

Politics begins at the local level, and Friona residents have an excellent chance Saturday of participating in the process which will eventually decide how Texas' delegations vote in the Democratic and Republican national conventions.

Democratic precinct conventions will be held at 2 p.m. Friona's convention will be held at the junior high school.

Precincts are allotted delegates at the rate of one for each 25 votes which Governor Preston Smith, the Democratic candidate, received in 1970.

Friona's precinct, for example, will have 21 delegates to the county convention, which will be held here on May 13. The number of delegates are based on the fact that Friona cast 523 votes for Governor Smith in 1970.

Upon entering the convention, each person attending will register his name and either a preference for a candidate or an "uncommitted" with the precinct chairman, who will count up the number of delegates supporting each candidate.

If any one candidate's name is listed by more than 70 per cent of those present, the entire precinct's delegation to the county convention could go to that candidate.

However, if any candidate receives the support of as much as 20 per cent of the persons present, those persons may demand that their candidate receive a proportionate number of the precinct's delegates to the county meeting.

The delegates attending the county convention the following week will select five delegates to the state convention, on the same basis. Parmer County gets a state delegate for every 300 votes Smith received in 1970.

A similar straw vote at the state convention June 13 will influence selection of Texas' 130 delegates to the National Democratic Convention July 10 in Miami, where the presidential nomination will be made.

Republican precinct conventions will still operate on the winner-take-all, or unit rule basis.

The Republican precinct conventions should be a lot less complicated, especially in light of the fact that President Nixon is practically a cinch to be re-nominated.

In order to participate in either the Democratic or Republican convention, you must have voted in the primary.

So...vote early on Saturday, and then take part in your party convention. It's your chance to have a say in the nomination of our next president.

There are seven candidates for the Democratic nomination for governor, and six on the Republican ticket. There are eight candidates for the nomination for lieutenant governor, but none on the Republican ballot.

Looks like at least one of the conservative candidates in the race would have considered running on the GOP ticket, to have assured a spot on the ballot in November.

The same thing is true in the race for comptroller of public accounts, where 80-year-old (that's right) Robert S. Calvert has six opponents for the Democratic nomination, but none on the Republican ticket.

