

When famed cattle baron Charles Goodnight brought his herd over a little rise in the Texas Panhandle in the 1870s, he almost had a stampede on his hands.

The cattle were suddenly confronted by Palo Duro Canyon, and they panicked. In fact, the mules pulling the chuck wagon were so frightened that they nearly dumped the entire wagon, cook and all, into the 1,000-foot canyon.

Palo Duro Canyon, located 12 miles east of the City of Canyon, is indeed a spectacular site to behold after crossing mile after mile of the monotonous rolling plains of the Texas Panhandle.

The canyon is 120 miles long and is 40 miles wide at its mouth. Because of the canyon's breathtaking scenery and its colorful history, more than 15,000 acres of it have been made into a state park.

The canyon has been in the making for 90 million years through the action of wind and water on rock. At least four geologic ages or eras are exposed by the canyon's eroded formations.

Palo Duro, a Spanish term meaning "hard wood," refers to the canyon's supply of strong cedar (juniper) brush from which the Indians made their arrows.

Probably the first European to visit Palo Duro Canyon was Francisco Vasquez de Coronado, who is generally believed to have been in the canyon in 1541.

The canyon was one of the last strongholds of the warlike Great Plains Indians until after 1874 when General Ranald MacKenzie defeated a large force of marauding Comanche Indians in the canyon, making it safe for permanent Anglo-American settlement.

The first rancher in Palo Duro Canyon was Goodnight, who, in partnership with John Adair of England, started the first cattle ranch in the canyon as well as the first ranch in the Texas Panhandle, the famous JA Ranch which is still in operation in part of the canyon.

But there is also a man-made attraction which has drawn visitors from all over the world. It is the outdoor stage production "TEXAS," a musical drama depicting the early settlement of the canyon area. "TEXAS" is held in an outdoor amphitheater of natural stone. It is a drama of man's struggle with the elements while trying to settle the untamed portions of central and northern Texas. Since its beginning in 1961, success of the drama has been as spectacular as the country and history on which the story is based.

Pulitzer Prize winner Paul Green wrote the script, and the music was scored by Hollywood composer Isaac Van Grove. Some of the cast are students, some are housewives and many of the feature performers have professional backgrounds.

Lights playing against rugged canyon walls and special sound effects are used to heighten the drama's excitement. On stage a panorama of Panhandle history unfolds as settlers, cowboys and Indians play out the day-to-day conflicts of that colorful era.

A prairie fire rages and the settlers struggle against searing winds, dust storms and blizzards. Simple pleasures, such as hoodlums and "plum pickens," brighten the hard existence.

"TEXAS" is beginning its 12th year at the amphitheater. Performances this year begin June 22 and run every day except Sunday through August 26.

Rev. Albert Lindley has been returned to begin his fourth year as pastor of Friona's United Methodist Church, according to the official appointments announced Tuesday evening.

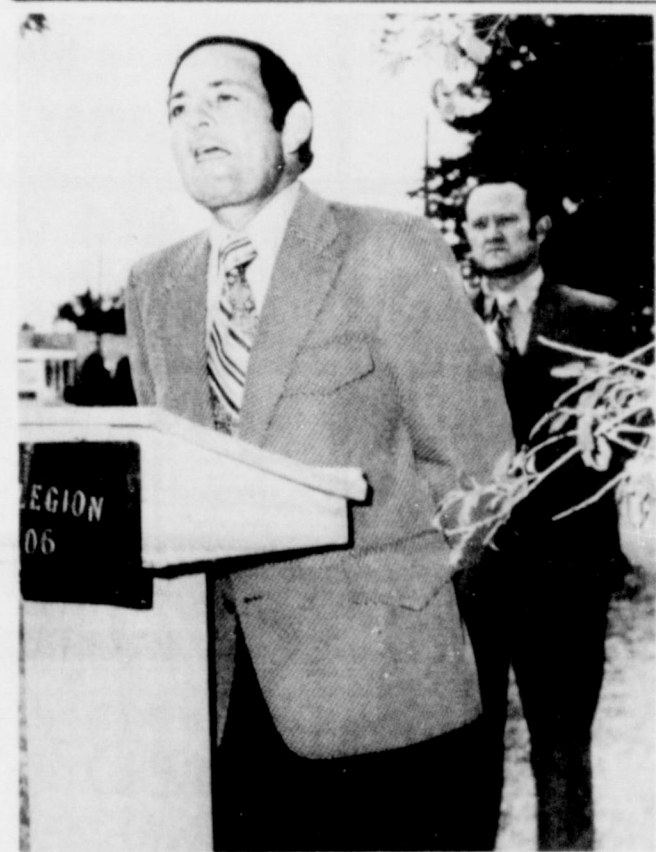
The appointment announcement was a highlight of the Northwest Texas Conference of United Methodist Churches, which is underway this week at the First United Methodist Church in Lubbock.

