## CEMPARES LEAGUE COVENANT WITH A COURT AS PLANNED

LATTER SUGGESTION VERY SIM-ILAR TO SUPREME COURT OF UNITED STATES.

#### PROPOSED COURT WITHOUT A PROVISION TO COMPEL

Claim That Moral Force And Public Opinion Will Be Suffi-

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The fact that the League of Nations, after being the dominant question in American politics for close to two years preceding the election instantly returns to the head lines in the same capacity is proof of the vitality of the idea. In-asmuch as America will be considering this subject for at least six months to come and perhaps least six months. to come, and perhaps longer, it is de-sirable to make clean the distinction between what was rejected at the re-cent election and what will be to be the control of public opinion. cent election and what will be pre-sented for our approval after the new leaders have reduced their ideas to

It would be roughly correct to say, in so confessedly tentative and in-complete a discussion as this is, that what the new plan contemplates is world court which shall be to the nations of the world what the supreme court of the United States is to the state of our own union. The court will not be the whole of the new plan, but court will be the principal part of and the only part that will have an, power.

Points of Simplicity.

simplicity between our supreme court and the court that is planned by those and the court that is planned by those whose thought will be dominant in attempting to bring about the new association of nations. There is not space here to go into these points jet similarity, nor, farther to describe this still inchoate plan. But one question which will arise in the minds of every

one can be partially answered.

It will be asked, what force will be at the command of this new court to enforce its decrees? What constable will it have, or what sheriff, or what marshal. To compel a nation against which a decree is handed down to obey that decree? That covertion has been that decree? That question has been at heart of every discussion of the present League of Nations and of ev-ery other proposed form of world as-sociation to enforce peace.

The League of Nations frankly re-lies upon armies and navies to en-force its decrees, and that is pre-cisely the feature of the League of Nations which was deemed objection-able by its most violent critics. The idea that the American army or the American navy might be so used was the most successful appeal made for popular support by those opponents of the league whose position was en

Court Without "Authority."

As to the court which is embodied in the new plan, the answer to this question about a sheriff or a marshal or some other form of force is that the court is not to be allowed to have any force at its command. It is to

have neither an army nor a navy nor a constable nor a sheriff nor a mar-

At this point all who advocate and At this point all who advocate and support the feature of force as a necessity to success in any league to enforce peace will probably throw up their hands. They will say that without some equivalent for sheriff or a marshall to enforce its decrees the new court will amount to nothing and will be helpless to keep the peace.

The answer of those who favor the new world court, modeled upon the supreme court of the United States, will come as a surprise. It will come as a surprise even to many lawyers. The answer given is that in disputes between the various states of the United States our own supreme court has no force and no way of enforcing its decrees if a state should refuse to bey its decree.

Facts Forgotten. This is a fact that nearly all Americans have forgotten. It is so uniform a practice for our states to obey handed down by the supreme court of the United States that we all take it for granted that the defendant states do so for the same reason that most of us obey the decree of a court —that is, because of the fear of the power over our persons and our prop-erty that the ordinary courts have. The fact is that when one of our states

sues another state in the supreme court, and when the decree is handed down, that ends the matter. If the defendant state should choose to ignore the decree, there is no way for the supreme court to punish such a contempt or overcome such a resistance. Nevertheless, all our states do obey such decrees when they are handed down. They do so not through fear

In all the cases since this one, the defendant state has obeyed the decree and has done se, not through fear of armed force, but wholly because of the moral force of the decree and of the public opinion

No Armed Power, The advocates of the proposed supreme court of the world, so to speak claim that what happens between states within the jurisdiction of our supreme court would also happen as between nations within the jurisdiction of the new court. They do not propose to give to this new court any armed power to enforce its They claim that the moral, force of the decree and of the public opinion behind it would be enough. If you reply that, theoretically, it would not

be enough, their answer is that they do not concede this to be so; and



Two Main Features. There are two main features to every set of plans of this nature. First, the thing that costs the city no money the thing that cests the city to moley—
the zoning plan. This can be applied without expense, and, while it
affects all residence and industrial
property, it assists in stabilizing
values. Second, the plan for general
public improvements, which plan does
call for expenditures. In this second
call for expenditures. In this second scheme I attempt simply to furnish a guide for the city's future develop-ment. Here and there you will apply funds on these matters as such funds become available."

