





### JUDGE SCURRY IS NEW COMMANDER SONS OF VETERANS

UNANIMOUSLY ELECTED LATE WEDNESDAY AT THE REUNION.

### S. Y. FERGUSON IS ON THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

Van Zandt Is Re-Elected Commander Of Confederate Veterans.

CHATTANOOGA, TENN., Oct. 27.—The 21st annual reunion of the United Confederate Veterans' association came to a close here today with a number of social events. A business session was scheduled for the Confederate Memorial association but that body wound up its business last night. Rain this morning caused the veterans' parade to be called off. For this afternoon a reception was announced. The final event of the reunion will be the grand ball to Sons of Confederate Veterans and official ladies, given by the Jonathan W. Beechman camp, S. C. V.

CHATTANOOGA, TENN., Oct. 27.—Following election of General K. M. Van Zandt of Fort Worth, Texas, and the selection of Richmond, Va., as the next reunion city, the 1921 sessions of the United Confederate Veterans virtually came to an end last night. While the annual parade, which is the big central event in these reunions, according to the views of most of the veterans, is on today's program, there will be no further business transacted. About mid-afternoon Wednesday, after having presided during the business session of about two hours, Commander Van Zandt delivered a brief valedictory to the veterans assembled before him, announced his final determination not to let his name go before the convention as a candidate for another term as commander in chief and left the hall to attend a reception given in his honor.

One of the outstanding incidents of the reunion yesterday was the receipt of an invitation to send representatives to the memorial exercises that will take place next year at Point Pleasant, Ohio, in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the birth of General U. S. Grant. The invitation was read by Adjutant General Booth, was from Hugh L. Nicholas, chairman of the Grant memorial centenary association. The convention immediately voted authority to General Van Zandt as commander in chief to comply with the invitation. C. Irvine Walker, chairman of the Hatterford committee, submitted his annual report at the close of which he called on the convention to adopt a resolution requesting national publishers of school books to use more articles written by southern authors. A resolution covering the recommendation was adopted.

Major General John N. Johnson, Chattanooga, was elected commander of the eastern department and Major J. E. Wood, Marianna, Ark., commander of the western department.

The following major generals were named as state commanders: Alabama: Frank S. White, Birmingham. Kentucky: Grant Price, Bowling Green. Mississippi: W. N. White, West Point. Tennessee: D. S. Scales, Nashville. Oklahoma: Samuel T. Lane, Tulsa. Louisiana: James A. Dinkins, New Orleans. Texas: M. A. Bridges, Bonham. Missouri: Archibald A. Parson, Kansas City. Gen. E. W. Rucker of Birmingham was elected honorary commander-in-chief and General E. E. Byles of Columbus, Miss., honorary aide de camp.

Judge Edgar Scurry of Wichita Falls, Texas, was unanimously elected commander-in-chief of the Sons of Confederate Veterans at the final business sessions of the organization here this afternoon. Judge Scurry succeeds Nathan B. Forrest, of Atlanta, secretary of Lamar University.

W. C. Calloway, of Wilmington, N. C., was named commander of the Army of Northern Virginia, attorney General J. F. Tatom had declined to stand for re-election. Other officers are D. S. Etheridge of Chattanooga, commander of the department of the army of Tennessee; J. N. Davenport of Oklahoma, commander of the trans-Mississippi department; Arthur H. Jennings of Lynchburg, Va., historian.

The following were named members of the executive council: J. Roy Price of Washington, D. C.; John Ashley Jones, Atlanta, S. Y. Ferguson, of Wichita Falls.

### POSTMASTER GENERAL TAKES PERSONAL CHARGE OF HUNT FOR ROBBERS

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—Postmaster General Hays arrived here today to take personal charge of the investigation of last Monday's registered mail robbery by automobile bandits who held up a mail truck and escaped with five pouches filled with bonds, securities and currency.

News that the postmaster general was coming to take a hand in the case led to reports that the losses were even higher than the \$1,600,000 figure intimated by postoffice authorities. Statements issued by banks and brokerage houses showed a total known loss of \$22,925.

This was exclusive of a large shipment of currency reported to have been included in one of the pouches.

