Plans for Friona's Maize Days celebration continue to move forward. The entries are now all in for the Queen's Contest.

The celebration will also mark the 65th anniversary of the founding of the City of Friona, which was begun in 1906.

Not just because we're growing a moustache, but because there are so many around this year, we're urging that a moustache division be included in the beard-judging.

In fact, it may be all-moustaches, since we've seen very few beards this year. The shave permits are just now going out—and while there are many who don't need over two weeks to grow a beard worthy of a contest, for others of us, it takes longer.

The opposition to the Hipples and other long-haired cults probably has done its part to discourage beard-growers, in favor of the less-objectionable (we think) moustache.

The growing trend toward outlawing chemical aids to agriculture have many farm leaders worried. It is generally realized that chemicals have helped to make food production in this country an advanced science, and the outlawing of pesticides could easily tip the scales toward scarcity and even famine, according to some leaders.

Pesticides, which are among the most essential tools of modern agriculture, are the chief target of anti-chemical advocates. At present, there is no substitute for the wise use of pesticides.

They often spell the difference between crops and no crops. In our area, for example, had it not been for pesticides during the last few years, the maize production would have been drastically reduced.

Dr. N.C. Brady of Cornell University says "It would not take much to tip the scales from plenty to scarcity. Scarcity, after all, has been a normal condition of man throughout all history and it is even now the accepted way of life for the greater part of the world's three million people."

Dr. Brady points out that it has been estimated that all of the food stored in U.S. warehouses and government surplus storage would feed our population for only 90 days, if all food production were stopped.

Ninety days from bountiful plenty, even agricultural surpluses, to abject famine! Moreover, the nation's population is growing. For every million people added to our population, there must be another 172,000 beef cattle; 25,400 dairy cattle; 433,000 hogs and 1.3 million hens at today's food consumption rates. The average family of four eats 2.5 tons of food per year.

Without considering the rest of the world, this nation's food requirements are high and rising. The production of this food necessitates the use of every scientific aid, in the light of this fact, broad emotional attacks on agricultural chemicals, such as pesticides, where no adequate alternatives are available, could prove suicidal.

STILL GROWING

Friona Enrollment Nears 1500-Mark

Farmer County scholastics totalled 3,137 at the beginning of this week. The figure was probably a record for the beginning of school, as two schools indicated all time records.

Friona led the way, with 47 per cent of the total. Enrollment in Friona schools stood at 1490 on Monday. This was up 42 from the first-day total and an increase of 45 from the same date a year ago.

The Farwell school system showed 675 scholastics, up slightly from a year ago, according to Superintendent W.M. Roberts. Bovina's enrollment on Monday stood at 662, also up slightly from a year ago. The total enrollment at Lazbuddie amounted to 310 students.

The totals at the three larger schools reflected the beginning of their second week of school. However, Monday was the first day of school at Lazbuddie.

Friona's total was only 10 below the estimate of 1500 which Superintendent Alton Farr predicted for the beginning of school. That figure undoubtedly will be reached, as new students are expected to be added until after Labor Day.

The Monday totals at Friona included 370 in high school, 527 in junior high and 593 in elementary school. The largest class is the first grade, with 162 students. The largest in junior high is the sixth grade, with 147 students, and high school's largest class is the freshman group, with 113. Every class in the Friona system has at least 100 chil-

dren, with the exceptions of the junior and senior classes in high school, which currently have 70 and 78, respectively.

Of the county totals, 810 of the scholastics are in high school. A total of 857 are in junior high school, and 1470 are listed as elementary children.

Farwell listed 198 in high school, 166 in junior high, and 311 elementary students. Bovina's totals were: 168 in high school; 164 in junior high and 330 elementary.

Lazbuddie's total was broken down as 74 high school students and 236 elementary. Friona's totals, by grade, are as follows: First-162; second-123; third-121; fourth-133; fifth-122; sixth-147; seventh-127; eighth-131; ninth-113; tenth-109; eleventh-70; twelfth-78.

There are 40 enrolled in the special kindergarten class, and 14 in special education, grades one through four, not included in the above totals.

