Another barrage of deadlines are creeping up on Friona area residents - about the last "wave" of 1969 deadlines.

Next Tuesday, April 1, will be the deadline for having your 1969 automobile plates affixed on your vehicles. That day is also the final day for voting absentee in either the city or school election.

There hasn't been much activity to date on the absentee voting scene, because there are the same number of candidates as there are offices in both the city and school races. However, officials point out that those wishing to cast their ballots keep in mind that the election date, April 5, comes on the Easter weekend; hence an absentee ballot might be in order.

Then, a couple of weeks down the road, starting everyone in the face, is the national day of mourning on April 15, otherwise known as income tax filing deadline.

And if you see people "hoofing it" on the 16th, it probably won't be because Uncle Sam has already taken their autos-it could just be that they didn't meet the other April 15 deadline-securing inspection stickers for their autos.

So, if you haven't paid attention to all of the above-mentioned deadlines--better step on it. And, if you haven't done anything about ANY of them as yet--lot's of luck.

Hunt For \$\$ New Businesses Started In Friona

The Friona Association of Retail Merchants announce an Easter shopping promotion, in which adult shoppers will be looking for "prize eggs" with cash as the prize.

MBP Elects New Officer Slate

Eugene Frye, president of Missouri Beef Packers, stated at a meeting of the company's shareholders last week that on

the basis of unsullied figures, the last four weeks accounting period had been the most profitable in the history of the company.

Unanimously elected to MBP's board of directors were Frye, Melvin Rolf, J.C. Walker, Harold Wichman, George Knepper, Robert Lee Stanton, Gordon Clifton, Frank Barker, George Beasing, O.C. Swackhammer, Dr. John Wanamaker, and Harold Melvin.

Melvin was elected to fill the position vacated by Charles L. Bacon, who did not stand for re-election. Bacon has been elected vice-president and general counsel for the company.

At the meeting of the board following adjournment of the shareholders meeting, Rolf and Knepper were re-elected as chairman and vice chairman of the board of directors.

The board also unanimously elected the following officers: Eugene Frye, president; J.C. Walker, executive vice president; Bacon, vice president and general counsel; Harold Wichman, administrative vice president, comptroller and assistant secretary; Raymond Shubate, vice president of sales; Wayne Tucker, vice president of sales; Robert Lee Stanton, secretary and Gordon Clifton, treasurer.

FOR "BREAKING"

Addition Is Proposed To Friona MBP Plant

Officials of Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. have announced a proposed addition to their Friona plant, and have stated that the company proposes to build two additional beef packing plants. The corporation currently has plants in Friona and in Rock Port, Missouri, the home office.

No definite plans have been announced for the addition to the local plant, but should be forthcoming in another week to 10 days, according to Dave LaFleur, manager of the company's Friona division.

The addition to the Friona plant, which also was announced in the company's annual report for 1968, which has just been released to shareholders, will include facilities for breaking and fabricating of the meat.

The new facility will permit the entire production of carcass beef at the local plant to be broken into primal cuts. The facility will also have capacity for fabricating primal cuts to satisfy the specific needs of this important segment of the market.

At the present time, the breaking portion of the Friona plant employs 10 people. The company is contemplating building a separate building of 6,000 to 8,000 square feet, and employing from 20 to 30 additional men.

The company's annual report hinted that the expansion would begin right away, but LaFleur said last week it might be fall before the expansion would start.

"Actually, with the price of cattle as high as it is right now, it does not benefit us as much on the breaking end," LaFleur said.

The Friona plant opened in May of 1968, and since settling a labor problem toward the end of the year has been turning out beef in near-capacity quantities. With a capacity of slaughtering 2,000 cattle per day, MBP's Friona plant is the largest single-

chain operation in the world today.

Nothing further has been said regarding the company's announced intentions to build two additional plants, although an MBP official hinted that something might be announced within the next couple of days.

Speculation has had it that the company might build a plant in the Stratford and/or Plainview areas.

40 YEARS AGO-MARCH 29, 1929

30 YEARS AGO-MARCH 31, 1939

The story you are about to read is true; vouched for by two of the people who were closely involved. It is brought to you in the belief that "to be forewarned is to be forearmed."

