The Houston Post's comment on the extending of the olive branch to Mexico by the Texas Senate's resolution, unanimously adopted, is possible of helping the relations existing between the United States and Mexico for Texas, in the very nature of things, knows more about Mexican affairs than any other state or section of the United States. The Post's remarks, under the heading, "Texas' Olive Branch to Mexico:"

The Texas senate has extended the olive branch to Obregon and the new regime in Mexico. By a resolution unanimously adopted, the manifestation of a desire by the new government to protect the border is commended, and the hope is expressed that the people on each side the Rio Grande may feel toward each other as neighbors should.

The people of Texas understand the Mexicans probably better than do those of any other American state, and being their next door neighbors, this offer of friendship from the legislative body of Texas should not fail to impress the Mexican authorities, and the Mexican people.

It affords them new evidence of the friendly attitude and intentions toward them of the American people, and extends to them a new opportunity to co-operate in creating better relations between the two peoples. This resolution should do much to disarm whatever hostile sentiment, which was stimulated by Carranza, against Americans that still lingers in Mexico.

The Mexicans by this time must clearly understand that it is up to them to say whether the relations between Mexico and the United States shall be strained or cordial. With an enlightened and liberal leadership in our sister republic, the probability is that the Mexican people themselves will choose peace and friendship with us.

The American people who know somewhat of conditions in Mexico are sincerely hopeful that the new regime in Mexico means a real restoration of internal quiet and of external comity with other nations, particularly our own. De la Huerta, Trevino—General Obregon, the big gun himself—all are promising the square deal to all foreigners, and that is made especially to include our own, who perennially got the "worst of it" at the hands of the Carranza administration. The new government starts off aided by a real desire on the part of the American people to help it achieve the results it professes to seek to achieve. The Texas Senate's resolution is of importance as proving the existence of a good will and the sincerity of its desire to be of real help.

Judging from the comment of the Richardson Echo on the recent meeting of the Texas Press Association, the attendants were more regaled and feted and entertained and dined than they were either accustomed to or wanted. The Echo is published by Sam P. Harben, secretary of the association since the mind of man runneth not to the contrary, and what he says doubtless "goes" for the whole bunch. Let him tell it:

The meeting of the Texas Press Association in Houston last week demonstrated to those who attended, that genuine personal hospitality is not dead. Houston people showed the members of the association the time of their forty-one years of young life. Various interests of Houston and vicinity placed everything at the disposal of the press. The one thing that could be objected to was that not near enough time was given over to business. Many members of the association went to Houston to learn something in a business way, many went there because they knew of the good times ahead. The man who is a practical business man, and who travels three to four hundred miles to the meeting of his association, is interested enough to listen to a few business sessions. "What are they rushing us so for?" The answer, "We have these things for you to see and you must see them on schedule." As soon as it gets settled down and has the time and available hotel facilities to attempt it, Wichita Falls might profitably again entertain the Texas editors, who were here a few years ago and who could come back now and get visualization of what the past few years have brought about in the transformation of Wichita Falls from a good-sized village into a real city. Wichita is accessible to a large proportion of the membership of the Texas Press Association. The Chamber of Commerce might consider the suggestion as worth while.

The Dallas News' criticism of the wording of the home-ownership amendment as defeated last year is deserved, and the News' hope that if the submission is ordered and the Legislature approves it the loose wording will be remedied finds a general echo among those favorable to the purpose of the amendment. The aim of the amendment is to permit the state to aid families in the acquirement of homes—city or farm—on the basis that a good citizen is made a better citizen by ownership of a home, that the raising of self-respecting children is easier in an owned home than a rented one. The amendment is of sufficient importance—it is almost revolutionary in Texas, constitutional procedure—to deserve the most careful drafting, because it should not grant greater powers than its backers contemplate. Then, properly drawn, it should be adopted, as we are sure it will be, its defeat by a narrow squeeze at the last election being attributable largely or wholly to the "agin 'em all" campaign, the animus of which was to defeat the prohibition amendment, the only one that came through unscathed.

REEVES' DRAW WITH BATTLING ORTEGA PUT HIM IN LIMELIGHT

It's an old indoor sport among the ring fans to recall how they saw "him in his real days," when some pugilistic star kayos himself into the limelight of championship honors. Picking them in the making, is a harder job, one that fans essay only after the newcomer is well on the way to the top and that sport scribes do with trembling.