Changes Mind, Chief Resigns

Bill Morgan, Friona's Chief of Police for the past five years, settled the matter of the chief's position by tendering his written resignation last Friday to City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland.

The position had been in a state of flux for the preceding week.

Acting as chief is Bill Denney, who has been assistant chief under Morgan.

"Bumper" Crops Are Prospects For Area

Farmers in the Friona area are flirting with bumper crop prospects in just about every category, a survey of agricultural leaders revealed this week.

Maize, the country's number one cash crop, is looking as good as most observers can remember. Cotton, given a break from the weather, could also approach bumper proportions. Corn (ensilage), which is for the most part ready, appears tops.

"I've lived in this country all my life, which is several years, and this is as good a maize crop as I've ever seen," says Arthur Drake, longtime manager of Friona Wheat Growers' elevator.

Other elevator operators echoed Drake's statement. "It's easily the best crop I've ever seen. There have been isolated fields that have been this good before, but for the country as a whole, we've never had anything this good at this stage," said O.L. (Mac) McMurtrey, manager of Hub Grain.

Don Huckabee, manager of West Friona Grain, said "It could be a bumper crop, depending on the weather from here on out."

Cotton ginners indicated that the past week or 10 days of hot weather have really improved prospects for cotton, but that a lot more of the same is needed for the crop to approach its full potential. "If we could have another month like the past week, this country would make more cotton than it has for several years," said Charles Waggoner, manager of Friona Farmers Co-op Gin. Other ginners polled expressed similar opinions.

But the maize appears to be "home free."

PAUSE AND REFLECT

Star Columnist Lewis Has Tracked Coronado

"They came from Spain," the new show that opens tonight in Palo Duro Canyon will no doubt offer thrilling entertainment for thousands of viewers.

The pageant, "Texas," is a hard act to follow; however it must be remembered that "Texas" has six years of success under its big belt while "Spain" is a newcomer to the Panhandle amphitheater.

The coincidence of Thursday being press day for the Star and opening day for "Spain" prompts the Prairie Prowler to offer a few comments on Coronado and his valiant band.

Actually the general's name was not Coronado--he was born Francisco Vasquez in the year 1510 at the town of Coronado in Salamanca, Spain. This province was part of the old kingdom of Leon which became part of modern day Spain due to the marriage of Ferdinand and Isabella in 1469.

Queen Isabella supposedly sold her jewels to finance the voyage of one Christopher Columbus: thereby establishing a link between the politics of that day and the history of our own southwest.

The fact that we refer to Don Senor Vasquez as Coronado does nothing to diminish his well deserved fame as a soldier, statesman and explorer.

We also sing the praises of a legendary character called "Pecos Bill" but we all realize that William Something took his name from the site of his early escapades.

Prior to coming to Texas I had for a long time been interested in Coronado's explorations.

Within a month of my arrival I met Editor Ellis and he supplied a map of the Panhandle upon which I planned to trace the route of this early adventurer.

Six years of study and travel have not dimmed my interest in the subject: rather every book, every site visited and every photograph taken adds fuel to the flame.

Anyone delving into the past must learn to respect one paramount rule:--research is a never ending challenge, a job never completed and therein lies the attraction. As in other areas of history Coronado's chroniclers do not agree at all points.

I took a simplistic approach--read all the material available at Friona, West Texas State University, and spent a few hours in the library of Congress at Washington, D.C.

The different routes and theories were traced on maps and at every opportunity a trip was made to the various locations.

The most valued work is Winship's translation of "The Journey of Coronado" written by a member of the army and published in 1892 as part 1 of a report to the Bureau of Ethnology.

A soldier-scribe named Castenada kept a clear set of notes and twenty years after the trip he put them all together in a long article to refute some outlandish and inaccurate stories that were being circulated concerning the venture.

His work is of utmost importance because the only other source of eye witness information would be the letters that the General wrote to the King of Spain and to Viceroy Mendoza.

As of this writing, many places have been visited and filmed.

A short digest of my findings may help you to appreciate the new presentation in the Canyon, so let's hit a few of the high spots along the path of Coronado.