MARKED REDUCTION IN PRODUCTION OF OIL IN SEPTEMBER

MORE THAN THREE MILLION DECREASE COMPARED WITH AUGUST.

NEARLY A MILLION OFF IN THE TEXAS FIELDS

Decrease of 164 Producing Wells Completed During the Month of September.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—Marked reduction in the production of crude oil for September is shown in the report issued today by the geological survey. Compared with August the decrease was more than 3,000,000 barrels and the daily average was less than for any month since May, 1920. The greatest loss shown was in California, where production dropped from 10,000,000 to 7,800,000 barrels.

Combined production for the two fields in Texas was 7,900,000 barrels in September against 8,138,000 barrels in August.

The loss in the coastal fields was less than 100,000 barrels, the figures being 2,872,000 for August against 2,796,000 barrels in September.

The report shows a decrease of 164 producing wells completed during the month, there having been but 78 contrasted with 2,335 in September, 1920.

Imports amounting to 9,138,456 barrels, showed an increase of 5,500,000 barrels over August, while exports 880,573 barrels, were normal.

The estimated average daily consumption was 1,285,667 barrels.

WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE IN SESSION AT DALLAS

DALLAS, TEXAS, Oct. 27.—The west Texas conference of the Methodist Episcopal church opened its annual session here today, to extend through next Sunday, October 31.

The west Texas conference extends from Beville, Texas, to Dalson and from Wharton to El Paso. Appointments for another year of ministers for the conference will be made during the meeting. The conference is composed of 103 appointments, divided into six districts with superintendents as follows: First district, the Rev. D. C. Lacy, Austin; second, the Rev. J. W. Warren, Dallas; third, the Rev. A. D. Jacques, San Angelo; fourth, the Rev. E. H. Wyatt, San Antonio; fifth, the Rev. J. G. Brassard, Victoria; and sixth, the Rev. K. W. McMillan, Waco.

Reports of each superintendent as to the condition of his district and of each pastor as to the spiritual, financial and material condition of his charge will be heard at the meeting. Bishop Robert E. Jones, New Orleans, La., is the president.

The undergraduates of the conference were examined yesterday by the board appointed by the bishop and the district superintendents.

SECURE BLOODHOUNDS TO AID IN SEARCH FOR MURDERER OF PRIEST

LEAD, S. D., Oct. 27.—Bloodhounds, sent here from Mitchell S. D., are expected here today in an effort to furnish a clue to the man whose call on Rev. A. B. Belknap here early yesterday was followed by the shooting of the priest on a highway just outside the city.

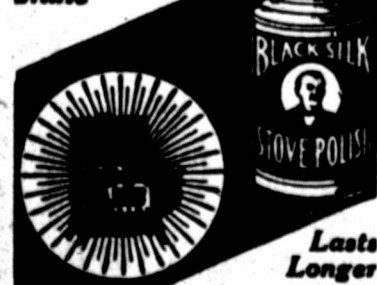
Bishop J. J. Wyatt, at whose residence Father Belknap made his home, expressed the belief that the crime was the work of a mentally unbalanced person. Rewards totaling \$1,500 have been offered for the arrest of the slayer.

The circumstances of the tragedy bear a striking resemblance to the recent murder in California of Rev. Patrick E. Heslin. Like the California case Father Belknap was called from his home before daylight ostensibly to administer the sacrament to a dying man.

RAILROAD CONTRACTOR SLUGGED AND ROBBED BY MEN HE HAD EMPLOYED

TERRELL, TEXAS, Oct. 27.—Albert S. Coker, 42, railroad contractor, was slugged and robbed of \$50 last night by two men he had employed, he told police today. After being rendered partially unconscious, Coker said his assailants threw him on the railroad track in front of an approaching train, but that he managed to get far enough from the track to save his life. The passing train crushed his left hand.

STILL NO TRACE OF WICHITAN MISSING SINCE LAST JULY

Rewards aggregating \$5,000 have been offered in connection with the disappearance and supposed murder of John J. Knight, Wichita Falls oil operator, who has been missing since July 8, 1921 on which date he left Buckeye N. M. for Parker, in the same state.

