

We think it is a shame that only some 50 or so Friona people attend the annual Memorial Day services, which are sponsored each year by the Friona American Legion Post and the Legion Auxiliary.

From the list of Armed Forces veterans buried in Friona, and others who lived here but are not buried locally, it appears that there should be a larger crowd than mentioned above, even if just the families of the veterans attended the services.

Surely the 8 a.m. starting time isn't a deterrent for people to attend. The service was held at 7:30 a.m. for many years.

We realize that many people leave town on Memorial Day, but it shouldn't affect the community observance to this extent.

Since the Legion officials go to the trouble of arranging the program, and the various Friona ministers and others lend their time and talent, it would seem that more residents would attend the services. We have always found them an inspiring way to start our Memorial Day.

Naturally, it's 51 weeks until the next service rolls around, so that's plenty of time for us to forest our "good intentions" in this respect. Perhaps we'll remember to reprint this reprint next year prior to the service.

We cannot understand why the freight rate for refrigerated beef from Friona to Dallas-Fort Worth should be 42 cents per hundredweight more than from Hereford, and 25 cents more than from Clovis to the above-mentioned market.

The rates we're referring to are truck freight rates, which are regulated by the Interstate Commerce Commission. Apparently, the freight rate charged MBP by Santa Fe Railway is more in line than the truck freight rates are.

The Chamber of Commerce's transportation and freight committee has had the above project for the past few months, and have been trying to find a reason for the differences which were quoted.

At first blush, it just doesn't seem right that the rates for Clovis and Hereford are within 17 cents of each other, but the rate for Friona, located between the two, is 25 cents higher than that for Clovis, some 35 miles farther west.

Apparently, the rates are based on volume. If a town, or company can prove a high volume of freight, perhaps the rates go down accordingly.

This being the case, surely Missouri Beef Packers can show the ICC a volume which would make for a more fair freight rate than is currently being charged. The rate apparently was established prior to MBP beginning operations in Friona.

Members of the Chamber of Commerce board of directors and the freight committee hope that the company can show figures which will give it a better break on the rate, and insure an equal chance for Friona-processed beef in the market place.

Perhaps MBP will be granted a hearing before the ICC.

**CROPS AIDED**

**Rainfall Puts 1969 Figures At 9.15"**

Rains in the Friona area Monday and Tuesday nights amounted to 1.57 officially, and continued the area's "wet period" which has existed since the first of May.

The city had recorded .41 inch of rain last Thursday, for a week's total of 1.98 inches.

The total rainfall for May came to 4.71 inches, largest monthly total since August of 1966, when the fall amounted to 6.83 inches.

Monday night's gentle shower measured .46 inch, and Tuesday night's offering was 1.11 inches, according to the City of Friona.

May's total rainfall pushed the year's total to 8.04 inches, more than double that which had been received in the city by June 1 of 1969. The good monthly total got the year's total more in line with the "average," after a very light first three months, which saw only 1.63 inches recorded.

The monthly totals as recorded by the City of Friona during 1969 are as follows, with the corresponding totals for 1968 in parenthesis:

January: .05 (1.37); February: .77 (.45); March: .81 (.52); April: 1.24 (.50); and May: 4.71 (1.25). Total: 7.78 (3.79).

Farmers in the Friona area also reported an average of a half-inch of moisture for Monday night's shower. The rain was ideal for the small cotton and maize row crops which had come up.

The topsoil had about dried out, and the shower, along with that of last Thursday, will help the moisture to "soak" that stored up from rains earlier in May, according to one observer. The deep moisture should be good, considering the 4.71 inches of rain measured during May.

However, many farmers who were giving their wheat one final watering did not receive enough from the Monday night shower to deter their irrigating, but went ahead with it.

The wheat had really dried out for the most part, and much of it is beginning to turn to the golden-brown harvest color.

Friona's new feed mill, Hi-Pro Feeds, began processing feed last Friday, and is now producing cattle feed on a small scale, according to General Manager Ron Davenport.

