



# MEXICAN GENERALS TO OPPOSE HUERTA

MEXICO CITY, July 9.—Five generals have taken up arms against the new Mexican government, Provisional President de la Huerta told foreign correspondents last night, but he declared they did not constitute a military menace, since they had but very few followers. He estimated that not more than 500 men had been involved in present outbreaks.

Admission was made by the provisional president that the new government had faced a rather acute situation since taking over the government a couple of months ago but he asserted the army had been reorganized, that unstable forces could not shake the administration. He said the government had no knowledge of the reported attempt of Luis Cabrera and General Juan Harragan to organize a revolution in northern Mexico.

"The Carranza government," said President de la Huerta laughing, "stood for more than four years, against over 25,000 rebels, and there is no reason why the present government cannot contend with less than 500."

General Pablo Gonzales, who recently left here for Monterey and who has been connected in unconfirmed rumors with recent outbreaks, has been offered the post of Mexican ambassador to France, according to the provisional president, who added the offer had not as yet been accepted. Questioned further relative to military matters, he said 15,000 soldiers were demobilized in June and about 5,000 so far this month. Most of them have been sent to sections of the country where they have been set to work cultivating idle lands.

# GRAIN DELAYED BY CAR SHORTAGE

WINTERS, TEX., July 9.—More than 100 cars of wheat and oats are awaiting cars for shipment at this point. The situation is regarded as serious. All elevators and available warehouses in town are filled. J. C. Wells, exhibit manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, who has just completed an investigation here, has taken the matter up with the organization's traffic department.

Last year Winters gained 18,000 bales of cotton, one gin having turned out 5,224 bales. Though there are four gins here two more are being erected. There is also a large oil mill here. At the last call two banks here had deposits of \$1,250,000. One real estate firm this year is reported to have transacted sales of farm property amounting to \$258,000.

Much of the heavy maize production of 1919 is yet to be sold, and another bumper crop is now forecast. Winters has an exceptionally complete school system and one of the finest edifices in Russell county. This section specializes in fine poultry and registered dairy cows. It also bears the reputation of being a choice agricultural region.

# CUBANS REFUSE SELL SUGAR AT 18 1/4 CENT POUND

HAVANA, July 9.—Reports that the Cuban sugar sales committee had offered sugar for sale were denied by Salcatorra del Valle, a member of the committee, here last night. He de-

clared moreover that offers of 18 1/4 cents per pound made to that body had been refused. Present prices would be ruinous, he said, because liquidation with cane growers had been made on a higher basis. ### ELIASVILLE COAL FIELD TO BE OPENED

ELIASVILLE, July 9.—The advent of the new railroad through this section will open up an entirely new coal producing territory, relieving the strain upon other Texas mines.

It is believed that almost all of this country is underlaid with thick deposits of coal, much of which crops out in the Crystal Falls and Eliasville regions. Coal in more or less quantities is to be found from Thurber and Hanger almost into Wichita Falls, at Newcastle and near Bridgeport.

The mines at Newcastle are furnishing considerable quantities of coal for railroad and manufacturing enterprises and used in homes for warmth during winter.

The present supply of oil in the territories where oil is found decreases the demand for all of the mined material is shipped to other towns not so favorably located with reference to oil.

Curtis Hancock, secretary of the Breckenridge Chamber of Commerce, informs the West Texas Chamber of Commerce that prospects are favorable for the early development of the new, extensive fields.

### PROHIBITION COMES TO FRONT; DRY'S BESEIGE GOVERNOR COX

DAYTON, O., July 9.—The prohibition issue is fast coming to the fore in the preliminary plans for the campaign of Gov. James M. Cox, the democratic nominee.

Dry factions of the party, it is apparent from telegrams now being received by the Ohio governor, are bent upon forcing him to declare for the present, drastic prohibition laws. Anti-prohibition forces have started a counter offensive, thus making Cox a storm center.

No inkling of what W. J. Bryan, with the backing of the Anti-Saloon league, intends to do about the next candidacy has been received here, but the Commoner is the one leading democrat who has sent no congratulations.

The prohibition question is becoming so important it is certain to be one of the main topics of discussion of the big conference of party leaders.

Cox expects to send a reply soon to demand of Richmond F. Hobson and the Anti-Saloon league that he declare opposition to any change in the Volstead law.

Cox will state he proposes to enforce the Volstead law as long as it is on the statute books and that any change in its terms can come only through a "damper" congress, friends believe.

Final decision on the notification ceremonies will be postponed until after Cox makes a trip to the state capital next week, the governor said today.

### NightNewsBriefs

NEW YORK.—W. G. McAdoo, in an address declared "There is no menace so great to our nation as the corrupt use of money for campaign purposes."

MALESTER, OKLA.—Monroe Betterson, white, electrocuted in the state prison here for the murder of his wife at Vanita.