His car was found stalled in the sand near the Mississippi river, but no trace of Knight nor any evidence of his fate, has been found, despite careful and exhaustive search by officers and detectives. A reward of \$2,500 has been offered for the recovery of his body, and a similar amount has been offered for the arrest and conviction of his slayer or slayers, by James A. McNab of Dallas, administrator of the estate valued at \$130,000 to \$200,000. Nothing has been done toward disposing of the estate until the body is found.

TEXAS POPULATION GAINS AROUND 35,000 ANNUALLY

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Oct. 27.—That the population of Texas is increasing annually about 35,000 is the opinion of Dr. Manton M. Carrick, state health officer. He arrived at his conclusion from figures compiled recently in his department as to the birth and death rate of the state.

Since the first of the year the state health department has been carrying on a campaign to induce cities and counties to report their births and deaths to the department in order that an accurate record might be kept of the increase in the population of the state. Until this campaign the births and deaths were reported but in a very lax manner, Carrick said. They could not be depended upon for accuracy, he said.

There is an unusual comparison in the births for 1920 and thus far in 1921. At the rate thus far this year, the births for 1921 will be around 75,000, Dr. Carrick said. Thus the state's population is increasing as shown by comparing the death record with the birth record. In 1920 there were 29,852 deaths reported to the department while for this year 31,155 deaths have been reported. At this rate, the deaths for the year will be near 40,000, Dr. Carrick estimated.

The figures were compiled for information requested of the department by Congressman Wurzbach of an Antonio, Texas.