**Governor's Race Tops Vote Menu**

The Democratic and Republican parties' runoff, or second primary, will be held on Saturday, and election officials remind voters of some minor changes in polling places for the runoff.

The Democratic precincts of Black and Rhea will vote with the Friona precinct at Friona Junior High.

The Friona Republican precinct, which also includes the Black and Lakeview voters, will ballot at Reeve Chevrolet,

rather than at the American Legion Hall, as was the case for the May 6 primary.

Secretary of State Bob Bullock warned voters this past week that they would be breaking the law to "switch parties" from the primary in which they voted in May. Bullock says this violation is punishable up to a \$500.00 fine, and urges all voters to stay in the same party runoff as they voted in the May 6 election.

Highlight of the second pri-

maries will be the Democratic race for governor, where rancher Dolph Briscoe is opposed by Frances (Sissy) Farenthold.

Mrs. Farenthold, who surprised many voters by making the runoffs with her May 6 voting totals, is running a serious race, and Briscoe supporters are not taking her lightly, in spite of their candidate's good showing in May.

"We're warning our people not to get complacent, and not to 'go fishing' on election day," says G.B. (Pete) Buske, who is

Briscoe's campaign manager in Friona. Buske expressed the opinion that Briscoe would win the nomination, if his supporters will turn out like they did a month ago.

Mrs. Farenthold has been wooing the liberal votes. She has received the endorsement of labor leaders.

Key factor may be decided by the votes picked up which were cast for one of the losing candidates in May, including Governor Preston Smith and Ben Barnes. Briscoe would be expected to get most of these votes, but there are also those who thought of voting for Mrs. Farenthold before, but declined on the basis that they thought they would be losing their vote.

The lieutenant governor's race, pitting Wayne Connally against Bill Hobby, also is generating some interest.

Connally is the conservative candidate, and Hobby has drawn the liberal tag. Connally is cast in the same mold as his brother John, former governor. He has been making much of a statement by Hobby which implied that he favored busing of school children to achieve racial balance. Hobby denies that he is pro-busing, and criticizes Connally for not agreeing to support all Democratic candidates, especially in regard to the presidential hopefuls.

The race for U.S. Senate has taken a back seat to the two state races. Former senator Ralph Yarborough, who narrowly missed winning a majority in May, in a field of five candidates, is opposed by Barefoot Sanders.

Yarborough, who has been the champion of the state's liberal voters for years, has been criticized for making the race at his age (67) by Sanders.

The fourth race on the Democratic ballot is for the Comptroller of Public Accounts. This race has stirred up little interest on the state level. Main objection has been to the age of incumbent comptroller Robert S. Calvert, who is 80. He is opposed by James (Jim) Wilson.

Only two names appear on the Republican ballot. They are in the governor's race. Henry Grover and Albert Fay are the candidates. Grover, the Houston lawmaker, led the ticket for the GOP in May, although Fay was the top vote-getter in Friona and Parmer County.

The two have not campaigned as extensively as have their Democratic counterparts, but Fay has played up his farming background and knowledge of agriculture, which he says he thinks are in his favor in the race.

act, and will be interviewed individually. Each will be asked a question concerning Farm Bureau, or farm life. The girls will appear in formal dress.