In it a very real and present danger is, I hope, illustrated. For obvious reasons the names of people and places are omitted.

It could happen in Friona, and the victims could be - - who? It began with a midnight phone call.

"Our little girl hasn't come home yet,"

"She phoned after school saying she was planning to eat at a drive in and then go to a movie."

"Yes, I've called the police. They haven't had any reports of violence or accidents concerning teenagers."

"Can you and your wife come over?"

Which one among us can deny the plea of a distraught father?

His sixteen year old daughter was suddenly a "missing person."

This is no family from an underprivileged minority group.

The father is a reasonably well-to-do man.

Upper bracket social standing, high salary, beautiful home, two cars.

The entire family long time members of the largest church in town.

No record of misbehavior or trouble with the children.

And yet here is this fine Christian couple held tight in the strangling, icy, grip of terror.

Another frantic call to the police.

"No, we have no word as yet".

"Which drive in?"

"Which movie?"

"Who was she with?"

"Who is her boyfriend?"

"Who are her girl friends?"

"We'll let you know when we learn anything."

"Yes, sir, we understand, we'll do all we can."

The first night dragged by.

The parents sat huddled on the divan and watched the dawn of the second day.

Milkmen and paperboys made their accustomed rounds.

Early morning traffic began its daily rumble in the streets.

The rising sun sent probing fingers of light dispelling every corner of darkness - except the gloom of fear and the shadows of dreadful anticipation that had settled like a fog around the too quiet house.

The muffled phone rang.

Another girl, a schoolmate, was missing also.

She, too, had called home to say she would eat downtown, claiming that choir practice would occupy the afternoon.

So passed the second day - forty eight hours of sleepless fasting.

And the morning was that of the third day.

A traffic officer saw the photographs of the two young girls and recognized them as having been passengers in a car he had stopped on the afternoon of their disappearance.

A routine check of tag numbers and car registration followed.

The driver, an older girl, was suspected of being a pusher for a ring of marijuana dealers.

The police dragnet widens to include a city a few hundred miles south.

In early evening the message comes by phone - the two girls have been located.

The older girl, the pusher, has eluded the police. After eighty-two hours of anguish, the girl was returned to her parents.

She had not intended to do anything really bad.

Some of the other kids said that smoking a couple of marijuana cigarettes was a "fun thing" and "everybody" was doing it. They assured her the weed was not addictive and did not lead to the "strong stuff."

Somewhere a father goes about his regular business but he is quieter than usual and seems preoccupied.

A mother attends to her duties, pausing now and then to gaze at nothing.

A daughter is back in school, but somehow things are not the same.

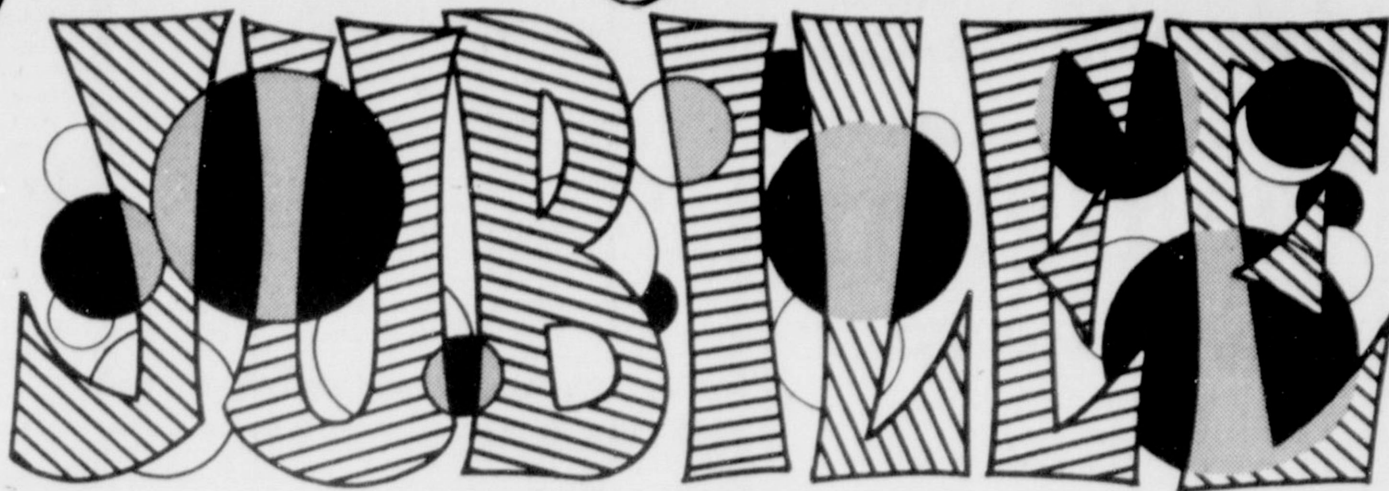
Rev. Bill Foll, pastor of Friona's First Baptist Church has been the visiting minister in revival services at the First Baptist Church in Petersburg this week.

