Deposits Set Record At Friona St. Bank

Deposits at Friona State Bank set another record at the June 30 mid-year point, it was disclosed this week. Bank deposits stood at \$8,526,897.96 at the close of business on June 30. At the same time a year ago, a new all-time high had been established for the date with deposits of \$7,818,933.51. This year's total beats the former record by nine per cent, or \$707,964.45. Other figures showed loans standing at \$7,218,308.65 as compared to \$5,450,981.62 and total assets at \$9,223,131.43, compared to \$8,553,148.62. The deposit totals are up by more than \$2 million over the similar date two years earlier.

The Friona City Council passed Ordinance 424, raising water rates for the city, and establishing a water tap fee and new water deposit fees, during its regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The new rates, which will go into effect on September 21, after the annual summer water rates expire, will increase the water bill of Friona residents an estimated five to six per cent on the average.

A \$20.00 deposit on all rental customers will now be required by the city office. A deposit of \$25.00 will be required of renters of commercial property.

Builders will now pay a water tap fee of \$80 for a standard sized service, and will be charged the actual cost for oversized services.

The rate adjustment, it is

estimated, will add approximately \$10,000 in revenue to the city.

In other business, the council authorized the city manager to purchase 12 additional Dumpster boxes from the City of Hereford for the city's business trash disposal.

The new location for White Auto Store, and the leasing of the potato shed has caused two additional needs for the boxes, according to City Manager Jake Outland. The City of Hereford had the boxes available, since they have gone to a different trash disposal system.

The council passed a resolution going on record as opposing limitations of the tax exempt status of municipal bonds.

An equalization board, to meet Tuesday, August 12, was ap-

pointed. O.F. Lange will be chairman. H.K. Kendrick and J.F. Hicks are committeemen.

Outland spent some time outlining possible capital expenditure needs for the 1969-70 fiscal year. The council discussed some of the more pressing needs facing the city, such as additional water, and the trash disposal system.

Outland discussed the involvement of municipal officials in the Texas Water Plan and Constitutional Amendment No. 2, to be voted on August 5. Mayor W.L. Edelman discussed the importance of the amendment to be passed.

Outland told the council that remodeling work is progressing at the American Legion Hall, to give the Library the entire ground floor of the building.

The mayor suggested a letter

of appreciation to the New Horizons Junior Study Club for the tremendous success of the community's July 4th observance.

The mayor, city manager and councilmen noted that there were very few fireworks ignited within the city limits this year, due to the new fireworks ordinance. While the patrolmen could not police the violators all over the city, there was one arrest and fine resulting from failure to cease to use fireworks.

Building Figures Healthy

Building permits continued to be issued by the City of Friona at a healthy pace during the month of June, according to figures released this week by Jake Outland, Friona city manager.

Eleven permits were issued during June, for total construction valued at an estimated \$61,200. This brought the total projected construction for the first six months of 1969 to \$667,100.

The year's totals are \$1,800 ahead of the 1968 totals of \$665,300 for the same six-month period. A total of 50 building permits have now been

issued during 1969, which is two more than was issued during all of 1968. Total construction began in 1968 ended up at \$1,035,200, which was the second largest total on record.

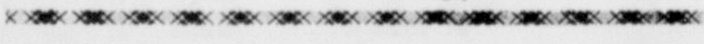
The six-month total for 1969 tops the entire year's construction for the years of 1965, 1966 and 1967. The all-time record building year was 1964, when almost \$2 million in permits were issued, including that for the new high school buildings.

Included among the 11 permits issued during the month just past were four new residences valued at an estimated \$42,000; three move-in residences at \$15,000 and four additions/alterations at \$4,200.

The building totals for the

first six months include 20 new homes, worth an estimated \$326,000; 19 move-in houses worth an estimated \$102,000; six apartment units (Medlock) for an estimated \$156,000, and 12 additions or alterations

worth an estimated \$26,300.00. Two permits have been issued for commercial buildings, worth a total of \$53,800 in construction. This total is more than the \$28,500 in commercial construction for all of 1968.

Crown-Fitting Time For Baseball Loops

The B-J Bees clinched a tie for the championship of the Pee Wee League in Friona's summer baseball program, and Friona Star-Hurst Department Store inched toward the title in the older league.

The Bees scored a 2-0 win over Monsanto Ag Center in a game July 4, to keep their record spotless at 9-0 for the season. Continental Grain is now second in league standings, with a 6-3 mark, and the Bees have only three games remaining to play, two with Farmer County Implement Co. and one with Ethridge-Spring.

In the Intermediate League, Star-Hurst also has a tie clinched, with two games left to play.

Three contests last week featured hitless games, but only one was a shutout. Mark Neill of Continental Grain blanked Hi-Pro Feeds without a hit or a run as his team coasted to a 10-0 win.

One of the games produced a hitless winner, as the league-leading B-J Bees edged Monsanto, 1-0 without the benefit of a hit.

Randall Snyder of Reeve Chevrolet pitched a no-hitter against Friona Feed Yards, and also led the batting attack with

a home run, a double and a single. First-baseman Trip Horton came up with an unassisted double play for the winners.