Davenport said that the plant had experienced no major problems, but that in training new personnel to work with new equipment, it would be some time before the mill would be utilized anywhere approaching its capacity.

An open house is planned for the new feeding facility in the near future. It will specialize on mixing supplements which are used by feedlots.

**Mann On Ship; Apparently OK**

Joe Bob Mann, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Mann of Friona, was aboard the USS Frank L. Evans when it was cut in half by an Australian aircraft carrier in a pre-dawn collision early Tuesday morning.

As of press time, the parents had had no official word from their son, but were optimistic, since the parents of the 73 men listed as missing were notified on Tuesday.

Young Mann is a machinist mate, fireman's apprentice on the ship, which had a crew of 274. There appeared to be 199 survivors.

**Chamber To Assist July 4th Project**

The Friona Chamber of Commerce voted to help the New Horizons Junior Study Club with its Fourth of July patriotic program, at the monthly board meeting Monday night at the chamber office.

The day's activities will begin with contests for young people, which are to be sponsored by the Noon Lions Club, in City Park.

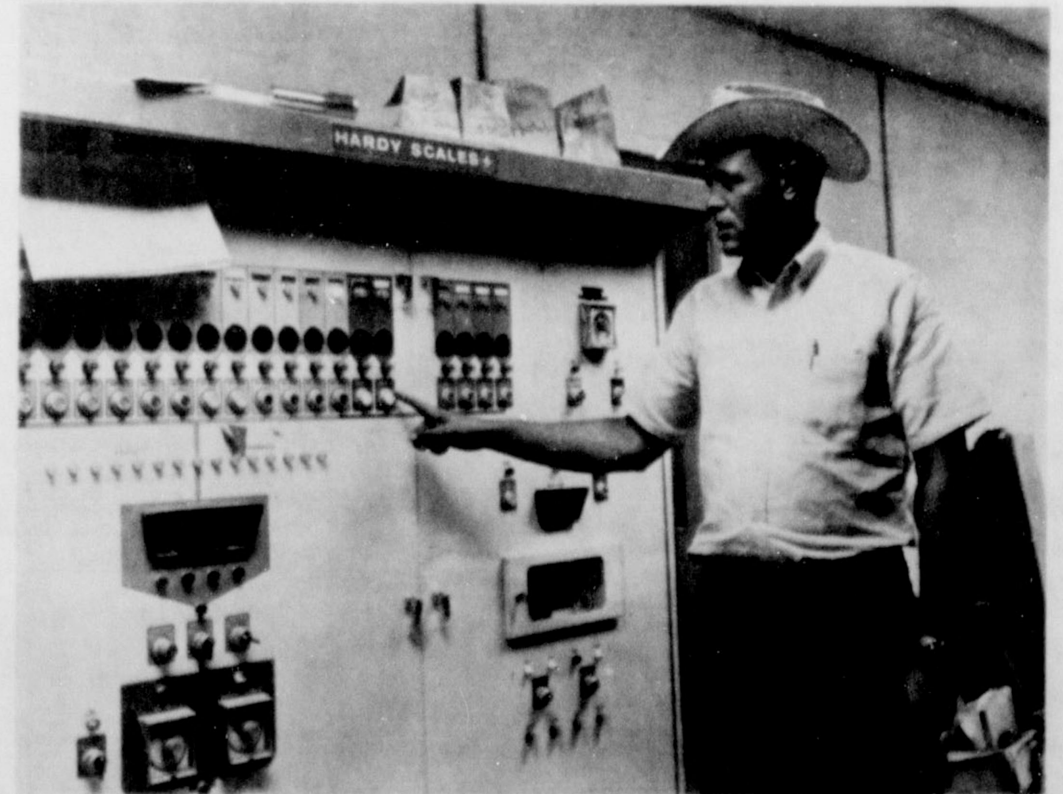

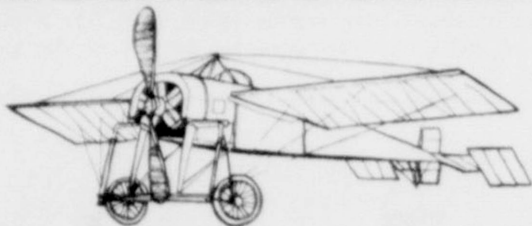

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## Pause And Reflect

There is an old saying that "the grass is always greener in the other fellow's pasture."

