## Showers Halt Harvest Work

The Vietnam war moratorium passed quietly in Friona last week. As a matter of fact, most of the activity was by anti-demonstrationists, who flew flags, or proudly wore them in their lapels during the day.

Nelson Lewis was sort of a one-man campaign to furnish city residents with small "party flags" for their lapels.

He said one person stopped him on Main Street and asked him what the flags cost (he was giving them away). "Nothing, but it could cost you plenty someday if you don't wear one," Lewis replied.

We're real pleased with the football schedule announced for the Friona Chieftains for 1970, and we feel most other fans also will be.

The two long trips for non-conference games which were on the current schedule (Tucumcari and Crosbyton) have been replaced by Bovina and Muleshoe. Not only will the long trips be saved, but more natural rivalries will be renewed.

Muleshoe has been played since as early as 1928, and always draws fan interest, whether the game is played here or in Muleshoe. And Bovina provides another county rivalry and that's usually enough to pack the stands.

Next fall, the longest trip on the schedule will be a district game to Abernathy. Floydada and Lockney will each be met here. With games at nearby Farwell and Muleshoe, it will be almost like having seven home games, in comparison to this year.

Probably the only people not happy about the deal are the local gasoline dealers.

But, you can't please everyone, as a maize farmer said this week while looking out at the falling rain.

Speaking of a moratorium, it appears that some sort of showdown is in the making between grain farmers, especially of the NFO variety, and area feed yards.

The NFO recently recommended that members hold grain off the market until it reaches \$2.30 per hundredweight.

The Texas Cattle Feeders Association, Jack Carrothers, president, points out that this would place area feedlots in an unfavorable position in comparison to other feeding areas of the nation.

In a recent conference, Carrothers said, "If the cattle feeding industry of the region is forced into a non-competitive position, the feeding industry will be cut back and the market for grain sorghum will be correspondingly reduced. Any attempt to establish an artificial price for grain sorghum will bring irrevocable harm to the entire economy of the region."

The local cattle-feeding industry has flourished because of the availability of grain sorghum—the chief ingredient in feeding rations. Feedlots were established by individuals for the most part who also were interested in helping the area's grain market.

It would be too bad if the relationship of the area feedlots and grain farmers—which has been a perfect marriage thus far—should be allowed to deteriorate, and both factions be hurt.

However, we don't believe this will happen, if both sides use common sense.

A slow, drizzling rain which set in about midnight Monday enveloped the entire area in moisture, stalling harvest operations in maize and sugar beets, and delaying the start of the cotton harvest.

However, the rain which may exceed three inches in some places, was welcomed by farmers with wheat or other "small grain" crops, and pastureland.

The total received in the city of Friona up to 8 a.m. Wednesday was 1.56 inches, and it was still raining at press time.

The rain appeared to be general throughout the area. A resident of Lazbuddie said that he had received two inches of rain by noon Tuesday, and probably another inch Tuesday night.

Jim Dixon in the Rhea community, indicated that he had received 1.5 inches by Wednesday morning, and that wheat, oats and pasture out that way were smiling their approval.

In the Lakeview community, Otho Whitefield said he received 1.5 inches of rain on Tuesday night, which should easily exceed two inches. "There is water everywhere, and it's beginning to run down the ditches," he said Wednesday morning.

One nice aspect of the rain was that it fell slowly, and most of it should soak into the area farmland, unlike heavy, hard rains which the area gets many times. This is borne out by the official record by the City of Friona.

A total of .70 inches had been received between 1 and 8 a.m. Tuesday. Another .34 inch fell between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., and then a shower of .52 inches fell during the night Tuesday.

Some farmers thought it would be a week before they could get back into the fields, but weren't particularly worried. "It usually always gets dry in this country, sooner or later," one farmer said.

## UIL Re-Shuffles District Setup

A somewhat different district schedule for 1970 and 1971 for Friona High School, and two major changes in the non-district schedule were brought about by the biennial realignment of districts by the Interscholastic League this week.

Major changes in the district alignment is the addition of Littlefield, a member of conference AA district to the south for the past four years.

