WILSON IS PLEASED WITH CONVENTION

WASHINGTON, June 29.—President Wilson today was described as "highly pleased" over the results of the first day of the democratic national convention.

One official at the White House said the convention news was the best tonic the President has had since his illness.

The story of the convention was received over a United Press leased wire running into the White House and carried to the president. Copies were made for other officials also and throughout the day a little group sat in the executive offices reading the United Press dispatches.

Probably the most pleasing feature to the White House was the effort of the keynote speech of Homer S. Cummings, but what officials regarded as or more practical significance was the apparent willingness of the convention to endorse the president and his administration.

It was said that if this sentiment at the convention continues to prevail, it is probable that Wilson will have nothing more to say for publication until the convention has finally adjourned.

It was declared Wilson has had no long distance telephone conversation with San Francisco since the convention opened.

GERMANS NOT INSIST ARMY OF 200,000

PARIS, June 28.—German delegates at the Spa conference will not insist upon the maintenance of an army of 200,000 men, according to the Echo de Paris, quoting an unnamed diplomat, who declares the allies will be asked to reconsider indemnity demands.

THREE ROBBERIES REPORTED TUESDAY

Gravel Hauler Held Up in Freight Yards—Auto Held Up in Oil Field

Three additional highway robberies were reported to the sheriff's office Tuesday bringing the total number of hold-ups during the past 10 days to five.

J. J. Dorsey, gravel hauler, who resides in the stockyards addition, was held up last night in the railroad yards by two masked highwaymen and robbed of \$23.50. Dorsey was walking through the railroad yards on his way home when accosted by two masked men, one of whom threw a revolver in his victim's face while the second searched his pockets.

Dorsey gave a description of his assailants to the police but no arrest had been made at 2:00 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. The sheriff's department is also searching for the "high-jackers."

The sheriff's department is also investigating the report of the hold-up and robbery of two motorists alleged to have occurred last Saturday night near Kemp City in the heart of the K. M. A. oil field. The motorists were robbed by two masked bandits according to reports received at the sheriff's office from deputies on duty in the K. M. A. region.

Rev. E. V. Collier, Burk Burnett, and four companions were also victimized by highjackers Monday night when the car in which they were traveling from Wichita Falls to Burk Burnett was stopped by bandits and \$100 in money taken from the motorists. Deputies at Burk Burnett immediately launched an investigation but no arrests have been made.

Two men arrested in the oil fields last week have been returned to Knox county where they will face trial there on charges of burglary.

FINISHING TOUCHES BEING PLACED ON THE OLYMPIC

OIL LEASE CASE ON TRIAL IN 10 DAYS

Damages totaling \$30,000 are asked by W. L. Duggan et al in a suit for damages and cancellation of contract that opened Tuesday in the 78th district court and in which H. A. Allen, W. M. Frank and H. F. Works, all of Wichita Falls are named as defendants. Duggan and associates allege that an oil lease sold them by Allen, Frank and Works failed to come up to certain standards recommended by the defendants. The land involved is a short distance east of Burk Burnett.

Duggan testified Tuesday that he and his associates were induced to purchase the lease through representations made by the plaintiffs and which he, the plaintiff, now brands as fraudulent. Complete cancellation of the contract and return of money paid under the contract together with \$5,000 punitive damages are asked by the plaintiffs.

The defendants vigorously deny that they resorted to fraud in selling the oil lease to Duggan and his companions. All charges of the plaintiffs are denied in a caustic answer read to the jury by defense counsel early Tuesday.

The trial jury is as follows: W. M. Noe, J. F. Hund, J. T. Woodhouse, R. L. Galther, E. W. Shaw, R. R. Robert, son, Tom Fisher, W. C. Adams, S. F. Copeland, G. L. Adams and J. P. Jackson.

The jury panel is composed of eleven jurors as a result of agreement by counsels.