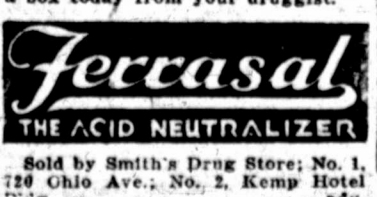

STATE OF SIEGE IS DECLARED IN SOFIA

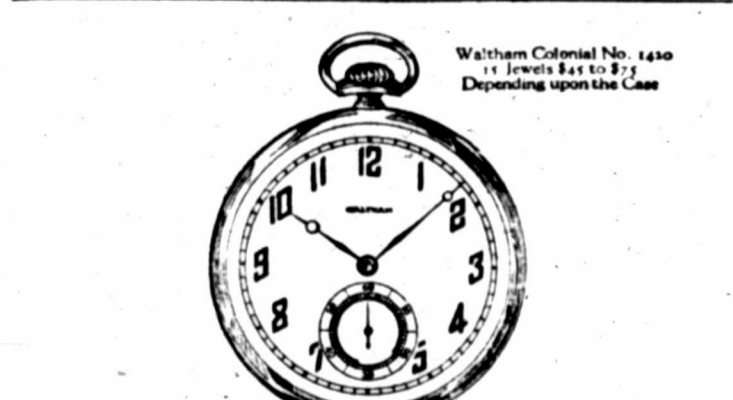

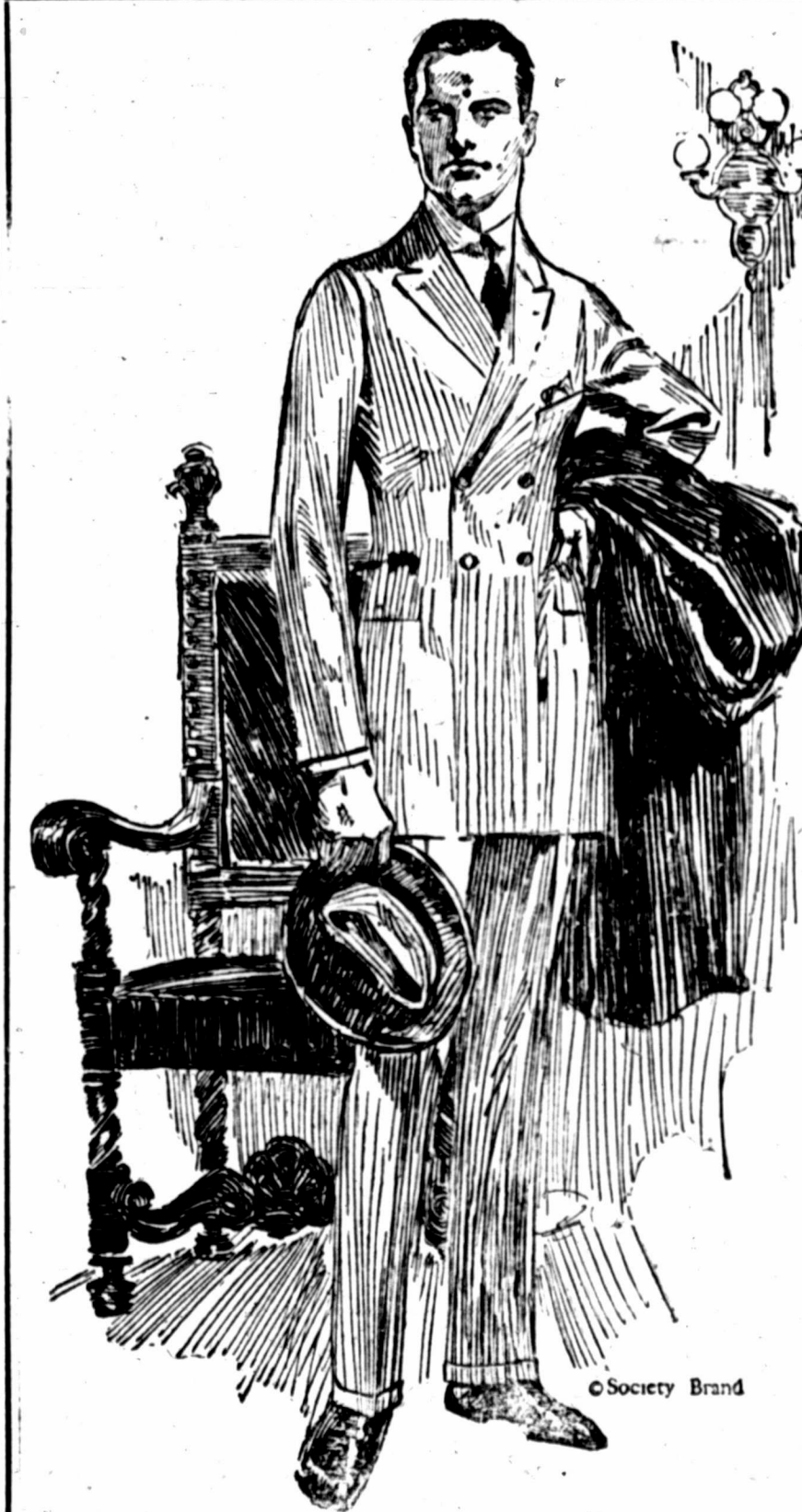

THE AMERICAN ATTITUDE TOWARD THE COMING CONFERENCE.

"The American people hate war far less than they love peace," says the World's Work for November. "Hate is hardly the word, for hate implies fear of the thing hated. It is more correct to say that we detest war. It offends our practical sense. There are so many less violent ways of getting results. We have often reluctantly realized that nothing but a club would make the stupid 'other fellow' see the light of reason and then have forthrightly used a club, but always with an exasperated feeling that he ought to have more sense."

"We detest war because, except as a weapon to defend peace, it is the weapon of bullies. And American literature, which accurately reflects American feeling, is full of stories whose chief point is the discomfiture of a bully by some quiet fellow who put up with his noise and arrogance for a while and then suddenly landed the decisive blow that restored peace and comfort to the scene. Our whole 'Wild West' literature, so enormously popular, is based on this feeling. Nine out of ten of these stories end with the death of the 'bad man' or the 'gun fighter' at the hands of some determined citizen who is bound to have peace if he has to kill somebody to get it."

"It is significant, too, of American psychology, that whereas the citizen of this country who carries a weapon on his person to his place of business is considered silly, the man who does not keep one in his home is pretty generally considered careless. This attitude about expresses the American psychology regarding armament. The nation that tries to do business with the help of fire-arms has badly mistaken ideas about business and also about the character of its neighbors. But the nation that has a proper affection for its home is welcome to keep as much of an arsenal as it needs to defend it. And if America feels that it needs the biggest gun in the world for that purpose, it will have no hesitation about buying it and keeping it ready—and using it. The question is, do we need the biggest gun?"

