

METHODIST FIGHT ON TEACHER'S BOOK, IS LED BY WICHITAN

A resolution urging trustees of Southern Methodist university at Dallas to accept at once the resignation of Dr. John A. Rice from the faculty of the theological department of that institution, was offered at the North Texas conference by Rev. W. L. Tuttle, pastor of the Floral Heights M. E. church here, and was adopted. The fight over Dr. Rice's book, "The Old Testament in the Life of Today," has featured Methodist conferences in Texas this fall, and the conferences have taken disapprobatory action on it for the most part. The resolution offered by Mr. Tuttle and others follows: "We congratulate the church and Southern Methodist university on the recent announcement of the resignation of Dr. John A. Rice from the faculty of the theological department of said university. We earnestly urge said board of trustees of Southern Methodist university to accept said resignation at once. We urge the proper authorities to secure the early elimination of the book entitled 'The Old Testament in the Life of Today,' together with all other books setting forth like objectionable teachings from all courses of study required in all our schools."

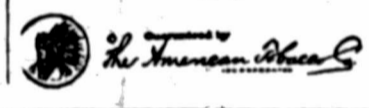
TEN THOUSAND BALES ARE HANDLED BY VERNON GINS

NEGRO AUTO RACE RESULTS IN WRECK AND THREE ARRESTS

Thirty dollars and the expense of having his car repaired was the price paid by Clive Waldrip, negro, for a wild race down Ohio avenue early Sunday night. A smashup at the foot of the street where Ohio and Barwise intersect at the railway tracks, a burning machine and a narrow escape from serious injury or death by two other negroes were the other features of the hectic spree that landed the three blacks in jail. Waldrip, accompanied by a negro named Bennett, undertook to pass another car driven by Henderson Bates Jr., a negro acquaintance, as the two cars were driving south on Ohio Sunday evening. A race ensued and came to an abrupt ending when the Waldrip machine, declared by officers to have been traveling 50 miles an hour, swerved into a railroad switch post at the Barwise and Ohio corner, breaking the post cleanly off and causing the car to overturn. Flames immediately broke out and the Central station department was called. The blaze was extin-

guished before it had done much damage to the machine. Bennett was slightly cut up in the crash but Waldrip escaped with no injuries. Bates, following close behind, managed to steer his car around the Waldrip wreck and bring it to a stop before further damage was done. All the negroes were locked up on charges of speeding, reckless driving and drunkenness. Waldrip drew a \$20 fine in police court Monday morning and the cases against Bates and Waldrip were set for trial Tuesday.