Entering Southern Arizona the "army" as it was called in those days, headed north then east to a point about 40 miles west of present day Albuquerque, New Mexico and that's a good place for us to join the party.

Hundreds of feet above the plain the pueblo of Acoma--the Sky City--perches on the crest of the cliff. We saw it earlier this month of August '71 and realized full well why Coronado's men passed it by with no thought of conquest. In the year 1540 the only access was a set of toe and hand holes hacked into the face of a sheer cliff. Halfway up, the pattern changed and the confused invader was easy prey to the rock throwing defenders.

Thirteen miles north of Albuquerque near modern Bernalillo, the hungry Spaniards took over a pueblo and spent the winter of 1540-41.

The spring of 1541 found them at another and larger town near today's Pecos. From here they traveled south down the Pecos River to Puerto de Luna where they built a crude bridge and crossed the river on their way to the cow (buffalo) plains.

Traveling east they came into what is now Texas where, being misled by a traitorous Indian (the Turk) they journeyed southeast when they should have headed northeast, toward Kansas and the Golden City of Quivera!

They crossed the Arkansas River near Dodge City and were disappointed in finding only grass huts instead of houses and streets of gold.

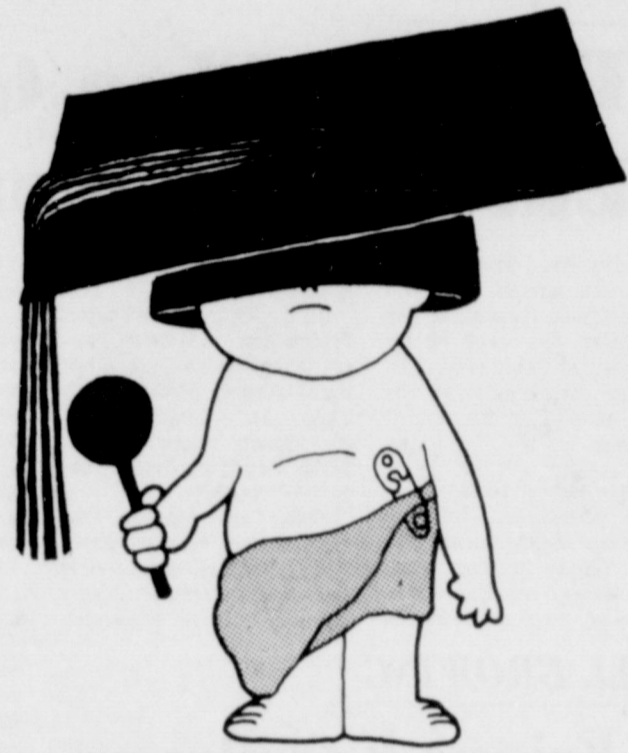

40 YEARS AGO--SEPTEMBER 4, 1931
The tonsil and adenoid clinic held under the auspices of the Parmer County health association this past week was a tremendous success. Dr. R.R. Wills operated on 23 children during the two-day clinic, originally scheduled for one day but extended by the good response.

35 YEARS AGO--SEPTEMBER 4, 1936
A WPA project has been accepted for straightening, broadening and deepening that part of the channel of Frío Draw which passes through or just south of the city limits. Surveyors have been busy on the project for several days and the actual work of moving dirt will begin in the near future.
A two-weeks singing school closed Saturday night August 31 at Rhea. An average of 40 persons attended the school.

30 YEARS AGO--SEPTEMBER 5, 1941
The 1941-42 term of the Friona Independent School opened in earnest Monday, when a large enrollment of both grade and high school students arrived at the buildings and got down to the work of the term. 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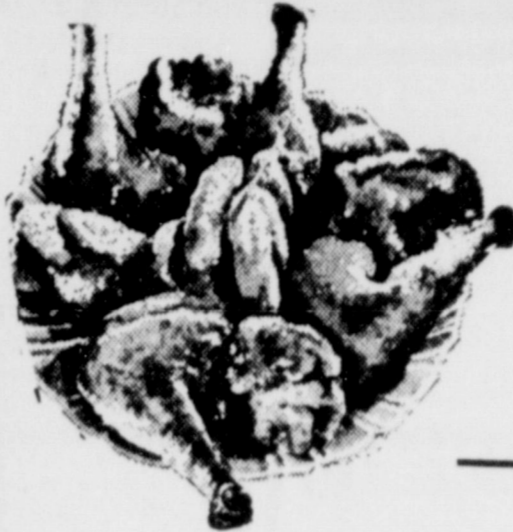