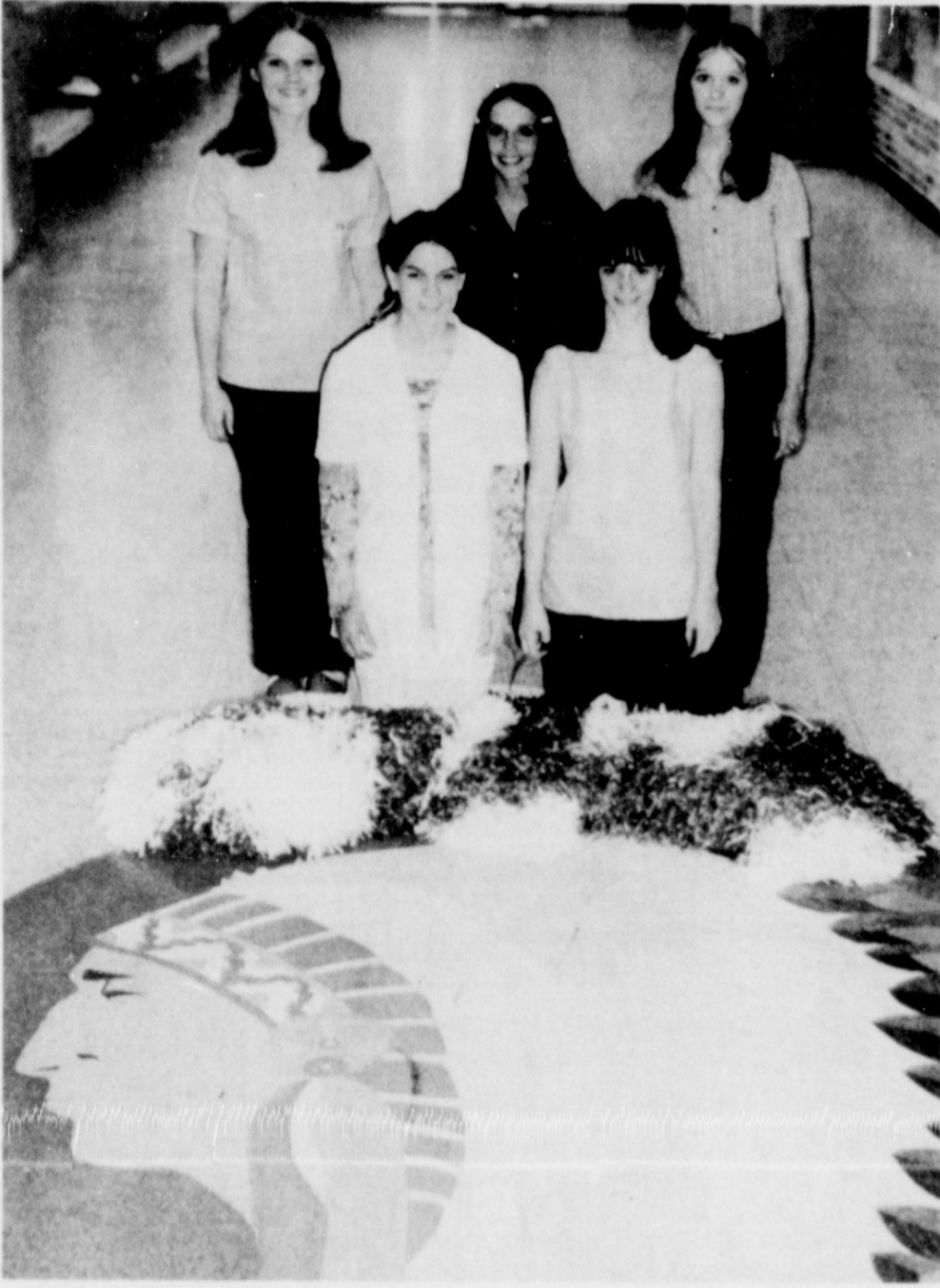
State Treasurer Jesse James has five Democratic opponents plus one on the GOP ballot. Railroad Commissioner Byron Tunnell has two Democrats and one Republican after his job. Attorney-General Crawford Martin has two Democratic opponents.

Probably the most confusing race to voters is the one for lieutenant governor on the Democratic ballot. We are presenting thumbnail sketches of the candidates in this race on an inside page of this issue.

At least the serious candidates for governor are known to voters.

It boils down to an interesting primary election. We hope you'll do your duty as a citizen by casting your ballot.

LITTLE LEAGUE

Teams To Draft Players Thursday

Thursday night will be player draft night in the new reorganized Friona Little League program.

A total of 195 boys had signed up for the Little League program as of Tuesday. This included 48 boys in the Senior Little League, which will field four teams, and 147 for the majors and minors.

Ronald Smiley, commissioner of the senior division, said that league, which is for players 13 through 16, could still use a few additional players, but that he would have to have the names by Thursday night so that they could be included in the player draft.

There will be 16 teams in all this season. Besides the four Senior Division teams, there will be four "Major League"

teams, which will replace the Intermediate League, and eight "Minor League" teams, which will replace the Pee-Wees.

Saturday has been proclaimed as a workday by the league directors. Men who can be asked to come and assist with the task of getting the fields in shape for the beginning of the season. Players and former players

who have uniforms are urged to turn them in either to their sponsors or to Curtis Butler, immediately. These will need to be re-issued.

Sponsors who have equipment are being asked to turn the equipment in to the league, as an inventory needs to be made, and additional equipment purchased as needed.

