WET FORCES TO MAKE FIGHT TO WREST CONTROL

Plan to Pay Particular Attention to the Selection of Members of Congress

HOPE FOR A REVISION OF THE VOLSTEAD LAW

Figure That Neither of Old Parties Can Afford to Oppose the Movement

WASHINGTON, March 11.—A vigorous campaign to wrest control of congress from the prohibitionists and amend the dry law so that light wine and beer may be made in plants in the "wets" throughout the country, it was learned today.

Keen political observers here whose sympathies are with the "wets" see little hope of completely overturning prohibition, but they do hope to make it less drastic by electing "wet" congressmen.

The supreme court's decision on the eighteenth amendment and the Volstead law, expected soon, merely determines how extensive the campaign to elect a "wet" congress would be.

In all probability the campaign will be bi-partisan, as it is known that both republican and democratic congressional campaign committees will participate in such a movement in some "wet" district.

Brewer's organizations are quietly participating in the formation of a non-partisan campaign, and the anti-saloon league, which was about to turn its attention to making the rest of the world "dry" has decided on more active participation in the coming campaign as a result.

ADMIRAL SIMS WANTS EVIDENCE OF MR. HOOVER

Will Be Requested to Testify Regarding Desperate Situation in World War

FIRST REALIZATION OF THE POSSIBLE DEFEAT OF ALLIES

Given By Mr. Hoover During a Conference in London After Admiral's Arrival

By RAYMOND CLAPPER (United Press Staff Correspondent) WASHINGTON, March 11.—Herbert Hoover will be asked to testify before a committee of the house on the possible defeat of the allies during a conference in London shortly after he arrived.

Sims today made the disclosure that in June, 1917, he urged Secretary Daniels to completely strip the American coast of sea going protection and transfer the ships to British waters.

General Milne, the British commander, would have charge of these troops. Admiral Beatty, Winston Churchill and other military and naval leaders met with the council yesterday to answer questions on the proposed military measures.

DECLARES WILD CAT OIL STOCKS WORTH CLOSE TO HALF A BILLION FLOATED DURING THE PAST YEAR

CHICAGO, March 11.—Wild cat oil stocks have been floated during the past year worth close to half a billion dollars, Felix Renick, secretary of the New York petroleum exchange, said in a speech here today before the National Petroleum congress.

Establishment of an oil exchange along the lines of coffee, grain and produce exchanges to curb fraudulent promotions, was urged by Renick. The phenomenal increase in promotions have drawn the attention of the oil industry to the necessity for concerted action to curb this invidious business which is responsible for the lack of general confidence in oil financing on the part of the investing public, he said.

### HUMANE SOCIETY IS MERGED WITH THE WELFARE COUNCIL

Merging their identity with the welfare council and turning over to the executive secretary of the council their balance of \$1,065.84, the Wichita Falls Humane Society on Wednesday, March 10, ceased to exist, after a year of work that has resulted in numerous tangible results for the furtherance of welfare work in Wichita Falls. The travelers aid at the union depot was first made possible by the humane society, and supported for six months, when the Y. W. C. A. took over this department, the railroads later putting on a night aid.

The humane society's funds will go towards the establishment of the day nursery by the welfare council. In dissolving the organization and turning over the treasury, the officers, Mrs. E. W. Nicholson, president, and Mrs. L. M. Boyd, treasurer, made the following statement:

"During the few months existence of this organization many were helped in other ways than financially and we feel that much good has been accomplished. We wish to bid the welfare council God speed as it goes forward in united and enlarged service."

### SUFFICIENT WATER FOR ANOTHER YEAR SAYS J. A. KEMP

"I believe after reading the interview with G. C. Wood in the Wednesday Times, that Mr. Wood is unduly alarmed over the Wichita Falls water situation," said J. A. Kemp Thursday morning. "The fact of the matter is that we have sufficient water in Lake Wichita to supply Wichita Falls' maximum demands for more than a year, provided it does not rain another drop."

"We have now in Lake Wichita the equivalent of 4,000,000,000 gallons of water, while the maximum demand of the city is under 3,000,000 gallons per day. The position of the city as to a water supply for the next year can easily be determined by a very little figuring."

"As to the evaporation in ordinary years, the normal rainfall will compensate the evaporation, so I don't think we have much to fear from that source."

"It is true that if we went a whole year without rainfall that the situation for the ensuing year would be somewhat alarming, and then Mr. Wood's suggestion that we take over a pipe line to the river and sink shaft wells in the river bank, which undoubtedly would fully satisfy our temporary needs, would be distinctly in order. This, however, would require little time to work out, and in view of all conditions we can well afford to wait until we have an entirely dry year before undertaking it."

"It is to be remembered that at the time of the low water supply to which Mr. Wood alludes, that this period had been preceded by two dry years. It is not likely, however, that we will have a recurrence of a condition like this during the next two or three years at least, which will give us time to put over and build the big irrigation project in which we are all interested, and which will solve all our water problems, both in the city and in the adjoining country, for all time to come."

**BURKBURNETT SUED BY DOUBLE BURK CO. FOR MOVING DERRICK**

The city of Burk Burnett is named as defendant in a \$25,000 damage suit filed in the 26th district court here, District Clerk A. F. Kerr announced Wednesday afternoon. The Double Burk Oil company, who brought the suit, alleges that the city of Burk Burnett caused a derrick erected by them on their holdings in Burk Burnett townsite to be removed without any cause, thereby damaging them to the extent of \$15,000. It is further alleged that had the derrick not been removed the Double Burk Oil company could have produced a profit of \$50,000. The suit was filed in the name of Double Burk Oil company and is captioned therefore that by the city's action with interfering with the plaintiff's operation their income from production was thereby injured to the extent of several thousand dollars.