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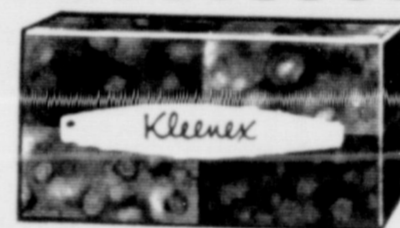

LEGAL NOTICE
All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be re-recorded with County Clerks after August 30, 1971. Producers will be given a six-month period (August 30, 1971 through February 29, 1972) in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are currently using, after which time any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "first-come" basis.

The law further states that all such brands and marks must be re-recorded every 10 years. Each County Clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operations indicate.

The owner shall have the right during this six-month period to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

It should be noted that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be so recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording of that brand.

There is no limit to the number of brands and/or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and re-recording of livestock brands are met.

this year's maize crop as much as they did last year. Observers said the rain helped considerably in curbing the pests. "They were pretty rough at the start, but I don't believe they did half as much damage this year," McMurtrey said.

If the maize price goes above \$2.00 this fall, Friona area farmers appear to be facing the envious position of bumper crops and "bumper" prices. That would be good for the local economy.

And the cotton farmers--they're just wanting a good old fashioned "Indian Summer," and it'll be great all around.

The County Clerk of each county shall have this act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of 30 days. The act shall be published on the effective date, August 30, 1971, and thereafter for 30 days.

It is the obligation of the County Clerk to assure that no more than one brand of a kind be recorded on the same location on the animal in each county. Therefore, no two people in a county may record the same brand in the same location. It is also the responsibility of the County Clerk to make certain that in recording any brand for a person, that the part of the animal on which the brand is to be placed be designated. Failure to do so is punishable by a fineable offense of not less than \$10 or more than \$50 (Article 1486 P.C.).

The law applies to all counties in the state of Texas and shall take precedence over any special statutes heretofore applying to individual counties pertaining to recording and re-recording of brands.

For all you Mothers with little ones or soon-to-be-Mothers here are some nursery decorating suggestions from Jan Slabaugh, Extension housing and home furnishing specialist.

Bright colors in the nursery are stimulating and exciting. But more important, vivid colors provide a happy environment for babies. Babies love intense hues, and learn very young to distinguish colors if the colors are clear and bright.

And, the nursery can also be planned for easy care. According to suggestions from noted interior designers, use olefin fiber rugs and the new nylon wallpapers. Washable olefin rugs are warmer in cold months than hard surface coverings; in addition to being washable nylon wallpapers are available in cheerful, bright patterns.

Furniture manufacturers are now producing cribs with highly improved safety features. Cribs with deep drop sides, closely set spindles, plastic-teething rails and finishes of non-poisonous materials are available.

Other features for convenience include drop side locks, fast releases for drop-sides, adjustable position springs and bearings to permit noiseless raising and lowering of sides.

Mrs. Slabaugh suggests using toy chests and wicker baskets in natural or color finishes for accessories. Or, install low bookshelves for collections of nursery books and storage of other items.

A mother can choose as many units for the nursery as required--cribs, hutches, armoires and dressing tables--in her choice of styles, ranging from Modern, Spanish, French Provincial, Country French or Colonial.

On the practical side, the specialist reminds that some children's furniture can be taken apart and re-arranged as the child's needs change.

Cats More Exposed To Rabies -Dr. Cash

Dr. Gary Cash, Friona veterinarian, was the guest speaker for the regular meeting of the Friona Lions Club on Thursday, August 26.

Dr. Cash discussed the various immunization programs that were recommended for animals, from pets to livestock.

