





IMMIGRATION NOW EXCEEDS EMI-GRATION.

The tide of immigration has turned. The number of immigrants at Ellis outflow of immigrants is also less, and predictions of a great outflow of foreign-born following the war have failed to materialize. The following figures indicate the steady increase of arrivals over departures during the past four

In July, 1919, only 9,432 aliens arrived at New York; for the same month 28.354 went out. For the month of August, 1910, 9,430 came here, while \$2,901 went away, but in September, 1919, the inflow took a spurt, with 20,-\$77 coming in and only 29,746 going out. In November only 17,778 aliens arrived and 36,450 went out, but December brought 34.669 and the departtres dropped to 21,909.

There are a number of factors that have influenced immigrants to remain in the United States. One of course is the widespread prosperity and the high wages that have been paid all classes of labor. A great many immigrants have returned to their native lands because they have accumulated their pile and believe they can live in easy circumstances in their old homes. Others have realized that even in Europe living costs have spared and that perhaps a dollar will not go further there than in America. Some of the more thoughtful too have considered the taxes that must be imposed in their native lands. A goodly number, doubtless, have appreciated the advantages of America and intend to remain here and become citizens.

But whatever the cause, the figures show that immigration is now exceeding emigration and the increase has steadily grown for several months.

It is this beating upon the air that produces the drone or hum characteristic of this bird which, equipped with a long bill, can extract the juice even from very deep flowers.