Polling Sites Are Given By Republicans

The polling places and precinct conventions for the Republican primary in Parmer County were announced this week by Glenn Lust, county chairman. The Friona, Black and Lake-

view precincts will vote at the American Legion Hall in Friona. The precinct convention will be held at 2 p.m.

Bovina and Rhea precincts will vote at Bovina at the Bovina High School Cafeteria. Precinct convention will be held at 4:30 p.m.

Farwell and Oklahoma Lane precincts vote at the Farwell City Hall. That convention will begin at 2 p.m.

The Lazbuddie precinct votes at the Lazbuddie School Cafeteria. The convention begins at 4:30 p.m.

Republicans have almost a full slate of candidates this year, including a local candidate in the commissioner's race, Forrest Osborn.

Residents Protest New Feedlot Here

Residents in the western part of Friona began a protest this week because of the proposed construction of a pre-feeders feeding establishment to be built within a mile of the western city limits.

John G. Baker reportedly is constructing the feeding operation on land purchased from Roy Clements, located .9 mile west of the city.

City Attorney Richard Colard said that the City Council has extra-territorial jurisdiction over anything constructed within one-half mile of the city limits. If the city's population were 5,000, the city would have jurisdiction over installations up to a mile from the city limits.

Governor's Race Hi-lights Primary

The governor's race will highlight the Democratic primary vote locally on Saturday, although a write-in candidate for the county Democratic chairmanship has generated a little more local interest in the voting.

A Friona group has spearheaded a drive to write in Hollis

Horton for the position of county chairman of the Democrats, while Dolph Moten of Bovina is also a write-in candidate. No name is on the ballot for this office, and the present chairman, Nelson Welch, who has resigned, says he will not serve again under any circumstances. In an unusual move, Forrest

Osborn, who is a candidate for county commissioner on the Republican ballot, is asking for write-in votes on the Democratic ballot against incumbent Tom Lewellen.

Cattleman Dolph Briscoe is perhaps the favorite locally in the governor's race, although Governor Preston Smith, al-

ways a strong vote-getter in these parts, should do well again. The seven candidate field is almost certain to produce a runoff with the top two candidates in Saturday's voting meeting again on June 3.

Five candidates, led by Barefoot Sanders and Ralph Yarbrough, seek the Democratic nomination for U.S. Senator and the right to meet John Tower in November.

Eight candidates are seeking the nomination for lieutenant governor (see separate story), six are opposing 80-year-old state comptroller Robert S. Calvert, and five are after longtime officeholder Jesse James' state treasurer's office.

Polls are open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. at the various precincts.

Somewhere around 2,000,000 voters are expected to vote in the state, with around 2,000 to turn out in Parmer County.

Polling Places

Polling places for Saturday's elections are as follows: Friona—Junior High Auditorium; Black—Tri-County Elevator; Lakeview—Otto Whitefield residence; Lazbuddie—High School.

The precinct conventions will be held at the same locations as the polling places.

IN SATURDAY'S PRIMARY HERE

Voters Must Mark 'For' On Busing To Vote 'Against'

Texans will finally get a chance to take their grumbles about daylight savings time to the ballot box Saturday, but they'll have to vote in the Republican primary—where most usually don't—to do it.

Three referendums—one on the Democratic ballot and two on the Republican—will allow voters to express their feelings on DST and on busing for desegregation.

State Demo leaders, however, rejected the idea of a DST "straw vote."

The Republican DST question merely asks that the ballot be

marked "For" or "Against" daylight savings time, but the busing questions are considerably more complicated and confusing.

On both Democratic and Republican busing questions, the voters must mark "For" in order to register himself as being against busing.

Wording is Confusing

The Democratic question reads, "No public school student shall because of his race, creed or color, be assigned to or required to attend a particular school. This referendum applies to the required busing of

public school students and provides for equal quality education for all public school students."

The GOP wording is thus: "Are you in favor of a constitutional amendment which would prohibit forced busing of school children or forced consolidation of school districts solely to achieve racial balance?"