Discussing the problem of rabies, and the recommended vaccination program for dogs, Dr. Cash said "Actually, cats are probably exposed to rabies to a greater degree than are dogs--yet most cities do not require cats to be vaccinated for rabies."

The veterinarian cited the fact that cats are "night prowlers" and may roam far and wide, and are more apt to encounter a rabid animal than are dogs, who for the most part are easier to keep in, and who do not roam as much as cats do.

Mention was made of the fact that there have been two cases of cats biting children in the Friona area this summer. They present an additional problem, in being harder to identify and catch for observation than a dog usually is.

Dr. Cash, who operates Friona Veterinary Clinic on East Highway 60 in Friona, recommended to members of the Lions Club that if they secure puppies, or raise them, to

vaccinate their pups at about six weeks of age, or at weaning time.

"Puppies receive an immunity from canine diseases from their mother's milk. However, as they enter the weaning process, this immunity starts downhill, and they need something more lasting," Dr. Cash said. He cited rabies and canine distemper as the most common killers of dogs, and recommended that pet owners keep their dogs on a yearly booster program.

The veterinarian also discussed the various vaccination programs for horses, cattle, sheep and hogs. He touched on the Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE) Epidemic, and hailed the emergency vaccination program as warding off the disease in this area.

WINLESS SEASON RECALLED

1961 Chiefs - - Short On Wins, Long On Character

Last week we had a feature article and pictures about the 1951 football team at Friona High School, one of the school's top teams, observing its 20th anniversary this fall.

Another team observing an anniversary is the 1961 team, and we decided that in many ways, the members of that team had to have a lot more courage than did the 1951 squad.

You see (many of you probably remember) the 1961 team happened to be right in the middle of the school's infamous 27-game losing streak, finishing 0-10 for the season.

Just as the 1951 team had everything going for itself, including being the highest scoring team and best defensive team in the school's record book, the 1961 team seemed to be jinxed from the first.

"We only had 13 players report for that first day's practice, and apparently that was an omen," recalled one of those "unlucky 13" this week.

Before the season was over, the team not only lost all of its games, but gave up the staggering total of 428 points, managing only 74 in the process.

"The high point of the season was the game at Dimmitt, when we surprised them with a 6-0 lead," says Floyd Reeve, who played quarterback on the snake-bit '61 eleven. "By the time we played Dimmitt, our reputation was established. The Dimmitt fans sure didn't expect to see us take the lead," he recalls.

However, unfortunately for Reeve and his mates, Dimmitt had in its backfield the great Junior Coffey, who has gone on to land a job in the professional football ranks, and the Bobcats stormed back for the win.

How did the team even hold workouts, with only 13 squad members? "It was a problem. One side of the line would scrimmage against the other side. It was mostly one-on-one contact," Reeve says. "It gave you a funny feeling to be out there on the field and look over at the bench, with only two or three substitutes on the bench. You knew there was no use coming out of the game, unless you were hurt pretty badly," the former Chieftain recalls.

The team's victory for the year was in not giving up, and going ahead with its schedule.

"There was some talk about cancelling the schedule, when we turned up with such a thin

squad and things went from bad to worse. However, we were afraid it would have affected our schedules in other sports, so we had to just grit our teeth and dig in," says the former Chieftain quarterback.

Reeve points out that there was one encouraging thing he recalls as a senior member of the team (there were only two other seniors--Gary Snead and Jimmy Braxton.)

"We not only had some 'green' sophomores and juniors playing, but a good example was Dwight Bates, who weighed 170 pounds and more. You really learned to appreciate fellows like that, coming back every week," he says. Like we said, it took a lot of courage--and we salute you members of that team, for not giving up, which would have been the easiest way out.

Singer Was Athletic Star While Student

Sam Allen, the music evangelist at the Revival Services at Friona's First Baptist Church this week, could have been a great professional athlete, if he had so desired.

Allen, a former resident of Hereford, set a world record in the 120-yard high hurdles as a high school track performer. In college, he was twice named to the All-American track team, and set records in the NCAA and AAU track books. He has been honored as a member of the Helms National Track and Field Hall of Fame. He had also been a star at baseball and basketball.