It will mark the first time in history for Friona to meet Littlefield in football, although the teams have met on the basketball court. Morton was a district-mate of Friona's for four years prior to the shift in 1966, and has been played as a non-district opponent since that time.

Littlefield moved into the district by virtue of the UIL moving up the maximum enrollment figures for class AA schools to 499. It had previously been 449. Littlefield is said to have had an average enrollment of 497 for the past two years—just two under the new maximum.

Friona's average enrollment

for the qualifying period was 330, making it about an "average" size for class AA.

Hale Center moved out of the district, as the new minimum for class AA was increased to 230 students, and the Hale County school failed to qualify. They had been in class AA only the past two years, under the old minimum of 220.

The realignment left an even number of teams in Friona's district-eight, and also allowed coaches and officials to reschedule non-district games for the next two years. Thus, the two teams played during the past two years more or less on a "stop gap" measures—Tucumcari and Crosbyton, were eliminated.

In their places, two nearby schools—Bovina and Muleshoe—were added. Both of these old rivals have been on Friona's schedule many times in the past, but neither since 1967, because of scheduling problems.

The Chiefs will once again open their season against county rival Farwell, on the Steer's home field September 11. Bovina will be met at Chieftain Field on September 18, and the Chieftains will visit Muleshoe for the tilt with the class AAA Mules on September 25.

The district schedule is as follows:  
October 2—Olton, there; October 9—Dimmitt, here; October 16—Littlefield, here; October 23—Abernathy, there; October 30—Floydada, here; November 6—Morton, there; November 13—Lockney, here.

## FFA Boys To Collect Money In "CROP" Drive

On Monday, October 27, between the hours of six and eight in the evening, the Friona Chapter of the FFA will conduct a house to house canvas for "CROP."

"CROP" is the Community Hunger Appeal of Church World Service collecting resources for the overseas relief programs of the churches. Last year, shipments valued at \$1,566,000 were made to hunger areas, especially Nigeria-Biafra, and in 25 other countries. For every dollar given to CROP 400 pounds of our surplus foods are sent overseas to those who are starving.

In addition to emergency shipments of food to starvation victims, "CROP" is now providing

9,000 pounds of vegetable seed, 110,230 pounds of hybrid seed corn, and 42,000 pounds of soybean seed to help refugees replenish their vanishing food supply.

The youth of the entire state of Texas participate in this annual canvas, and the FFA boys are part of a large army that will fan out to ask generous Texans to give aid to those who are starving. "The boys have always done a fine job in our town, and I know they will be given every cooperation by the citizens of Friona, Rhea and Hub this year," says Rev. Paul Mohr, local "CROP" chairman. The boys will be working under the direction of their advisors, Benny Pryor and Bob Middleton.

## Football Leaders See Scores Take Nosedive

Lovelace was the only contestant to score a 13, and the two who had scores of 12 tied for second and third place money. They were Trip Horton and Clarence Monroe.

