RETURN THE TREATY TO PRESIDENT

TWO THOUSAND PEOPLE KILLED IN FIGHTING INCIDENT TO THE GERMAN REVOLUTIONARY MOVE

LONDON, March 20.—The general strike in Germany has been called off, according to Berlin dispatches received here this afternoon. The government, it is said, has accepted the workers' demands, including far-reaching concessions to the independent socialists, which will be made public shortly.

LONDON, March 20.—Two thousand persons have been killed in the fighting incident to the German revolutionary movement and disturbances of the past week, it is estimated in reports according to the Exchange Telegraph Company correspondent in that city.

BRUSSELS, March 20.—The capture of Essen was effected on Friday by a Spartan army of about 100,000 men, with 77 guns and an equipment of armored automobiles and tanks, according to reports from the city. The Spartans proclaimed a soviet republic there.

During last night, the advance led by the manufacturer of the city of Düsseldorf, on the Rhine, north of Cologne, was captured by Spartan forces, the government troops evacuating it without a fight.

 BERLIN, March 19. (Night)—Violent disorders growing out of attempts by radicals to institute a soviet government were reported from many parts of Germany today. Armed workmen were reported to have captured Essen after two days' hard fighting. More than 200 persons were reported to have been killed and many others wounded.

Social democrat artillery was reported moving toward Suhl. Troops armed with machine guns and tanks were reported to have been ordered to the Ruhr district. The disturbed district in Westphalia.

Armed workers were said to occupy the greater part of Westphalia including the Ruhr district. Armed forces of radicals also were reported in control of Bitterfeld, Langensalza and Meiningen.

The situation was reported acute with armed conflict imminent in Düsseldorf, Bremen, Thuringia and Mecklenburg.

Make Demands.
 In Berlin the majority socialists have demanded the immediate withdrawal of all troops and other concessions, including participation in the government. It was impossible to obtain telephone connections outside Berlin, but motorists who came through the suburbs said that citizens in Schoenberg yesterday captured a truck loaded with rifles and captured an inspectionary troops and massacred them. The dead were variously reported from 50 to 100, with more than 200 wounded.

Armed workers were reported to be fighting in Berlin. Fighting was especially severe near the Brandenburg gate and the Adlon hotel. Additional fighting took place at the Bellevue hotel, but so far as could be learned none was killed.

Report Ebert's Arrival.
 One apparently reliable report said that President Ebert arrived secretly in the capital last night, accompanied by Philip Scheidemann, the majority socialist leader. Scheidemann it was said will be entrusted with reorganization of the cabinet.

The Hotel Adlon, headquarters for most of the foreign correspondents in favor of the American correspondents, today still bore the appearance of an army hospital in the field. The lower corridors were lined with stretchers, and from wounded men were carried into the hotel after last night's fighting.

As the battle troops marched by the hotel they were cheered by a crowd which had gathered in front of the building, firing severer volleys in the air. Then suddenly they began shooting into the crowd.

Watch the Fighting.
 Newspaper men, many American officials and several American women watched the fighting from windows of upper floors. They saw soldiers leap from the ranks and deliberately shoot down citizens on the sidewalk. Other troops were seen to be hurrying into the fleeing crowd. Dead and wounded lay in the streets. The slaughter lasted about three minutes.

Several American correspondents tried to enter the scene and hurried below to aid in caring for the wounded after the troops had marched on. Dead and wounded were brought into the Adlon and surgeons hurriedly cared for them. Government forces marched into the city about 4:30 p. m.

SPECIAL TRAIN GOES TO RESCUE AMERICANS

CORLENZ, March 20.—A special train made up by local German authorities at the direction of American officers, left this city at 2:00 o'clock back to America to bring the American and allied business men who are stranded there and report in danger. The train will reach Leipzig this afternoon. It takes 1,250 ration coupons for the 200 persons expected to make the return trip and the members of the train crew on a possible five days' journey.

The train consists of a locomotive, a tender, a passenger car, a dining car, a baggage car, a mail car, a kitchen car, a water tank car, a coal tank car and two extra coaches. By skipping way stations it would be possible to make the run to Leipzig and return in 12 hours.

Latest reports say that the allied and American business men who have been attending the Leipzig fair have kept to their hotels, because of the disturbances in the city, but that every provision had been made to care for them and transfer them to the train as soon as it reaches Leipzig.