Also on the program, the county entrants in the talent find and discussion meets will be featured.

Ben McCain of Bovins will be the county's entrant in the "talent find." McCain, who placed second in the state University Interscholastic League in poetry interpretation, will do a reading.

Also appearing will be Jackie Adams, also of Bovins. Adams, who is entered in the "discussion meet," will present a speech similar to what he will be required to do in the district competition.

The county winners in each category will advance to further competition, until a state winner is selected.

**OFFICIAL SAYS**

**Voters Must Stay In Party Primaries**

Voters in the June 3 runoff elections were warned this week by Secretary of State Bob Bullock to "stay in the party primary where they voted on May 6."

"Judging from reports several county clerks are receiving, it looks like many Republicans are being tempted to switch over and vote in the Democratic runoff on June 3," Bullock said.

"Every voter needs to know that if they voted in the Republican primary on May 6, they cannot vote in the Democratic runoff. And if they voted Democratic the first time, they cannot switch and vote Republican on

June 3.

"We want the public to know that this action violates Article 240 of the Texas Election Code and is punishable by a fine of from \$100 to \$500.

"We know that this type of voting has taken place in the past. A survey by State Senator Oscar Mauzy in 1968 showed that there were 1,300 crossover voters in his district alone.

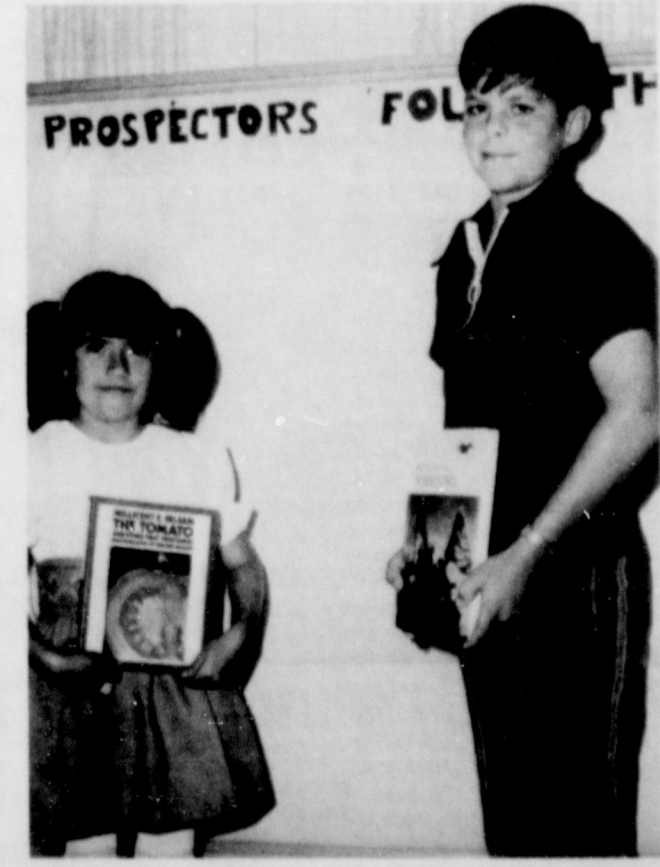
"We hope that public awareness will discourage this type of voting. If we find that it still takes place, we will have no alternative but to pass this information along to the proper prosecuting authorities," Bullock said.

"We want election officials to know that there is a law behind them and they should not permit this practice. This will be the only way we can preserve the integrity of the Texas election process."

Bullock said he wanted the voter to know that it is also against the law for a voter to cast a ballot in two different precincts, even within the same party.

"We know that there were instances of this reported during the May 6 primary. Like crossover voting, this dual voting practice is against the law and simply cannot be tolerated.

"I want the local election officials to hear down and make sure this doesn't happen in the runoff," Bullock said.

This particular one impressed me because I was on the homeward leg of a thousand mile trip during which I had not seen any reckless driving, much less a serious accident.