CHICAGO.—Plans for a united third party being formulated here received an upset when members of the single tax party announced they would not support Senator La Follette as candidate for president.

CHICAGO.—Announcement made that General Wood expects to confer shortly with Senator Harding concerning republican presidential campaigns.

BATON ROUGE.—The Louisiana legislature adjourned without taking further action on woman suffrage ratification.

WASHINGTON.—George H. Cushing, managing director of the American Wholesale Coal association, in a statement declared representations of a coal shortage were without foundation.

CHICAGO.—Virgil G. Hinshaw, chairman of the prohibition party, announced the party may place a ticket in the field again this fall.

WASHINGTON.—Secretary Houston offered for subscription two issues of treasury certificates of indebtedness having a combined value of \$200,000,000.

### TEXAS BUILDING MILES OF HIGHWAY

AUSTIN, TEX., July 9.—There are under construction and under the supervision of the state highway department 1,642 miles of designated roads to Texas there is \$5,000,000 for \$22,000,000, including state and federal aid, according to R. M. Hubbard, chairman of the state highway commission.

Twenty federal aid projects whose plans, specifications and estimated cost have been approved and upon which contracts will be awarded in the near future amount to 284 miles, costing \$2,400,000, involving federal aid to the amount of \$1,400,000. There are 65 projects, both state and federal aid, whose applications have been approved and on which plans are now being prepared for 875 miles, costing approximately \$9,800,000, and on which will be paid \$2,825,000 federal aid and \$25,000 state aid.

Summing this up, says Charles Hubbard, it is found that there are 212 active projects, totaling 2,302 miles of highways, costing approximately \$25,000,000, on which \$5,200,000 federal aid and \$1,300,000 state aid has been granted. Of the total federal aid \$2,825,000 federal aid and \$25,000 state aid will be prepared within the next 12 or 15 months.

### MEXICAN STRIKE MOVEMENT NOT CONSIDERED SERIOUS

MEXICO CITY, July 9.—The strike movement throughout Mexico is not alarming, according to a statement by Provisional President de la Huerta, published this morning in the Democrata. He attributed the movement to the cost of living, which in some

cases has risen 500 per cent since 1910. Assertion was made by the provisional president that, while the government welcomes foreign capitalists to Mexico, it must protect the rights of workers. He adds that business men should not be alarmed at the present unrest in the country.

COMMISSION TO APPEAL FOR FREEDOM OF FORMER MINISTER  
MEXICO CITY, July 9.—The liberal independent faction in the chamber of deputies has named a commission to appeal to the provisional president for the freedom of Manuel Aguilar Ber-

langa, former minister of the interior; Gen. Francisco Murguía, Gen. Francisco de P. Mariel and Col. Paulino Fontes, who have been imprisoned since the death of former President Carranza.

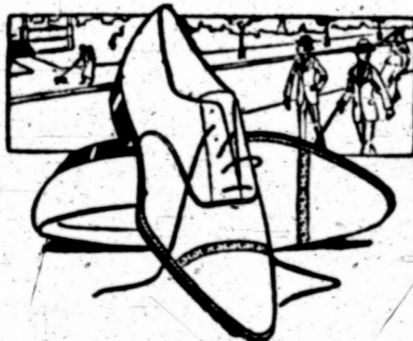

### GOODFELLOW WILL REFUSE TO RESIGN

Declares He Will Stick to Finish and Demand Showdown on Charges.

The waters of police politics still remain muddy today, and the future effect of Police Commissioner Bralley's demand for the resignation of Chief of Police Goodfellow is the chief topic of conversation in the various administration offices in the city hall. Rumors are as plentiful around Ninth and Ohio as bag worms in other sections of the city—rumors of a complete shake-up in the police department; rumors that officers have threatened to quit if Goodfellow is ousted; rumors that use may be made of the recall provision in the city charter and other rumors too numerous to chronicle.

Police Commissioner Bralley is "standing pat" on the charges he made earlier against the chief of police. "The fight is on," he said, "and I don't intend to weaken. I will prove everything I have said when the proper time comes. I am going through with this fight, and I will again ask for Chief Goodfellow's resignation when Mayor Cline returns to the city."

**Will Not Resign.**  
The chief of police on his part stated flatly this morning that he will not resign, and will not surrender his position unless the city council orders his dismissal.

"I have been a police officer in various capacities for 19 years, and I defend my stand, and I don't intend to permit any one man to drive me out of office on trumped-up charges of dishonesty and inefficiency. Such charges are not going to make me show any yellow streak and quit. I resent any attacks on my honesty, and I intend to stick to the finish and demand a showdown on this matter."

Chief Goodfellow this morning led a spectacular police raid in the flats, and returned to headquarters later with three automobiles filled with 21 women and 4 men. In the course of the raid porch swings were removed from the galleries of many of the raided houses, and officers took down all "rooms for rent" signs in sight. One of the charges made against Goodfellow by Commissioner Bralley was that the chief of police had failed to clear this district of men and women of questionable character.