"The first suggestion that America have the biggest navy in the world came from President Wilson in 1916. It was a logical threat against Great Britain to make her accept his freedom of the seas doctrine. That doctrine has since disappeared, but the plea for the greatest navy remains. It is, of course, our right to build a navy as large as we can afford, which is larger than any other nation can afford. Whether we need it to defend ourselves is questionable. Our 1916 program set the pace for naval rivalry after the war. It is fitting, therefore, that we should call the conference to limit naval competition. As we are the least vulnerable from a naval point of view, and by far the most self contained and powerful of the three naval powers, we ought to be able to excel them in trustfulness and generosity at the coming conference."

OVERRIDING A TEXAS LAW.

So far from reducing income taxes this year the new revenue bill is likely to increase the tax on Texans who are married. An amendment to the revenue bill seeks to nullify a Texas law, making the property of man and wife in this state community property and which now permits a division of the property in rendering income tax returns. The amendment would override the law of the state and would make either the husband or the wife make the return for the income of both.

Discussing the proposed amendment the Houston Post says: "Among the objections to the proposed amendment to the new revenue bill changing the method of taxing community income of husband and wife, there are two that stand out prominently. One of these is the disregard the amendment shows for the laws of those states that have community property legislation, and the other is the manifest injustice to the taxpayers themselves."

"Under the plan that has been in vogue by authority of a ruling obtained by Texas, the husband and wife have been permitted to divide their income for taxation purposes. This is manifestly fair, since both husband and wife have an interest in each income. For instance, under this plan, if the husband has an income of \$5000 and the wife \$3000, they may add them together and divide them by two, each paying on only \$4000."

"Under the proposed plan, it would be necessary for either husband or wife, which ever one was represented as collecting the income, to render the income in a lump sum of \$7000 and pay the surtax. In the case cited above, it is apparent that both husband and wife would have to pay only 4 per cent on \$3500 each, since each income was below \$4000. On an income above \$4000 the rate would be 5 per cent up to a certain point, where it would be still further increased."

"In case a husband and wife together had an income of \$20,000, by dividing it and each paying on \$10,000 a very material saving could be made, and it would be only just and right, since each has a half interest in the income."

"Dispatches from Washington indicate that the senators from the states having community property laws are making a strong effort to defeat the proposed amendment, and to prevent large sums in surtaxes from being collected from the people. These senators should have the vigorous support of the people back home. By organizing a protest of sufficient volume, the people will be able to prevent this injustice to them, and the invasion of the rights of the states from being consummated. No time should be lost in voicing public opposition to the measure."

CONGRESSMAN BLANTON'S IMPROPRIETY.

Copies of the Congressional Record containing the extension of the remarks of Hon. Thomas L. Blanton for which a resolution has been introduced for his expulsion from congress have been received in Wichita Falls.

These remarks do contain matter of shocking obscenity and profanity but it ought to be understood that they are not the words of Mr. Blanton himself but are contained in a copy of a letter from an employe of the government printing house to the public printer, and are claimed to be epithets directed to this employe, who is a printer without union affiliations by an employe who is of was a member of the typographical union.

Mr. Blanton is making a fight to prevent what he conceives to be union domination of the government printing office. Other employes have the privilege of contracting with the union or not as they see fit, but, of course, the government printing office must remain open to union and non-union men alike. If conditions are as Mr. Blanton describes somebody ought to make a protest and Mr. Blanton is right in making it.

He has certainly overstepped the bounds of propriety in putting into the Congressional Record matter of the obscene nature contained in the letter referred to, but just as certainly he has committed no offense that would warrant his expulsion from congress.

HOW ABOUT THE PUBLIC? (Denison Herald.)