CHAUTAUQUA FAILED TO MAKE EXPENSES

Deficit Estimated at About \$600 Which Will be Made Good by Guarantors

The hopes which the Y. W. C. A. had cherished in regard to large financial returns from the Chautauqua which closed Monday, failed to materialize. The exact figures have not been compiled as yet but the management estimates that the expenses will amount to approximately \$1600 and the gate receipts totaled slightly in excess of \$900. This means that there will be a deficit in the neighborhood of \$600 which the local business men who sponsored the Chautauqua will have to account for. The publicity managers are of the opinion that if they had been given more time to advertise the coming attraction more favorable results would have been obtained and that the response secured from the preliminary work was satisfactory. The management wishes to thank all those who by interest in the work helped to make the Chautauqua the success that it was and to those workers who aided in any way whatsoever they express their sincere appreciation.

INTERNAL REVENUE OFFICE WILL REMAIN HERE

A. F. Bowden, division chief deputy collector of internal revenue, returned to Wichita Falls this morning from Austin, where he has been assisting Collector A. S. Walker in the work of dividing Texas into two internal revenue districts. Immediately on his return, Mr. Bowden laid emphasis on an announcement that the contemplated changes will not mean the removal of the local office. "The internal revenue office here will remain very much on the job," he said, "the only change being that hereafter citizens in this division will make out checks to Collector Scott Reed, instead of to Collector A. S. Walker, and will bring their checks to this office or mail them to Collector Reed in Dallas."

For several years the third internal revenue district of Texas, has handled all taxes for the entire state of Texas. Owing, however, to the tremendous volume of business it has now been found necessary to divide Texas into two districts. For this purpose the government has created the second internal revenue district of Texas, which will handle the taxes of half the state. Scott Reed has been appointed collector of the new district, with headquarters in Dallas, and the Wichita Falls division will in the future, beginning July 1, be responsible to the Dallas headquarters instead of to Austin.

MORE OFFICE CHANGES ORDERED AT COURT HOUSE

The county commissioners Monday passed an order moving the office of the United States commissioner into quarters formerly used by the department of justice officials. County Auditor W. W. Murphy will occupy the present quarters of United States Commissioner J. A. Lantz while the room formerly used by the county auditor will become the non-jury room of the 89th district court.

MUCH PREJUDICE AGAINST THE SUSPENDED SENTENCE LAW IS ENCOUNTERED

Prejudice against the suspended sentence law is creating much trouble for the sheriff's department due to the fact that bailiffs are kept on the run summoning takers to make up panels shattered by defending counsel who refuse to accept jurors who express prejudice against granting suspended sentence.

The trial of H. L. Tarrant, charged with the theft of an automobile was delayed for several hours Tuesday due to continuous objections raised by Shields Heyser, defense counsel to the jurors who expressed bias against granting suspended sentence.

Some prospective jurors declared that they would grant a suspended sentence to defendants under 21 years of age but would "refuse to consider applications for mercy from defendants over that age." Other jurors asserted they "believed the suspended sentence law greatly abused and would not grant a suspension of punishment under any condition."

Persons who refused to grant suspended sentences assert that a verdict of acquittal is more reasonable than the customary return of a verdict of guilty and suspending the punishment.

Three Craftsmen to Make a Japanese Print. Japanese prints are wood engravings in color. The design was engraved in relief on a wood block, usually of cherry, known as the key block. Prior to 1743 the impression from the key block was colored by hand, and these prints are known as the primitives. The first pigment used in coloring prints was tan (red lead). Then followed, in order, benzoin (a red extracted from saffron), a greenish yellow, a thin lacquer (rush), and a blue extracted from Chinese cotton. After 1743 blocks were made for each color and were applied to the paper by hand. A print is therefore the work of three craftsmen—the artist, the engraver, the printer. The number of marriages in Great Britain every year is about 333,500.

"We're here to do or die. Ohio, Ohio. We'll nominate Cox or know the reason why."

The Swat Harvest.

The result is that most pitchers have lost their old confidence. For a fighter who came to America for the advertised purpose of meeting the champion, I cannot understand his attitude. Dempsey is ready to fight now. He is in good shape and wants to fight. I am going to have a personal interview with Deschamps in New York and put it up to him flat to fight or quit talking. If he doesn't want to fight we will accept an offer to fight some American at once."

JULY 7 DESIGNATED AS CLEAN UP DAY

Health Officers Are Planning Thorough Sweep of City by Volunteer Workers

Fifteen new cases of typhoid fever have been reported in this city within the past week, bringing the total of known cases to 65. In view of this persistent spread of the disease, a city-wide campaign against the house fly and against dirt, weeds and refuse generally was launched at a meeting last night of city officials and members of the board of health.