Taint necessarily so!

If we apply the adage to our annual vacation trips we are likely to find ourselves preparing for hundreds of miles of driving and after two weeks of rubber-necking in foreign lands we hurry back home to rest up.

We would then agree with the old lady who said, "the nicest part of a long trip is returning home."

Some of the verbal outpourings that have occupied this space in the Star have been sent in from several different states.

Yours truly is known far and wide as an avid landscape inspector - but he also places a high value on local attractions - thereby earning the nickname of "Prairie Prowler".

If you are interested in the adventures of the men and women who really "won the west" there are a number of places that may be visited on any weekend and some that require only a one day trip.

Such a one day jaunt is Adobe Walls a little northeast of Amarillo.

Take Highway 60 east of Amarillo to Panhandle, then through Borger to Stinnett. Six miles north of Stinnett take Route 15 for about 8 miles then turn right onto 281. From here on little signs labeled "Adobe Walls" will take you to the old battleground.

You won't see any upstanding walls - just long mounds of grass covered earth.

There are a few monuments that tell a little of the story. Lets regress a few miles.

Before reaching the city of Panhandle, keep a sharp eye on the right hand (south) side of the road.

A wrought iron fence incloses a very tiny plot of ground and there in stands a grotesque little tree.

But don't sell it short!

It is the first tree to grow in the "great American desert."

Thomas Cree planted the small tree, a Bois d'are (wood for bows) or Osage Orange at the north edge of the buffalo wallow that was on his claim - not many yards from the wagon road to Amarillo - the trail that is now the four land highway you are traveling.

His neighbors laughed him to scorn "no tree can live in these droughts and winds!"

But the little tree did live.

It furlived like a true panhandle Texan and for seventy five years it has put out green leaves.

Now back to Adobe Walls.

On the evening of June 26, 1874, there were less than thirty persons at Adobe Walls.

A motley crew of buffalo hunters, skinnners, freighters, merchants, and store employees.

At dawn on the 27th they were attacked by over 700 Indians.

The defense, and ultimate victory, was climaxed by Billy Dixon's famous rifle shot.

From a distance of 1538 yards (almost seven eights of a mile) Dixon shot an indian out of his saddle!

When you visit this place remember that here the battle was fought that began the final breakdown of savage resistance to the white man's westward expansion.

Go to our library and obtain a little book entitled "Adobe Walls Bride" - read it during the week; then on Sunday take the wife and kids to the battleground.

Remember this - those who are not proud of the deeds of their ancestors will not deserve the pride of their descendants! All it can cost you is a tank of gas and a picnic lunch.

The Prairie Prowler thinks that is a very small price for a lesson in basic American history.

We have the know how for a moon landing.

Why do we not have the ability to inform anguished parents of the fate of a son on board the U.S.S. Frank E. Evans?

40 YEARS AGO-JUNE 5, 1929

It now appears to be an established fact that Friona will be the center of a system of rural telephones, which will be connected with and operated by the same system that will be in use in the city.

It is reported on the best of authority that Friona will have a first class and strictly up-to-date "M" System store, which will be open for business on or about the fifteenth of June.

35 YEARS AGO-JUNE 8, 1934

Mrs. A.H. Boatman was appointed to membership on the Texas Centennial Advisory Board as one four members from Farmer County, according to a letter Mrs. Boatman received from Will H. Mayes, temporary secretary of the Texas Centennial Commission.

30 YEARS AGO--JUNE 9, 1939

The City of Friona is soon to have a new fire truck, which is now being built and nearing completion in the work shops of Reeve Chevrolet Company, with Charles Bainum, one of the firemen, doing and supervising the work of building.