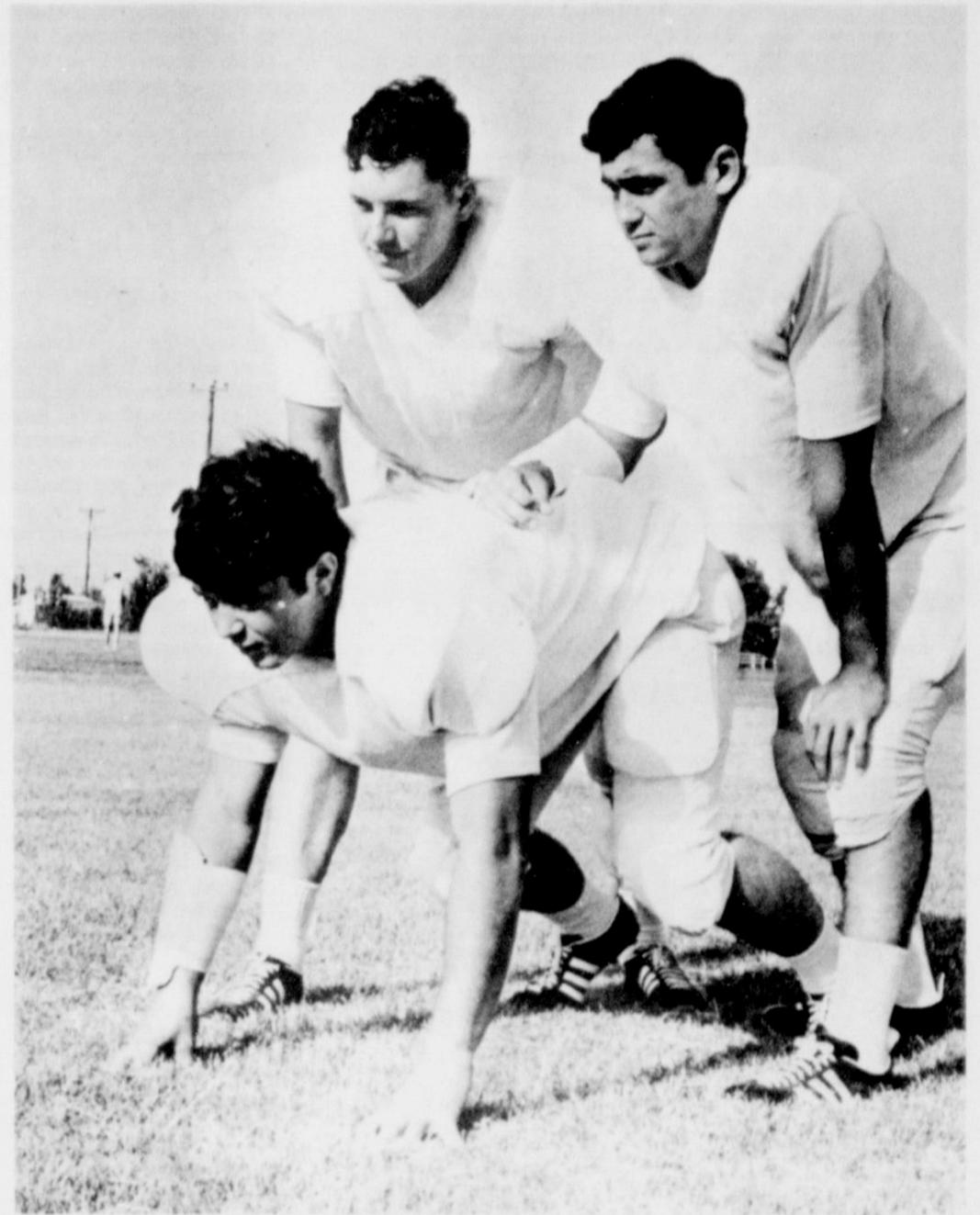
Horton's only miss besides the tie was Farwell-Springlake, while Monroe missed by picking West Texas State over Colorado State.

## Chiefs Out To Upset Tough Floydada "11"

The Floydada Whirlwinds, who have provided Friona with some exciting games in the past few years, will try to stay unbeaten when they invade Chieftain Field for the district 3-AA battle Friday.

Although the "Winds are 6-0 for the year, compared to Friona's 3-3, many people have compared them to Friona. They don't have the speed, for example, that Lockney had. Like Friona, they depend on steady grinding game.

Friona will be out to upset Floydada's appellation—and perhaps repay the Whirlwinds partially for the defeat they handed Friona the first time the teams ever met—1964—when Friona was unbeaten in district and the Chiefs visited Floydada.

The teams have met four times since that inaugural game, swapping out with two wins each. So, you might say it is Friona's time for a win to keep the series even at 3-3.

In fact, Friona needs a win to keep their season win-loss record on a winning keel. After Friday, the team will have

only one other home game, and the Chiefs admittedly have done much better at home this season, especially in district play, where they've won their only test.

By winning the Chiefs could also stay mathematically in the district race, and slow down the Whirlwind express.