Both the railroad executives and the unions are too prone to believe that the labor board is obligated to settle railroad controversies to the satisfaction of the workers and the executives. Both are mistaken. The board is obligated to settle the differences—or rather point out the settlement—in the interest of the roads, the workers and the public. The general public is not particularly interested in the rules and conditions governing the working man, so long as they are humanitarian; nor is it interested in an executive's relation to the men, so long as it is just, but the public does want service at the lowest possible rate compatible with the interests of all concerned. The public does not want a strike at this time and it is opposing it not because it thinks the demands of the workers are unjust or the claims of the roads unfounded. Strikes, walkouts and lockouts are economic malstroms. It is easy to see why workers would fight for conditions they had secured only after long years of effort, and why they should oppose wage reductions when statistics show that living costs have shown but a small drop. The public knows that the railroads, in many cases, have been mismanaged, that they have too much watered stock and too many high-priced, inefficient executives. On the other hand, the public realizes that the roads' contention that rates cannot come down until wages drop is sane. The public knows that the executive's objection to many of the working conditions, on the strength that they cut down efficiency, is sound, in both instances it is a simple question of two factions battling for supremacy, and the public paying the costs of the battle. Neither is fair to the other and as the result of their unreasoned "Jones pays the freight."

COMMON SENSE WAYS TO KEEP WELL

LIME NEED FOR TEETH

By DR. R. H. BISHOP

The prevailing theory in regard to decay of the teeth is that it is brought about by the fermentation of acids in the mouth, produced by the fermentation of sugars and starches. The lactic acid formed is supposed to attack the enamel, the tooth dissolving the lime, the chief constituent of the enamel.

But the theory now most supported and most probable is a surprising one. Decay, according to this theory, is brought about by systematic changes in the blood.

Some bodies are more able to resist disease, than others while variations in weather and conditions bring variations in the resistance of almost all bodies. This variation of resistance is believed to be due to changes in the state of the blood and that high resistant blood contains certain special substances called "soxins."

Normal saliva has a highly protective influence on the teeth due to the presence of these "soxins" or lime content in the saliva. Thus, it is a deficiency of lime in the diet of the average American that is a widespread factor in the universal decay of teeth.

The average bill-of-fare consisting of fine flour, bread, potatoes, meat,

coffee, butter, sugar, breakfast foods, fruits, etc., contains less than one-quarter of the amount of lime necessary to maintain calcium balance.

Secondly, a dietary rich in calcium, is required so as to make sure of a high calcium content of the saliva. Such a diet includes an abundance of green and fresh vegetables. Whole wheat cereals should be substituted for such foodstuffs as fine flour, hominy, cornmeal, polished rice and various bakery products. Milk should be freely used, especially by growing children.

Third, the teeth should be brushed not only on arising in the morning and before retiring at night, but also after each meal.

Fourth, laxative foodstuffs should be included in the dietary in order to keep from constipation. Necessary agar-agar and paraffin oil may be used in some form.

"Audacity and Faith"

The phrase "audacity and faith" caught my eye and I rather liked it. I wondered if most readers who saw it where I saw it would think it a misplaced coordination. Have faith and audacity, sayings in common, is not faith passive, submissive, and something whose quality is the reverse of audacity?

Mr. Bennett was speaking of a treatise on religion. It is in Arnold Bennett's book entitled "Your America."

We criticize Englishmen for going back to tell Englishmen what sort of country America is; but this book, based on a tour of that kind, was written for Americans.

Mr. Bennett was speaking of parks and boulevards. He did not like Chicago streets, and I do not blame him. He did not think Chicago at all real, and I think he is right.

He said Chicago had no proper railway point, and she needs it. He is right about that; and the congestion of Chicago's loop is an abomination and a peril.

I who live there may be permitted to say that which Mr. Bennett did not say. But he said Chicago's boulevard system "discloses a tremendous audacity and faith."

Every American city represents in its best achievements a combination of audacity and faith.

The faith that removes mountains is visible in America's tunnels and bridges, her railways and commerce. Business depression is a lack of confidence, that is to say, a lack of faith. Business success is invariably a triumph of faith.

Mr. Bennett is right not only of Chicago but of every American city. What is there disclosed is "a tremendous audacity and faith."

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### INQUIRY BRINGS STATE INSTITUTION BEFORE THE PUBLIC

LITTLE GENERALLY KNOWN OF REFORMATORY AT GATESVILLE

SCHOOL NOT OPERATED SIMILAR TO PRISON

Has Same System of Instruction as Have the Public Schools of State

GATESVILLE, TEXAS, Oct. 27.—The inquiry by the board of control into the charges of brutality and cruelty to the inmates of the State Juvenile Training school in Gatesville brought the institution before the public of Texas. Until that time it had been known generally as the "State reformatory."