Chief Goodfellow, questioned about the raid, declared somewhat forcefully: "The police commissioner says I'm not keeping that district clean. Let him go over there, and see for himself what has been done. If he wants the police department to confine its activities to the cleaning up of disorderly houses, all right, I'll make a clean sweep of the city before I get through. The name of every man and woman arrested will be published, and some people will be buying gasoline in their hurry to get out of this city."

Meantime, the rumors continue to fly thick and fast—and there is little possibility of any action that will clarify the situation for some time to come. Mayor Cline is not expected to return to the city for two weeks, and Alderman W. S. Curlee, acting mayor, has gone to Colorado. Alderman W. N. Benner is serving as mayor, pro tem—but there isn't a quorum of the city council in Wichita Falls, even if definite action at this time should be demanded.

### OIL TANK STRUCK BY LIGHTNING FRIDAY MORNING

During the storm Friday morning, a 50,000-barrel tank of the Lone Star Refining Co., on the hill just north of Wichita Falls was struck by lightning and the oil ignited. There was comparatively little oil in the tank. This was allowed to flow into the eastern levee around the tank from whence it was pumped into other tanks so that the loss will be small.

### CLAIM AGENTS HOLD ANNUAL CONVENTION IN GALVESTON

GALVESTON, TEX., July 8.—Claim agents of steam and electric railway lines in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana opened their ninth annual convention here today. One of the subjects that is to claim special attention will be grade crossing accidents and methods of reducing their frequency. The claim agents are giving attention particularly to the large number of automobiles which are involved in grade crossing accidents. The sessions of the convention will continue Saturday.

The circuit embraces a general territory running from Ninth and Indiana, out Ohio, Pease, Mississippi, Walnut, Galvestor and Mill streets and swinging back to fire headquarters along Indiana avenue.

This is the second circuit to be completed, and it is probable that a third will be in operation tomorrow. Thirty-three of the 100 alarm boxes are in service.

### TREASURY INDICTMENT AGAINST JOHN REGAN DISMISSED

The felony theft charge against John Regan, in the month of August, 1919, a Wichita county grand jury, was dismissed Friday forenoon upon the recommendation of the district attorney. The case was dismissed due to absence of material witnesses, it is said.

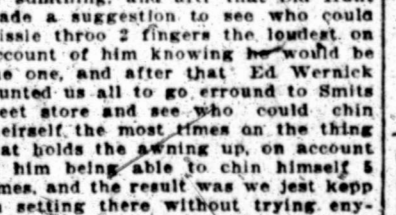

### BURKBURNETT MAKES PLANS FOR PAVING

### MIDNIGHT MORALS OF WICHITA FALLS WILL BE KICKERBOCKER'S THEME

"Midnight Morals of Wichita Falls" will be Rev. H. D. Kickerbocker's subject at the First Christian church Sunday night. This will be the first of a series of joint meetings of the congregations of the First Methodist Church South and the First Christian church.

Rev. Mr. Kickerbocker makes the following statement: "Good people are proverbial for their neglect of civic and political duty. If there are some that think that such questions should not be discussed for the warning of young people and the stirring up of the antagonism of older people against the outrage of commercialized vice and all that leads to it, let them come and hear the stories of a beautiful 14-year-old girl and a beautiful 18-year-old girl that came to a climax in Wichita Falls last week, and they will perhaps change their minds."

"The service will begin at 8:15 and there will be 15 or 20 minutes of special music furnished by the combined music forces of the First Christian and First Methodist churches."

"The Christian church where the union services are held during July nights has lately installed a full complement of electric fans and is delightfully cool."

"At the morning service in my own church, First M. E. church, corner Fifth and Lamar, the subject of my sermon at 11 o'clock will be The

Narrow Way of Life. This sermon will show that the narrowness with which religion is often reproached is an inescapable universal law of life. The morning services are approximately 30 minutes long during the summer."