FEDERAL COMPANY HAS DEEP SAND IN WILBARGER COUNTY

By A. C. MCCONNELL. VERNON, TEX., March 11.—The Federal Oil Company, operating on the Baker farm in Section 29, block 5, has struck the 1,800-foot sand and are now shut down awaiting orders from headquarters before drilling in this test well in Wilbarger county, near the Piper farm, and is the first well in that section to make a test of the 1,800-foot sand. It is not known at this time what the well will make, but it shows up extra good and several feet in the pay sand. This well is on the same lease with six or eight small producers and the Federal Oil company hopes this well will be their best.

The Doctor Diamond company on the same lease have brought in a good well, and developments in Section 29, block 5, is going on as a rapid call. The pipe has been connected to this well and preparations are under way to connect the Federal well to pipe line connections. The Texas Pipe Line company have built a new pipe line to Section 29, which has been badly needed for some time. Pumps will be installed to force the oil through the large pipe to the Floyd Oil company's power house. The Texas company's lines will be used, it is said, to pump production to the Waggoner Redney from the Baker lease.

The Standard Drilling company reports a 40-barrel well on the Zelenet lease from the 1,100-foot Piper sand in Section 19, block 13. The test was drilled with standard tools and only went a few inches into the pay. This is an extension westward of the Piper sand, which has long been predicted, and the bringing in of this well has stimulated leasing activity in this section, being in a semi-proven territory where about a dozen companies are operating. The well is almost an offset of the Piper lease westward, about half way between the Texas Crescent holdings and the Kemp-Wilson-Randall well.

PROGRAMS ANNOUNCED FOR WEST TEXAS FAIRS

VERNON, TEX., March 11.—At a conference held in Quannah by representatives of the chambers of commerce of Vernon, Quannah, Childress, Texas and the Mesquite and Oklahoma, dates for the different fairs in this circuit were arranged and programs adopted. It is planned, according to announcements from the meeting for the Jackson county, Okla., exposition to open at Altus, Okla., Sept. 1 to 4. The Tilden county, Okla., fair will be held from Sept. 5 to 11. The Fort Worth town will hold their fairs, opening at Childress, Sept. 15 to 18, being followed by the Hardeman county fair, Sept. 20 and 25. Wilbarger county fair will be one week before the Dallas fair, which begins in Dallas, Oct. 3. The Wilbarger county fair will be held this year Sept. 29 to Oct. 5. Dates selected at the fourth annual meeting of the West Texas chamber of commerce were not recognized. The Rice-Dorman shows, a 25-cent carnival, will play all of these fairs, a representative of the company being at the meeting and contracts closed.

GARAGE AND AIRDOME TO COVER HALF BLOCK

VERNON, TEX., March 11.—Work has begun on the construction of a garage to cover half a block of ground on West Wilbarger and Fanning streets by R. J. More, who recently purchased the land from J. R. Renfro. Mr. More, who is local representative of W. T. Waggoner at Vernon, recently sold the More theater to T. N. Duke and associates, and Mr. More announces that an airdome with a seating capacity of 3,200 people on top of this garage, over half a block, is included in the building project under way. This airdome will provide an outdoor amusement house and provide ample seating capacity for large gatherings.

TWO VERNON WOMEN ANNOUNCE FOR OFFICE

VERNON, TEX., March 11.—Two Vernon ladies have thrown their bonnets into the political arena. Mrs. Eugene Kells, former Vernon school teacher, but idle in the oil lease boom, has announced for tax assessor. Miss Verna Luckey, the present county clerk, is seeking re-election.

FEAR THAT FRUIT AND VEGETABLES ARE KILLED

VERNON, TEX., March 11.—Much apprehension is being felt by local fruit growers that fruit and tender vegetation were killed by the late freeze. An unusually low temperature was attained when the mercury dropped to 14 above, establishing a record that has not been attained for 30 years, report old settlers. High winds did much damage to derricks in the oil fields. Water pipes over the city were frozen.

INCREASED OPTIMISTIC VIEW OF DEVELOPMENTS IN WILBARGER COUNTY

VERNON, TEX., March 11.—The West Vernon well, recently acquired by the Penn-Burk Burnett Oil Company of Wichita Falls, with 1,900 acres under lease from the Broas, et al, resumed drilling operations Tuesday after being shut down for three months.

The Penn-Burk Burnett Oil Co. has increased their capital stock from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000. New proceeds from the new issue will be used to develop acreage held by the company in Wilbarger and other counties.

The well and holdings of 3,000 acres of Kay Bros. et al, Hanes, in Wilbarger and Ponder counties, has been acquired by the Cosgrove Oil Co. of Wichita Falls. This well has been spudded in at 40 feet and the new company will carry the well to completion. The number of wells now drilled, after shut down for various causes, are causing operators to have such an increased optimistic view of the general prospects for wildcat production.

NEW YORK, March 10. — (United Press)—Lady Nicotine is fighting hard for her life and unless the anti-tobacco forces present a more formidable attack, she will never "rest in peace" beside her dear husband, according to information obtained in a survey by the United Press.