25 YEARS AGO-JUNE 9, 1944

On Saturday afternoon, June 10, Friona will be featured on a historical broadcast over station KGNC by Miss Laura V. Hamner of Amarillo.

Some time Monday afternoon, Mrs. Pearl Kinsley was uninjured when her car overturned while enroute to Friona. Mrs. Kinsley sustained only a few minor bruises, but the car was considerably damaged.

20 YEARS AGO-JUNE 10, 1949

On Monday of last week, Day Brothers, house movers of Hereford, arrived in Friona and began preparations for moving the home of Rev. Tommie Allen, pastor of the First Baptist Church, from its old location to make room for the proposed new auditorium to be built on the ground it formerly occupied.

15 YEARS AGO-JUNE 4, 1954

The city has begun making street markers for Friona, a badly needed commodity to assist strangers in finding addresses. The Lions Club set up 64 of the markers on Wednesday, and still have 52 to place on the corners.

Thirty-four cars of a Santa Fe freight were derailed Sunday at the east switch at Summerfield. The cars were filled with perishable goods. Five or six carloads of fruit were taken to Hereford to reload on other cars.

10 YEARS AGO-JUNE 4, 1959

W. O. (Bill) Wright, 39, drowned sometime Friday night following an unexplained accident at Lake Conchas in New Mexico.

Hail cut a destructive swath through Farmer County, in the shape of a new moon from Rhea to east of Hub. Hail was stacked up a foot deep next to buildings on some farms following the storm.

## Green Thumb Tips

It's easier to cultivate between rows of vegetables than it is to weed. What's the difference? When weeding you remove an offending plant, roots and all. Calendulas can be sown twice during the garden season—in spring for flowers during summer and in summer for fall bloom. Where climate is mild, calendulas are considered winter flowers.

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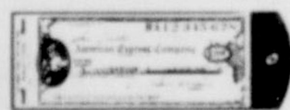
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**LITTLE LEAGUE**

