Surely the 8 a.m. starting time isn't a deterrent for people to attend. The service was held at 7:30 a.m. for many years.

We realize that many people leave town on Memorial Day, but it shouldn't affect the community observance to this ex-

Since the Legion officials go to the trouble of arranging the program, and the various Friona ministers and others lend their time and talent, it would seem that more residents would attend the services. We have always found them an inspiring

We cannot understand why the freight rate for refrigerated beef from Friona to Dallas-Fort Worth should be 42 cents per hundredweight more than from Hereford, and 25 cents more than from Clovis to the abovementioned market.

The rates we're referring to are truck freight rates, which are regulated by the Interstate Commerce Commission. Apparently, the freight rate charged MBP by Santa FeRailway is more in line than the truck freight rates are.

The Chamber of Commerce's transportation and freight committee has had the above project for the past few months, and have been trying to find a reason for the differences which

At first blush, it just doesn't seem right that the rates for Clovis and Hereford are within 17 cents of each other, but the rate for Friona, located between the two, is 25 cents higher than that for Clovis, some 35 miles farther west.

Apparently, the rates are based on volume. If a town, or company can prove a high volume of freight, perhaps the rates go down accordingly.

This being the case, surely Missouri Beef Packers can show the ICC a volume which would make for a more fair freight rate than is currently being charged. The rate apparently was established prior to MBP beginning operations in Friora.

Members of the Chamber of Commerce board of directors and the freight committee hope that the company can show figures which will give it a better break on the rate, and insure an equal chance for Frionaprocessed beef in the market

Perhaps MBP will be granted a hearing before the ICC.



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Pause And Reflect

There is an old saying that "the grass is always greener in the other fellow's pasture."

Taint necessarily so! If we apply the adage to our annual vacation trips we are likely to find ourselves preparing for hundreds of miles of driving and after two weeks of rubber-necking in foreign

lands we hurry back home to rest up. We would then agree with the old lady who said, "the nicest part of a long trip is returning home'

Some of the verbal outpourings that have occupied this space in the Star have been sent in from several different states. Yours truly is known far and wide as an avid landscape inspector - but he also places a high value on local attractions - thereby earning the nickname of "Prairie Prowler".

. . . . If you are interested in the adventures of the men and women who really "won the west" there are a number of places that may be visited on any weekend and some that require only a

one day trip. Such a one day jaunt is Adobe Walls a little northeast of

Take Highway 60 east of Amarillo to Panhandle, then through Borger to Stinnett. Six miles north of Stinnett take Route 15 for about 8 miles then turn right onto 281. From here on little signs labeled "Adobe Walls" will take you to the old battleground.

You won't see any upstanding walls - just long mounds of grass covered earth.

There are a few monuments that tell a little of the story. Lets regress a few miles.

Before reaching the city of Panhandle, keep a sharp eye on the right hand (south) side of the road.

A wrought iron fence incloses a very tiny plot of ground and there in stands a grotesque little tree.

But don't sell it short!

It is the first tree to grow in the "great American desert." Thomas Cree planted the small tree, a Bois d'are (wood for bows) or Osage Orange at the north edge of the buffalo wallow that was on his claim - not many yards from the wagon road to Amarillo - the trait that is now the four land highway you are traveling.

His neighbors laughed him to scorn" no tree can live in these droughts and winds!"

But the little tree did live. It furvived like a true panhandle Texan and for seventy five

years it has put out green leaves. Now back to Adobe Walls.

On the evening of June 26, 1874, there were less than thirty persons at Adobe Walls. A motley crew of buffalo hunters, skinners, freighters,

merchants, and store employees.

At dawn on the 27th they were attacked by over 700 Indians. The defense, and ultimate victory, was climaxed by Billy Dixon's famous rifle shot.

From a distance of 1538 yards (almost seven eights of a mile) Dixon shot an Indian out of his saddle!

When you visit this place remember that here the battle was fought that began the final breakdown of savage resistance to the white man's westward expansion.

Go to our library and obtain a little book entitled "Adobe Walls Bride" - read it furing the week; then on Sunday take the wife and kids to the battleground.

Remember this - those who are not proud of the deeds of their ancestors will not deserve the pride of their descendants! All it can cost you is a tank of gas and a picnic lunch. The Prairie Prowler thinks that is a very small price for a esson in basic American history.

We have the know how for a moon landing.

40 YEARS AGO-JUNE 5, 1929

It now appears to be an established fact that Friona will be the center of a system of rural telephones, which will be connected with and operated by the same system that will be in use in the city.

It is reported on the best of authority that Friona will have a first class and strictly up-to-date "M" System store, which will be open for business on or about the fifteenth of June.

35 YEARS AGO-JUNE 8, 1934

Mrs. A.H. Boatman was appointed to membership on the Texas Centennial Advisory Board as one four members from Parmer County, according to a letter Mrs. Boatman received from Will H. Mayes, temporary secretary of the Texas Centennial Commission.

30 YEARS AGO -- JUNE 9, 1939

The City of Friona is soon to have a new fire truck, which is now being built and nearing completion in the work shops of Reeve Chevrolet Company, with Charles Bainum, one of the firemen, doing and supervising the work of building.

> 25 YEARS AGO-JUNE 9, 1944

On Saturday afternoon, June 10, Friona will be featured on a historical broadcast over station KGNC by Miss Laura V. Hamner of Amarillo.

Some time Monday afternoon, Mrs. Pearl Kinsley was uninjured when her car overturned while enroute to Friona, Mrs. Kinsley sustained only a few minor bruises, but the car was considerably damaged.

20 YEARS AGO-JUNE 10, 1949

On Monday of last week, Day Brothers, house movers of Hereford, arrived in Friona and began preparations for moving the home of Rev. Tommie Allen, pastor of the First Baptist Church, from its old location to make room for the proposed new auditorium to be built on the ground it formerly occupied.

15 YEARS AGO-JUNE 4, 1954

The city has begun making street markers for Friona, a badly needed commodity to assist strangers in finding addresses. The Lions Club set up 64 of the markers on Wednesday, and still have 52 to place on the corners.

Thirty-four cars of a Santa Fe freight were derailed Sunday at the east switch at Summerfield. The cars were filled with perishable goods. Five or six carloads of fruit were taken to Hereford to reload on other cars.

Calendulas can be sown twice during the garden season - in spring for flowers during summer and in summer for fall bloom. Where climate is mild, calendulas are considered winter flowers.

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
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

Continental Grain rebounded to beat Fthridge-Spring, 11-1 in the other league game. In that game, pitcher Keith Martin







A good terrace system will prove its worth in just a few years, especially on dry land farms, or on those farms where the irrigation water is "weak."

S.C.S. engineers figure that it would take a 600 gallons-perminute irrigation well almost nine days to pump the same amount of water onto a 160-acre field as would fall in a twoinch rain.

"The fact is," says Clark, "over half the water from a two inch rain might be lost due to runoff, especially if it falls hard and fast."

By using parallel terraces as part of the "tools of the

"The ability of our land to trade", Parmer County farmers can accomplish these things: hold water from rainfall on the land where it can be used by crops; conduct excess water to safe outliets; and facilitate contour farming, all of which cuts erosion to a mini-

"To make farm 'ng operations easier, terraces in a system should be made parallel," advises Clark, Parallel terraces require more time and planning, but they are worth it. They can be made to fit modern four, six, or eight row farming equip-
