FAVORS CONTINUATION OF INCOME SURTAXES

Says Excess Profits Tax Must Go In Discussing Plans For Revisions.

WASHINGTON, Del. 21.-Business of the country is demanding and must have revision of the tax laws if it i to continue a healthy growth, Otto H. Kahn, New York banker, told the house ways and means committee today in a statement in which he denounced economic aspects of the treaty of Versailles and declared for continuation of income surtaxes.

The excess profit tax "must go,"
Mr. Kahn said, adding that while it
was theoretically sound, its disadvantages outbalanced its advantages. Continuation of the income surtaxes

Mr. Kahn explained, was a social and economic necessity, but he warned against excessive levies on the higher mes on the ground that they did produce the maximum of revenue which they were designed. He said also that he opposed any exemption under income tax provisions. "Your problem." Mr. Kahn continued

"is to find out how to make the sur-taxes economically sound. It is a question of finding how and what rates can be made to produce the maximum. But I think there is danger in excessive levies in surtaxes and this should be guarded against." Before Mr. Kahn was called, Chair-man Fordney stated that he and other members of the committee were in fa-vor of "some kind" of a sales tax as as one of the means of ratsing four bilons of revenue needed annually by

the government.

"It seems a sensible tax," said the chairman, "but we do not want a sales tax that will be multiplied and pyramided into a burden on the consumer. amided into a burden on the consumer. We want to avoid a law which will cause to be passed on the consumer a levy which nets more profits to the merchant than tax to the govern-

LANDING OF PILGRIMS IS CELE BRATED AT PLYMOUTH. MASSACHUSETTS.

VICE PRESIDENT-ELECT ALSO DELIVERS ADDRESS

Hymna Appropriate To The Occasion Feature An Interesting Program.

PLYMOUTH, MASS., Dec. 21 .- On the hore of Plymouth Bay, where "the breaking waves dashed high" when the Pilgrmis set foot on Plymouth Rock on December 21, 1620, their descendants joined with other distinguished men of this generation in America, Great Britain and Holland in observing today with due solemnity the tercentenary of their landing. The orator was Senator Henry Cabot Lodge, a successor in representation in the senate from Mas-sachusetts of Daniel Webster, who de-livered the famous "Plymouth Oraflon"

at the two hundredth anniversary.

An address was delivered by Governor Calvin Coolidge, vice-president-elect, and a poem, "1620-1920," was read by Dean Le Baron R. Briggs of the faculty of arts and selences of Harvard University Harvard University Harvard University. Hyms appropriate to the occasion were ng. including the "Landing of the Pilgrims," by Mrs. Felicia Hemans, known to every Amer can school boy and girl for genera

Senator Lodge gave a scholarly out-line of the Pilgrim story and in draw-ing from it a lesson for present day America he pointed out that "they set character first," "sought to give men freedom both in body and mind," and "tried to reduce the sum of human misery."

be no nobler purposes for men than
thus to deal with the only earth he
knows and the fragment of time
awarded him here. White the greatrepublic is true in heart and deed to

In stately measures Dean Briggs set forth the vision of the Pilgrims and tastr prayerful determination:

"Freedom Thy new-born nation here shall cherish;

Grant us Thy covenant, unchanging, Earth shall decay; the firmanent shall

Preedom and truth, immortal shall endure."

The answer of their descendants to this challenge came in these words:
"The Pilgrim's faith, the Pilgrim's courage grant us:
Still saines the truth that for the Pilgrim sheet."
We are, his seed, not life nor saith shall daunt us.
The part is freedom! Pilgrim heart; sail on!"

The official party came from Boston on a special train and proceeded immediately to the old Colony Thestre, where the exercises were held. In their number, in addition to the speakers of the day, were official representatives of Great Briain and Holland, several New England governors, members of the New England judiciary. Senator Oscar W. Underwood of Alabama and members of patriotic societies, including the Society of Mayflower Descendants. The presiding officer was Louis K. Liggett of Boston, chairman of the Massachusetts Pilgrim Tercentenary Commission.

Benator Lodge touched upon "the peevish, meaningless objection," that if the great men of history had not accomplished the specific deeds at, tached to their names "somebody else would have done all these things."

"The 'might have beens' have no claims to celebration. That which alone is entitled to this high honor is 'what was.' The actual deed and the men who did the deed which breaks the horizon's level line,' not those who did do it, even if they thought about it, alone deserve honor. alone deserve honor, reverence and

"Can we, then, justly place what happened here at Plymouth, and the men and women to whom we owe the great act, in the small, high-class of decisive events due to the actual doers of great deeds? The senator sketched briefly the early struggles of the Pitgrims, and went on:

"It is clearer than anything else, to those who look into it with considerate eyes, that these men, the leaders especially, had a profound consciousness that they were engaged in a vantly greater task than establishing a colony. They fest in the depths of their being that they were laying the foundation of an empire—of a mighty nation.