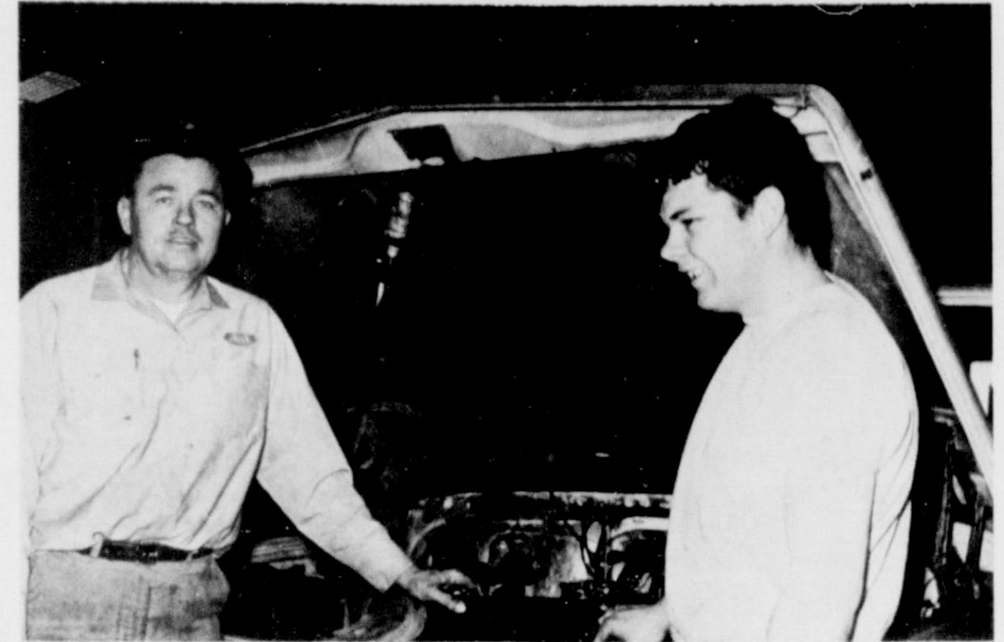

Farmers Should Plan Place For Wildlife

Have you included a place for wildlife management in your farming operation this year? Now that the new planting season has arrived every landowner should check his farm planning operation to see if the wildlife on the farm is being considered in his farming plans.

Every farm will have some place for wildlife management in its operations. A farm that is completely in cultivation can still be managed to produce small game such as quail by the use of fences and turnrows, waterways, ditches, and those areas which are unsuitable for cropland production.

These areas can be used as nesting and food supply areas at very little cost to the landowner by planting small grains such as millets, sudans and sorghum allum. The weed and erosion hazard will also be reduced when these unused areas are planted to crops that can be used by wildlife.

Landowners who are operating ranch and farm-ranch combinations are in a very good position to include wildlife management in their farm and ranch operations. Rangeland can be managed for the production of big game animals such as deer and antelope as well as small game. Stock ponds that are used in farm operations can be

stocked with almost any appropriate game fish at very little cost to the landowner through the use of the State Game and Fish Department facility which can be obtained by contacting your local County Agent or Soil Conservation Service.

Any landowner interested in wildlife on his farm or ranch should analyze the facilities for wildlife production on his farm as the carrying capacity for wildlife depends on quality, quantity, and distribution of food, water and cover.