Unlike the popular opinion that the institution is a prison, and operated similar to the prison system of Texas, the school is under the direction of a superintendent appointed by the board of control, which is the governing body of the school.

The institution has the same school system as the public school of Texas, having the same curriculum as provided by the state board of education and under the supervision of the state superintendent of education. The teachers must have the same qualifications as the teachers in the public schools of the state.

The school was established in 1917. It was for the purpose of taking care of the criminals of the state too young to be sent to the penitentiary. It was known as the reformatory or the "House of Correction," as is painted above the door of a safe that has been in the bookkeeper's office since the establishment.

be in the eleventh grade and as a matter of economy he is sent to the Gatesville high school. Each day he goes alone to school returning to the institution at night. Incidentally his report card was brought in while the board of control was present and it was noted that his department grade was 100 per cent. He was listed as an incorrigible when sent to the training school.

The purpose of the school is set out in a report to the governor. The report reads that "the primary end to be sought by the board is to reform, educate and train the children committed to the institution into industrious and useful, law-abiding citizens; strengthen their self control and place them in a moral environment that will build their character and inculcate correct ideas of civic virtue and responsibility."

Senator Cowell chairman of the board of control, expressed it as follows: "This is the end. There is no alternative. The boys sent here have to be controlled. You cannot tell them you will place them in jail or send them to prison. When a boy refuses to work, drill or study, something must be done. This is the last resort. The inmates are boys that everybody else has failed to control and it is up to the state and this institution to control them. They must be controlled."

The school is located about three miles from Gatesville in the most scenic part of Texas' most beautiful scenery. In a fertile valley of Correll county the surrounding hills add a bit picturesque beauty to the school that tends to offset the idea of a prison.

On approaching the institution the drab idea of a prison or reformatory receives a severe jolt. Instead one thinks of a university or college. The landscaping plans carried out under the direction of the present superintendent border on the expert. The inmates do the work under Mr. King's direction. The buildings are scrupulously clean and dirt is unknown.

The institution controls about 2,500 acres of land adjoining the school, about half of which is owned by the state and is in cultivation. The negro inmates do the farm work, there being about 250 in present. They alternate in the work, going to school half the

working day and working the other half. The white boys do the other work of the school, running the laundry, the blacksmith shop, doing the tailoring and plumbing heating and other similar work. The inmates range from mere children of 7 and 8 years old and younger to youths of 20 years. The younger boys are separated from the older ones as are the negro inmates from the white. They never mingle either in classes or play.

The military discipline has received nothing but praise from the employees and teachers of the school. The nurse and physician testified at the hearing that since its inauguration there has been decidedly less sickness.

The board of control admitted that the military training and the work of Superintendent King had been "no less than wonderful," but their announced object in the inquiry was to ascertain if such improvement was gained through the alleged brutalities and cruelties to the inmates. Their conclusion will be final in the matter.

### IMMIGRATION FROM MEXICO NOT LIMITED

EL PASO, TEXAS, Oct. 27.—Immigration quotas will not apply to aliens who have resided in Mexico for a year or more according to a ruling received at the American consulate in Juarez. Under the ruling, any alien may enter the United States, it is believed by the officials, if he lived in Mexico for one year. There is no limit, it was announced, on immigration from that country.

### LEGION CELEBRATES THIRD ANNIVERSARY ON ARMISTICE DAY

INTEREST IN PROPER OBSERVANCE OF HOLIDAY IS WIDESPREAD

NATIONAL COMMANDER ISSUES A STATEMENT

Large Public Meetings Are Being Arranged in Many Communities

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., Oct. 27.—Posts of the American Legion throughout the United States are arranging for celebrating the third anniversary of Armistice day. The national headquarters of the legion here has received information from the posts and from units of the Women's Auxiliary which indicates that interest in the proper observance of this new American holiday is widespread. Large public meetings are being arranged in many communities and more than 1,000 legion posts will stage symbolic pageants. Plans have also been completed for large meetings in New York, San Francisco and Chicago at which the au-

dience, by means of amplifiers used in connection with long distance telephone wires, will hear the addresses made at the burial services in Washington for an unknown soldier.