Before he leaves the city, Kessler expects to confer with J. A. Kemp regarding plans for a rural community outside Wichita Falls in connection with the Wichita valley irrigation project. Kessler stated today that ne is particularly interested in this matter, as he is convinced that the irrigation project, when successfully completed, will be a remarkable contributing factor to this city's future. John Noyes, Kessler's assistant, will arrive in Wichita Falls this evening bringing the actual plans as will arrive in Wichita Falls this evening bringing the actual plans as they have been prepared thus far. After checking them over carefully, and adding certain suggestions, Kessler will leave the matter temporarily in Noyes' hands for action here. Noyes will probably be here two weeks going over all the details, and getting matters in such shape that the final draft can be made and presented to the city.






In olden times the names given by parents to their children were usually descriptive of some peculiarity already existing or which it was hoped might become charac-teristic. The names of the Jews, Greeks and Romans were almost in-variably of this nature. Thus Eve means life-giving; Jacob signifies a supplanter; David is "well-beloved." while Lazarus means one destitute of help. In the Greek, Alexander is a helper: Hector A defender; and Charity signifies love or beauty. In Latin, Augustus meant grand or venerable; Clement, mild-tempered, and Felix, happy. So also in English names, wheth-

er of Ceitic, Anglo-Saxon, Danish or Norman origin. Cadwallader, for example, means valiant; Griffith, good faith; Liewellyn, lion-like; Alfred is "all peace"; Bernard, bear's heart; Edward, happy-keeper; Gilbert, bright, and Richard, powerful.

These names were of a personal nature, having nothing in common with the names of others. In this respect they correspond to the English Christian or "Christianed" name of modern times, and to the forename of other countries. As population increased, however, it was found that something more was required to distinguish between two or more persons who were named or more persons who were named alike, and the practice of giving a supplementary name—or adding something to the proper name—into vogue. These additions were called "super"—or "sur-names."

At first, however, these surnames were not handed down from for these

were not handed down from father to son, but were changeable at the will of the owner. Nor was a man confined to the use of one surname. In the "Domesday Book," for instance, there is the case of the Earl of Clare, who had five surnames in addition to his title say loss. In addition to these 18, 35 other roads have applied the recent award, making a total of 53 roads vol-untarily applying the award.

The decision in the case now being studied by the board will be of the mendous importance on other short line roads. What action is taken to this case is believed almost certain to be applied to all of them. It is con sidered most probable that the board will cover all shortline roads in its de-

The short line road employes are tacked in their demands by officials of the Brotherhoods and the American Federation of Labor. Practically all of them are members of the Brotherhood or of the department of Raifrond Employees of the American Federation of Labor. Their request was not included in the earlier demands, because short line roads were operated under private control. It was only employer of poads that were formerly under federal control that asked for a raise. The latter originally made their demands when the government operated the roads and by the time they obtained the settler control to the roads. tained the action sought, the roads were back in private hands.

#### COTTON MARKET.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—This morning's weather map fully realized yesterday's predictions of cold weather in the cotton belt, temperatures ranging from 20 to 32 degrees being reported in northern sections. They failed to create any buying power of consequence, however, the market being influenced by weak Liverpool-cables and reiterated reports of easier spot markets. First prices were easy at a decline of 20 to 47 points, with January selling off to 18.25, or 77 points below the high price touched on the rally of yesterday afternoon. Liverpool cables reported hedge selling there with very little buying power and the failure of freezing temperature in the belt to stimulate demand in the local market evidently was a disappointment to recent buyers. stimulate demand in the local market evidently was a disappointment to recent buyers.

Prices recovered 20 or 25 points of their opening losses during the middle of the morning on covering for over the week—end. Otherwise there was very little demand and the market weakened again around mid-day owing to reports of an easier spot basis in the southwest accompanied by some selling through brokers with spot house connections. January broke to 18.11, or even with the low point of the week and active months generally sold 48 to 64 points higher.

Selling became more active in the afternoon on continued bearish spot advices and the unsettled ruling of the stock market. Prices made new low ground for the week with January selling at 17.25, or 80 points net lower. A private crop estimate of 13,000,000 bales excluding linters encouraged the selling movement, which included a good-deal of pressure from Wall urreet sources.