So, if you mark your ballot "For" such an amendment or "For" no student being required to attend a particular school, you are voting "Against" busing.

No one filed for the position by filing deadline, so there is no candidate for the office on the printed ballot.

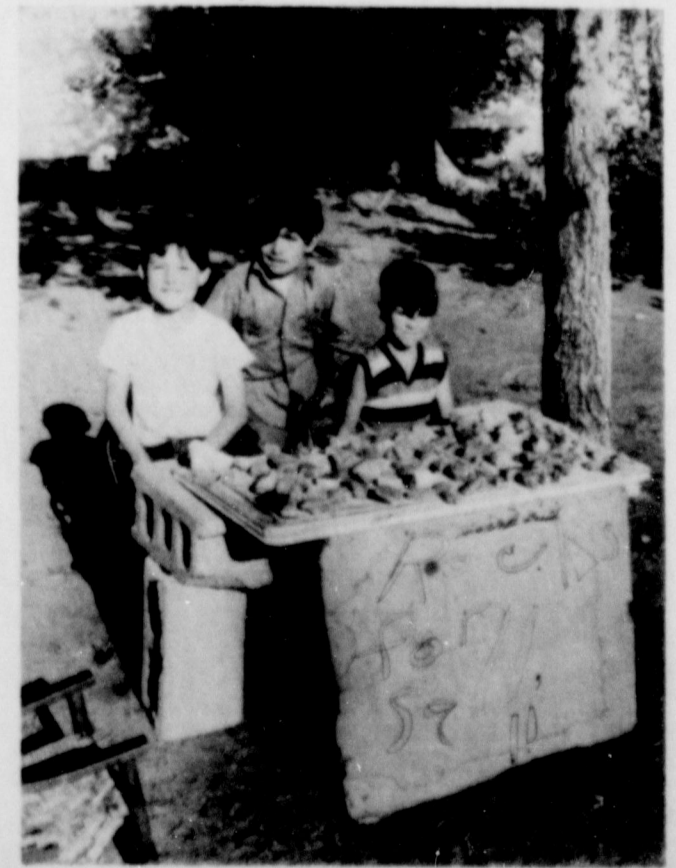
The present chairman, Nelson Welch of Friona, gave notice prior to filing deadline that he would not seek re-election.

However, it was difficult to tell whether little Johnny was coming or going... but I hadn't planned to get political with this.

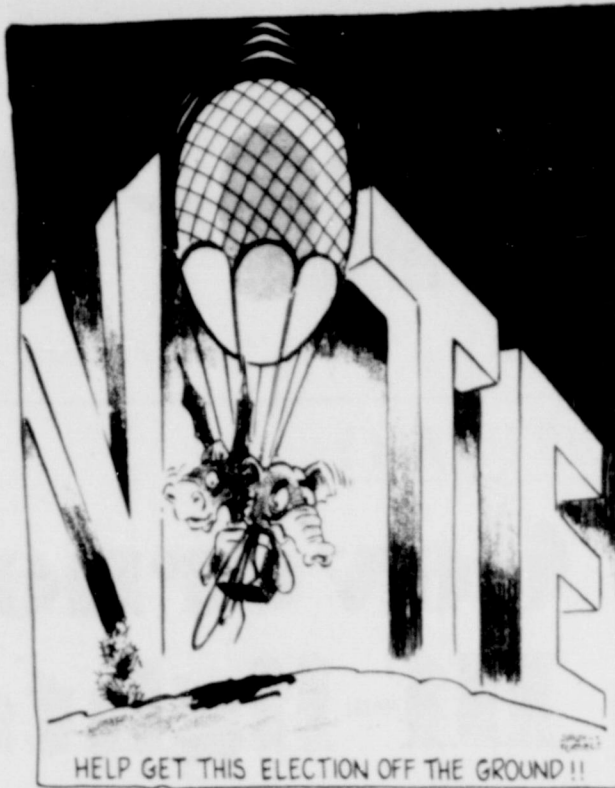
The matter of knowing what you are all about is important. How do you choose and decide? What standards are used for your measurement of doing right? How strong is your will, etc.