VERDICT NOT GUILTY IN GAFFORD CASE AT QUANAH LATE FRIDAY

BELGIAN WOMAN ARE REWARDED FOR WORK DURING WORLD WAR

LONDON, March 19.—Awards have just been made to two Belgian women Madame Clement and her sister, Mile, Marie D'Have, and posthumously to their father, Theophile D'Have, for giving to the Belgian general staff details of the first German tank.

Posthumously, Mile D'Have was able to send one of his daughters to Havre, then the Belgian great headquarters, with a design of the mask concealed in her dress.

They declared the premier was "preaching class war" in outlining his reasons for the new political alignment.

Arthur Henderson, leader of the labor party, issued a statement saying: "Labor accepts the challenge of Mr. Lloyd George. We are arranging to attempt to locate the persons who have been selling extracts to pupils of the sixth grade."

SELLING EXTRACTS TO SIXTH GRADE PUPILS

MIAMI, OKLA., March 20.—Authorities of the Roosevelt school are attempting to locate the persons who have been selling extracts to pupils of the sixth grade.

Mrs. W. W. Lynch, sixth grade teacher reported yesterday that three of her boys were drinking a certain brand of extract alleged to contain 82 per cent alcohol. One boy became ill and was sent home while the others "acted funny."

LORD MAYOR OF CORK IS KILLED ON FRIDAY

CORK, March 20.—Thomas MacCurtain, lord mayor of Cork, was shot and killed in his home at Blackpool at 11 a. m. today.

The murder was committed by a band of armed, masked men, who had blacked their faces and hands with black paint.

Mrs. MacCurtain answered a rap at the door and was overpowered. Then her husband was called from his bed chamber and shot in the chest, as he opened the door. The mob fled.

MacCurtain had been a prominent Sinn Féin leader. He served several terms in prison for activities in behalf of the Sinn Féin. Today's shooting came as the climax of a long series of outrages in the Cork district.

Newberry Gets Two Years

GRAND RAPIDS, March 20.—Senator Truman H. Newberry and 16 of his 84 co-defendants were found guilty of criminal conspiracy in the territorial election by a jury in the United States district court here today. Besides the senator the men convicted were his brother, John S. Newberry, Paul King, his campaign manager; Frederick Cody, New York legislative agent; Charles Floyd, Grand Rapids; Alan A. Tompkins, president of the Detroit board of commerce; Hannibal Hopkins, publicity director; B. Frank Emery, office manager; Harry O. Turner, Detroit; Harrison of the national republican headquarters; Roger Andrews, Menominee; publisher, Milton Oakman, Detroit; William J. Mickel, Oshkosh; Wis.; Richard Fletcher, state labor commissioner; J. M. E. McGregor, Detroit; Fred Henry, Flint; and George S. Ladd, Starbridge, Mass.

All other defendants were acquitted on the first charge and none was found guilty on the death count. The penalty is a fine of \$10,000 or less, and two years or less in prison.

Sentences were pronounced upon the convicted men this afternoon as follows: Senator Newberry, two years in Leavenworth and \$10,000 fine.

Frederick Cody, two years in Leavenworth and \$10,000 fine.

Paul King, two years in Leavenworth and \$10,000 fine.

Charles Floyd, two years in Leavenworth and \$5,000 fine.

DOES NOT INVALIDATE HIS SEAT IN SENATE

WASHINGTON, March 20.—Conviction of Senator Newberry by the Grand Rapids jury does not invalidate his seat in the senate, republican leaders said today. He will be entitled to retain office, they declared, until the senate itself acts on the charges filed by his opponent, Henry Ford.

Whether Senator Newberry in view of his conviction will continue his duties in the senate pending a final decision of his case by the courts is a matter for his own discretion, senators said.

PINK BOLL WORM SITUATION IN TEXAS TO BE INVESTIGATED

DALLAS, March 20.—A committee of 13 to investigate the pink boll worm situation in Texas was announced here today by the Texas Chamber of Commerce. Their appointments, made by James Z. George, general manager of the chamber, were authorized by a conference of representatives of farming and commercial interests in Dallas last Wednesday.

In his announcement Mr. George said the committee would investigate the pink boll worm situation in the state and take such action as may be necessary to safeguard the cotton and hemp interests of the state. The personnel of the committee follows:

BURGLARY COMPLAINTS FILED AGAINST YOUTHS

FORT WORTH, March 20.—Following the efforts to rob the National Bank of Commerce early Friday morning, burglary complaints were filed this morning against Harold Hall of Springfield, Texas, and Vernon Moore of Niagara Falls, N. Y. Police who saw a man in the bank and another in an alley arrested Hall and Moore before the vault was opened. Hall in a statement admitted participation in the attempted robbery, but Moore denies his guilt.