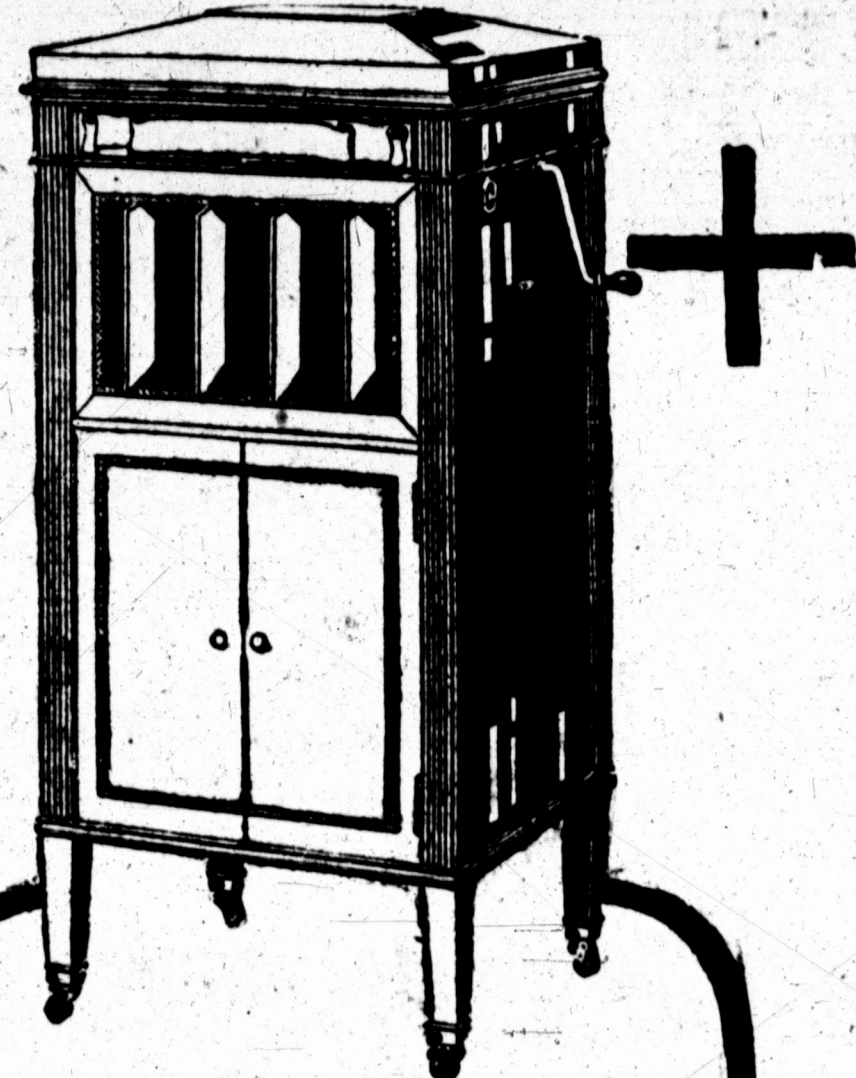

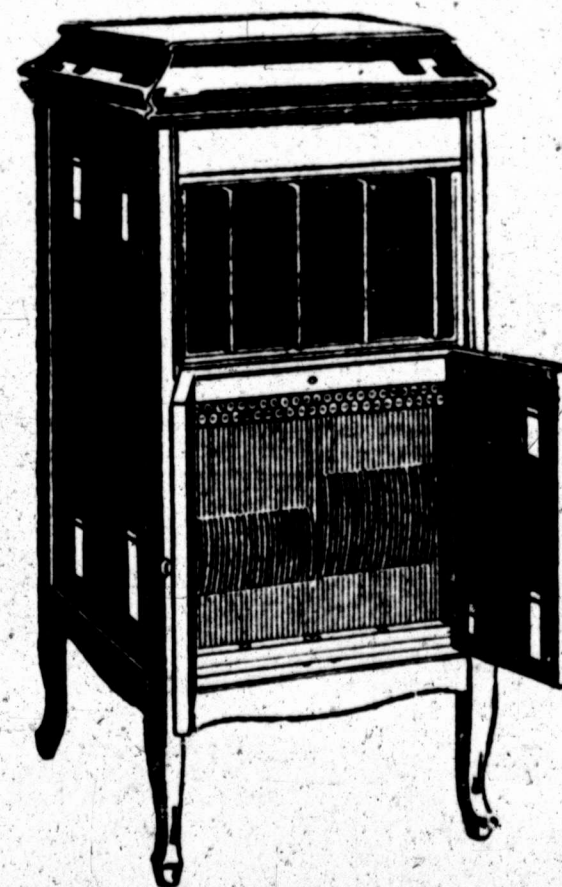

### FIFTEEN HUNDRED ACRES IN PECANS

SAN ANGELO, July 9.—Fifteen hundred acres of irrigated lands in Concholand in paper-shell pecans is the goal set by the Concho Valley Cooperative Paper-shell Pecan Association, with a capital stock of \$250,000. John R. Box, treasurer of the company, is very optimistic over the outlook. The company claims that it has 22,000 native pecan trees that are now bearing and that will be topworked and re-budded on the land that the company is holding.

Mr. Box in a statement to a staff representative of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce declared that the company was absolutely going to plant this mammoth pecan orchard as outlined and made it the biggest thing of its kind in the Southwest. The Knickerbocker section of Concholand has been a prolific producer of native pecans, shipments of which have been made throughout the country. The new improved-pecan—the paper-shell variety, has cut quite a swath in the nut market of recent years. The immense pecan crop of West Texas last

year is estimated to have brought several millions of dollars of profit to owners of pecan orchards along the various streams of the section, without the owners doing any extraordinary labor.

