

A few short years ago, when you heard about assassinations of national leaders, it was always in some remote place you probably couldn't locate on the globe.

"What uncivilized savages," we would think, taking solace in the fact that such things didn't happen in our homeland.

However, things have changed. Suddenly, in this most civilized (7) nation on the face of the earth, it is not safe for national political figures to appear in public.

Where did we go wrong? What has happened to our America?

Outlaw capital punishment, the moralists said. It is barbaric, and besides, it is not a deterrent to crime.

Be sure the criminal gets all of his rights. Never mind the law-abiding citizen who is going about his own business. It's the criminal who needs to be protected.

Fill our courts with so much red tape that criminals are seldom brought to trial. If he is tried, and somehow convicted, give him a commuted or probated sentence. Turn him out into society again.

Charge "police brutality" whenever law officials are caught in the act of enforcing the law.

Demonstrators deserve freedom of speech. If a riot results from a "peaceful" demonstration, that's too bad, but it's a chance we must take.

Let the communists and atheists cause us to outlaw the mention of God, and the use of prayer in our schools.

With all of this, it is no wonder that events such as Monday's shooting of Governor George Wallace took place.

We have almost completely departed from the principles on which our great nation was founded.

The return to "normal" may be long and painful. It is hard to undo mistakes compounded by years of non-discipline.

But change we must, if we hope to survive with our great nation. Otherwise, we may be destined to become a police state.

Citizens must demand reforms of their congressmen, before it is too late.

We sit back, and let our freedoms be taken away, without so much as a whimper.

Dr. Billy James Hargis, director of the Christian Crusade, warns that if the women's rights amendment to the U.S. Constitution is ratified and becomes law, "it will tear this country apart."

The women's lib movement is no laughing matter. If the amendment becomes law—and it is rapidly approaching that status—the American concept of the family will be wiped out, Dr. Hargis says.

Commenting on the prospect in a recent column, Wes Izzard of the Amarillo Daily News, points out that there is a lot more at stake than business careers and opportunities.

"No child need bear his father's name. Most grounds for divorce will be eliminated.

"No longer will there be laws excluding women from certain occupations. The amendment would even mean military service for women. They could be drafted, assigned to barracks along with male recruits, and even given combat duty," Dr. Hargis says.

There are 24 keywords in the amendment which the Tulsa crusader is talking about. They are:

"Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States by any state on account of sex."

These 24 words were approved by Congress with only one dissenting vote, and sent on their way to the various state capitals.

At last count, 17 states have ratified the amendment. Action by three-fourths of the state legislatures—38—is needed to make these words law.

Too late to head it off in Texas—we were the eighth state to ratify.

If Dr. Hargis is right, the women's lib amendment could be just another thing that could tear the country apart.

Can't happen here? What about shooting down of public officials. Outlawing prayer in public schools.

Don't tell us it can't happen.

Demo Delegates Go Uninstructed

Parmer County's Democratic Convention elected five delegates to the state convention June 13 in San Antonio, and passed a motion that the delegates go uninstructed as to which candidate to support for the presidential nominee.

Elected as delegates were Hugh Moseley, Richard Collard, Steve Messenger, Charles Flynn and Johnny Horton. Dolph Moten was chosen as an alternate. Wives of the delegates also were named as alternates, and will be eligible to vote in the event that all delegates cannot attend.

The convention passed three resolutions, which had been submitted from the Friona precinct convention, but without considerable discussion on one of the resolutions.

Two of the questions, one dealing with urging haste in implementing the Texas Water Plan, and another advocating that Texas discontinue participation in Daylight Savings Time, were passed unanimously.

The third resolution recommended the end of the electoral college system of electing the president, with the country's chief executive to be elected by popular vote.

A couple of delegates spoke

in opposition to the resolution, arguing that it could hurt the rural areas. However, after another delegate, Carl Oglesby of Lazbuddie argued in favor of the measure, pointing out that a democracy is based on majority rule, the resolution passed by a vote of 18-10.

The delegates also passed a motion to express thanks to former county chairman Nelson Welch, for 18 years of service to the county Democrats.

Hollis Horton, who had been elected to replace Welch in a write-in campaign the previous Saturday, said he would attempt to handle the office "as fair as Nelson Welch has done."

"I think I can represent all of the Democrats in Parmer County, and I want to help the Democratic party remain a driving force in the county," Horton said in his opening remarks.

Thirty-seven delegates, from a list of 60 nominated from their respective precinct conventions, attended the county convention, held at Friona State Bank's Community Room.