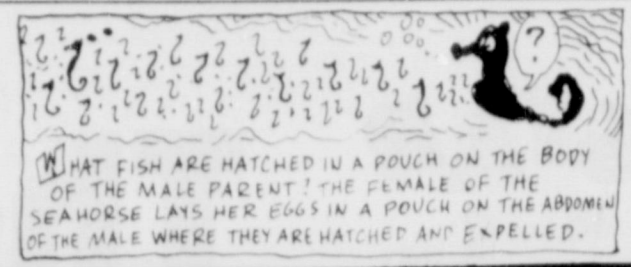
Were other people sacrificing their holiday that I and my family, and countless other families, might enjoy a weekend tour?

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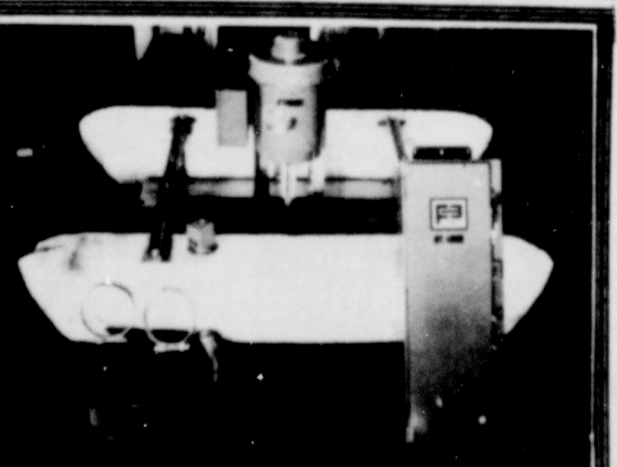

**On The Farm  
In Parmer County**

Herbicides run off from farm land is apparently not a grave threat to the environment, according to studies by Texas Agricultural Experiment Station researchers in the Panhandle.

Dr. Allen Wiese, weed scientist at the USDA Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland, began a study in the spring of 1968 that has shown only minute amounts of herbicides dissolved in irrigation or rain water that ran off fields.

The chemicals used in the study included Treflan, AATrex, and Milogard, all common weed control products. In the first season, the fields received either rainfall or irrigation water four to five times.

The first water samples after herbicide application contained the most chemical, but by fall no herbicides could be detected in the run-off water.

Milogard had the highest concentration in the water, which was less than a fifth of one part per million. The other two substances had much less concentration than the Milogard.

That means that if there was one inch of run-off from 100 acres, only a little more than five pounds of the chemical would be collected, which is well below the danger level in the area's playa lakes.

As a further test, the researchers wanted to determine what would happen to herbicides in playa lake water. Small ponds 20 x 50 feet in size were constructed in a playa bed. Treflan and AATrex were applied at a rate of one pound per acre to the bottom of each pond. In addition, one-half pound of the new brush herbicide Tordon was tested.

The ponds were then flooded with six inches of water and the bottoms were kept covered for two months. Six months later, the ponds were flooded again for one month. The Treflan disappeared from the water and bottom soil at the end of the first flooding period of two months.

The AATrex and Tordon persisted for 90 days, but were no longer present in the soil after 18 months.

When it comes to caring for houseplants, most receive either too much attention or not enough. Mistakes in watering, lighting and fertilizing create the most common problems.

If plants seem to be doing poorly, check your method of watering first. Leaves will drop off whether the plant is receiving too much or too little water. Most plants should be watered once a week. However, some plants such as cacti need watering only every three or four weeks.

When watering, completely saturate the soil. After a week, check the soil every few days. When it feels almost dry and crumbles easily between the fingers, it's time to water again.

Lighting is another critical item as far as the progress of houseplants is concerned. Some plants do well only in indirect sunlight. These include Chinese evergreens, Norfolk Island pines, Goldust acauba, rubber plants and most philodendrons. Boston ferns, begonias and aluminum plants do best in medium light (including two or three hours of direct sunlight). However, potted mums, ivies and geraniums like direct sunlight.

Since you are interested in keeping houseplants healthy rather than growing them, fertilizer should be used sparingly. Special houseplant fertilizer should be used.