While the pecan crop this fall is at present not flattering, it is believed that the interest created in 1919 by the big crop of that year will result in numerous new acres being impressed into the pecan service, so that in time West Texas will be famous for not only its high grade staple of cotton and its great sorghum grain crops, but for its unmatched pecan yields. Mr. Box proposes pecan culture on a scale hitherto only dreamed of by men less willing to put their means into it.

### FULKERSON, OKLA., BANKER DISAPPEARS AFTER PARDON

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA.—July 9.—Efforts were being made today in locate M. M. Fulkerson, banker of Alva, Okla., who was pardoned by acting Gov. Tom Waldrop here last Saturday. Fulkerson was serving a seven-year sentence for embezzlement when pardoned.

# IMPRESSIONS OF SAN FRANCISCO

By W. C. EDWARDS

SAN FRANCISCO, CALIF., July 4.—With a breath of spring in the air the Golden Gate City today presents a charming Sabbath appearance to the Texans here who have worked ineffectually for a week now to name a candidate for the presidency. The sun is shining clear and bright, for almost the first considerable time since the Texas delegation arrived, and they, worn out by the strenuous sessions of one of the greatest conventions the democrats ever held, are taking advantage of the day mostly for rest.

One who has never before attended a national convention, either as a delegate or working newspaperman, finds that conventions lack much of being all beer and skittles. Indeed, there has not been a day since the convention met that the eight-hour law has not been violated, and since the platform committee made its report and the big fight began, everybody connected with the convention has been getting in from 12 to 14 hours a day of attending the sessions or writing about them afterward. Leaders of the delegation, in addition, have been giving still more hours to caucuses and "log-rolling," and the Texas member of the platform committee, General M. M. Crane, with other members of the sub-committee has been devoting as much as 20 hours a day to the stop of the platform, the ironing out of major differences that arose in the effort to reconcile all democratic factions to acceptance thereof, and the discussions in the full committee.

Democrats from everywhere, regardless of geography or local conditions, are agreed the democracy will enter the fight in one of the greatest utterances ever made by the party. It is sound, it differs from the Chicago platform in that it "comes clean" on every point upon which it makes any expression whatever. Omission of a specific utterance on prohibition is one feature about which there is a very considerable difference of opinion. The vote on the Bryan bone-dry plank was not a real expression of the sentiment of the delegations, because there were two factors responsible for its overwhelming defeat. One was that many delegates resented the attitude of Mr. Bryan and intended their vote as a rebuke to him personally. The other and much more considerable reason was that the dry delegates planned after the defeat of the Bryan minority plank, which they thought went too far in the way of exultation or "blabbing it in" on the wets, to put through the Hobson resolution which was the one put forward by the All-Saloon League and which simply declared for enforcement of the prohibition amendment and Volstead law. After the defeat of the Bryan amendment, however, parliamentary shrewdness on the part of the officers of the convention or lack of it on the part of the dry leaders prevented the Hobson resolution going to a record vote, and it was declared lost. The Texas delegation voted against the Bryan resolution and for the Hobson, and the fate of the latter caused some friction among the delegates, some of whom declared that the Texas delegation—being overwhelmingly dry—should have voted for the Bryan resolution and not taken a chance.

Eastern cities as large as this one would hesitate to speak to a resident for assistance or information in fear of rebuff. In some of the eastern metropolises, indeed, even the policeman, who is put there to give information to visitors if they need it, frequently lacks much of being courteous or helpful. In San Francisco the most casual stranger will go a block out of his way to help out a visitor; the policemen are more than helpful; they are most courteous and genuinely sincere in their desire to do anything they can for the inquirer and with 15,000 or 20,000 visitors here for the convention, most of them here for the first time, their patience cannot but be exercised at times. In the press-section many cordial acquaintances have been formed, some of them promissory of endurance. The local newspapermen are as desirous of helping their visiting brethren as can be. There are many notable newspaper folks here for the convention. Doing feature work: Irvin Cobb, Ring W. Lardner, Edna Ferber, W. J. Bryan, Fanny Hurst (who perchance must miss her twice-a-week breakfasts with her husband) and any number of political correspondents from every important paper in the country are "doing" the convention, and most of them are syndicated their articles to the local papers with the result that one gets much opinion and very few facts from San Francisco publications about the convention.

One misses Texas newspapers and when Senator Pat Harrison the other day devoted a few minutes of a convention talk to denunciation of San Francisco papers he got a "nag" that should have gotten through the hide of the local publishers. To one accustomed to real newspapers in that they publish the news without bias and without regard to whether it helps or hurts their cause, these San Francisco papers are a "rotten joke." If so harsh and truthful an expression may be used. Hearst is the dominant figure in newspaperdom of the California coast, and he seems to have thoroughly imbued even those papers he does not control with his idea of newspaper-making—which apparently is to publish nothing that is not colored to suit the policy of the paper and that accuracy is of only the remotest importance in news story writing. They are as careless about the truth as they are "colored." They are as partisan in their news columns as in their editorial, and reading them one does not wonder at the political vagaries and prejudices that have come out of California. It is curious among visiting newspaper men that the San Francisco

Through a new invention which receives the sounds spoken into it and magnifies and directs them in all directions, speakers on the stage are heard perfectly throughout the big building.