Allen organized and coached Wayland College's "Flying Queens," coaching that team for five years.

But Allen realized the tremendous impact of great gospel music as a compelling force in winning the lost to Christ, and has been a Baptist minister of music evangelism for the past 20 years.

He has served as soloist for the Southern Baptist Pastors' conference, and has directed music for many Baptist

State Conventions during the past 15 years. He will conduct the music for some 40 evangelistic crusades this calendar year.

Allen has recorded three sacred music albums, "A Man With A Song," "God's Love Sustains Me," and "Grandad's New Sacred Sound."

Allen's family includes his wife, Peggy, daughters Anita, Jeanne and Kathy, and son, Sam II.

The singer is featured along with Rev. Clayton Day in the revival meeting, which continues through Sunday at the local church.

This week the Chiefs scrimmage Springlake, and coaches are looking toward an even better evaluation of the team at that time.

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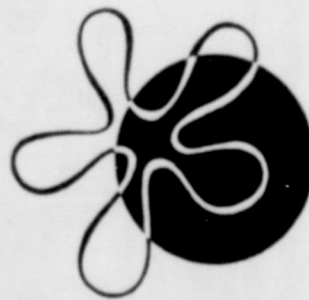

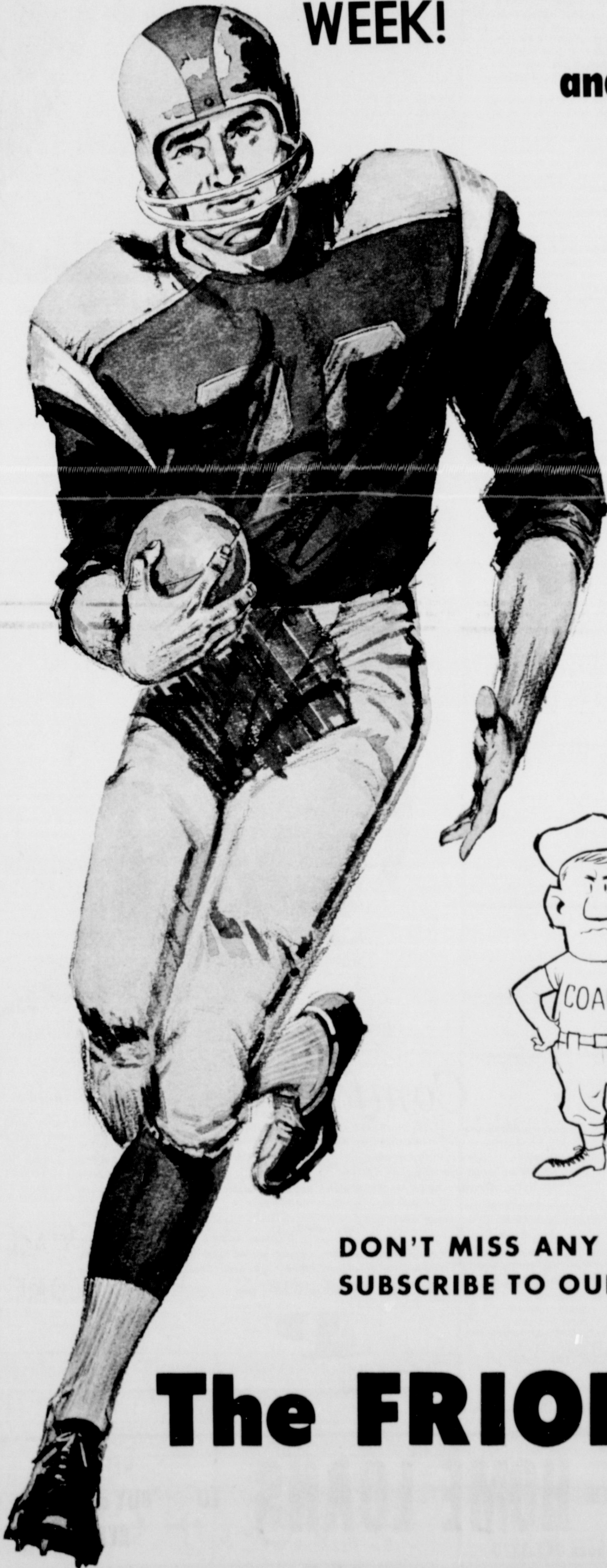

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What Does The Bible Say?