Houseplants generally prefer the same temperatures as humans but have a liking for high humidity that is usually lacking in air-conditioned or heated homes. Plants such as orchids and ferns must have high humidity.

To increase the humidity around plants, place potted houseplants in a tray filled with gravel or peat moss that is kept wet. Water evaporating from the surface of this material can raise the relative humidity around plants and thereby create a satisfactory growing environment. Care should be taken to keep potted plants on top of the gravel or peat moss since a constantly wet potting soil is highly undesirable.

Is your home safe? Did you realize that ninety-five percent of accidental poisonings occur while children are supposedly under adult supervision?

More than half a million different kinds of medicines, cleaning aids and other household substances tempt children's curiosities and often cause poisoning.

The key to halting these poisonings is a continuing plan of prevention in the home. First, don't store bleach, detergent, drain cleaner or other hazardous substances under the kitchen sink or any other place accessible to small children.

And don't keep bug killers, medicines or other dangerous items next to food.

Paint, insecticide, turpentine, alcohol or other such substances may be mistaken for something to drink when poured into bottles or similar-type containers.

Just because something looks, smells or tastes horrible to you doesn't mean that a child won't eat or drink enough of it to poison him.

A child's sense of smell and taste aren't as developed as an adult's. He can't read or recognize the signs of poison, and just one taste can kill him.

Remember, it's up to you to keep your child safe from poisons.

The Food and Drug Administration is working to prohibit lung disease caused by certain furniture polishes.

After September 13, 1972, manufacturers of certain liquid furniture polishes must package their products in child-proof containers to comply with a new FDA regulation.

The regulations cover liquid furniture polishes that contain at least 10 per cent mineral seal oil, a crude form of mineral oil used to put a shine on furniture. When swallowed by children such polishes can cause lung diseases.

The FDA formulated a test that the packages must pass. First, a sample of children under five years of age must be able to open the package 85 per cent of the time. However, a panel of adults must be able

to open it 90 per cent of the time. Second, the opening of the container must restrict the flow of poison so that only about a half teaspoonful comes out from one shake or squeeze of the opened container.

Children aren't the only ones being poisoned. Adults using pesticides should use them with extreme caution since all pesticides are poisonous.

Spring has come and with it comes man's pests—insects, weeds, rodents and plant diseases. And, farmers, ranchers and homeowners are once again calling on pesticides to eliminate these problems.

Pesticide use increases drastically in the spring. And, since all pesticides are poisonous, extreme caution in their use is essential.

Improper pesticide use may cause more trouble than the toxic nature of the pesticide itself. Observing some simple rules can minimize the hazards involved.

Always read the label completely, even the small print, before beginning and follow the directions for mixing and using the pesticide. If the information on the label includes specific recommendations for safety equipment such as a respirator, by all means use it.

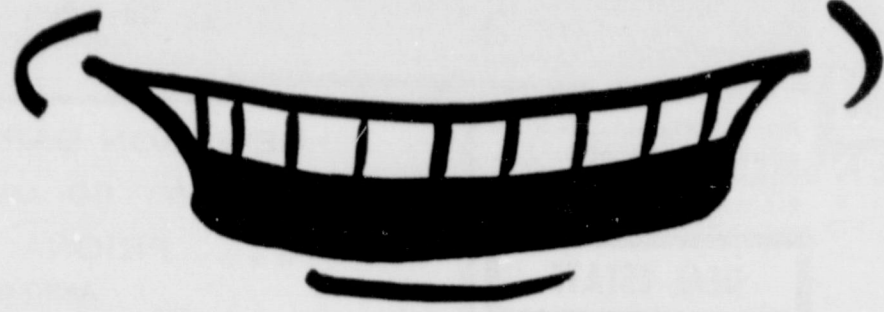
Wear clean, long sleeved clothes. If pesticides are being used for extended periods of time, such as several days, a shower and a change of clothes at the end of each work day are important. Clothing should be laundered after each day's use.

Always change and bathe if pesticides are spilled on the skin or clothing. Studies have shown that you must wash the affected area immediately in order to minimize the chance of poisoning.