ANNUAL HARVARD AND YALE BOAT RACE ON CARD FOR TOMORROW

NEW LONDON, CONN., June 24.—Yale and Harvard University oarsmen meet in their fifty-second dual rowing regatta here tomorrow. Three races compose the program the freshman and junior varsity eight competing over a two mile course in the forenoon and the varsity crews over the four mile stretch of the Thames river late in the afternoon. Unless weather or wind cause a change in the schedule the preliminary events will be rowed down stream from Bartlett's Cove to the Navy Yard while the feature race will be rowed upstream from the railroad bridge to Bartlett's Cove.

The annual regatta of the University oarsmen and their thousands of admirers here has caused this city to assume its yearly regatta carnival dress. Everywhere one turns either ashore or afloat, there are lively scenes of bustle and preparation. Along the fringes of the river, on both sides, galli- decked pleasure craft are moored while the streets and buildings in this quaint seaport are beflagged and ribboned with the rival blue and crimson colors interlaced with the Stars and Stripes.

Not taking any account of the informal two-mile race which was rowed on the Housatonic River in 1918 and won by Harvard, Yale has had a shado the better of the rival Harvard oarsmen as the Blue has flashed over the line a winner 26 times while Harvard's total of winning efforts numbers 25 out of 61 races rowed in the series inaugurated 68 years ago.

Yale began the rowing season this year with a victory over Pennsylvania on the Schuylkill River at Philadelphia over the American Honey distance of one mile, 550 yards. The New Haven crew won by a scant length 1:04.43 seconds faster than Pennsylvania's time. Three weeks later in a two-mile race on the Housatonic river, Derby Conn., Yale won by more than a length from Columbia in 10:07.25, Columbia's time being 10:12. Yale's only other race in public this year was on Carnegie Lake, Princeton, where she finished last in a three crew race over a course of 1.78 miles which Cornell won in 9:16. Princeton was second in 9:17.25 and Yale third in 9:20.

Harvard also raced in three public varsity events and finished in all of them. At Annapolis on April 26 the U. S. Naval Academy crew beat Harvard in a 2-mile race by four lengths, the official time announced being Navy 11:48, Harvard 12:05. A week later at Cambridge, Princeton beat Harvard at 1.78 miles by 3.4 of a length in 9:47 while the Crimson crew beat Penna at 1.78 miles by 3.4 of a length. After a lapse of three weeks the Harvard oarsmen were beaten by Cornell in a dual race at two miles on Lake Canoga, the respective time for the crews being 10:47 and 10:58.

"BABE" RUTH MAY SUFFER ACCORDING TO NEW RULE CHICAGO, June 24.—A change in the baseball rules governing balls hit out of the play, which go into effect tomorrow, it was announced by the American league officers today. The rule is covered by paragraph 48 of the rule book and at present provides that a ball shall be called fair or foul, "according to where it passes over the boundary line of the actual playing field. The new wording will be the same as in 1919, which says that when a ball passes over the side ground or into the stands the umpire shall judge it fair or foul, according to where it disappears from the umpire's view."

Major League Bits Yesterday's hero: Nehf of the Giants. He held a two-run lead and won from the Cubs, score 3 to 1. Olson, Brooklyn shortstop, went out cold from a fast ball which beamed him in the fifth. The Robins took the final game of their series with Pittsburgh, 4 to 2. Whatever other delegates may do, National Committeeman Mack of New York said the New Yorkers propose to put all of their weight behind an effort to pledge the party to amend the act so as to permit the states to determine alcoholic content of beverages for themselves, with a maximum limit to be substituted for the one-half of one per cent restriction of the present federal act.

This announcement was made today by Pure Food Commissioner Hoffman, who added that this was the first result of a campaign inaugurated some time ago to prevent such adulterations.

STEPHENS HELD FOR GRAND JURY INVESTIGATION ST. LOUIS, June 25.—John W. Stephens, who late yesterday shot and killed his wife, Texas, 23 years old, and then fired a bullet into his left breast, was ordered held for the grand jury following a homicide verdict by a coroner's jury here today. Mr. Stephens was formerly of Fortman, Ark.

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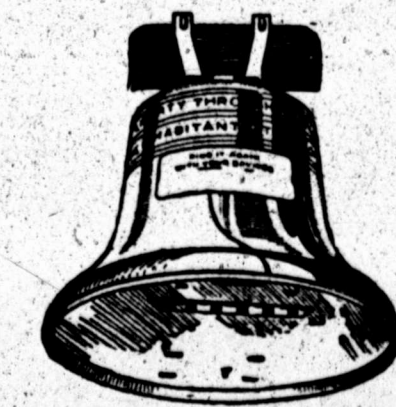