In all truth "wisdom" does appear a rare commodity in the arsenal of civilization.

Perhaps this opinion is born of ignorance, oversight, or illusion: or it may be further proof that hindsight is more prevalent than foresight.

Then again it may be that a childhood overshadowed by World War I, a youth spent in the "great depression" while storm clouds gathered and erupted into World War II and Korea, advanced years saddened by the current conflict in Asia: all this may have combined to make one doubt the wisdom of world leaders.

When viewed from the plateau of 64 years, which position we attain this 4th day of May, 1972, it is best to spare only a glance backward and to look into the future for our means of salvation.

Alexander Dumas expressed it thusly: "All human wisdom is summed up in two words, wait and hope."

We greyhounds must therefore wait and hope--confident that the new crop of world leaders will be our superiors in thought and action.

Still it would be selfishly cruel to stand aside and allow them to fall into the same quagmire from which we are trying to extricate ourselves.

The practical program will be a blending of age and experience with youth and ambition.

To achieve this we must build a bridge of understanding across the generation gap.

It is a foregone conclusion that without such a bridge the future of both young and old will become but another dusty page in the Dooms Day Book.

A number of my young friends, from ages 15 to 30, tell me that their generation understands mine perfectly: the gap is created by the old folks failure to comprehend the reasoning of the young.

Oh, how clearly I recall using the same argument on my own father half a century ago, and frustrated I became when he anticipated my every move!

When successive generations stand eyeball to eyeball and make an honest effort toward understanding, both must recognize the value of love, respect, and appreciation.

A detailed discussion of guilt and innocence would reach from here to yonder, accomplish nothing, and put to shame any Perry Mason court scene ever filmed.

The truth of the matter is that we are all in the same boat, sink or swim, survive or perish, the choice is ours.

It will not be solved by our standing on opposite sides of an imaginary canyon throwing harsh words at each other.

There is a third generation growing up--they are our first concern--they and the America they will inherit.

That's the way it looks to me from the vantage point of my 64th birthday.

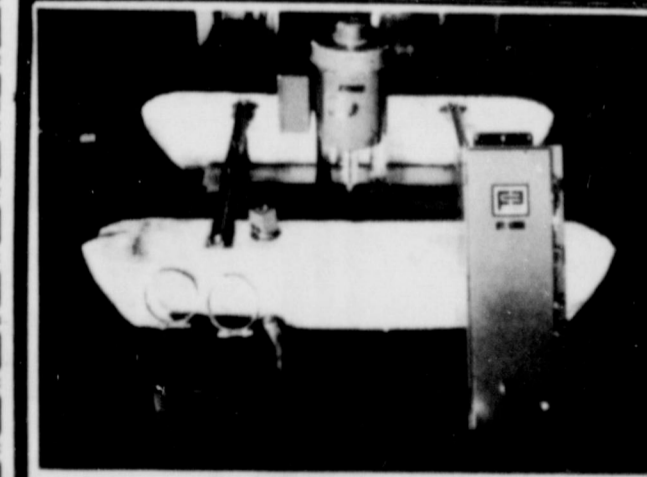





RUNOFF TERMED MOST LIKELY IN IMPORTANT VOTE

Five Major Demo Candidates In Lt. Governor's Race

If the candidates for lieutenant governor know what they're talking about, a runoff is in the making and this final week of campaigning could decide who's in it.

The candidates agree that about one out of two Texans still has not made up his mind. Voters get a choice of eight Democrats and no Republicans since the GOP is skipping the race this year.

Five are so-called major candidates. They are spending money, have state headquarters in Austin with paid workers and organizations in other big cities and counties and have been criss-crossing the state for months making speeches.