A "clean-up" day was voted by the health officers, who fixed Wednesday, July 7, as the date. Meantime a program will be worked out that will systematize the cleaning work by blocks, and make possible a thorough sweep of the city by volunteer workers against disease.

Every business house in Wichita Falls will be asked to close for half a day also, in order to devote attention to cleaning up the downtown section.

A police officer, whose salary will be paid by the Wichita Falls Water Co., will be detained immediately to patrol the city water canal from the lake to the plant to prevent pollution. The sterilization of bottles in which distilled water is sold also will be insisted upon by the health board; an inspection of sanitary conditions as regards the service at soda fountains will be made; restaurants and produce houses will be inspected more frequently, and two additional food inspectors will be added to the city's force at once.

Dr. M. M. Walker stated today that in his opinion private wells constitute one of the most dangerous sources of typhoid. The city water at the present time is showing but a small percentage of germ pollution, but the pollution remains high in all samples of well water tested recently.

Joseph T. Robinson, of Arkansas, another staunch administration supporter, chosen for permanent chairman of the convention, and administration at the head of other committees, was the line up brought out of what had promised to be a contest.

The threatened anti-administration fight, so far as it related to the organization of the convention machinery, collapsed without a showing.

At the same time, the committee formulating the rules for the convention has cleared the way for the nominating speeches to be delivered while the resolutions committee is working on the platform.

By unanimous action it decided that the various candidates may be placed in nomination while the platform negotiations are going on, but no balloting for a nominee may be concluded until after the platform has been brought in, perfected and

adopted. This action will simplify and hasten the work of the convention very much.

From the dramatic moment yesterday when a portrait of President Wilson was unveiled in the great convention auditorium to let loose a storm of tribute and approbation from party followers on the floor, there seemed little chance for those who had set themselves in opposition.

The administration forces now have a strong grip on the machinery which will write the confession of faith for the party's 1920 campaign. There will be battles in committee over many planks, but there was less prospect today than at any time since the convention leaders began to assemble, in the opinion of most observers schooled in the ways of conventions, of an open fight on the floor. Administration leaders appeared confident that differences could be ironed out in committee.

Mr. Bryan has put forward the League of Nations plank on which he would have the convention stand. It declares for such reservations as are necessary to secure ratification and is in sharp conflict with the position taken before the convention yesterday by National Chairman Homer S. Cummings in his keynote speech.

Whether Mr. Bryan, like a good trader, had asked more than he expected to get and is willing to take less, is not clear. The administration leaders, stimulated by the victories of yesterday, reiterated their confidence that no minority report on the treaty plank could carry.

Other planks may cause committee discord, but there was a word of cheer for Irish sympathizers in Mr. Cummings' speech. The only issue he did not deal with directly in his keynote address was that over a party statement on prohibition enforcement.

That issue may be wrapped up in the fate of some aspirants for the presidential nomination. The battle has come to the surface in a caucus of the New York delegation, which voted without roll call to urge modification of the enforcement law.

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The session left behind it echoes of "gag rule" charges and assertions that if a floor battle were insisted upon by the New Yorkers, the party's chances at the polls would be ruined. Events so far have shown no marked reaction over the discussions of nomination boomism. There seemed to be a general feeling that prospect of Mr. McAdoo's selection had increased, but there was no definite development upon which it could be based by those who took this view.

With a member of the president's cabinet in the race in the person of Attorney General Palmer and a former cabinet member, Mr. McAdoo, being urged just as vigorously, no candidate has yet been formally characterized as the choice of the president.