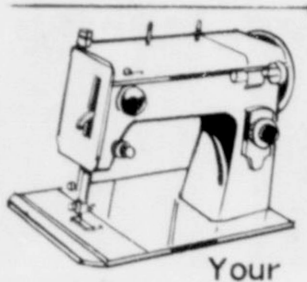

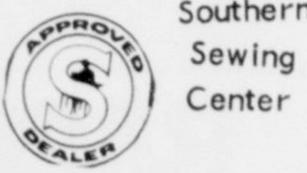

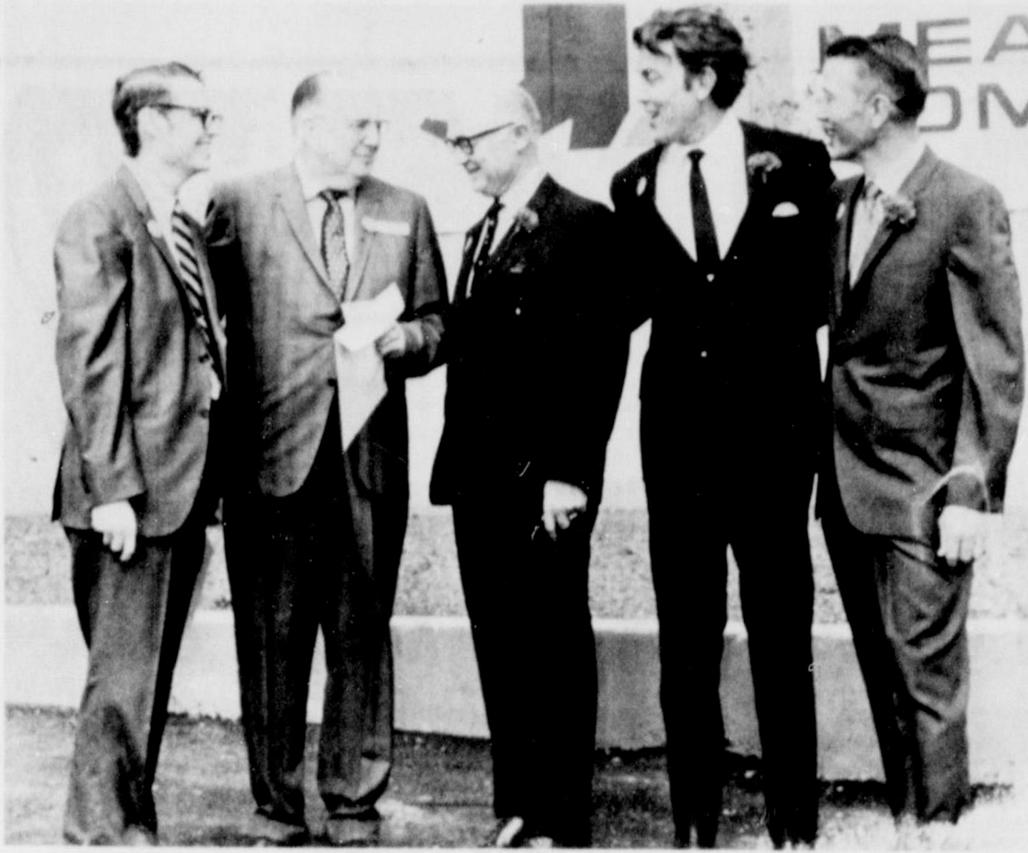

## Open House Sunday At Cannon Air Force Base

Cannon Air Force Base will be staging its annual Open House June 8 with plenty of entertainment lined up for your enjoyment.

Cannon's Fire Department, in conjunction with the men from Detachment 2, Western Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Center will present a fire-fighting demonstration.

