WASHINGTON, March 11.— Relatives and friends of Americans kidnaped by Pancho Villa need have no concern as to their safety and may dismiss all fears that they may have held for ransom if they repose full confidence in a communication recently received from the Mexican bandit leader. According to his note of reassurance, he has adopted the only practical means he can think of to get a friendly conversation with various American representatives who cross his trail, and while they are his "guests" they will be treated with every consideration and returned unharmed and unrobbed to their friends. 



Reports from cities throughout the country showed a general increase in births during the first two months of this year practically uniform in all sections. Milwaukes and Seattle wers the only places to report a decrease.

Adoptions, wherever figures were available, generally showed even a greater ratio of increase than births. Many cities reported a commensurate in the number of babies abandoned by their parents. The number of mothers who cannot support their babies to assure a good home for them rather than trust to the comparative uncertainty of an institution, has been evinced through several instances of hables bethrough several instances of bables being "auctioned off"-in some cases even before birth. 