Friona will be more ready to play this week, with starting fullback Isidore Cordova ready for action. Cordova was averaging 118 yards rushing per game until getting a head knock at Lockney after only two tries for six yards.

Guard James Weatherly will be available for duty, and as a whole the team will be practically at full strength for the first time this year.

The week's wet weather has hampered early-week workouts, but Coach Bob Owen said that the team spirit had bounced back, following last week's loss.

Owen termed Lockney the "Best team Friona had faced to date."

## Frionan's Relatives

### Don't Act Their Age

At an age when most people would be content to stay at home and watch "As the World Turns," a couple of octogenarians related to a Friona man are giving the world "another turn."

Mr. and Mrs. T.N. Wright of Sacramento, California, an uncle and aunt to Charles Russell of 1311 Virginia, Friona, visited here with the Russells last week on the last leg of a tour which has taken them thousands of miles and is now in its sixth month.

Mr. and Mrs. Wright aren't any different from many other such tourists, except perhaps for the fact that he is 88 and she is 82.

And Mr. Wright, although practically blind (he is considered blind by the state of California) has not let that handicap keep him from travelling. He gets around good with a cane, and walks three or four blocks every day.

The Wrights left Sacramento by plane last May 6, and they have visited relatives in Michigan, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Florida.

At Fort Lauderdale, Fla., Mr. and Mrs. Wright were met by their daughter, Pauline, who works for the American Embassy in Bogota, Colombia.

The Wrights have five children 15 grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren. About Russell, Mrs. Wright said, "He was our son before we had one of our own."

The Russells took the Wrights to Colorado for a week's visit

with relatives there. It was in Colorado that the Wrights first met, while he was teaching school in Chromo in 1906-7.

Mrs. Wright, whose father was a Union soldier in the Civil War, remembers how the family moved to Colorado from Illinois by wagon train when she was only eight years old. It was quite an adventure, she says.

Wright taught school for 27 years, and was with the Farm Bureau another 17 years before retiring.

This was their third visit to Friona, and the Russells said they were afraid Mr. and Mrs. Wright would never come back for a visit after they left in 1954 amid one of the worst dust storms the area has seen.

"Yes, it was a terrible dust storm, but we didn't hold that against Friona. All states have their good and bad qualities, and you don't gauge them by their worst," Mrs. Wright said.

Most people in their eighties couldn't even be enticed into an airplane, but the Wrights have made the biggest portion of their tour by commercial flights.

They left Clovis last Friday by air for Phoenix, on the last leg of their trip before returning home.

Just looking at the Wrights, you wouldn't think they'd lived a combined total of 170 years.

In fact Mrs. Wright impresses you as the type of person who would probably wade in the ocean on her 82nd birthday, if she had the chance. And that's exactly what she did.

## Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of the Friona Star

### 40 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 25, 1929

One of the most lamentable accidents that has visited this area in many years occurred a few miles northwest of Friona last Sunday shortly after noon.

James A. Wyly, a prominent farmer living in the south part of Deaf Smith County, was killed, and his wife and five children injured when their truck overturned while returning home from church services in Friona.

Something apparently went wrong with the steering mechanism, causing the truck to go out of control.

### 35 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 26, 1934

Last Friday afternoon and night and the greater part of the day Saturday, Frion Draw, which passes through the south edge of Friona was filled to overflowing with water as the result of a heavy rain that fell Thursday night over in New Mexico, over and to the south of Grady.

The entire portion of the road leading south from town was covered with the flood from the bridge that spans the draw, north to Highway 33 and the highway itself was covered from the large bridge west of town to a point nearly a mile west of town.

### 30 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 27, 1939

Roy Wrigley of Davis, Okla., who is employed on the farm of Mr. Wayne Moody three and one-half miles south of Friona, killed an eagle out there the other day. Eagles are not too common in these parts, and we think this is news. The wingspread was between four and five feet.

### 20 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 21, 1949

Rev. E.E. Houlette was in the Star Office Monday and stated that he had accepted the pulpit of the Pentecostal Church at Portales, and he has already begun his pastorate there. He will continue to live at Friona for a season at least, until suitable arrangements can be made for moving to Portales.