DETECTIVE ARRANGES TO GET "TOUCHED" AND MAKES ARRESTS AS A RESULT

City Detective Jackson gave a vivid first hand description in police court Saturday morning of his experiences with a fortune teller or, as she styled herself, a phrenologist, in connection with a case against a woman charged with vagrancy. He told how a friend of his had complained of being "touched" for a fever while he was having his fortune told. Jackson then borrowed \$42. to make a trip to the phrenologist, noting the number of the bills on a piece of paper and assumed the role of a "jasper" from "up the creek" and went into the tent on Ohio street occupied by the woman. He went into detail to tell how the woman had read the lines in his hand, telling him that he was going on a long journey and finally asked if he had any large piece of money. Jackson said he pulled out the roll and extracted a \$10 bill for her to hold. She then, according to the detective story, asked him to tell her truthfully the amount of money he had in the roll. Scouting her rise, Jackson replied that he thought he had \$38, not believing that she would want to relieve him of more than \$5. After various questions on the part of the phrenologist, Jackson related that the woman whom she believed to have the "flow in the middle of the field, she pronounced the seizure or seizure at an end. Then Jackson said he counted the money and found she had been rather ambitious and had taken \$10 instead of \$5. He then declared he thought the phrenologist moment had arrived to show his badge and invited the two to accompany him to the city hall. When they were searched, according to the officer, the two marked bills were found concealed on the person of the "phrenologist."

The women were represented by an attorney who sought to show that the Gypsies were practicing the ancient and honorable science of phrenology. Judge Martin caused a "good deal of merriment" in court when he learned that he asked the women about the technical side of phrenology.

A fine of \$10 apiece was assessed with the advice for them to get greener pastures. The 10 frogs which were taken from the plain clothes man were restored but it was not known whether or not a charge of theft would be entered against the women in the court room.

AUTHORIZE SECOND REVENUE DISTRICT IN NORTHERN TEXAS

WASHINGTON, March 20.—C. N. Holladay of the two internal revenue districts in Virginia and organization of a second district for northern Texas has been authorized by the president. In announcing the change, the internal revenue bureau explained that the reorganization would make easier the handling of tax collection work in the newly developed oil territories of Texas.

Headquarters for the new Texas district will be established at Dallas.

WOULD AGREE TO A 25 CENT SHAVE ON 65 PER CENT BASIS

Wichita Falls Journeymen barbers will return to work immediately at the old price of 25 cents for a shave and the old price for all work if the loss barbers will agree to their demand for 65 per cent of journeymen's gross receipts. The barbers are now getting 50 per cent.

C. N. Pitts, acting secretary of the Barbering union, authorized a statement to this effect Saturday morning.

RECOMMEND THAT SENIOR COLLEGE BE BUILT IN ABILENE

ABILENE, TEX., March 20.—The educational board of the Northwest Texas Methodist conference has recommended that a senior college be built in Abilene.

Meeting here last Wednesday, the board accepted this city's offer of approximately \$400,000 for the college. Abilene also would give another \$100,000 endowment to the proposed college. The board's recommendation, the conference meets in November.

Besides the fund to be provided by Abilene, the general educational board of the church will endow the proposed college to the extent of \$150,000.

BOLSHEVIKI CAPTURE TOWN ON BLACK SEA

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 19.—Dispatches from Novorossiysk today state that Ekaterinodar fell March 18. (Ekaterinodar is about 75 miles inland in Caucasus from Novorossiysk on the Black Sea). It is not clear whether the town was captured by the bolsheviks or by the Russian army. The bolsheviks have been reported to have captured the town but as a bolshevik radio stated that the reds were within a few miles of that town, it is believed that the bolshevik capture by the bolsheviks has been effected.

EARL CARMICHAEL IS AGAIN ARRESTED; CHARGE SWINDLING

Earl Carmichael, released last week by Judge Wilson after having been in jail for eight months, is again in jail charged by complaint in Justice court with swindling. He is charged with swindling over \$50, Carmichael pleaded guilty in federal court to being implicated in the theft of \$1,000 worth of railway checks. He was given a jail sentence of eight months and his sentence was dated back to cover the time he had been in jail and he was released. Carmichael promised to return to the state and other valuables he had received for the money checks but upon leaving jail failed to make good his word, federal officials said.