Women have played a big part in this convention and newspaper men who have handled both this and the Chicago republican gathering say that the democrats have outgenerated the

r. o. p. in the way of its treatment of the women. Some of the best speeches the convention has heard has come from them. What the writer believes to have been the best nominating speech of any kind excepting the magnificent key-note address of Chairman Homer S. Cummings, was delivered by a woman, Mrs. Junior Brown of West Virginia, who seconded the nomination of John W. Davis. The first nominating speech ever delivered for a presidential aspirant was delivered here this week when a woman from the Philippines—she is an American—nominated Gov. Gen. Francis Burton Harrison. The party gave full recognition to the women in the organization of the national executive committee.

### TEXAS DELEGATION PLEASED WITH COX

Kemp, However, Believes Different Tactics Would Have Won For McAdoo.

Which from now on will include a committee man and a committee woman from each of the states, with coordinate authority. The women are taking part in the caucuses and they are exercising a potent influence on party policies, including the nomination which at this writing are yet to be made.

There is a very considerable interest here among the natives in Texas, in the tremendous oil development in the Lone Star state within the past few years. It is estimated that through the geographical importance of the average citizen in so far as realization of the tremendous extent of Texas goes, leads to the belief that all Texas is a rich oil field and that nearly everybody from Texas is a millionaire. One finds also quite a number who have more than a vicarious interest in Texas oil fields through possession of Texas oil stocks. Trying to buy a Texas newspaper the other day, the writer was pounced upon by one of the stand-owners with a query if he knew anything about the value of a certain oil stock. The man unfolded a story of how his mother had invested \$100 of her savings in that stock, had received one or two per cent dividend and since then hadn't been able to get any reply to her inquiry as to why dividends stopped. He was inclined to be "sore" at the state and the citizens thereof, because of the result of the investment in a company that was of the wildest of the wild-cat variety with which Texas oil fields have been cursed. Everybody knows about Wichita Falls and the stories of the wealth and prosperity that liquid gold has poured into its lap.

One of the figures with the Texas delegation is Capt. Joe Brooks of the Texas Rangers. He it was who was in charge of the rangers in the Oklahoma-Texas land controversy and he is of the new type of the ranger force—deadly cold and courageous, but with an utter absence of the old-time frontier bravado or desire for a reputation as a "beller." In the ranger white hat and with a face that will attract attention in any urban community, the captain has come in for much attention everywhere. He is a head-hunter gone. He was made doorkeeper at one of the principal entrances of the convention hall and if there is any Texas without a head controversy and get in, it was simply because they didn't know the doorkeeper was on the job. "Anybody who has come all the way out here from Texas is entitled to see the convention," is the way Captain Brooks expresses it, "and I'm going to see that all who come to my door get in." And he has. One Texas woman came into Texas headquarters one day this week. "I want to see the convention," she said. The newspaper man she talked to simply took her over to meet Captain Brooks. He has been a regular visitor at the convention hall since, and she is only one of a good many whom the very limited number of convention tickets allotted the delegation would not take care of.

The Honorable Albert Sidney Burleson is in San Francisco. At any rate, the local newspapers say he is. But few if any of the Texas delegates have seen him and while it was reported that he visited the hotel which is Texas headquarters, nobody of the delegation seems to have seen him on that occasion. His ignoring of his fellow members may have been one reason that helped to put through a Texas caucus repudiating his wet declaration and stating that he did not represent the sentiments of the delegation in that respect.

One who had been in San Francisco in the old days and who believed that if there was a city in the United States where prohibition would not prohibit it would be this one. There are stories of booze at \$25 a gallon and the absence of bootleggers is some proof of the difficulty of getting it. Chinatown, whose drinking places largely made it a place for tourists, is a quiet place now. The Barbary Coast, which in its prime gloried in the well-earned reputation of being the toughest place this side of Port Said, is no more. The principal relic of the old wet days is the night life. San Francisco still has its habit of going to bed late—or early—and getting up late. The quietest time of the day is from 5:00 to 8:00 a. m. At 1:00 or 2:00 o'clock in the morning the streets are as crowded as at 10:00 in the night and the absence of booze doesn't seem to make any difference with the gaiety of restaurant night life. They are good-natured crowds, out for a good time and apparently having it.

The Texas delegation will go home by various routes. Like the Mother Goose rhyme of "wlier, brier, limberlock," some go east, some go west and others north and south. They have had a pleasant trip and they hope a successful trip in the way of nominating a candidate for the presidency who can win. They have heard more politics and talked more politics than ever before in the same length of time. But they will go on talking politics on the way home and after they get home, for they have not lost touch with political affairs in Texas in their greater immediate interest in national politics.