### 15 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 21, 1954

Maize Harvest in Parmer County began in earnest this week, and even at this stage of the harvest local elevators are taxed to handle the many loads without long truck lines being formed.

The maize is said of excellent quality. Yields have been reported from 4,000 to 7,400 pounds per acre!

### 10 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 22, 1959

Scoring the first time they got the ball, and then coming from behind at halftime with a score of 28-8, the Tulia Hornets defeated the fighting Friona Chiefs by a score of 34-28 at Chieftain Stadium Friday night. It was a district opener for both teams.

### 5 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 23, 1964

The 1964 Friona Chieftains can boast of something no local team has been able to claim for the past 30 years. By beating Dimmitt 28-6 last Friday, the Chiefs now hold a two-game winning streak over their old rivals.

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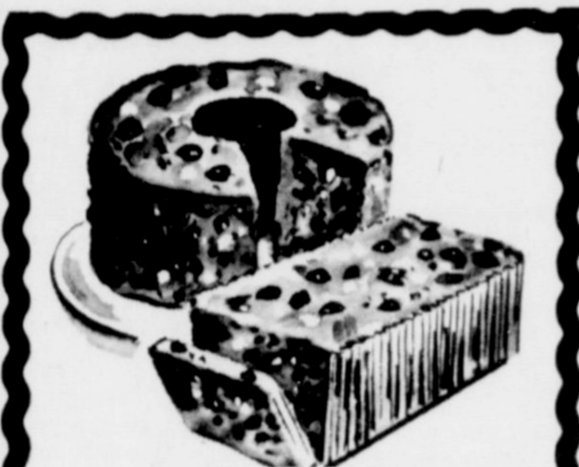

The best way to defense Isidore Cordova, according to the Lockney Longhorns, is to set him on the bench. So that's what Lockney did on the third play of the game last Friday, and it completely wrecked Friona's game plans as Lockney took a 39-6 win.

"We had planned to control the ball, making three or four yards at a time, and try to stay in possession as much as possible," stated Coach Bob Owen following the game.

However, when Cordova went out early, this hurt the Chieftains' plan. The big fullback had gained over half of Friona's total yardage in the first five games, averaging 5.2 yards each time he touched the football.

But "Izzy" apparently suffered a light concussion the first time he carried the ball last Friday, and left the game after picking up only six yards on two carries.

Cordova had to be told where to line up on his second play, so the team knew something was wrong.

Dr. Paul Spring, the team physician, worked with Cordova during the first half, and although he had cleared up considerably by halftime, recommended that he not have any further contact.

And, after Lockney's fantastic second-quarter rally, it's doubtful whether two Cordovas could have turned the tide.

The Longhorns scored 25 points within a two minute, 18 second period, counting the opening kickoff of the second half, to make a shambles of what had been a 14-6 game.

The 'Horns lost no time in taking control, scoring in only three plays after they got the ball. Donny Carthel's short punt gave Lockney good field position at the Chieftain 43 after Friona's first series.

Quarterback Lanny Glasscock ran around end for 24 yards to the Friona 19, and since the keeper play worked so well he tried it again for two straight plays, and rambled 19 yards to score to give the home team a 6-0 lead with only 2:19 gone from the clock. Gary Mangold's kick made it 7-0.

Lockney put Friona in the hole with a 53-yard punt which went out at the 10. Donnie Lewellen, subbing for Cordova, and Wesley Clark made gains to give Friona a first down, but the team had to turn the ball over on another punt.

This time the Longhorns drove 56 yards in 13 plays, paced by the running of sneaky halfback Tracy Dickson, who scored his first of four touchdowns on a pitchout around left end, going 11 yards untouched for the TD. This was four plays deep in the second quarter, and the kick made it 14-0, Lockney.

At this point, Friona pulled together for its only scoring drive of the night. Clark returned the kick to the Friona 32, and then teamed with Lewellen and Rickey Davis to move the ball upfield.