The county's five delegates to the state convention was based on one delegate for each 500 votes cast in the 1970 Democratic race for governor.

Poppies Are Tribute To Our War Dead

On Saturday, May 20 all of us will be asked to wear a red memorial poppy. As most of you certainly know, once each year Americans observe Poppy Day which is a voluntary tribute to our dead and disabled servicemen.

By accepting one of these poppies from a member of the American Legion Auxiliary or some other volunteer we aid the living victims of the past three wars while honoring our dead. The poppy grew in the battlefields of France and Belgium where American servicemen have fallen during two World Wars. In the years following the first World War the poppy came to be recognized as nature's tribute to the war dead, and it was soon adopted as the Legion and Auxiliary's official memorial flower.

The poppies you will wear on Poppy Day have an even greater significance than the flowers which bloomed on the battlefields of Europe. These memorial poppies you will be offered have been made in hospitals and work shops where the suffering of war still exists. The disabled veterans who make these flowers are able to gain a dual benefit from their work—the poppy program gives many men their only opportunity to support themselves and their families; and it offers them a productive pastime with which to combat long hours in the hospital wards.

Volunteers who offer the poppies to the public—unlike the disabled veterans—receive nothing tangible for their work. However, these workers gain satisfaction from their contribution to a program which honors the war dead while assisting the living. Money dropped into contribution boxes in exchange for poppies goes directly to the welfare activities of The American Legion and Auxiliary; all funds are used for the aid of disabled veterans, their families, and the families of deceased servicemen.

Understanding the character and purpose of Poppy Day, would any of us wish to ignore this appeal? I am sure all of us will consider it a privilege to wear a poppy again this year on Poppy Day.

In fact, it has to do with you and me and Wallace and Bremer and the whole bit. . . .

We must take a stronger hold upon the reins and regain control of every facet of our lives.

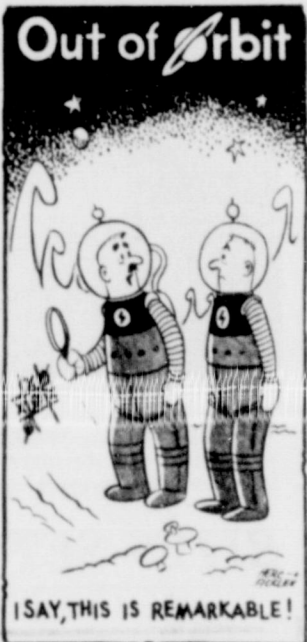
As things stand today George Washington would be ashamed of us!

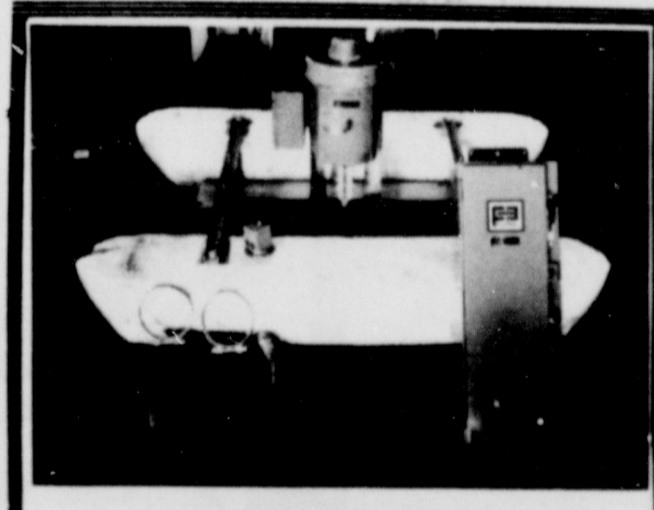

With school almost out and most of the college set home or on their way, we are already thinking about that long awaited summer trip, whether it is to Europe or just camping for the week-end or church or band camp or that trip with the Scouts or 4-H. No matter where we're going we like to be prepared for the occasion so here are some packing tips that might help.

Clothes unpacked from a suitcase needn't look like you slept in them.

There's a way to pack that minimizes wrinkles.

The traveler who's carefree, fresh and unrumpled has mastered packing comfortable clothes—both neatly and sensibly. Good packing begins with planning ahead. You determine all the clothes and accessories needed for the climates and activities your trip will include. Visualize every outfit from head to toe, inside to outside. Also itemize the cosmetics and drugs you usually rely on.

