ADJUTANT GENERAL OF CONFEDERATE VETERANS DIES AT MOBILE HOME

MOBILE, ALA., Feb. 18.—General William E. Mickle, adjutant general of the United Confederate Veterans and one of the best known men of the Confederacy, died at his home here after an immediate filess of only two weeks. He was 74 years of age and was born in Columbia, S. C. General Mickle served throughout the Civil War, enlisting when he was 17 years old. He was a member of the Mobile cadets, company A of the 3rd Alabama and was twice wounded during the war. At the close of the war he engaged in business in Mobile. In 1903 he was made adjutant general of the United Confederate Veterans and maintained an office in New Orleans for a number of years, but was later given permission to transfer the head-quarters here.

General Mickle is survived by his widow, two sisters and three daughters. Funeral arrangements had not been completed today.

"I sincerely hoped the men who believe in the fundamental principles of the Democratic party could unite in supporting the candidacy of some other citizen for the governorship of Texas, but friends in whose judgment I am confident, insist that the only way to avoid a division over candidates among the men who cherish our principles, is for me to make the therefore he should "regard it as the imperative duty of any-man to accept a nomination if it should come to him unsolicited.



Representative Fess Wants Amendment Providing for An Emergency.

Just who would institute the pro-ceedings to determine whether the President is able to serve will be left ceedings to determine whether the President is able to serve will be left to later legislation, but Fess believes this should be done by a resolution asking the supreme court to investigate. The legislation enforcing the proposed amendment would give the court power to summon all witnesses necessary for an inquiry into the disability of the chief executive.

Fees, who is an authority on United States history, said he framed the amendment after a careful scrutiny of the constitution and the debates during the constitution and the debates during the constitution Defective.

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"I have determined that the consti-tution is defective upon this point." said Fess, "and that additional au-thority from the states in the form of a constitutional amendment is neces-sary to give the other two branches of the government, the judicial and the legislative power to provide for such legislative, power to provide for such disabilities as have just occurred. There is no doubt that some one should be the responsible head of the should be the responsible head of the government during such periods and I believe the power of designating an-cher official to serve temporarily should be left jointly to congress and the supreme court, thus assuring the the supreme court, thus assuring the cilmination of partisan influences in case congress and the President are of different political parties. By a study of the constitutional debates I have found that this question came up in the convention and was never finally determined. 

Finding that the property values in the Wichita Falls independent school district would not support a bond issue of a million dollars, the school board at a meeting Tuesday night decided to defer action on such

night decided to defer action on such a bond issue and the building of a new high school, but as the need for more school facilities is imperative, decided to ask for a bond issue of \$200,000 in the near future.

"The board of education, at its meeting Tuesday evening, carefully considered a building program for the year 1920. Careful estimates of the assessed values of the district, it was found, with the present 50 cent limitation for free school purposes, would not yield enough income for the maintenance of the schools and the issue of bonds in the sum of a million dollars for the building of a new high school building and the building of the ward buildings that are absolutely demanded. It was with a feeling of great disappointment that the board decided to abandon the high school building for the present year and wait until the election next fall to raise the limit of taxation for school purposes before undertaking this enterprise. It is the temper and determination of the board, when this new high school building is erected to see that it is one of the best in the state and large enough to meet the future requirements of the city for years to come. the future requirements of the city for

In the meantime, it is probable that the present high school will have to resort to double daily sessions next year like they are doing in many placer.