They are Sens. Joe Christie of El Paso, Wayne Connally of Floresville and Ralph Hall of Rockwall, Houston Post newspaper executive Bill Hobby and Bill Jones of Odessa, an independent oil operator.

All are family men and have been in the armed services. A glimpse at each:

—Christie, 38, might be a cinch if all Texas women could meet him in person. "He's gorgeous," exclaimed one in an attempt to give reasons why she was voting for him. A lawyer who looks at home in a sweat shirt, khakis and white tennis shoes or an expensively tailored suit, Christie got his first statewide publicity last year when he guided the liquor-by-the-drink bill through the legislature. His campaign got a boost when the Texas AFL-

CIO's Committee on Political Education endorsed him although he is not a bedrock liberal. Twenty-two Young Democrats clubs also announced their support recently, pointing up his appeal to youth.

His personal wealth is less than the other major candidates, and he admits his main corporate client is the El Paso clothing firm owned by his father-in-law. He reported an adjusted gross income in 1970 of \$43,072.

Would Start Earlier

He has concentrated on suggestions for reorganizing the day-to-day work of the Senate, over which he is lieutenant gov-

ernor presides. He would start the sessions earlier, at 8:30 a.m., hold Saturday committee meetings so those who punch time-clocks could attend and would cut the number of committees from 27 to about 10 to save money to hire better staff.

Christie's protest that Texas may be losing up to \$75 million a year in sales tax revenue because of inefficiency by the state comptroller's office has gained a lot of attention.

"I'm in this race because Wayne Connally is in it also. Wayne Connally has voted against every issue in the Senate which even smacked of progress," Christie says.

—Connally, 48, started the race with the built-in advantage of the Connally name. Merrill Connally is running his campaign, and one of his opponents insists that former Gov. John Connally, his brother, is pressuring businessmen not to put money into the race unless it is for Wayne.

Lots Of Support

Three House members once were joking that Connally couldn't run because he wouldn't even know where to pay his filing fee. "Don't worry," interjected another. "Someone will show him"—meaning he could expect lots of support in his campaign. "The name is a very significant factor," said Sen. Connally. "It's very easy to go about the state and get people involved."

He is considered the most conservative of the candidates. He has been criticized often for his vote for the food tax in 1969 and also for his comments in favor of the sales tax. He says the only limitation is what "people are willing to pay"—and he considers it a fair tax because, he says, most of the revenue from the tax is funneled toward services for poorer people.

Connally also has strongly opposed a minimum wage and extending the vote to 18-year-olds.

—Hall, 48, is a funny man with an underlying toughness and stubbornness which enables him to get his way most of the time. He's also good at compromising and is a member of school of politics. "No matter how many get in the race I am going to outwalk, outtalk and outwork all of them," Hall insists.

A lawyer and businessman with personal wealth of nearly \$2 million, Hall announced a couple of years ago he would run for lieutenant governor as soon as Ben Barnes moved on, and his staff has stayed intact since then working toward that goal. His chances were diminished greatly when Connally announced because that cut off a bloc of conservative votes he hoped to get.

He is usually considered a conservative but has pushed youth bills and ethics in recent years. Some of his proposals for the legislature have been far reaching, such as staggered terms for the governor and lieutenant governor, a committee to regulate all public utilities and possibly annual, year-round legislative sessions.

Target Picked

His criticism has been aimed mostly at Connally and Hobby. "Wayne Connally is riding on his brother's name and Bill Hobby on his family name," Hall says.

—Hobby, 40, is the son of the late former Gov. William P. Hobby and Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby, the first secretary of the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Hobby is president and executive editor of the Houston Post, a family business, and filed a financial statement showing he was worth \$857,822.

He insists he is running very strong in the big cities and says he has a good chance of winning because voters are in a mood to get rid of those in office, such as Christie, Connally and Hall. The word "politician" is distasteful to the average Texas voter, Hobby says.

