Father Dominic, private chaplain to the mayor, visited the prison this morning and said that MacSwiney was "very low."

TWO PEOPLE INJURED IN SUNDAY ACCIDENTS

James Duran Of Burk Burnett Sustains Most Serious Injury When Cars Collide.

Three automobile accidents in which two persons were slightly injured and two cars damaged to some extent occurred Sunday. The most serious of the three was reported about 1:07 o'clock Sunday evening when a car driven by James Duran of Burk Burnett, collided with a machine driven by G. W. Hubbs. The accident took place just north of the intersection of Indiana and Sixth street. The Duran car, in attempting to turn into Indiana from Sixth did not make a wide enough curve and as a result ran into the Hubbs machine which was coming from the north on Indiana.

In the crash Duran was thrown from his machine and sustained several bruises and cuts about the body. His car was not badly damaged, but the one belonging to Hubbs suffered a badly smashed radiator and three broken wheels. Both men were taken to the city hall where they gave bonds in the sum of \$25 for appearance before Judge Ogil Monday morning.

Mary Collins, aged 3, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Collins, 2119 Ninth street, was struck by a machine driven by Mrs. R. Brannon, 1912 Eleventh. This accident took place in Eighth street between Ohio and Indiana. The girl is said to have stepped in front of the machine and was struck before it could be brought to a stop. She was slightly bruised and after examination was taken to her home.

The third affair took place near the northern end of Ohio when a car driven by Charles Burroughs plowed through a crowd of persons standing on the curb. No one was injured.

SKELETONS MAY BE THOSE OF MEN WHO WERE DODGING WAR

CORPUS CHRISTI, TEXAS, Sept. 5.—Skeletons found recently behind fourteen miles southeast of Corpus Christi may have been those of a party of men who, during the late days of the Civil war, left their homes in the western part of Hunt county and started for Mexico to evade army service, according to a new theory advanced by J. B. Briscoe of Pecos, Texas. In a letter to Gordon Boone, mayor of Corpus Christi.

Mr. Briscoe's letter said, in part: "About the first of April, 1865, a bunch of men—thirty-eight, I think—left the western part of Hunt county to go to Mexico to keep out of the war and not one of them ever has been heard from since. I am quite sure they all were murdered before they reached Mexico. They started from my wife's father's house and she is the last living person who saw them start. I was in the army at the time and did not get home until the first of May. It is possible that those skeletons may be the remains of those men. Several of them were married and some of their wives lived as widows for fifteen years before they remarried."

ATTEMPTED HOLD-UP STAGED SUNDAY NIGHT

Intended Victim Escaped By Making Dash When Ordered To "Put 'Em Up."

An attempted hold-up in which several shots were fired took place Sunday evening at the corner of Indiana and Twelfth streets. The victim, rather than the intended victim, J. O. Bobo, 704 Broad street, took to his heels when ordered to throw up his hands, and escaped amid a shower of bullets. The two highwaymen who made the attempted robbery fled after being foiled by Bobo's prowess as a dash man.

In telling his story to the police Bobo stated that he was walking toward the business district from Ohio and Twelfth when he noticed a group of five men standing some distance ahead of him on Ohio, and that as he drew nearer three of the men left the group and walked on ahead of him. The other two waited until he had passed and then followed a short distance behind. This placed Bobo between the two groups and, after proceeding for a short distance the men in the rear of the procession approached Bobo and ordered him to hold up his hands.

Instead of complying he turned and looked it across Ohio street while the two men opened fire with their revolvers. Bobo went immediately to the ground and lay flat on his back. The shooting in company with two officers. The three men whom Bobo is said to have seen talking with the two robbers were found near the corner of Tenth and Indiana. They were arrested and taken to the city hall where all three stoutly denied any knowledge of the affair.

Bobo affirmed that they were the same three that he had seen in conversation with his assailants and on the strength of this the suspects are being held for further investigation by the police. A search was made for the two men who did the actual work but at an early hour Monday it had proved fruitless.

BETTER VESSELS TO BE BUILT BY JAPANESE

TOKIO, Sept. 5.—Leading Japanese shipping companies are arranging to build bigger and faster steamships to meet passenger competition to the Far East offered by the American shipping board, according to announcement today.

Delegates from chambers of commerce of all large cities of Japan conferred in Tokyo today to decide on policies in connection with Japan's reduced commerce and the effect of the American shipping policy on Japan's trade.

Reports on American commercial activities in China, contrasted with Japan's loss of business in that country, were discussed.

NEW WAGE SCALE FOR NAVY YACHT EMPLOYEES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—A new wage schedule affecting about 75,000 yard employes probably will be put into effect on the first day after September 15. Secretary Daniels announced today that he had completed his review of the findings of the navy yard wage board and that the proposals approved would be ready for application during the present month. The schedule will be made public later.