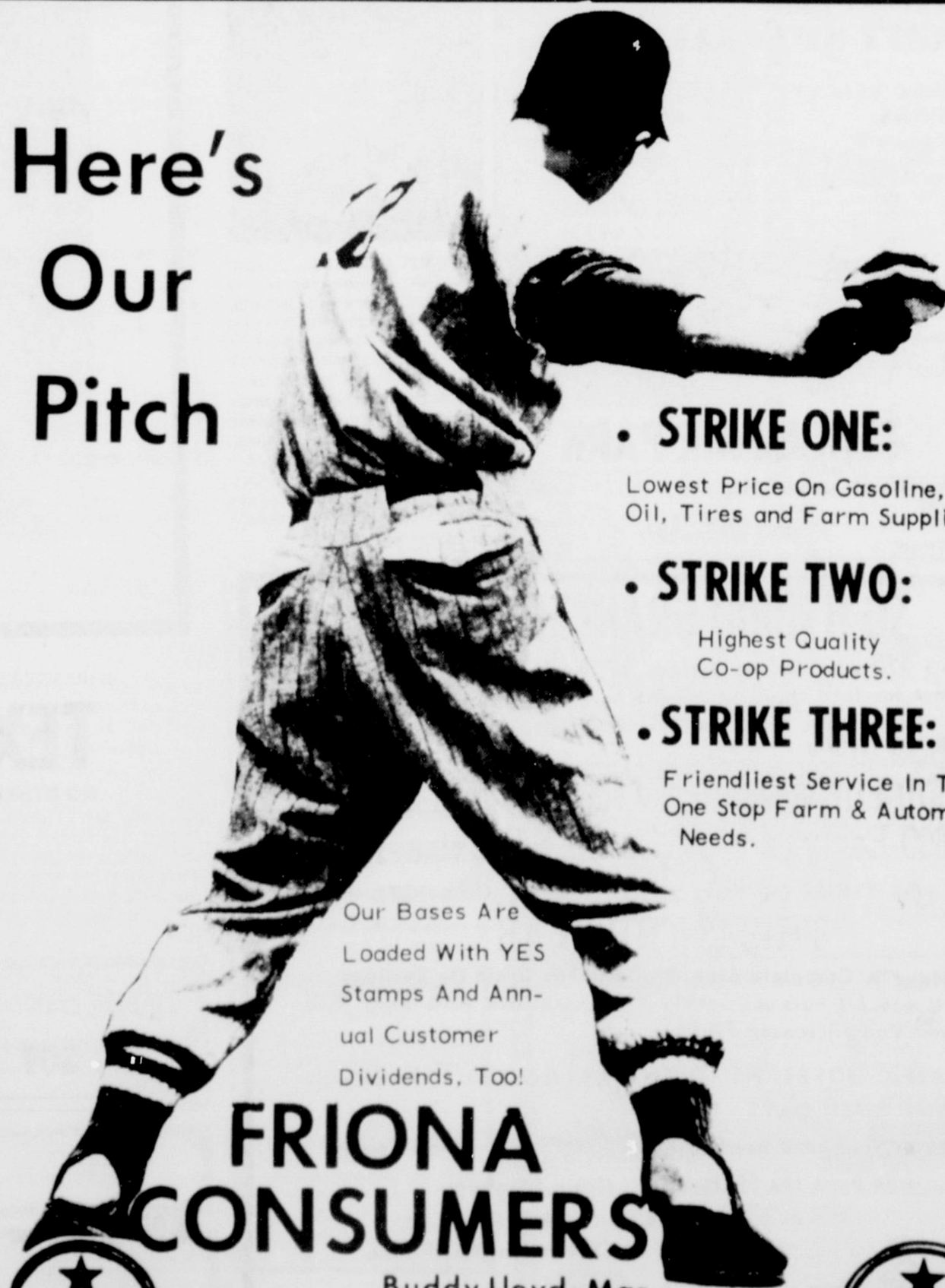

With only a few more days until the June 2nd deadline for the 61st Session of the Legislature, District 72's State Representative Bill Clayton commented on the progress of the current session during an interview in the House chambers today.

"I think history will prove that we have passed more meaningful legislation in the field of water resource development, pollution and conservation than any session of the Legislature ever has," Rep. Clayton said.

The Springlake Representative attributed much of the constructive legislation to speaker Gus Mutscher's astute recognition of the problems of the State and his allowing members full privileges of the House floor for a full hearing of their bills. Rep. Clayton added that Speaker Mutscher has added his support to all water development bills for the State.

The District 72 House Member has served as the author, co-author, chairman of the subcommittee or on the conference committee of every major piece of water legislation that has been considered by the Legislature since 1963. He has served as a member of the Committee on Conservation and Reclamation since he started as a freshman member in that year.

In speaking of his district (the best in the State, according to Rep. Clayton), he said that District 72 leads the nation in cotton and grain sorghum, cattle feeding, slaughtered cattle and all-irrigated agriculture. Being from a district whose people understand the value of water conservation to agriculture and agricultural-based industry, Rep. Clayton is serving the best interests of his constituents by his unstinting work for water legislation.

He is the author of House Joint Resolution 9 which increases the authorized amount of Texas

Water Development Bonds to \$3,500,000,000.00, the largest bond issue ever passed by the Legislature. It will be submitted for a vote by the people on August 5th.

The four-term Representative has carried 27 bills in the House this session and expects to have at least 20 pieces of legislation passed into law by the time the session closes. His bills are about equally divided between local and statewide interests.

Representative Clayton's interests are by no means limited to water legislation. He has served on the Urban Affairs Committee for four terms and is a member of the Committee on State Affairs, traditionally one of the hardest-working committees in the House. He was appointed by the Speaker as Chairman of the Committee on Livestock and is also serving on the Elections Committee.

The 61st Session of the Legislature by law must close at midnight on June 2, but Representative Clayton will go on working for the people in District 72 in the fields of water resource development and attracting new industry by working with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the Texas Industrial Commission. He also hopes to be working as a member of one of the House Interim Committees. He has served twice as chairman of the House Interim Water Study Committee and has seen many of the recommendations of these interim committees become law during following sessions.