"My objection to prohibition," he

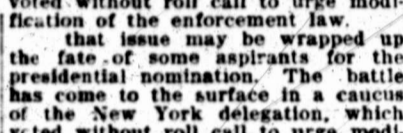

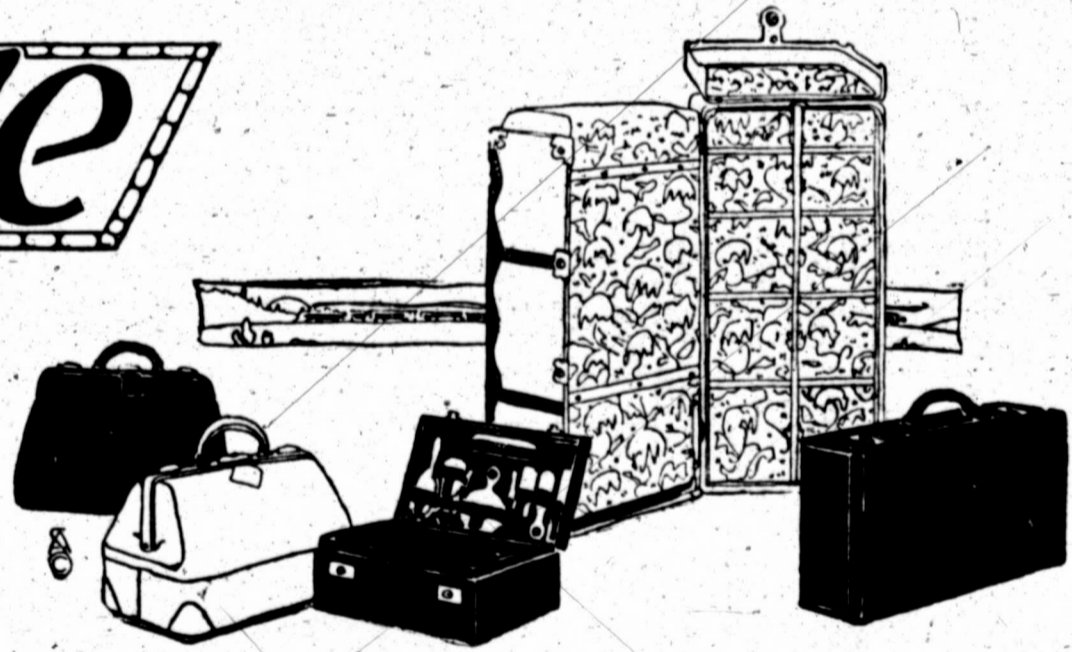

WORK WELLS

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WORK RESUMED ON WELLS NEAR AMARILLO

More Drilling in Progress Now Than Any Time Since Operations Started

Amarillo Tribune.

Several wells in the Amarillo district that have been shut down for various lengths of time started drilling last week, and more holes are now going down than at any time since the field was opened.

The Benedum and Trees Shelton No. 1 in Oldham County started drilling last week after being shut down for several months. The hole was cleaned out a few days ago.

Drilling was also resumed on the Matador No. 1 in Oldham County.

Shortage of coal which shut down the Gorton Trust well in Oldham for some time was relieved last week and operations on the hole were resumed.

The Emerald in Potter county last week pulled in the crown block, repaired it and are drilling again.

Other wells in Potter county now drilling are: The Seven States, Miller, Haines Little Pool No. 1, Masterson No. 5 and Bivins No. 2.

Wells which are commanding big interest in other parts of the territory are: The Masters Oil Company, Speed, Cole-Heywood, Gulf, Humble, Purvine, Oil Issues, McGee, Endue and Standard.

Drilling was resumed the first of last week on the Virginia-Texas Oil and Gas Company well near Memphis, this well has been delayed for some time due to a break in casing, which was being pulled. A string of 12 1/2-inch casing was received the first of last week, and the big casing pulled in the Virginia-Texas well was banded to the well of the Mutual Company in Donkey county.

Work on the Home People's test near Memphis is held up pending straightening out of the hole. L. T. Jackson, expert driller, has been employed to clean out the hole and put it in condition for further work.

Arrival of a string of casing for the Crayola test near Turkey the first of last week enabled drillers to resume operations.

Drilling is going forward by Towers on the Wilde like well near Childress. The hole is down over 1,150 feet.

The formation is said to be growing more and more favorable. They are still using their 10-inch casing and hope to continue this to 2,250 feet before dropping down to their 8 1/4 casing. This would leave them in a favorable condition for drilling to any reasonable depth.

A heavy windstorm that passed over this country came so near blowing the Shores Creek well derrick over that it was deemed best to rebuild it. The force is now engaged in tearing down and reconstructing the derrick. This time they are building it 96 feet high instead of 84 as it was before. As soon as the derrick is finished drilling will be resumed. The well is now more than 800 feet deep.

