The committee's investigation has revealed that the government has an annual rent bill of \$14,500,000 for buildings scattered over the whole nation. Rent usually amounts every year to 10 per cent of the value of the rented building. That would bring the total

cost of rented buildings to \$145,000,000 Big Yearly Saving.

Now the government can borrow all

the money it wants at rates of interest between 4½ and 5½ per cent. If the government borrows enough to buy these buildings outright, its yearly interest bill on the funds borwed for this purpose will be around

That's more than \$10,000,000 less than the amount now paid in rents.

In many cases the buildings new rented would be abandoned and new buildings constructed with the borrowed funds, putting many idle to

The joint committee on reorganization also will recommend that govern-ment customs offices at all ports of entry, save the larger ones, be con-solidated with revenue offices. The customs offices now are in actual use Against Subsidy.

#### CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS

Today is the anniversary of the discovery of the American continent by Christopher Columbus. Four hundred and twenty-nine years ago today the lookout on Columbus ship sighted the island of San Salvador.

Columbus believed that he had discovered a part of the continent of Asia to which he sought a short route by a westward course from Spain.

What he discovered was more than a continent; it was a turning point in civilization and government, for when he landed at what he called San Salvador he opened the door of a land that made government by the people pos

Like many another discoverer, pioneer and leader, Columbus little realized the importance of what he had done. He died without knowing that he had discovered a else was a new and shorter route to the fabled wealth of the Indies.

Columbus named the spot on which he landed San Salvador because it saved him from disaster. He had been at sea more than four months when the discovery Two days before the discovery they had protested to Codiscovered within three days he would turn back for and perhaps the course of history might have been changed.

Columbus was received with great honor on his re turn to Spain. He subsequently made two more trips and made new discoveries. He attempted a fourth but after a disastrous experience was forced to turn back. In the meantime Queen Isabella, who had been his patron, died. King Ferdinand failed to fulfill her promises to Columbus and he died in humiliation and disappointment.

We do well today to honor Columbus. He is one of the great figures of history. His epochal discovery was another instance of the imminence of success when hope was almost abandoned. His belief that he had discovered a part of the continent of Asia showed that he, like others before and after him, failed to realize how great a thing he had done and his death in humiliation and disappointment was another showing that history's verdict is "ot always pronounced by the public of the day.







That is the situation we face today. It presents a problem in which we are involved in common with all other nations, and whether we will or no, we must consider our relations to other

nations as an essential feature of our own national life.

While before the war we were a debtor nation to the amount of \$5,000,000, we are today the world's creditor to the sume of more than \$15,000,000,000, and our entire relationships to the world's business and the world's liferests generally are completely altherests generally are completely altered—a change we are tardily recognizing and the full significance of which, apparently, we have not yet begun to comprehend.

In brief, the betterment of business in this country is not merely a do-mestic problem, it is a world-wide problem.

we are paying the bills of man's folly, ambition, greed, selfishness and hatred, nation against nation, class against class, interest against interest, and as long as these factors in human nature are dominant, all of the relations of men are disturbed by them and economic recovery is halted.

When will this recovery be manifested? No man can foretell. It could be stated that fundamental, factors in the situation are improving.

There are concrete evidences of gradual improvement abroad, and there is.

ual improvement abroad, and there is, reason to believe that we have passed through the worst of our deflation pe-riod in the United States and will soon experience a slow but material betterment.

This would undoubtedly be imme-diately accelerated by the funding of the railroads' indebtedness to the govthe railroads' indebtedness to the government on account of capital expenditures made by the government while the roads were under its control. That settlement, which would provide half a billien dollars for the immediate use of the railroads should result in a stronger financial position for the carriers and hasten the time when they can make additional expenditures, for carriers and hasten the time when they can make additional expenditures for maintenance and equipment.

The stimulus to the steel and other industries resulting from any large scale expenditures by the railroads would assist more than any other single factor at this particular time, perhaps, in overcoming the present business duliness and in providing employment for thousands of men.