California Commissioner Lantz brought swindling charges in the state courts against Carmichael and he was arrested Friday afternoon by officials of the sheriff's department. He is from Waco.

FINAL GINNING REPORT MADE BY CENSUS BUREAU

WASHINGTON, March 20.—The final ginning report made by the census bureau today announced that the crop of 1919, ginned to date, is 446,532 equivalent 500 pound bales, compared with 412,327 of 1917 and 412,327.

The department of agriculture in the earlier estimate of the ginning report of 1919, estimated the ginning to date at 412,327 equivalent 500 pound bales.

Included in the 1919 production are 174,629 bales—high ginner estimated would be turned out after the 15th of March. Round bales included are 113,857 for 1919 compared with 124,204 for 1918. American Egyptian included was 42,574 bales compared with 35,173 for 1918 and 35,173 and 6,000 bales, compared with 52,208 for 1918.

"Snapped" and "Bolly" cotton included amounted to 57,554 bales.

The average gross weight of bales was 502.2 pounds compared with 500 pounds in 1918.

Ginneries operated number 18,804 compared with 19,229 in 1918. STANDARD OIL COMPANY LEASES NEW YORK BUILDING

NEW YORK, March 20.—The Standard Oil Company, it was learned today, has acquired a 99 year lease on the new, 10-story, Wells building at 1429 Broadway, which with its present holdings and property for which negotiations are reported to be well under way would give it a 528 1/2 foot Broadway frontage, the greatest in the financial district.

Completion of other reported negotiations would give the company possession of all of the block bounded by Broadway, Beaver and Nassau streets, and Exchange place with the exception of two plots.

ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE TO FIGHT SENATOR HITCHCOCK

WASHINGTON, March 20.—The Anti-Saloon League today declared war on Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska.

Wayne B. Wheeler, general counsel, in a formal statement, said the senator's formal declaration in favor of an amendment to the prohibition code permitting light wines and beers "ought to defeat him not only as a candidate at the democratic convention, but for the leadership in the senate."

To champion a beer and wine amendment is nothing short of an attack upon law enforcement, said Mr. Wheeler. "This beer and wine movement is the entering wedge to destroy prohibition."

JUGO-SLAVIA AND ALBANIA EXPECT TO REACH AGREEMENT

WASHINGTON, March 20.—An early agreement between Jugo-Slavia and Albania on settlement of the Adriatic problem was predicted here today in diplomatic circles. Foreign Ministers Trumbitch of Jugo-Slavia and M. Konizita of Albania, it was said, had been in conference in Paris for a week and a definite approach had been made between the two Balkan countries most vitally concerned in the Adriatic controversy was expected soon to mark the first step in the arrangement of a new Adriatic settlement.

A sympathetic accord between Albania and Jugo-Slavia, who have long been at loggerheads over boundary disputes, officials said, was made possible by the Jugo-Slav suggestion for the creation of an autonomous Albanian state, made him reply to the French and British ultimatum.

CAN RE-SUBMIT QUESTION OR MAKE IT A CAMPAIGN ISSUE; LATTER COURSE IS EXPECTED

PPRESIDENT WILSON WILL PARTICIPATE

WASHINGTON, March 20.—President Wilson will continue to participate in the settlement of international questions growing out of the war despite the senate's rejection of the peace treaty, it was learned today.

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Night News Briefs

NEW YORK.—At dinner given in his honor by friends and associates on the occasion of his sixtieth birthday, William Jennings Bryan declared that it was not his ambition to enjoy the honors of public office, but to start his charges as fully as possible his debt of gratitude to the American people.

SENATE TREATY BACK

WASHINGTON.—The senate for the fourth time voted against ratification of the peace treaty, and decided to send it back to the president with a notification, who should start to refuse to advise and consent to its ratification.

LONDON.—The lord mayor of Cork was shot dead by masked men of an anti-saloon league and adjourned. It will not meet Monday.

PLUMBING COMPANY IS FINED FOR FAILURE TO REPAIR THE PAVEMENT

A local plumbing company was fined \$10 in corporation court Saturday morning for destroying city property on a street in Dallas. The company had neglected to repair a hole made in the concrete pavement. The permit to excavate the hole, obtained from the city, required the company in order to allow the firm to repair some sewer connections. Acting Judge Sartin recommended that the firm be given until Monday to repair the hole, and that if they failed to do so after that they should be fined each day until they repaired it.