At the Longhorn 28, Friona faced fourth down and four to go, and the drive appeared stalled. However, Danny Kendrick hit end Raymond Hamilton with a pass at about the 10, and Hamilton raced in to score Friona's first touchdown by passing this season.

Kendrick decided to try a pass for two points, but a good defensive play by Lockney left the score at 14-6, with 5:44 left in the half.

The Longhorns drove with the ball, aided by a personal foul penalty on Friona, and went 67 yards in 10 plays, with Dickson getting the TD on a pitchout from the eight. The play was a carbon copy of his first touchdown. A wide kick left the score 20-6 with 2:03 left in the half, and the roof was about to fall in on the Chieftains.

Lockney caught Friona napping on the kickoff, and sneaky halfback Robert Dickworth raced to recover the kick at Friona's 35. On the first play, Glasscock passed complete to Dickson, who went for the touchdown. The kick made it 27-6, and only 12 seconds had expired since Lockney's last TD.

Minutes later, a 50-yard punt by Carthel was practically nullified when Dickworth returned it 39 yards to the Friona 40. The teams then traded fumbles, and with time running out in the first half Glasscock passed to Dickworth for a 47-yard gain to the Friona three.

Two plays later, Glasscock took it in for the score, to make it Lockney 33-6 at the half.

This made 19 points for the Longhorns in the last 2:03 of the first half, and Dickson ran the second-half kickoff back 85 yards for a touchdown to complete the scoring.

With Dickson and Dickworth as deep men, the 'Horns are a threat on every kick.

"We knew they were good at breaking kickoffs. They had run opening kickoffs back for scores twice in their first three games," Coach Owen said.

He said that Friona had worked on a flat kick most of the week, but had not developed it to perfection, so he decided to go ahead and kick long. "It just completed our record for the night--everything we did was wrong, and everything they did was right," Owen said.

Clark and Davis did some good running in the third quarter to give the team a pair of first downs back to back. But a personal foul penalty stifled the drive after it passed midfield.

Then early in the final quarter Friona, Clark and Lewellen sparked the Chiefs to three first downs which carried to the Lockney 36, where the Longhorns held.

Halfbacks Davis and Clark took up some of the slack left by the absent Cordova, gaining 69 and 57 yards respectively. Owen had words of praise for Lewellen, also who stepped in for Cordova and had some key gains, including three runs for first downs.

The game produced Friona's best passing totals, with Kendrick hitting three of six plays, Fortenberry one of five and Procter one of one, totalling 60 yards.

Lockney evidently felt it had evened the score for Friona's five straight wins over the Longhorns, including four in a row by one or two points. And

the 'Horns were still smarting from their 24-20 loss to Floydada last week, in a game that the Lockney supporters thought they should have won.