'The underlying and the lasting causes which made the action of the Pilgrims a decisive event in history seem to me to be not what they did with their ships and farms, their tradeand their fisheries, but with their minds and with their thoughts. It matters not whether we agree with their theology or with their forms of Christian worship. That which counted then and has counted ever since was that they set the spiritual above the material.

"They never for a moment thought that life and its mysteries could be expressed in economic terms, which seems, if not actually avowed to be the tendency among all classes today. They set character first. They sought to give men freedom both in body and mind. They tried to reduce the sum of human misery. 





"Shrigtmag-Tree" Associated
With Shrietmas?

Digging back into the folk-lore of various nations, we find a number of legends surrounding the light-and-present-bedecked tree which is now a legends surrounding the light-and-present-bedecked tree which is now a grabol of Christmas in a majority of homes throughout the world. The Scandinaviana, for example, still re-late the story of the "service-tree" which sprang from the blood-drenched soll where two lovers had died, and at certain nights in the Christmas season, mysterious lights were seen flaming from its branches —lights that no wind could extin-guish.

mights that no wind could extinguish.

The French vision of the story is that one of the early knights found a gigantic tree whose branches were covered with burning candles—some standing erect, some upside downand at the top, the vision of a child with a hale around its head. The knight asked the pope for an explanation of the mystery, and was told that the tree undoubtedly represented mankind: the candles, good and bad humans, and the Child was the saviour.

Raviour.

Bir George Birdswood, the eminent Egyptologist, explains the Christmastree as "being derived from the ancient Egyptian practice of deckins houses at the time of the winter seistice with branches of the date-palm, the symbol of life over death."

As a permanent institution—the Christmas tree can be traced back only as far as the Sixteenth century, appearing, apparently for the first

anyearing, apparently for the first time in its now accepted form, in Stragsbourg. For several centuries the tree remained a custom which was confined almost entirely to Ger-many or to those of German descent, and in 1860 the German residents of and in 1860 the German residents of Paris could obtain a Christmas tree only with the greatest difficulty. Nine years later, however, the trees were sold in the markets, and Paris uses now nearly 100,000 of them each year. The marriage of Queen Vic-toria to a German prince brought the tree to England, and the German emi-grant to America spread the custom through this country.





PROPOSED REFORM OF TAX SYSTEM TO

Public Utilities Commission is Proposed And Bill Is Prepared By Committee.

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Dec. 21 .- The thirty-seventh Texa: legislature, which will convene in regul.: session at Austin on January 11, 1921, it composed of 142 representatives and the redistricting of the state into control thirty-one senators. Lieutenant Governor-elect Lynch Davidson will preside over the senate. A number of representatives have entered the race for speaker of the house, with no definite indications as to which will be successful.

The Texas legislature is overwhelmingly democratic. In the sen-ate thirty democrats are assured, with possible contest between a democrat nd a republican for the thirty-first lace. Unofficial reports reaching the capital are that four American party this morning, according to long discandidates for the house of representatives defeated their democratic opponents in the general election. The remainder of the house is democratic.

The state platform directs that the legis'a-ture consider and try to remedy such defects as may be found in the present system of taxation before taking up a new one. The rtate comptroller and the state tax commissioner have recommended a state tax board to equalize all property values, while Representative John A. Smith of Austin has prepared a bilt proposing radical changes from present taxation methods.

Amendment of the law authorizing the fixing of a minimum wage for. not been enforced because the com-mission appointed to fixe the mini-mum said they could not fix a just wage scale under the present law, is the most important labor account scheduled at present.

Judiciary Reform.

A reform of the judiciary system of the state has been urged from several sources, including the state democratic platform, and Representative Joe Burkett of East and has declared that he will introduce a bill proposing to abolish the nine courts of civil appeals and delegate their jurisdiction to the state supreme court, which he would increase from three to twelve members.

Harding has been specifically urged to name W. G. Lee, head of the Order of Railway Trainmen and one of the three or four men acknowledged to be the ablest and the highest in standing among the leaders of organized labor. Lee began life as a brakeman on the Atchison and the Union Pacific, and has never held any political office ex-cept for a brief period many years ago as deputy recorder of deeds in Ford

County, Kansas.

The argument that supports Lee is to the effect that it is the wisest policy

to give recognition and support to or-ganized labor.

For some years past the conservative leaders of organized labor, including Gompers himself, have been constantly under assault from radical labor men. It is believed to be the best policy to give to these conservative leaders the kind of recognition that will help them in their resistance against radical opposition in their own ranks. osition in their own ranks.

President Wilson has followed this police frankly. He wentout of his way police frankly. He wentout of his way to make an address at the annual meeting of the American Federation of Labor at Buffalo three years ago. It was generally accepted that his presence on that occasion was partly due to his wish to give moral support to Mr. Gompers and to help this veteran head of the federation against any attempt which was just then acute to oust him from his position in favor of some onesiess conservative.