John G. Emery, national commander of the legion today issued the following statement to legionnaires regarding Armistice day celebrations: "At 11 o'clock on the morning of Nov. 11, 1918, an entire world, weary and worn, bent under the disaster of the world's war, knelt in thanks to God. The guns ceased booming. The roar of their firing

no longer smashed around the world in terrible thunder. A new note was in the air, high, clear and strong, a symphony of joy. A new hope was in every heart, a hope and a prayer that the fighting of nation against nation, of people against people had ended for all time.

"Three years have passed. We are about to celebrate the third anniversary of that occasion when, for the last time, the runner dashed across the field of death and carried to the farthest outpost the order 'cease firing.' We want to go back in spirit and thought to

that grand moment. We want to recall, in full, the purpose common to every one at that moment to do each his or her share to make it possible ever again, such a disaster. Let us do this in celebration that will include every American citizen.

"We want to recall the thrill that came to each of us, whether at the front or at home, in the knowledge that we had done our duty. We want especially to turn aside from the routine of daily life and to remember the sacrifices of those whose pride is that they gave their dearest and best, and of those

among us, torn and crippled, who gave of themselves. These are our heroes—our living monuments to American ideals, to American principles, to American citizenship."

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### COURT OF APPEALS AFFIRMS CASE OF H. T. (DOC) SNOW

CONVICTED ON CHARGE OF MURDER WITH 20-YEAR SENTENCE.

JURY RETURNED VERDICT OF GUILTY NOVEMBER 23

Case Was Taken to Higher Court On Over Half Hundred Issues.

H. T. (Doc) Snow lost practically all hope of securing a new trial in his murder case Thursday morning when the announcement was received locally that the court of criminal appeals at Austin, Texas, had affirmed the case in which he was convicted and sentenced to 20 years confinement in the state penitentiary.

Following a lengthy trial, a jury in the 19th district court on November 23, 1920, returned a verdict of guilty and assessed his punishment. The motion for new trial was argued before Judge P. A. Martin and denied and notice of appeal given by the attorneys.

The case was taken before the higher court on over a half hundred issues and the matter was argued late last year. In view of the many special issues on which judgment was rendered until late Wednesday evening.

Snow has been confined in the county jail ever since October 4, 1920, the date of his arrest by Sheriff Bob McFall and his deputies. The condemned man has always maintained the best of spirits, sincerely believing that he would

be granted a new trial by the appeal court. During the past summer the prisoner confessed religion and he was taken to the church and baptized. During the entire time he has maintained that he was convicted on a charge of which he was innocent. On the night of September 20, 1920, Deputies Spiller and Belcher of the constable's department and Marvin Caple and William E. Toney raided a gambling den at Kemp City. In the raid Caple and Toney were killed. Fifty-two men were arrested at that time and brought to this city where all were fined on charges of gambling.

Four days later Doc Snow was arrested along the banks of Big Wichita river and lodged in the county jail. The following day he was secretly removed to the Fort Worth jail as mob violence was hinted. A month later he was brought back to Wichita county.

The special grand jury which was called by the district judge indicted Snow in two separate bills, each charging murder. He was tried on one of the charges.

There remains but one more course or other foreign countries will be believed that this will be resorted to. A motion for a rehearing on the case can be presented to the court of appeals.

### RESUME WORK ON KOURI WELL NO. 1

Tools Are Removed and Thorough Test Will Be Made, It is Announced.

HASKELL, TEXAS, Oct. 27.—Work has again begun on Kouri well number one, 12 miles east of Haskell, and sufficient capital has been secured to make a thorough test of the well. The string of tools that were lost in the well have been

caught up and removed and a new packer is to be put down in an effort to shut off the salt water which is claimed by the drillers to be the only barrier in the way of production for this well.

Experienced oil men also believe that this well will be a producer when the salt water is cut out. The utmost care is now being put forth to save the well and all concerned feel confident that Haskell county will develop the next big oil field.

The Glenn Royalty well that is now being put down on the X ranch a few miles from Kouri No. 1 is progressing nicely and is nearing if not past 1,000 feet in depth. This well is to be put down to a greater depth than Kouri and so far they have had no hitch in the work.