"I am not a professional politician, neither am I a novice at state government," he adds. Hobby was parliamentarian of the Senate in 1959 and was a familiar sight at the 1971 legislative session in connection with his chairmanship of a committee which did extensive work on welfare reform proposals.

Stresses Need

One of his proposals for state government is to establish a cabinet form of government, with the governor appointing

such officials as attorney general, rather than having them elected. He says a citizens-only commission is the only way to settle the question of legislative ethics, and he has spent a lot of time stressing the need to crack down on drug pushers.

—Jones, 54, is a businessman who began the race prepared to spend \$250,000 of his own money, if necessary, on his campaign. Like Hobby, he thinks Texans want a fresh face in office. "As many as six or eight out of 10 people will ask, 'Are you in office?' Have you ever been in office? If you say 'no,' they'll support you."

Jones says he's worth between \$2 million and \$3 million and has been traveling mostly by mobile home—he will have made all 254 counties by the May 6 primary. He appears particularly incensed over what he calls John Connally's interference in the race on behalf of his brother, Wayne. He cites one incident when he was talking to a man about contributing to his campaign when, he said, Connally called and asked the man not to contribute to anyone but Wayne. Did you get any money? Jones was asked. "No," he replied.

But once he sets a course, he is not likely to back off or apologize. If the people want me, fine; if they don't, that's fine, too. It won't destroy a political career.

Biggest Obstacle
His campaign literature is labeled, "Who is Bill Jones?" and name recognition appears to be his strongest obstacle. But he claims 42-60 per cent of the voters are undecided, and maintains that he and Hobby may get in a runoff because everyone is so disgusted with office-holders.

His views are conservative and, like many others, he thinks good government can be achieved if it is operated like a successful business.

His only other statewide race was in 1956 when he ran for agriculture commissioner. He also is a former Kermit city councilman.

—The other candidates in the race are Robert McCord, 44, of Corpus Christi, a former worker with the Methodist Church there; Troy Skates, 59, an Austin city employee; and John Standlee, 56, a salesman in Mathis in South Texas.



On The Farm In Parmer County
MACK HEALD
County Agent

With warm weather hopefully here to stay, planting has been in full swing for the last two weeks. Corn, potatoes and onions went in during the early part of April. But with May approaching, cotton and milo planters throughout the county have been set and rigged up for the busy planting season ahead.

The last two weeks has seen most of the cotton and a great deal of the milo put in the ground. Somewhere around 40,000 acres of cotton will be planted and about 36,000 acres of corn. Milo will probably remain the major cash crop with approximately 165,000-170,000 acres being planted.

Wheat and barley harvest will be here before long, but this season should wrap up in a hurry. With much of the wheat being grazed out, a little over 20,000 acres will be harvested for grain.

Crop demonstrations conducted by the county extension service are also being planted and set up at this time. Parmer County conducts ten to fifteen different demonstrations each year in such fields as varieties, insect control, water use and fertility. For 1972, grain sorghum fertility demonstration is being put in on the Chandler Brother's farm east of Farwell on U.S. 84. This demonstration is sponsored by the Texas Plant Food Institute. Several different rates of nitrogen and phosphorus will be applied to determine yield difference under

irrigated conditions. Check plots without any fertilizer will also be planted to compare the results. The rates of 200-80-0, 200-40-0 and 200-0-0 are the highest being applied from the nitrogen standpoint. Rates of 140-80-0, 140-40-0 and 140-0-0 will also be used to compare difference in nitrogen level. This will be an interesting demonstration to watch throughout the growing season.

With warm weather approaching the threat of the screwworm is also coming back to this area. Health officials think the pest will reach into Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle by this summer. In 1971, only 5 cases were reported in Texas, but thus far in 1972, nearly 1,000 cases have been reported. They are already up as far as the Central West Texas area and are continuing their trip northward.