Pesticides used on crops and livestock should not be used in or around the home. Also, never eat, drink or smoke when handling or using pesticides.

After a field or area has been treated, re-enter it only after the danger of poisoning has been reduced. Contact with treated plants, surfaces or application equipment can be hazardous.

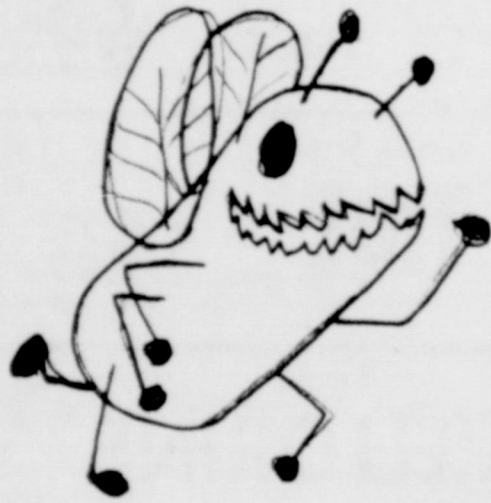

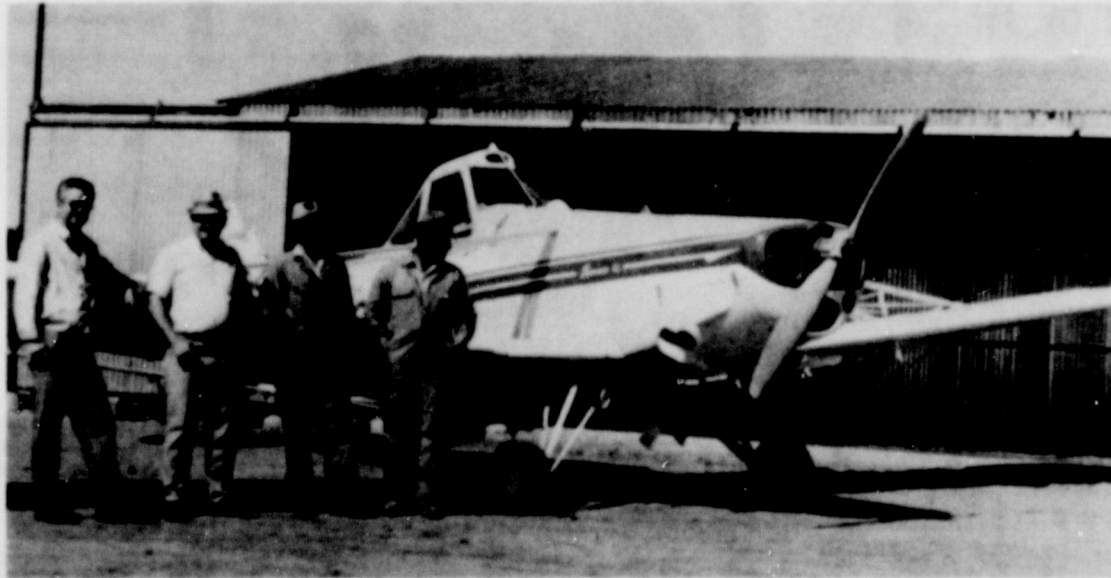

# Era Passes As Welch Sells Tractor

A 1924 model Rumley tractor, which was used to break out many acres of former XII Ranchland in Parmer County, was sold this week to a Dimmitt man who plans to restore the tractor and add it to a collection of antiques.

Ray Robertson, who farms near Dimmitt, purchased the tractor from Nelson Welch and the F.N. Welch estate.

The selling of the tractor closed out a page of history for the Welch family. F.N. Welch was a pioneer machinery dealer in Friona, and was dealer for the Rumley line, as well as John Deere equipment. The tractor which was sold this week was the last remaining vestige of the early-day line of equipment which was sold and used locally.

"We had six of the tractors originally," Welch related. One other tractor had been purchased by a collector. Two of the Rumleys were purchased by a farmer from Baird, Texas about 15 years ago, who intended to continue to farm with the machines.