For a greater variety with a minimum of bulk, choose a basic color scheme and garments that serve more than one purpose. Pack clothes that you enjoy wearing and that can't "take it". Easy-care fabrics are ideal for travel. These include such materials as jerseys, no-wrinkle synthetics and blends and knits—garments that are washable as well as packable.

Prints that camouflage spots and wrinkles are also good traveling companions.

Whether using the "roll-up" or "fold-it-flat" method, pack tightly, but without crushing clothes. Too much room allows clothes to roll and shift, thus forming unnecessary wrinkles. Pad out needed folds with crumpled tissue paper or soft garments.

Use plastic bags for laundry, damp swimsuits, or anything you want to protect. Tissue paper and plastic bags are the

tools of good packing. Pack heavier items such as shoes and less used garments in the bottom of the suitcase. Lighter, frequently used items should be placed near the top.

Carry cosmetics in a separate case. A good method of arranging cosmetics is to pack go-togethers individually. For example, put hair setting items together and soaps and cleaning supplies in another area or package.

Plastic bottles and jars make ideal containers because of their light-weightness. Leave room at the top to allow for expansion of liquids; then seal with tape.

Do not forget the many small gadgets on the market that make life easier for the traveler. Consider such things as folding inflatable hangup miniature clotheslines and pins, sewing and repair kits, spot remover, shoe shine pads and plug-in hot cups. It's wise to make allowances for an unexpected separation of you and luggage by labeling both inside and outside with your name and address. An unusual decal or strip of colored tape on the outside of your luggage will cut time spent at baggage claim areas to a minimum. The chance of someone picking up your bag by mistake will also be reduced.

Planning ahead for your travel needs will give you that extra amount of confidence as you open your luggage for the first time. When miles from home, you'll find that you did bring that oh-so-important item.

Since I mentioned traveling I would like to congratulate some of our local Parmer County 4-H'ers who have earned the right to travel to the State 4-H Round-up. Round-up is the state wide demonstration contest to be held on the campus of Texas A&M University at College Station June 5 and 7. Those qualifying were Cheryl Gohike and Bill Roberts of the Oklahoma Lane Community and Deborah Harding of Farwell.

Texan Added To Staff

For expanded McNair breeding research, a well-prepared Texan has been added to its Texas staff. Bobby Ray McGehee has joined McNair Seed Company at its Plainview, Texas, operation. He will be engaged principally in grain sorghum breeding research.

McGehee holds an M.S. (1970) degree from Oklahoma State University in the field of Crop Science. He is completing requirements there for his Ph.D. At OSU he was research assistant prior to graduation. His undergraduate work was done at

Texas Tech where he majored in agronomy. He graduated in 1956 with a B.S. degree.

Before completion of his graduate school study, McGehee was a cotton and grain sorghum farmer (1959-65), following a four-year tour of duty as a pilot in the USAF. From 1965-67, he was manager of the West Texas Seed Company at Morton.

In commenting upon this addition to the McNair research staff at Plainview, Dr. Donald H. Van Horn, Vice President of McNair Seed Company, and director of its Plainview operation, said: "We could not have found a better prepared person to join our accelerated sorghum breeding program."

Bobby Ray McGehee is a native of Lampasas, Texas, is married and the father of two children. The family lives in Plainview, Texas.

A power generating system which could produce low-cost electricity while virtually eliminating sulfur oxide emissions was described recently by United Aircraft in a study for the National Air Pollution Control Administration. The new approach results from application of advanced aerospace technology to existing pollution and power shortage problems. On The Farm In Parmer County MACK HEALD County Agent

The screwworm, which some time was one of the most economically damaging pests to livestock and wildlife, still poses a threat to the southwest. As of May 4 there were over 1400 screwworm cases confirmed in Texas. Screwworm samples have been identified from as far north as Dickens and Borden counties.

At the present time the Screwworm Eradication Program is releasing sterile screwworm flies in a band of 500-600 per square mile 100 miles ahead of the last confirmed report. This band should help to slow the northward movement but much assistance is needed from area producers.

Several steps that producers can take to prevent a bad outbreak in West Texas include:

1. Inspect animals regularly for cuts, scratches and wounds. Pay special attention to the nasal region on newborn calves.
2. Manage livestock to reduce injuries. Avoid surgery or any treatment that may create a wound.
3. Collect larvae and egg masses for identification. Search deep in wounds for screwworms. Send samples to: Screwworm Eradication Program, P.O. Box 969, Mission, Texas 78522.