Star-Hurst clinched the tie for first place with an 8-6 win over Friona State Bank. Danny Waggoner hit two home runs for the winners, and Johnny Rendo hit one. David Hutson hit one for Friona State Bank.

The team clinched the crown outright with its win over Reeve Chevrolet Tuesday night.

40 YEARS AGO-JULY 12, 1929

The city commission Tuesday morning granted a franchise to the West Texas Gas Company for supplying gas to the city for light, fuel and power. It is hoped to have the mains laid here within a year. The news will evidently come as welcome news to a large per cent of our people, as it will be the means of supplying them with a cheap fuel for further heat, light or power, and will avert a possible shortage of coal, and abolish the nuisance of kindling fires and carrying coal and ashes.

30 YEARS AGO-JULY 14, 1939

According to information reaching the Star office, the Lubbock Poultry and Eggs, a Lubbock institution, has rented the J.G. Weir building, commonly known as the Corner Filling Station, at the corner of Sixth and Main, and will open there a general produce station.

20 YEARS AGO-JULY 8, 1949

Rev. Walter H. North, who has served as pastor of the Union Congregational Church for the past three years, resigned from the position last week. Rev. and Mrs. North came here three years ago when the church was temporarily without a pastor, to serve during the Lenten, Easter and Pentecostal season or until the time for their annual vacation. Upon invitation by the church, the Norths stayed three years beyond their original intentions.

15 YEARS AGO-JULY 15, 1954

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE #87 PASSED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS ON THE 1st DAY OF DECEMBER, 1952 AND AMENDED BY ORDINANCE #95, PASSED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS ON THE 2nd DAY OF NOVEMBER, 1953, AND AMENDED BY ORDINANCE NUMBER 323, PASSED BY THE CITY COUNCIL 6th JULY 1959, AND AMENDED BY ORDINANCE NUMBER 343, PASSED BY THE CITY COUNCIL 3rd JANUARY 1961; PROVIDING FOR A NEW CONSUMER WATER RATE; ESTABLISHING A NEW WATER SERVICE DEPOSIT FEE; PROVIDING FOR A NEW WATER SERVICE TAP FEE; DOUBLING THE CONSUMER WATER RATE FOR CUSTOMERS OUTSIDE THE CORPORATE LIMIT; PROVIDING PENALTIES IN ANY AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED TWO HUNDRED (\$200.00) DOLLARS, AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Section 1 of Ordinance #343, dated 3d January 1961, is hereby revoked, cancelled and rescinded and said section 1 shall henceforth read as follows:

Each water consumer shall put up a meter deposit in accordance with the following rates or schedule, to wit:

SECTION 2. That Section 2 of Ordinance #343, dated 3d January 1961, is hereby revoked, cancelled and rescinded and said section 2 shall henceforth read as follows:

ALL OVER 20,000 GALLONS .25¢ PER THOUSAND, RESIDENTS OR SERVICES OUTSIDE THE CORPORATE LIMITS, 100% INCREASE OR DOUBLE THE ABOVE RATE.

SECTION 3. A water tap fee is hereby established in the amount of Eighty (\$80.00) Dollars for a standard 5/8" x 3/4" inch sized service. The fee shall be payable with the building permit for a new installation and/or at the time of the request for service.

The charge for the installation of an oversized (larger than the standard size above) water service shall be the actual cost of the meter, parts, and labor for making the service.

SECTION 4. That from and after the publication and effective date of this Ordinance any person, firm, partnership, association of persons or corporation or any agent or employee thereof, who shall violate any of the rules, regulations or provisions of this ordinance, or any part of it or portion thereof, by any act either of omission or commission or cause the same to be done, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine in any amount not exceeding \$200.00 for each and every such violation. Each violation of each part or any part of this Ordinance shall be and constitute a separate offense and where such violation is a continued act, each day such violation is continued, or permitted to continue shall be and does constitute a separate offense and be punishable accordingly.

SECTION 5. The effective date of this Ordinance shall be after its approval, publication thereof, and upon the 21st day of September, 1969.

At Home In Parmer County

Are leftovers a problem at your house? Some of the more common leftovers are rice, green peas, roast beef and boiled potatoes. Here are some suggestions for using leftovers in tasty dishes.

-Cooked rice can be covered and stored in the refrigerator. Reheat in a small amount of water, and it tastes as good as when it was first prepared. Rice also gives body to soups and meat loaves.

-Leftover roast beef is often sliced for sandwiches. Or try cutting it into small pieces and frying with diced potatoes and onions.

-Boiled potatoes can be used for potato salad, or they're good fried. Mashed potatoes can be shaped into patties and fried in margarine until crisp.

When shopping for peaches, a soft, creamy-to-gold undercolor of the yellow part is the best sign of ripeness. The red blush on a peach, may or may not be a sign of ripeness. Blush depends on variety, not ripeness.

Proper care of roses now will insure you of having attractive plants and abundant flowers this fall. The regular application of a complete fertilizer plus a continuation of insect and disease controls are musts. But, fertilization is not recommended after early August.

Does your family enjoy meat grilled outdoors? To keep the meat from sticking to the grill, brush it with oil.
