## 2 MORE INDICTED IN ALLEGED SALTING OF EAST WICHITA WELL

LADEK ARRESTED LATE TUES DAY ON SWINDLING CHARGE

DRILLER OF TEST JAILED SEVERAL WEEKS AGO

Three Men Are Jointly Indicted Honaker and Zoladek Make Bond for \$2,500 Each

William Honaker, president of the East Wichita Oil company; Joe Zoladek, one time director and owner of well, who were jointly indicted by the grand jury on the charge of swindling lished a record by loading six tankers over \$50, if became known late Tues-

The indictment contains three this counts, the first of which alleges that the men conspired to secure unlawful acquisition of money by false and decitful pretenses. from various and divers persons, the names of whom are to the grand jurors unknown.

The second count charged that the men conspired to secure from Mrs. Emma Stinchcamp the sum of \$100 by deceitful pretenses, and the third count from the said Mrs. Stinchcamp.

The East Wichita well was located

on the Honaker farm three miles east of the city and attracted as much attention as any wildcat test in the county. The stock of the company was given a prominent showing on local stock markets and at one time when excitement ran high the stock sold as excitement ran high the stock sold as high as 300. This, however, was be-fore the last excitement. The last reported effort to get a well

was made during the month of January, 1921, at which time stock was purchased on the local market as high

had been found and that the well stood \$60 feet in oil which, when tested, showed it to be an exceptionally high grade of oil. Different dates were set when the well was to be drilled in, but on the last set date the driller, C. A. Williams, did not show up and it was reported that he had disappeared.

A month later Williams was arrested in Duncan, Oklahoma, and returned to this city. An examining trial was held where it was alleged on the witness stand that the well had been "saized."

The driller who was employed to drill in the well testified that there was no sand at the bottom of the well and that although he did not know how the oil that was in the hole got there, he was positive that it had not come in from the bottom. 



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