The oldest of the group had been junked out during World War II when scrap iron was badly needed for wartime purposes.

The huge tractor, which weighs in excess of 21,000 pounds, uses kerosene for its fuel. It is about eight feet tall. A piston for the machine weighs 75 pounds.

A number on the tractor indicates that it was the 48th machine of its kind produced by the Rumley Company. Welch said that one of the other tractors the family had owned was the 24th ever produced.

Welch recalls that the Rumley could plow up to a quarter of a section in a day's time. His father had the six tractors at one time, which were instrumental in farming 6,000 to 8,000 acres of wheat per day in the late 1920s and 1930s in Parmer County.

Welch's father was a machinery dealer in Friona for about ten years beginning in 1926.

A storehouse on the Welch place has housed equipment parts for the ancient tractor,

many of them never used, and kept intact for over 25 years. It appeared that Robertson would be able to get the tractor back in running order without much difficulty. He also plans to paint the machine its original dark green.

Welch says he personally has put in a lot of hours driving the old Rumley tractors, even before he started to school. "We did a lot of threshing for other people, pulling the threshers with the Rumleys," he says.

The longtime Friona resident says he remembers one time when all six of the tractors pitched in at once when all the plowing had been done except for a half-section at the home place. They did the job in about seven hours, as he recalls.

The giant Rumley tractors would pull from two to four ten-foot plows, so that one could cover as much as a 40-foot swath at one time. They were economical, too. "I remember we used to cover four acres on a gallon of distillate-- and the fuel cost only two and one-half to three cents per gallon. Our new equipment may be more convenient, but they can't equal that for economy," Welch says.

Back in the late 1920s, the Capitol Land Syndicate was selling a lot of land in the Friona area, from the old XII Ranch. The syndicate people made a habit of bringing their prospective buyers out to the Welch place, to show them their farming operations. So, a lot of people were able to see the old tractors at work.

Robertson, whose farm borders the city of Dimmitt on the southeast, says he has only recently become interested in antiques. He owns an antique Model T Ford, two Edsel automobiles, plus old threshers and binders.

Robertson and a pair of companions loaded the 48-year-old tractor onto a flatbed truck Tuesday and the old warrior left its Parmer County home after covering many an acre.

"It was sort of like parting with a member of the family," Welch said.