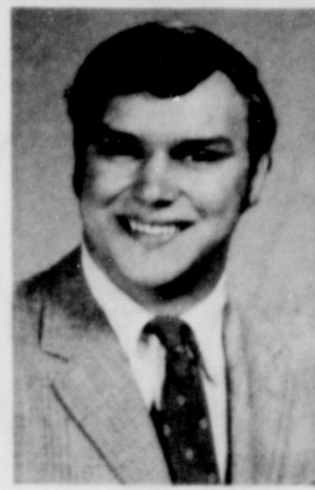
James S. Evans of Friona was among 1,206 students from 37 different states receiving degrees at summer commencement August 14 at North Texas State University.

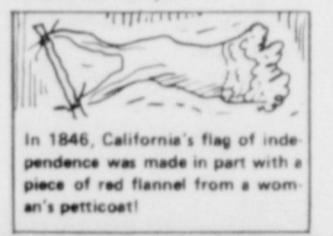

Okay, now this will be one of those rare situations when you will simply learn something because you took the time to read this. . .

I invite you to try it and see. . .

I'm going to use a prefix that has a meaning in itself but that meaning is only of worth when it is attached to something else. Let me explain.

My prefix is "TELE" and, in itself, means "at a distance" -- but when it really takes on meaning is when it is placed before another word with meaning. . . still with me?

Tie it on to the word "communications" and all of the derivatives of that word and you really do come up with some meaning.

"Telecommunications" is intended to mean a "shared awareness" between two or more organisms.

Now one can go in all directions here since there are so very many ways to share one's awareness: vocal-audio-visual-physical-(ESP)-mental. . . and there are all kinds of media of sharing one's awareness. -- I'll start off with "newspaper" and get "ole what's his name off my back" -- then there is radio-telephone-television-telegraph-telepathy-telescope-telephone (I wasn't the first to have that idea) but you do get the idea of my direction, don't you? Don't you?

Well, let me move in on something that has been mentioned which kinda grabs me -- I like the idea of a "shared awareness." Does that move you?

Just think of all that can come because of "shared awareness."

This is our beginning of scientific discovery -- or any discovery -- This helps our physical pains to be healed -- This directs us in decision making and choice -- This even kinda becomes a "fallout" of all kinds of info which help in our daily experience.

Are you with me? A "shared awareness" has been basic to your very existence, purpose and future plan. . . Shared Awareness. . . Had others not explored this process, and shared, I honestly doubt our being here. . . (profound.)

Take another step. . . Even think of the "awareness" of different things which you share with the world. . .

Boy, don't try to tell me we are cut off from the affairs of the world. . . nor can we be. . .

But back to my assumption, and maybe it is time for me to "share" it with you!

My assumption is that all that has come to us has come because of an awareness which was shared. . . sometimes lovingly. . . sometimes warlike. . . sometimes with concern. . . sometimes selfishly. . . but shared, just the same.

Now, it becomes my concern as to what we think is worth our sharing with someone else.

Let us try an example. . . If you had the responsibility of conversing with a person who had been out of the thought process of our world (a guy from Mars or one who had been frozen for 25,000 years -- they could come from many places) but like it is your responsibility to bring that person to an awareness of his existence. . . what would you tell him? What would be the first five things that you would try to relate to that person?

This would be your high priority of your "telecommunication" . . . your "shared awareness."

Would you try to help that person physically, mentally, spiritually -- or all three -- or none of these?

You can see that I am leading you to think about what you think is most important. I don't have an answer for you. I want you to find it for yourself. I should think it would help you to see how you classify for yourself, the importance of things. . .

Incidentally, I thought of another instance of telecommunication. . . or sharing of awareness between two different organisms. . . prayer.

Now I really do like that idea. . . To share our awareness with each other, that is something to think about. . . You might try that one out, too. . .