The Screwworm Eradication Program is still in operation. Sterile flies are dropped on areas where the fly larvae are found. If you find what you believe to be the screwworm larva, bring several to the county agent's office so they can be sent to Mission, Texas, for identification. If positive identification is made, the flies will be dropped in the area to help bring them under control.

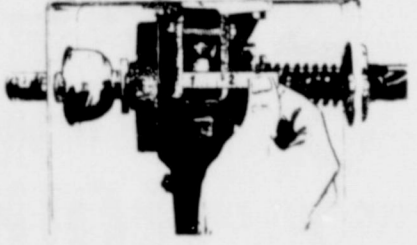

Trim. Cut. Clip. Snip. Women who sew need proper cutting tools. Sharpness is the most important quality of good cutting equipment.

"An ideal kit of tools might contain eight-inch shears, six-inch snipping scissors and three-inch embroidery scissors." "Though you could get by with less, a minimum set should include at least a pair of bent handle dressmaker shears and a pair of scissors."

Shears are usually larger than scissors and are used for heavy cutting jobs. The handle's bent to let the blade rest flat against the cutting surface.

The openings in the handle of shears are of unequal size so that two or three fingers can be inserted in the opening of one handle and the thumb in another.

Use scissors for lighter cutting tasks. The handle features smaller openings of equal size.

Later, when you want to add some luxury items to your minimum kit of sewing tools, consider embroidery scissors, pinking scissors, buttonhole scissors and thread clips.

Buttonhole scissors, designed to cut buttonholes of uniform size, provide adjustable cutting edges.

Thread clips are a modified form of scissors that have only one finger opening. They fit snugly in the hand and provide maximum flexibility of movement.

For the homemaker who likes to carry her needlework with her, folding scissors offer the perfect solution. These tiny scissors fit into their case which is the size of a match box.

Manufacturers also produce left handed shears for those who work with their left hands.

"Buy good quality cutting tools and have them resharpened when necessary." "Select shears and scissors with blades connected by a screw that can be adjusted."

Avoid buying cutting tools that have blades riveted together or a rivet made to look like a screw.

Keep the blades in proper adjustment. Blades connected too tightly are tiring to use. Those too loosely connected cut sloppily.

Since shears and scissors are expensive, keep all cutting equipment for sewing only. Keep them in a safe place away from children who need to cut paper, husbands who need to cut a piece of wire, and little brothers who need to trim finger nails.

"With good sharp shears, you can cut out a garment easily." "And sharp, well-kept tools make your work more accurate than dull ones do."

We hope all who attended the Suit Fair in Hereford did enjoy and benefit from it. And we hope you will consider coming back next fall as a Sew Fair is being planned for September 12th with demonstrations and exhibits by representatives of Nationally known Manufacturers connected with home sewing needs.

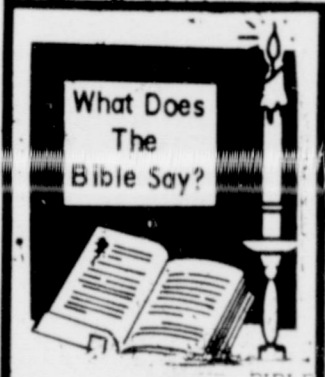
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What Does The Bible Say?

The Bible says that we are justified by faith (Rom. 5:1), but in no place does it say that we are justified by faith only. To the contrary, the scriptures say, "Ye see then how that by works a man is justified, and not by faith only" (Jas. 2:24). Another passage reads, "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God: not of works lest any man should boast" (Eph. 2:8-9).

A careful reading of the texts will show that there is no lack of agreement between Paul and James. The apostle Paul writes of the works of human merit which are powerless to obtain salvation while James writes of the works of God's righteousness without which salvation is impossible. The harmony is seen in Acts 10:35, "...he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted with him," and in Gal. 5:6, "...faith, worketh by love." So one is saved by both faith and works (as well as by grace) but by neither "only."