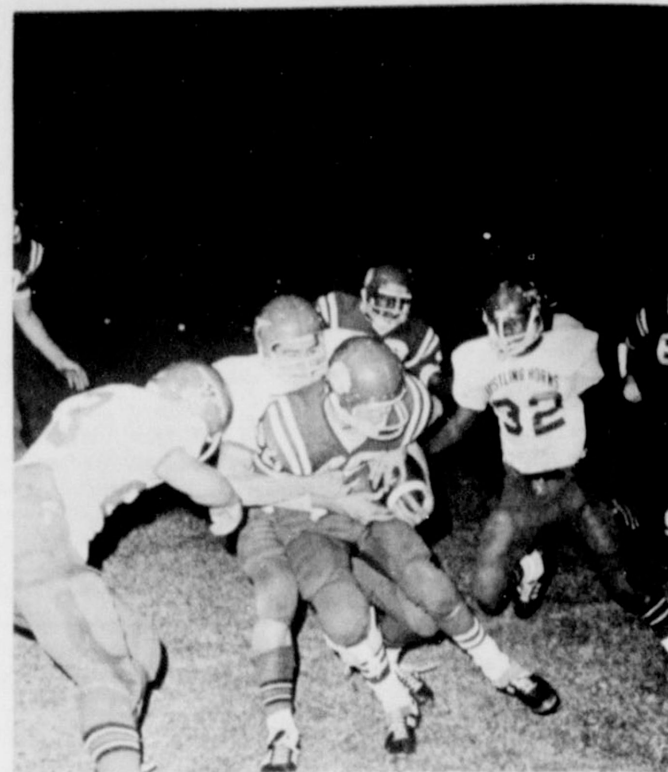

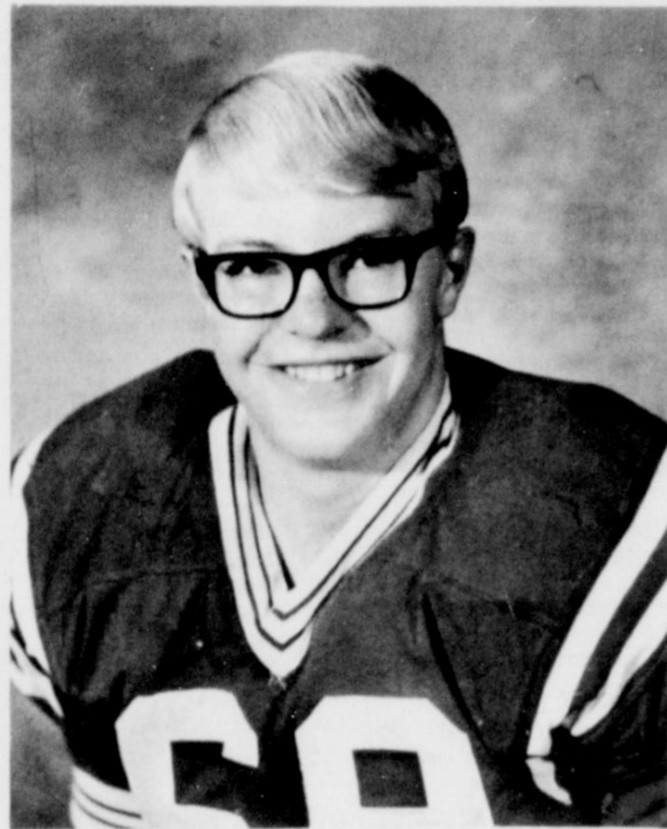

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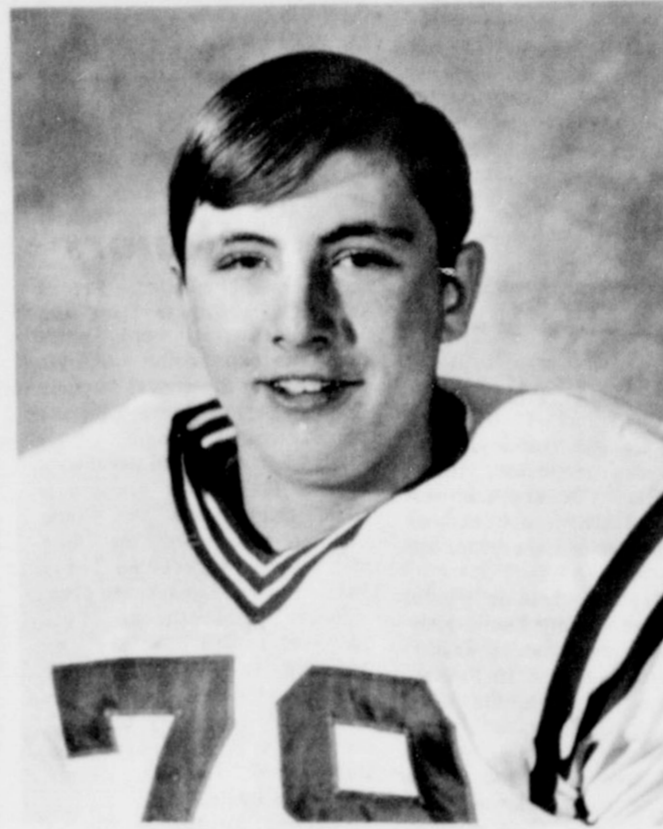

**On The Farm

**CROP SURVEY**

The annual survey, the basis for the official crop production estimates for Texas and each of its counties, will soon be underway.