Oil men of Amarillo are interested in the Underwriters No. 1 in Mitchell county which is now bailing from twenty-five to thirty barrels of oil a day for fuel in the boiler operating the drill. The well is now down about 2,500 feet, and the flow of oil is reported to be increasing as the bit goes down. When the producing sand is penetrated a heavy charge of nitroglycerine will be shot, and oil men of that section expect a good producer.

CRYSTAL FALLS HAS GOOD PRODUCTION

CRYSTAL FALLS, June 28.—Crystal Falls is now almost surrounded by good production. The Roxanna company's well No. 2 1/2 miles southwest is flowing by heads with the drill only a foot in the pay. It is being cleaned out and is good for between 1,500 and 2,000 barrels. It extends the proven field northwest from Breckenridge. Drilling was begun on this well Jan. 1. Depth is 3,370 feet. Oil was found in gray lime.

The Sinclair's J. B. Sloan No. 1, 2 1/2 miles northwest at 3,200 feet, is getting out dropped casing and is expected to come in a good production this week. This showing was everywhere as good as that in the Ball.

The Hopper No. 1 of the Gulf, three miles southeast, is drilling at 3,100 feet with a good showing of both oil and gas. This well was started 90 days ago.

The Prairie Oil and Gas company's Brown No. 1, two miles east, is drilling at 400 feet.

In the Black field, three miles east, there are now five producing wells making from 100 to 1,500 barrels each with pipe line connection to the central pump station at Ranger.

The Cooper-Henderson No. 1, Stoker, four miles south, is drilling at around 3,200 feet with a good showing

INDIANS TESTIFY IN JENKINS CASE

MEXICO CITY, June 28.—Several Indians examined with regard to their previous testimony in the case of William O. Jenkins, former American consular agent at Puebla, testified today that they were suspended in the air, struck and threatened with death by shooting until they agreed to testify against Jenkins, according to Puebla dispatches to El Universal this morning. Jenkins was kidnaped by the bandit Frederico Cordova last fall and later was charged with complicity in his own capture.

The testimony is being heard before the third criminal court of Puebla. Ignacio Vasquez, former secretary of the second criminal court, declared court papers were stolen to damage the case against Jenkins and the judge was deposed when he was about to free the American. The bandit Cordova was cross-examined for four hours today, but his testimony was not disclosed.

Interviewed in Mexico City tonight on his arrival from Puebla, Cordova said he had kidnaped Jenkins, but that the latter was not an accomplice. The agents of the Carranza government, Cordova asserted, had made attempts to induce him to testify that the kidnaping was the result of a scene between himself and Jenkins, but he had declined to make such a statement. Any declarations purporting to come from him accusing Jenkins of being implicated in his capture, Cordova asserted, were pure fabrications.

GERMAN SOCIALISTS AGREE PROGRAM NEW GOVERNMENT

BERLIN, June 28.—German majority socialists are in general agreement with the program of the new government headed by Konstantin Fehrenbach, said Philipp Scheidemann, a leader of that organization, speaking in the reichstag today. He declared it was a fault of the independent socialists that the present cabinet does not contain a representative of the socialist organizations.

George Ledebour, an independent socialist leader, said members of that organization had refused to join the cabinet because the elections had shown that the people condemned a coalition government. The best means to bring about an amelioration of peace conditions, he asserted, would be the abolition of existing armies and this could be effected only by the workers of all countries, including

WILL RAISE MONEY TO DRILL DEEPER

Aid of Citizens Asked by East Wichita Through Sale of Additional Stock

In a statement issued Monday, Judge J. W. Nicholson, secretary of the East Wichita Oil Company, announced that at a meeting of the stockholders of the company Saturday, an increase in the capitalization of the company was authorized to drill the well deeper.

"Should the enterprise be abandoned, it means a condemnation of the whole section of country in which this well is located, as an oil or gas territory, and also means a complete loss to every stockholder of all stock of said company held by them.

"If the enterprise is carried on and oil or gas in paying quantities is found, it means millions of dollars to Wichita Falls, and great returns to the stockholders.

"The prospects for finding oil or gas are more flattering at this time than ever before in the history of the well, the hole is open and clear, with 53-16 inch casing, and our driller says, that there is no apparent reason why the hole cannot be drilled considerably deeper.
