SMOOT OFFERS A MODIFIED SALES TAX AMENDMENT PROVIDES ONE PER CENT MANUFACTURERS' TAX ON SALES OVER \$5,000

It provides for a one per cent manufacturers' tax on all sales in excess of \$5,000 and a turnover tax of one-half of one per cent on sales in excess of the same amount. The original Smoot proposal was limited to manufacturers' sales tax of three per cent.

'SICK A BED' PROVES RARE GOOD COMEDY FOR LARGE AUDIENCE

"Sick A-Bed" may be alright for a stage comedy title but "Sick A-Bed" would, in the opinion of more than one amusement bug in this city, be more appropriate when the effect on the audience of the Gene Lewis-Olga Worth presentation of the famous Broadway hit is considered. What the "Sick A-Bed" cast didn't accomplish in the way of fun making when they appeared at the Wichita theater Monday night was about as inconsequential as a suggestion from the ex-kaiser would be at the Washington disarmament parley.

The play was a riot of comedy from first to last and the audience, individually and collectively, howled with glee until it was weak in the knees.

The plot of "Sick A-Bed" is too well known to require a lengthy recounting of its many humorous turns and twists. The story of how a wealthy American gets mixed up with a foreign adventuress while traveling abroad with a young ward and how the latter is induced to take a serious illness in order to get out of appearing in court to testify against his guardian is one of the most popular with present-day theatrical audiences. The situations arising from the efforts of the pseudo invalid to convince the legal sharks that he really is sick furnish some remarkable blood-avenues in which the comical features travel.

Romance in plenty is scattered throughout the production, not the oscillatory endurance tests that take up about the last three reels of the average movie, but the lively, snappy kind that holds the attention and respect of anyone. Gene Lewis and Miss Worth make an admirable Romeo and Juliet team, although it must be admitted that the love-making ideas of the former smack more of the modern than of the Shakespeare era.

Selection of the cast for the play was carried out with the same "thrust" that marked the "Turn to the Right" presentation last week. Miss Lee Smith, anyhow the program sheet called her Miss, scored another triumph with her work, as did Jack Doty, Jack Emerson, Klock Byler, Miss Fathline LeRoy and Joseph Remington.

MARJORIE RAMBEAU OFF STAGE AND ON IS DIFFERENT—O, QUITE!

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—"Women are to blame for most of the unhappy marriages."

Marjorie Rambeau told me that, back in her dressing room at the Plymouth theater.

"I'm for the women, all the way, but they haven't the breadth of character that men have. They are suspicious of their husbands under circumstances in which the husbands would be entirely unsuspecting of them."

Then she made me laugh at her characterization of the wife fretting over her husband's night at the club.

However, within the hour she had brought tears to eyes of many with her delineation of a wife made unhappy by her husband. She was behind the footlights then, as the heroine of "Daddy's Gone A-Hunting."

That play by Zoe Akins is the most first to last and the audience, individually and collectively, howled with glee until it was weak in the knees.

The playwright has made each of the acts a complete play within itself.

In the play the husband returns after a year of art study in Paris. He has had a complete metamorphosis. This change is summed up in his own words, "Love's damn little when a man has work to do."

Husband and wife sit down at a table. That scene would have been no more thrilling if knives and forks had been thrown across the table instead of cold water.

A broken heart speaks in broken sentences. Monosyllables shoot straight to the mark like the duelist's bullet to the outland heart.

No, no other woman. Several of them. But they didn't matter. Just incidents. Changed? Sure, changed. He arises from table and looks out the window. "There's a world outside you don't know anything about."

He goes out. Their little daughter comes in and curls upon her mother's lap. A long silence. Then the little girl, "Tired?" Another pause. "A little." "Another?" "They rock to and fro. 'Let's play I'm a little baby. You sing 'Bye-o.'"