That a serious mistake was made in placing McAdoo's name in nomination at the San Francisco convention, was the opinion expressed today by J. A. Kemp, Wichita Falls banker and delegate to the convention, who returned to this city last night. If McAdoo's name had not been formally presented to the convention, it is Kemp's belief that the democratic party would have drafted him as their candidate; that a "wise" speech's support of the New Yorker at a crucial moment would have brought a landslide of votes sufficient to nominate him.

The Texas delegation, however, is thoroughly satisfied with the selection of Cox. "Practically every man among the 40 Texas delegates," says Kemp, "voted Cox for second choice, and many preferred his nomination over that of McAdoo. But the state convention at Dallas showed a strong sentiment for McAdoo, and before the delegation reached California it was decided to stick solidly behind him."

"But in my opinion it was not wise that McAdoo's name was placed in nomination. He did not want to be put in the position of seeking the office; he was absolutely sincere in this. But his name went before the convention immediately as the balloting started. It gave an opportunity to the San Francisco republican newspapers to utter some bravado or desire for a reputation as a 'beller.' The republicans dreaded McAdoo more than any other presidential possibility in the democratic ranks, I believe."

"But I feel sure we have a mighty strong team in Cox and Roosevelt. Mr. Cummings' keynote speech at an argument on the position of the democratic party that is absolutely unanswerable. When it is fairly digested, I believe the public will appreciate the fact."

Questioned regarding the wet-dry issue, Kemp stated that any impression that the convention was a "wet" convention in sentiment, is a false impression. "The convention turned down Mr. Bryan's appeal by an overwhelming vote, it is true, but in doing so the convention simply was accepting the majority report of its platform committee and rejecting Mr. Bryan's minority report. Mr. Bryan resolved one of the greatest ovations I have ever witnessed. But wise leaders of the party, including Mr. Glass, pointed out most convincingly that a prohibition law is upon the statute books and that it would be absolutely unnecessary for the democratic party to include in its platform any pledge to enforce any particular law. That is to be assumed."

"If Mr. Bryan from the convention floor had asked for the passage of a resolution endorsing the good done by prohibition, I believe the convention would have done so promptly and willingly."

Tammany hall was bitterly opposed to the nomination of Franklin D. Roosevelt as a vice presidential candidate, when his name first was mentioned, and at one time in the course of the convention, according to Mr. Kemp, a near-riot ensued when Roosevelt attempted to seize a New York banner on the convention floor. But the objections of the New Yorkers were overcome and their support was pledged to Roosevelt soon afterward.

Mrs. Kemp returned with Mr. Kemp from San Francisco.

### JACK JOHNSON OFFERS TO SURRENDER ON CONDITIONS

LOS ANGELES, CALIF., July 9.—Jack Johnson, former heavyweight champion pugilist of the world, now a fugitive from American justice, in a long distance telephone call today from Tia Juana, Lower California, offered to surrender himself to federal authorities if accorded certain privileges.

### THOMASON WILL SPEAK HERE JULY 17

Hon. R. E. Thomason, candidate for governor of Texas, will speak in Wichita Falls on Saturday, July 17. A telegram from the Thomason headquarters in Dallas was received today by J. A. Kemp asking that arrangements be made.

"I will do my best to find a place where it will be possible for Mr. Thomason to obtain a good audience of Wichita Falls voters," Mr. Kemp said. "He has always been a good friend to this city, and he is certainly entitled to a cordial welcome here."

### POLISH GOVERNMENT PLANS LEAVE WARSAW

LONDON, July 9.—It is the intention of Poland to move her seat of government from Warsaw, according to statements printed by the German press quoted in a wireless message from Berlin today.

Warsaw, July 8.—Russian Bolshevik forces have broken through the Polish lines south of the Dvina river in a drive designed to overrun Lithuania and form a contact with East Prussia, according to an official statement issued here late today.

The Soviet army is using infantry, artillery, airplanes and tanks. The Poles are fighting desperately to check the advance along the northern front, against which the enemy is throwing crack divisions. On the south front General Budenny, with Rovno in his possession, is advancing in the direction of Lemberg, which is but 150 miles from Warsaw.

### MARSHALL B. HUFF DIES FROM TYPHOID

Member of Prominent Wichita Falls Family Succumbs After Illness Several Weeks.

Marshall Burroughs Huff, aged 19, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Huff, died shortly before 10 o'clock this morning at his home, 1722 Collins avenue. Death was due to typhoid fever. The funeral will be held at 2 p. m. Saturday from the First Baptist church, Rev. O. L. Powers officiating. Death followed a month's illness. His condition had seemed so favorable late in May that his father and mother left for San Francisco to attend the democratic convention. Last week there was a decided turn for the worse and Judge and Mrs. Huff were summoned home, arriving Sunday. Monday his condition became very critical, and though there was some improvement later, it was realized that he could not withstand the fever much longer. Early today there was a severe sinking spell from which he never rallied.