This is an important survey since the information gathered is used for many purposes. Certain farmers and ranchers in Parmer County will be among the 35,000 in Texas receiving a questionnaire, he adds.

Those who receive the questionnaire, are urged to complete it as soon as possible and return it to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Box 70, Austin, Texas, 78767. Accuracy in completing the questionnaire is stressed. The survey is a joint responsibility of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Statistical Reporting Service. Cary D. Palmer is the state statistician and his office will be mailing the questionnaires. CARE OF EQUIPMENT

Proper care of pesticide application equipment prior to winter storage will prevent deterioration and insure its working condition for next season's use.

First the equipment should be thoroughly cleaned. Flush with clean water: remove all strainers, screens and nozzles and wash them in kerosene using a soft brush.

Mix a medium box of wash-day detergent and 30 gallons of water in the sprayer tank. Circulate this mixture through the bypass pressure regulator and jet agitator for 30 minutes. Drain the mixture. Replace the screens and nozzles. Fill the tank one-half full with one part household ammonia to 49 parts of water. Circulate this mixture through the pump and bypass, allowing a small amount to leak out through the nozzles.

Let the solution stay in the sprayer overnight and run it out through the nozzles. Flush with two full tanks of clean water with the nozzles removed. Dry moisture from the tank, hose, and boom, and coat with a light coating of rust inhibitor or motor oil. Fill the pump with a thin motor oil and plug all openings with pine plugs. The pump may also be stored by submerging it in a container filled with a light motor oil.

If the sprayer is powered with a gas engine, drain fuel tank and carburetor and pour a tablespoon of engine oil through the spark plug hole. Turn motor over by hand to distribute oil on cylinder walls.

Proper care of equipment will extend the period of trouble free operation, notes the county agent.

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## Can You Afford Parralel Terraces? Formula Given

The narrow margin between costs and returns in farming presents the farmer with the problem of keeping costs sufficiently below revenue in order to provide a desirable profit. The fact that the financial position of the farmer is most often that of a doctor makes his costs and returns to capital investment of primary importance.

The investment of capital in terracing and leveling sloping fields prevents the loss of rainfall runoff moisture, and increases yields by maintaining a higher level of moisture content in the soil thus increasing the probability of producing satisfactory crop yields.

In situations where excessive rainfall runoff is the problem, terraces are constructed so as to allow safe and effective dispersion of the surplus water, thereby reducing water erosion. Terraces also serve as guidelines for contour farming. Parallel terraces reduce and sometimes completely eliminate point rows, therefore increasing the efficiency of the farmer's labor and equipment. The cost-price squeeze of today dictates that the farmer

adopt the use of technology in order to increase productivity. The adoption of parallel terraces with leveled intervals is one such alternative and must reduce per-unit costs in the ranges of output in which the farmer plans to operate. Therefore, the leveling of terrace intervals must increase productivity at least enough so that revenue will increase an amount equal to the cost of leveling allocated over a period of time.

In order to determine an increase in yield necessary to maintain the same level of net revenue for dry land grain sorghum the estimated cost of terracing and leveling is divided by the price of grain sorghum.

For example on a slope of 1.5 percent the cost per acre for terracing and leveling amortized at 7 percent interest for ten years must equal the increase in net revenue brought about by their use in order to economically justify their adoption. This increase being 391 lbs. per acre with the price of grain sorghum at \$1.75 per cwt and operating costs of \$7.86 per acre.

Runoff studies conducted at the South Plains Research and Extension Center at Lubbock, Texas on loam soils of different slopes under three minimal

moisture conditions from 1963 through 1966 demonstrated, that by reducing or eliminating slope, production was increased sufficiently through increased water storage in the effective root zone.

The degree to which the adoption of this technology will increase yields is primarily de-

pendent upon the productivity of the individual farmer or manager of the farm and the soil capability of the land under consideration. If you desire any assistance in determining the economic feasibility of installing parallel terraces on your farm, contact the SCS in Friona.