4. Treat all wounds with a wound dressing. Follow directions on the label. Reinspect wounds until healed and re-treat when necessary.
5. Spray or dip herds with approved pesticides. Follow directions on the label.
6. Know positively that purchased animals are screwworm free at point of origin.
7. Tell your neighbors about the screwworm threat. Encourage them to follow these precautions.
8. See your local county agricultural agent for screwworm mailing tubes and additional information.

Screwworm flies, have a long flight range and it is very important to determine where infestations are occurring. This can only be accomplished through the cooperation of all concerned. Therefore, producers

are urged to follow the points outlined to prevent the re-establishment of this damaging pest.

Hog cholera is still on the loose in Texas, and unless farmers and others use certain precautions, the situation could get much worse.

The most recent case of hog cholera has come up in Nueces County. That county was placed under a state quarantine on May 6. Moore County in the Panhandle was also quarantined recently when an infected herd was found. Five other counties in the state remain under state quarantine. They are all in South Texas and include Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Webb and Willacy.

Three counties recently released from quarantine were Fayette, Gonzales and Lavaca.

There is one major point regarding the hog cholera quarantine that relates particularly to those buying hogs. This is that any hogs bought in a quarantined area are confined to the buyer's premise for a period of 30 days. The animals cannot be resold or moved for that 30-day period unless they are shipped directly to slaughter.

The purpose of the quarantine is to limit the movement of hogs. Then, if sick animals are detected, animal health officials can be notified and the animals can be properly disposed of. This is the only way Texas will be able to move toward 'hog cholera free' status.

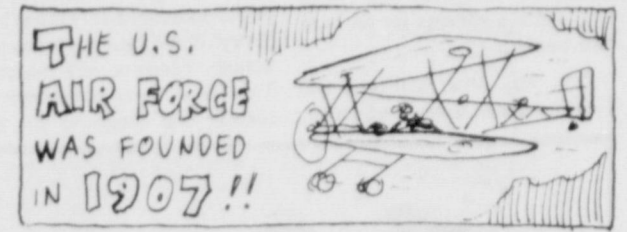

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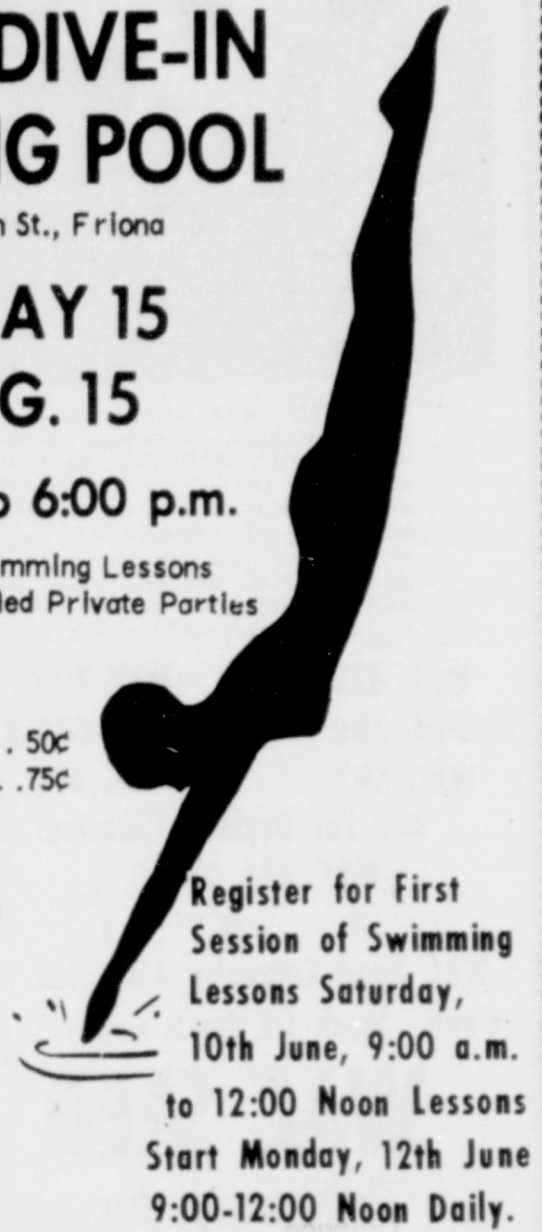
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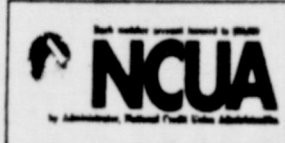
