the Belton district, and there is considerable activity in other parts of Montana. The formations will be mostly cretaceous with a tertiary overlap in some places. The writer has knowledge that there are a number of structures which have been surveyed and mapped by geologists. Now this is merely to call attention to the vigor with which the people of Montana and surrounding states are rounding up for tests to test for oil and gas, and it will be more than an even bet that

some of the tests will prove paying wells. Such a determined effort on the part of the people of Montana to show to the people of other states and the world that that state contains not only gold, silver, lead and copper, but oil and gas as well, should serve to cause greater effort to be thrown into the effort to open an oil field in Montague county, Texas, where the Pennsylvania formation is exposed over so much of the county, and this is a condition which well might be envied by many another locality in which oil and gas test wells are being drilled. The

writer will hazard the prediction that there will be 10 to 20 new wells under way in Montague county within six months, and should some of the tests now drilling prove paying wells, this prediction might still be increased. There is no part of the United States where the Pennsylvania formation comes to the surface which offers greater inducements to the wildcatter than here. Look the geological map over, and you will reach the same conclusion, taking into account the favorable structural conditions in this locality.