ATTEMPT TO PREVENT SURRENDER OF VILLA

Make Effort To Capture Bandit Leader While Negotiations Were In Progress.

TORREON, COAHUILA, MEXICO, Sept. 5.—High officials of the Mexican army attempted to prevent the surrender of Francisco Villa, the bandit and guerilla revolutionist, who recently laid down his arms, according to Elias L. Torres, an architect of Mexico City and El Paso, who is credited with bringing about Villa's surrender. Torres, in describing the negotiations between Villa and President de la Huerta said the Mexican executive was anxious to bring about a peaceful settlement while some army officers tried to capture Villa while negotiations were in progress.

Torres, in detailing the negotiations, weaves much romance into the recital. He said: "The first link in the surrender of Villa was forged in June, 1919, when General Felipe Angeles, he attacked Juarez on the Mexican border. Previous to the attack Hipolito Villa, a brother of the guerilla, became despondently ill. Villa sent for an American doctor in El Paso named Villareal. Villareal was a friend of Villa and was promised that if he made his way through the Carranza lines Villa would grant any request, even though it might seem impossible. In case the doctor was killed or met with any accident, Villa promised to care for the physician's son for life, settling a large sum of money on him.

"Doctor Villareal went to Villa's camp and saved the doctor's life, returning in safety to El Paso. With the overthrow of the Carranza government Dr. Villareal remembered Villa's promise and he wondered if it could be used to bring about peace in Mexico. He came to me and after discussing the possibilities of using this as an opening I went to Mexico City and conferred with President de la Huerta and the secretary of war. I was empowered, with Villareal, to discuss a settlement with Villa.

"When I returned to El Paso Dr. Villareal would not join me in a trip to Villa. I went alone although I never had seen Villa.

"I gave me an outline of the terms under which he would surrender. I took these to Mexico City and President de la Huerta outlined the government terms, they being a compromise with those of Villa. I returned and these were accepted by Villa. The terms of agreement were to be signed at Sanluis, Coahuila, a few days later. I telegraphed this information to the government.

"My message was intercepted by a leading general of the north, who threw his troops around Villa, notwithstanding an agreement of armistice until the agreement had been signed and accepted. My arrest was ordered as was that of a lesser general. Villa heard of the trick and sent me word to tell President de la Huerta he would capture me en route to confer direct with the president. The general whose arrest had been ordered with mine, hitched an engine to a solitary coach and started for Mexico City. I accompanied him.

LARGE ORDER MADE FOR FRANCISCO VILLA RANCH

EL PASO, Sept. 5.—An insight into the extent of the farming operations proposed by Francisco Villa, former Mexican bandit chief, at his colony in Durango, was given the public through an order for implements received here by Luis Montes de Oca, Mexican consul, who has been charged by the provisional government with making the purchases for Villa.

The order includes 7,500 sets of harness, 800 plows, 20 mowing machines and 400 scythes; road building and other land improvements and implements to be used by the former guerilla revolutionist, as evidenced by an order for 100 shovels, 200 spades, 200 picks and 200 axes.

Complete equipment for a blacksmith shop was ordered, together with a ton of bar iron. The order also called for two threshing machines, corrugated iron roofing for two warehouses, and thousands of dollars worth of miscellaneous farming implements.

POTATO CROP OF TEXAS ESTIMATED AT 9,127,000

AUSTIN, Sept. 5.—As the Texas sweet potato crop began to move recently the estimate of the federal department of agriculture placed the production for the state at 9,127,000 bushels, according to a communication to the Texas bureau of markets and warehouses. Texas is third among the states in production. Alabama and Georgia both being credited with larger portions of the nation's total of 11,442,000.

Sam H. Dixon, state marketing agent, estimated that approximately 28,000 acres were planted to sweet potatoes in Texas this season, with the bulk of the crop in the northeastern section of the state, where, he said, farmers made it their staple crop. The yield is estimated at approximately 100 bushels an acre. Mr. Dixon said that no car was shipped from Texas last year with the price less than \$1 a bushel, while some of the potatoes

were sold as high as \$2.50 a bushel. He said the movement had not been sufficient thus far this year to deter, unless a standard price.

Sweet potato growers have been called to meet in Dallas September 14 to perfect an organization for marketing their crop. The east Texas chamber of commerce and a number of growers and curing plant owners, Mr. Dixon said, are behind this movement.

The curing of potatoes—drying them in a kiln, so they will not rot—began in Texas on a commercial scale less than five years ago, according to Mr. Dixon, and now the Texas farm is rapidly coming to the front as a "money crop." He estimated that about 10,000,000 bushels of the nation's crop this year would go through curing plants and he held until undried potatoes were off the market.