Cover of several types for nesting, loafing, roosting, escape, and to protect from the elements. The wildlife analysis of the farm should include the present condition of the wildlife, and the potential possibility afforded on the farm for increased production.

The Soil Conservation Service philosophy is to use each acre according to its capabilities, and treat it according to its needs. This includes the land and water that is best suited for fish or wildlife production.

Wildlife is a crop of the land, and agricultural crop that can be used for cash, food, and personal pleasure. The landowner is the sole lifeline for wildlife. Incorporate wildlife management in your farm planning this year.

Citizens Have Right To Appeal Medicare Rulings

If a person disagrees with a decision on entitlement to Medicare benefits, does he have any appeals rights? According to Wayne Klipping, social security Field Representative for this area, the law provides an appeals process for both parts of Medicare.

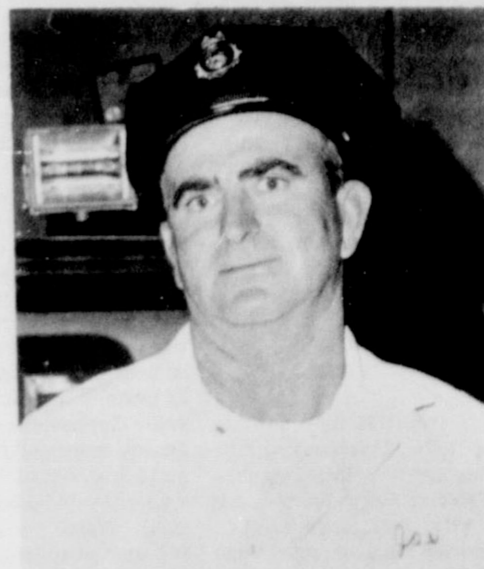
Occasionally, a person doesn't understand the notice he receives from Medicare and so he asks the local social security office to help explain it. After the explanation, the person is usually satisfied that his claim was processed properly and the case is closed.

After an explanation of the claim, Klipping pointed out, a person who still felt an error had been made could appeal the decision.

The amount of money involved, and the type of benefit affected, will determine the actual mechanics of the appeals process. However, the social security interviewer will assist with the completion of the proper forms in each case.

Anyone who has questions about Medicare or other social security matters should get in touch with Klipping in the Council Room at the City Hall from 9 a.m. until noon on the third Tuesday of each month.

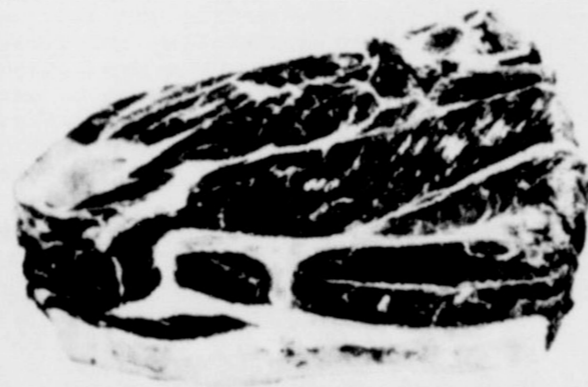

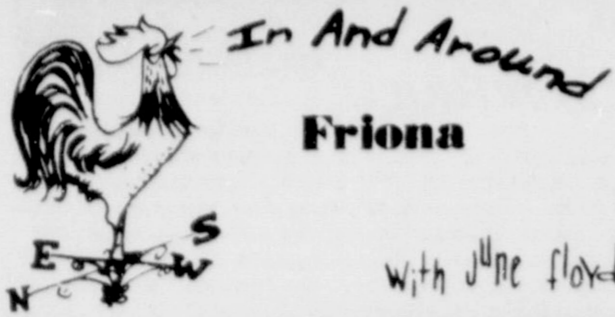

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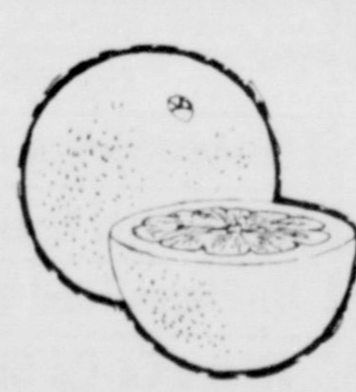
