AGUA PRIETA, Sonora, April 28.—Mazatlan, Sinaloa, a port on the Pacific coast of Mexico, is being attacked by revolutionary forces under General Angel Flores, according to an unconfirmed report received at military headquarters here today. General P. Elias Calles announced the attack had been expected since yesterday.

Restrictions Upon Sale of Shipping Stock

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Estab-WASHINGTON, April 28.—Establishment of an America-first policy for the development of the American merchant marine is provided in a bill drafted as a substitute for the house merchant marine bill by the senate commerce sub-committee and made public today by Chairman Jones, who plans to report it to the full committee tomortow.

Coastwise shipping, the bill provides must be entirely American owned while 75 per cent of the stock of corporations engaged in foreign trade must be held by American citizens. Sales of American ships to foreign interests would be prohibited by the bill without the approval of the shipping board, which the act creates.

The bill also would prohibit the in

The bill also would prohibit the in-terstate commerce commission from exercising authority already existing to grant preferential rail and water freight rates on exports or imports as well as passenger rates unless Amer-ican-owned vessels were used. Upon ican-owned vessels were used. Upon the board's recommendations, where American owned occan transportation facilities are inadequate, the commission would be authorised by the bill, however, to suspend this section. In order to permit this discrimination, the bill directs the president within 90 days from its passage to terminate treaties restricting the right of the United States "to impose discriminating duties or tornage dues on foreign ing duties or tonnage dues on foreign

imports or fore gn vessels."
"This simply unshackles the United States commercially so far as its mer-chant marine is concerned and will enable 12 to pass such laws as it may desire to pass for the encouragement of the merchant marine," Senator Jones said today. In providing for the preferential rates, he declared, the bill only proposed a policy similar to that under which Germany, Japan and other countries have built up their export trade and maintained their ship-

As already announced, the bill would As already announced, the bill would place the present government-owned merchant fleet under the direction of a shipping board composed of seven members which would be authorized to operate the ships under charter or otherwise and develop the foreign trade routes by means of private en-terprise if possible, or through govern-

ment operation if necessary.

AUSTIN, April 28.—Fire losses in Texas during 1919 were 35 per cent less than in 1918, according to reports made by insurance companies to the state fire insurance commission which have just been compiled. They reported a total loss last year of \$7.278.851, and of this amount they paid claims for \$5,360,792. The commission estimated that these figures represent about 50 per cent of the total fire loss, since not all of the insurance companies doing business in Texas make reports and the uninsured losses in towns and on farms, an Texas make reports and the unin-sured losses in towns and on farms, together with fences, forests and grass which cannot be insured, will run the total for 1919 to 315,000,000. The report accounted for 6,114 fires and the causes are given as follows:

Unknown, 1,179; exposures, 935; chimney, flues, cupolas, overheated or defective, 540; petroleum and its products, 495; matches and smoking, 420; lightning, buildings not rodged, 287; sparks on roofs, 338; electricity (not including irons and other desires), 237.

However, the vote was very close, seldom showing a margin of more than 533 for Wood against Johnson. While, theoretically, the question of the military force to be maintained is purely an internal one which every country has a right to settle for itself, yet, as a matter of fact, every country as has always been the case in the past, is obliged to govern the size of its military effectives and strength by what its neighbors are doing.

Likewise as in the past, Germany is still the world's predominating factor in this respect. The peace treaty originally reduced the German army to 100,000 men. Later this was temporarily increased to 200,000 in order to enable Germany to meet internal

### **OPERATORS IN TERRITORY UNDER** RECEIVER TO BE HELD RESPONSIBLE FOR MISTAKES OR FOR NEGLIGENCE

Tests in the Red River bed territory under the jurisdiction of the federal receiver, Frederick A. Delano, which are uncompleted and which are at such a depth that unless they are at such a depth that unless they are cased or otherwise protected would result either in the loss of the hole and the labor and material expended on it, or result in any damage to the oil proporties on which they are situated, should be finished to such a point as will result in the protection of the work done and to the adjoining property, according to a statement issued Wednesday by Mr. Delano.

lano.

Any damage to a well or to property under the jurisdiction of the receiver resulting either from a mistake in judgment or through negligence of the operator will render the operator accountable to the receiver for this injury, the statement continues.

tinues. The receiver further recommends that tests which have just been started in tihs territory, and which are not down to such a depth as to make their immediate completion necessary, should be shut down until a representative of the receiver can be on the ground to supervise their completion. The statement further states thart he has no authority under the

pletion. The statement further states thart he has no authority under the mandate of the supreme court to reimburse any parties for drilling or other development on their leases.

Operators are urged to speed up the work of preparing inventories required in the questionnaires addressed to them by the receiver, and are notified that these inventories can not be checked by the receiver or his représentatives until the leases have been cleaned up and all the loose material assembled thereon. The cleaning up of the leases is especially urged by Mr. Delano in the interest of the reduction of fire hazards.

Permanent local offices are to be oncored by the receiver in the new City National bank building, it is announced. Temporary offices have been maintained at the Hotel William and Mary where he and his party have been staying since their arrival in Wichita Falls. The principal office of the receiver is located in Washington.

CLEBURNE. TEX., April 28.—Organized opposition to the open shop association was urged in the report of officers of the Texas Federation of Labbr, in session here today.

C. F. Rusci, of San Antonio, third vice president, said that the open shop movement, "born in that city last year, is rapidly disintegrating." He asserted that unions have profited by the opposition to them through the open shop movement, but advised union carpenters to remain away from San Antonio. He urged the organization of more unions at Dallas to combat the open shop movement there and said that Dallas unions would "get the organizers goat and crowd him on to other destinations."

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Japanese guards near Nikolaevsk, eastern Siberia, are believed to have been annihilated and several Japanese, including the consul there, massacred, according to an official statement by the Japanese foreign office made public today by the state department.

The Japanese statement said suspension of communication with the district rendered it impossible to get at the real state of affairs, but that it was evident that "a serious upheaval" had taken place.