Marshall Huff was born in this city and attended local schools. Last year he entered the ranks of business men, establishing the automobile agency which bears his name. Though much younger than most business men, he had already shown marked acumen and ability when death cut short his promising career. 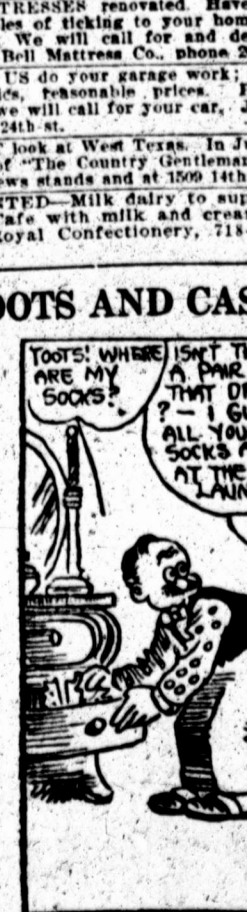

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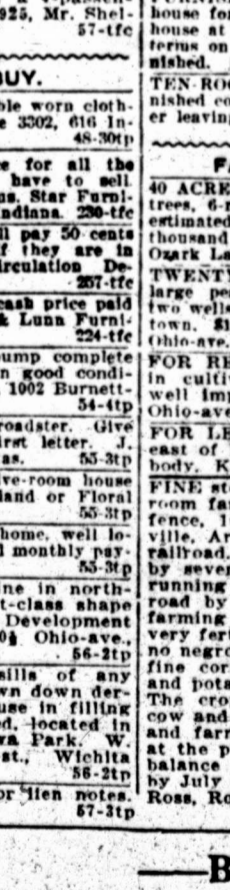
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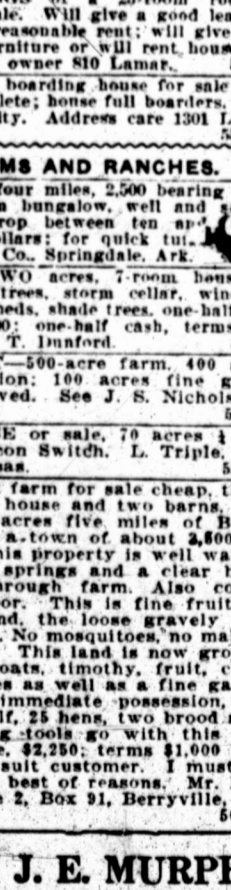

### COTTON MARKET.

New York Cotton Market.—The cotton market showed irregularity at the opening today, first prices being 24 points higher on the inactive month of September and 2 points higher to 4 lower on other positions. So far as could be learned there were only one or two July notices and there was little business in that position, but the continuing good weather in the south led to selling of new crop months with October easing off to 32.52 and December to 31.92 shortly after the call, or 17 to 22 points net lower. Private cables said Liverpool was lower under selling on rumors of dearth in midmonth crop conditions.

Private reports of rains in Texas seemed to help the tone of the market during the middle of the morning, and prices advanced rallies of some 15 to 20 points from the lowest with the final selling at 32.45 or within 10 points of yesterday's closing figures. There was not a great deal of buying made from covering over the week-end, however, and the market weakened again late in the morning owing to a renewal of scattering July notices. That delivery sold off to 32.45, or 50 points net lower and new crop showed no early signs of coming back to the early afternoon.

Selling of 32.31 for October, or about 12 to 14 points net lower on new crop months, the market steadied on covering for over the week-end and the price advanced to 32.31 for September and the market closed steady.

### NEW ORLEANS COTTON.

New Orleans Cotton.—Aggressive selling opened July 9, and prices were 14 to 30 points under the close of yesterday, but were encouraged by reports of further curtailment of output by mills and by the fact that the market was in the belt, but as the market fell, general reaction set in among the holders, so that at the end of the first hour of business the market showed a recovery under the final prices of yesterday.

The reaction continued in force until the market was 17 points over to 5 points under the close of yesterday, October selling at high 32, and the entire cotton region brought in new cotton in the afternoon, but selling under which prices advanced in the morning and late in the morning the more active months were 22 to 23 points lower than yesterday's final.

At the lowest of the day the market stood 27 to 50 points under the final price of yesterday, July making the widest loss and trading down to 26.10. Profit taking again began, and the decline amounted to but 2 to 3 points.

The market closed steady 5 to 18 points down net.

Later Brown testified, Mrs. Asker "revealed to me a plot to frame up" Mr. Snow. Brown declared Mrs. Asker proposed that they were to swear that Snow had told them to make away with "Mr. Asker." He added that they understood that the wife was to be "richly paid." It was not developed who was to pay them.

The witness also testified that Mrs. Asker suggested that they write a strong line of testimony to support the story.
