


CAVERNOUS CHAMBER

Being an inveterate "book-worm" it is only natural that I should like to pay tribute to the men and women everywhere who have helped make books available to the general public, and say a special "thank you" to the Friona city fathers and the Library board.

Thanks also the the Friends of the Library and to all those working either as individuals or through clubs and civic organizations.

At a point in the world's history where general knowledge is doubling every seven years it would be unthinkable to deprive our children of any means of education.

The appreciation of public and private libraries is by no means new,

The ancient Egyptians, Babylonians, and Greeks, to name only three empires, had gathered great numbers of stone and clay tablets filled with inscriptions.

Thousands of papyrus rolls were stored in pyramids, temples and monastaries, thus preserving all manner of knowledge and thereby forming the nuclei of our present system of libraries.

Here in the United States libraries got the greatest boost from Andrew Carnegie who gave sixty four million dollars toward the establishing of seventeen hundred libraries.

Carnegie was a poor Scottish immigrant who earned only one dollar a week at his first job in America.

In waging his own personal war on poverty he was greatly helped by the printed word.

Years later after he had amassed a vast fortune he demonstrated his respect for all branches of learning by sharing his wealth with schools, colleges and organizations devoted to maintaining peace and good will among men.

The largest university library in the world is that of Harvard.

Founded in 1638 by John Harvard, it was an oasis of learning in the raw colonies, but it was not the first in the new world. Any history of libraries is the essence of history itself and the first library in America was part and parcel of the English settlement in Virginia.

In May of 1611 Sir Thomas Dale came from England to be

"High Marshall of Virginia." For some months the settlers had realized that the swampy

surroundings at Jamestown were unhealthful and Dale soon decided to move the village upstream a few miles to higher ground.

He chose a location where the James river makes a series of "ox-bow" bends - on the map it looks like a snake crawling. The land is sandy loam and in those days supported a good stand of timber.

Across one short neck of land Dale caused a channel to be dug; thereby turning a peninsula into an island.

The man in charge of the digging was from Holland - and of course his nickname was "Dutch",

The new channel became known as "Dutch's Gap", today it is the scene of extensive sand and gravel dredging operations and fittingly enough is called Dutch Gap. (Those of you who have seen my collection of Indian artifacts may recall the largest of the spearheads - it was found near Dutch Gap). This new town of Dale's was to be Henricus in honor of Prince Henry, son of James 1st of England.

It was well planned and fortified and contained a college (our nation's first) which in turn housed our original library. Sir Thomas' plan would have worked real well - except for one thing!

The heathen redmen failed to appreciate his attempt to father English domination of their hunting grounds - so they burned the whole deal and chased the settlers back to the swamps of Jamestown!

40 YEARS AGO -- APRIL 26, 1929

Friona was visited last Saturday by what was perhaps the most costly fire in its history, when the immense piles of grain heads and ear corn in the Doggett Grain Company's yard caught fire.

Wind swept the fire from the northwest corner of the yard to the south, and soon the entire yard, consisting of three city blocks, was in flames. Estimates put the loss at not less than \$12,000.

millions of young grasshoppers. Mr. Clearman assured us that the hoppers we saw coming out of the ground, literally by the thousands, were the real "migratory" variety, and if nothing is done about them, they will take wing within six weeks and be ready to destroy crops many miles from their place of origin.

15 YEARS AGO-APRIL 29, 1954



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
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Dear Editor:

Street of town. And I would like to see this speed limit enforced. Those of us living on 5th Street who have small children live in mortal fear of our little ones lives,



Growing small-flowered dahlias from seeds is a fascinating adventure, for the colors and the forms of the blooms all will be different. Treat yourself to a little fun!

One of the most rewarding efforts any gardener can make in late winter or early spring is to sow a packet of seeds of dwarf dahlias. This is because the results are so entrancing. Two different hybrid groups of little dahlias are available. The Coltness hybrids have single flowers; the Unwin hybrids have mostly semi-duble but operationally a plast with following dashle


mostly semi-double but occasionally a plant with fully-double

range of colors.


And another mixture from which many of the whites and yellows have been eliminated, thus giving a darker-colored overall appear-ance to a bed of these dahlias.

It takes only four months or a bit less from the time seeds are sown until the little plants start to bloom. It's such fun to watch as the first blossom on each opens - to see the form, color and flower size!

These little fellows are easy dahlias to grow. Set out the plants in a sunny place where the soil is good, spacing them 18 inches apart. No need to pinch them back as is done with large dablias



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