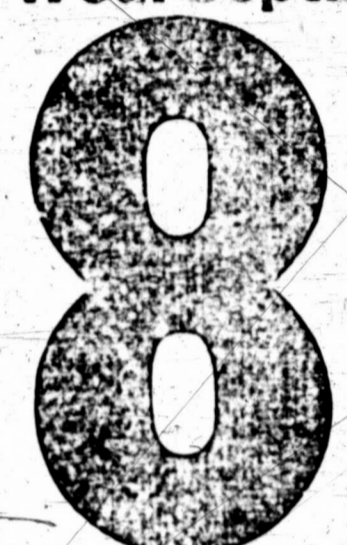

TO VOTE ON AMENDMENTS.

Three constitutional amendments are to be voted on by Texas citizens on Nov. 2 and the addition of the women voters ought to be of material advantage to proponents of all three of these very good amendments.

1. The amendment to remove the limit upon school taxation in the rural districts. The present limit on such tax is 50c on the \$100.

2. The amendment which declares that all state, district, county and precinct officers in the state shall be paid salaries, such salaries to be fixed by the legislature.

3. The amendment to increase the limit in taxation in cities and towns having a population of less than 3,000. Such limit is now one-fourth of 1c on the \$100.

Two of the amendments really only give local option to voters to increase their own taxes to a point commensurate with the needs, of which the people paying the taxes are the best informed.

WHAT IS BEHIND THE IRRIGATION PROJECT.

Wichita Falls and Wichita County must have water abundantly to go forward in future development. Benefits will be distributed. The poor man and the rich man both will profit far beyond any cost that can ever be assessed against him.

It is self protection. To be frank, we MUST put the irrigation project over or be hampered throughout the coming years with inadequate water supply. A frank understanding among ourselves compels the statement that if Wichita Falls grows during the next ten years at even one-third the rate it grew during the last ten years the present water supply will have been hopelessly outgrown.

SECTION III.

WHERE TO VOTE

The district is divided into two precincts. The dividing line runs down Mississippi Ave. in Scotland Addition to Scott Ave. Down Scott Ave. to Tenth Street, out Tenth Street to Brook, down Brook to the Wichita Valley railroad, along the railroad to Archer road, down Archer road to the Southern boundary. Four Propositions and What They Mean

1. An issue of \$4,500,000.00 of 40 year bonds to furnish the city of Wichita Falls, Texas, with a permanent and abundant supply of pure water, also to irrigate some 150,000 acres of rich Wichita Valley land. Vote yes on this issue.

By the adoption of this proposition you elect to change the present district into a conservation district, authorized by Section 59a of Article 16 of the State Constitution. 3. For the levy and collection of taxes at a rate of ten cents on each one hundred dollars valuation of property. This is to pay the running expenses of the district that cannot be paid out of the proceeds of the bond issue. Only so much of this tax will be collected as may be required and same will be a small amount. Vote yes on this issue.

4. For the levy of taxes upon a benefit basis instead of an ad valorem basis. It is vital that you vote No on this issue. The law requiring the submission of this proposition was passed at the re-

quest of Federal Reclamation Projects to meet a condition existing in these projects. The law was so worded as to apply to all projects while the purpose was to provide a method of taxation suitable only to such Federal projects composed only of farm lands and where the project applies solely to furnishing water for irrigation. It contemplates the appraisalment of each tract of land and the levy of taxes on that appraisalment which is based upon the benefit to the land. Second, bond buyers are afraid of new schemes of taxation. When you vote against this proposition you simply vote to continue the present plan of ad valorem taxes and to pay these water improvements bonds by the same method of taxation that all other city and county bonds are paid. The old and tried method. You may ask then why we submit this proposition if it should be defeated. Simply because the law above referred to provides that it shall be submitted. To those favoring the project we repeat, be careful in preparing your ballot. Vote for the first three propositions and against the fourth.

Boy Scout News

Plan Tree Nursery. A plan has been started among members of various boy scout troops in the establishment of a tree nursery in Wichita Falls. A movement of this sort was inaugurated in Lawton, Okla., last spring and met with such success that it is being copied by troops in other cities of this section of the country.

Mr. Frank Rush, a forest and game warden with headquarters at Lawton was responsible for the inauguration of the nursery movement and it was largely through his efforts that the Lawton scouts have built up the idea of the high degree of efficiency that it has now reached. Mr. Rush has offered his services to the local troops and will be available to give instruction and aid in the planting and caring for any trees that may be planted here.

The nursery movement is merely one which is designed to foster and propagate the idea of the U. S. forest reserve, which is in charge of the government timber acreage of the country. It is proposed to plant in this city a number of trees that are adapted to growth in this climate and soil, mainly black locust and cedar. Lawton has been beautified to a great extent already through the efforts of the scouts and local officials, both scout and civic, have expressed themselves in favor of following the nursery plan in this city.