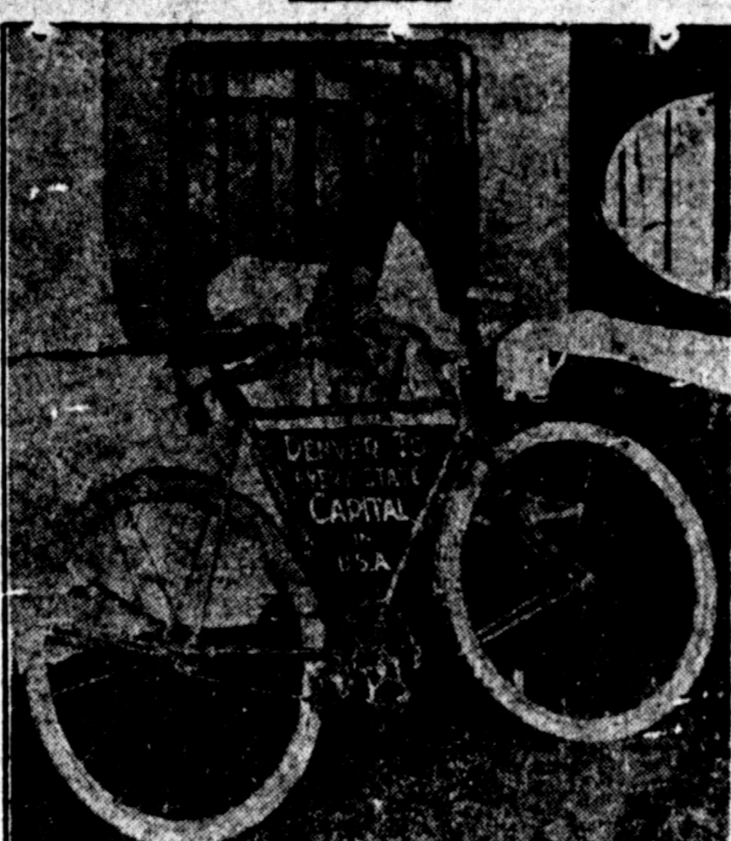

BURCH TRIAL CONTINUED UNTIL MONDAY TO PERMIT THE STATE TO COMBAT THE INSANITY PLEA

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 2.—The case of Arthur C. Burch, charged with the murder of J. Belton Kennedy, was continued until next Monday to give the district attorney's office time to prepare affidavits to combat an application for a trial to test Burch's sanity, made by defense attorneys. The case of Mrs. Madalynne Obenchain, indicted jointly with Burch, was continued to the same time.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 2.—Whatever criminal facts may be developed in the trial of Mrs. Madalynne Obenchain and Arthur C. Burch, jointly charged with the murder of J. Belton Kennedy by shooting from ambush, it promises to unfold such a love-drama as has seldom been linked with mysterious killing.

For though the slayer and his motives may never be revealed, in the unfolding of the story of this "love square" there will be bared to the jury the actions and emotions of cultivated, college-bred folk in the grip of overwhelming passions, passions which, the state maintains, brought about the death of the Los Angeles broker, whom Madalynne was to have married.

Both prosecution and defense will have to elaborate these emotional factors in seeking, respectively, to prove and to rebut the alleged reason for the crime, which, by theory, is the fury of a woman scorned.

Kennedy was shot on the night of August 5 while he and Mrs. Obenchain, divorced wife of a Chicago attorney, and fiancée of Kennedy, were at the broker's rustic suburban cottage. The two were searching for a "lucky penny." Mrs. Obenchain shot a gun which killed Kennedy and his escort.

Challenger For Chess Title Was Marvel as Boy

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 2.—Norman T. Whitaker, who has challenged Frank J. Marshall, present title-holder, for the chess championship of the United States, is one of the most brilliant of the younger Americans who have qualified as "Knights of the chess board." Even as a boy, Whitaker, was a chess phenomenon. At 17, when he just entered the University of Pennsylvania, he went to England a member of that university's team, where he defeated every player from Oxford and Cambridge he met. The contestant for Champion Marshall's crown began his chess career when he was 12. The rudiments of the game he learned from his father, and then began "studying a game" under the tutelage of his mother, who is a professor of mathematics in one of the Philadelphia schools. Later, when he joined the famous Mercantile Chess club of his Philadelphia city, young Whitaker came under the notice of Dr. Gustave Neibohm, who had an international reputation as a writer on chess and as a problem solver and proposer. The boy became one of Neibohm's proteges, and from his noted expert learned his first lessons in the first art of chess. Last February he came in second in the Pennsylvania state championship matches. Last summer, in a masters' tourney in Atlantic City in which Marshall was defeated, Whitaker again won second place, being to David Janowicz, the Polish champion. It was Whitaker who, disguised as a monk and a hooded figure, created a sensation in his own mercantile club. It had been announced that an unknown chess player would be at the club room to meet 20 of the best players in the club in 20 simultaneous matches. Although personally known, not one of them suspected the identity of Whitaker when he was brought in and introduced as "Masked Marvel." The 20 matches were completed and the Masked Marvel won 12 of the 20. Then the last match was finished, a mysterious visitor removed his mask and his opponents and the spectators were amazed to discover that it was Norman Whitaker, one of their own members. Whitaker is 21 and a patent attorney with offices in Washington.