PROMINENT DENTIST OF OKLAHOMA DROPS DEAD

TULSA, OKLA., March 20.—Dr. Frederick Coulter, Oklahoma City, president-elect of the Oklahoma State Dental Society, dropped dead while attending a business meeting of the society in the municipal auditorium at about 8:00 o'clock last night.

Dr. Coulter had just arrived at the auditorium and started to sit down when he fell face forward. He died before others in the building could reach him. Dr. Hettzell, Minneapolis, one of the visiting dentists, said his death was caused by apoplexy.

Dr. Coulter came to Oklahoma from Chicago in 1898. No funeral arrangements have been made, pending word from Mrs. Coulter.

NATIONAL CONFERENCE ON COMMUNITY ORGANIZATION

WASHINGTON, March 20.—The national conference on community organization, which was called by Franklin K. Lane as one of his last official acts before retiring as secretary of the interior, met here today.

This afternoon session was devoted entirely to a discussion of what special groups can do to "promote neighborhood days" and the community movement.

A resolution introduced at the morning session proposed the formation of a national body which would include in its membership representatives from each of the 48 important national groups.

MAY MAKE IT ISSUE

The general expectation among senators is that they will make the second course and ask the democratic party to make the treaty the paramount issue in the campaign.

Whatever Wilson does about the treaty, it was generally agreed here today, that the country faces another long stage of treaty ratification in the senate if it will be delivered from every stump in the land.

For a long time, it is believed that the senate will not ratify the treaty. In the senate it is going to try to get the country a separate Wilson.

BRAYN OPPOSES WILSON

In the opinion of many in the senate, Bryan is opposed to Wilson on the question of reservations. That fight may make the 1920 democratic convention a war of attrition.

In the opinion of many in the senate, Bryan is running for president on an anti-treaty platform, while Lodge will have to run on a treaty platform. At Chicago they will be the two main issues.

The position of the senate, which finally and unilaterally in the opinion of many a nation, is not the treaty into the campaign, was devoted largely to a study of the political aspects of the situation, were not considered.

Irslinger Defeats Harry Demetral in Wrestling Match

Henry Irslinger defeated Harry Demetral of Houston last night in a wrestling match at the C. A. C. Irslinger took the first and third falls and the second went to the Greek.

The match was witnessed by a good sized crowd, with whom the match proved a great favor from the start. The match proved one thing and proved it conclusively—wrestling is a popular sport has come to stay in Wichita Falls. While the two wrestlers went at it as hard as they could go last night, the crowd cheered and yelled alternately, and there was far more excitement during the bout than at many of the boxing bouts.

Irslinger found popular favor, due to some actions on the part of Demetral which tended toward the unfair. This was especially true of the end of the second period, when Irslinger was knocked completely out due to a kick in the chin administered by Demetral. The kick was forceful enough to break a dental plate in Irslinger's mouth. It was this kick more than anything else that gave Demetral the fall, as Irslinger was helpless to defend himself. He bounced off the ropes and fell flat, Demetral going down on top of him for the fall.

In the first period, Demetral started the things by clamping a headlock on the local wrestler. From then on the fastest wrestling seen in some time ensued. Holds were made and broken in less time than it takes to tell it. Head spins and everything known to the wrestling game in the way of the defensive art were pulled by Irslinger, while his opponent took the offensive. Irslinger appeared to be slightly out of training and his wind could have been better. The fact that he was a little out of shape gives him all the more credit for his wonderful showing against the Greek who was in perfect shape. After 45 minutes of the hardest kind of going, Irslinger managed to squeeze out of a tight place and clamp a body scissor and bar arm. This combination won the fall.

The second fall was short and snappy. For the first five minutes it looked like a repetition of the first, but at the eight minute mark the boys got mixing it in the corner, with Irslinger on top. Suddenly his body shot into the air and he fell back against the ropes, then bounced to the ropes at right angles to that side of the mat, and then he went down. He was taken from the ring and upon examination it was found that a bridge of plate had been broken. Part of the bridge of the ring at which the thing happened stated that Demetral kicked Irslinger in the face.

Irslinger came right back, however, and took the third fall in 14 minutes with a Japanese back roll.

Irslinger weighed 166 pounds and Demetral 158. Demetral issued a challenge after the match for a rematch at the legitimate middleweight limit, 155 pounds. George Sauers, the referee, challenged Irslinger following the bout, and will meet Irslinger at the C. A. C. next Friday night.

FURTHER PLAN FOR LIGHTING SYSTEM IN BUSINESS DISTRICT