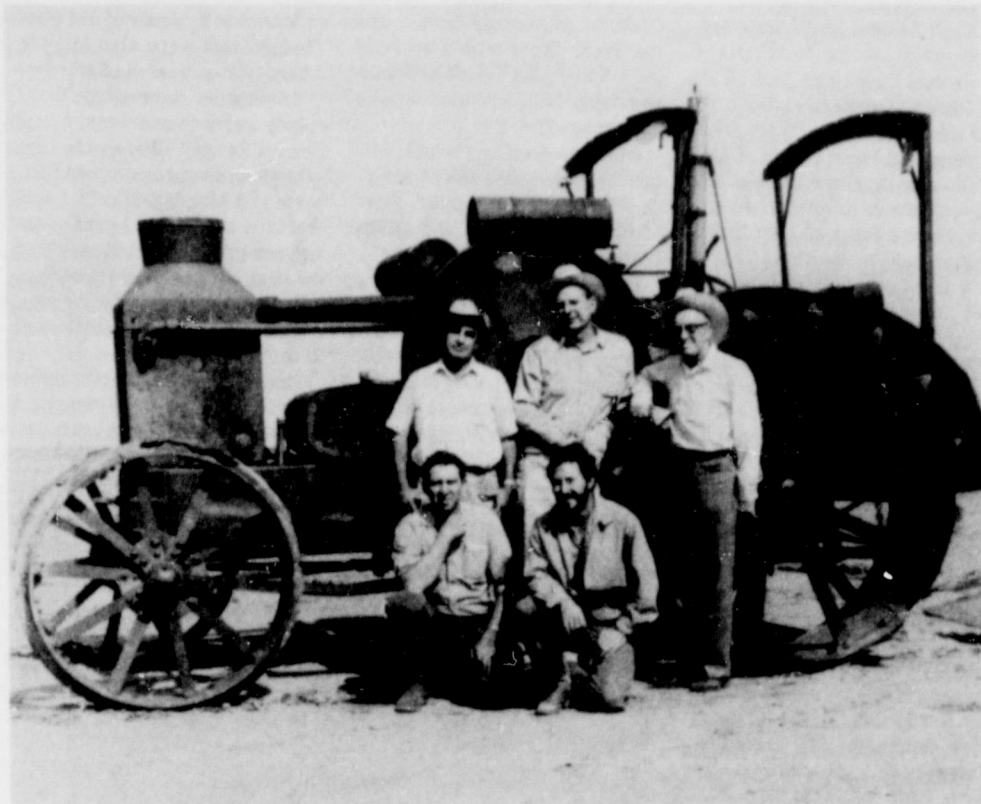
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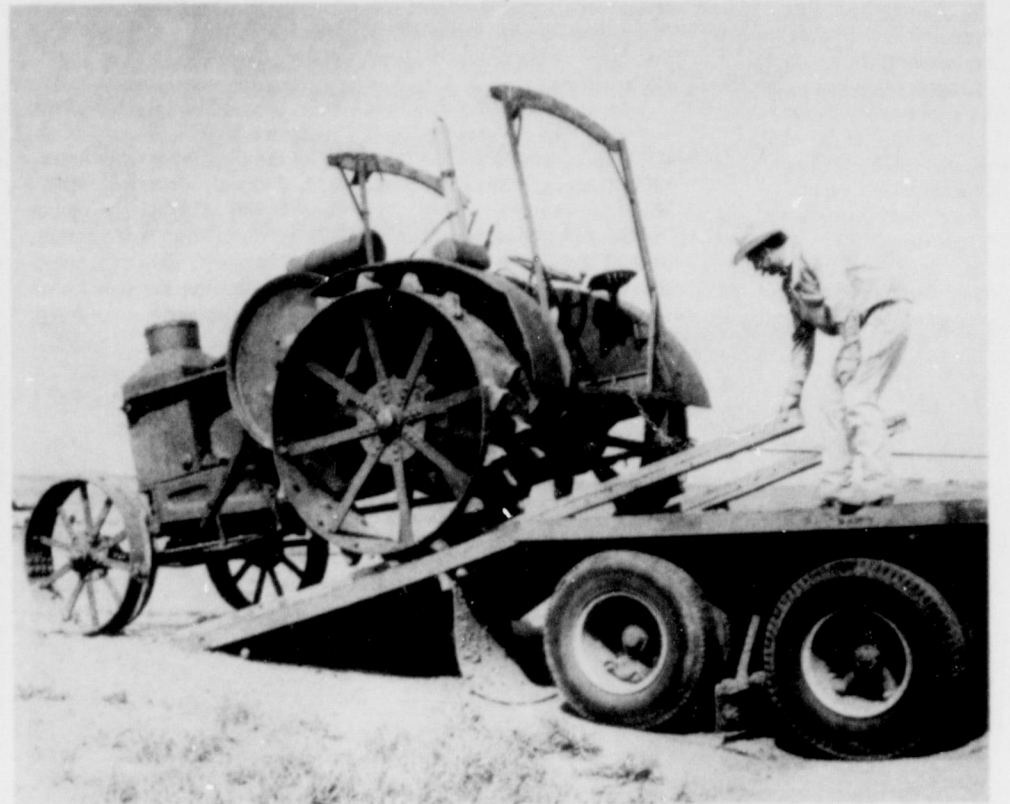

# Farmers need a friend in Austin

*Have a land use management program for Texas as recommended by the state farm and ranch organizations and other friends of agriculture.*

*Promote research to help rural areas.*

*Make sure that there is ample health services in rural areas.*

*Provide for better rural schools through a fairer tax system.*

*Continue to fight against over control of rural business as I did when I voted against the trailer brake bill.*

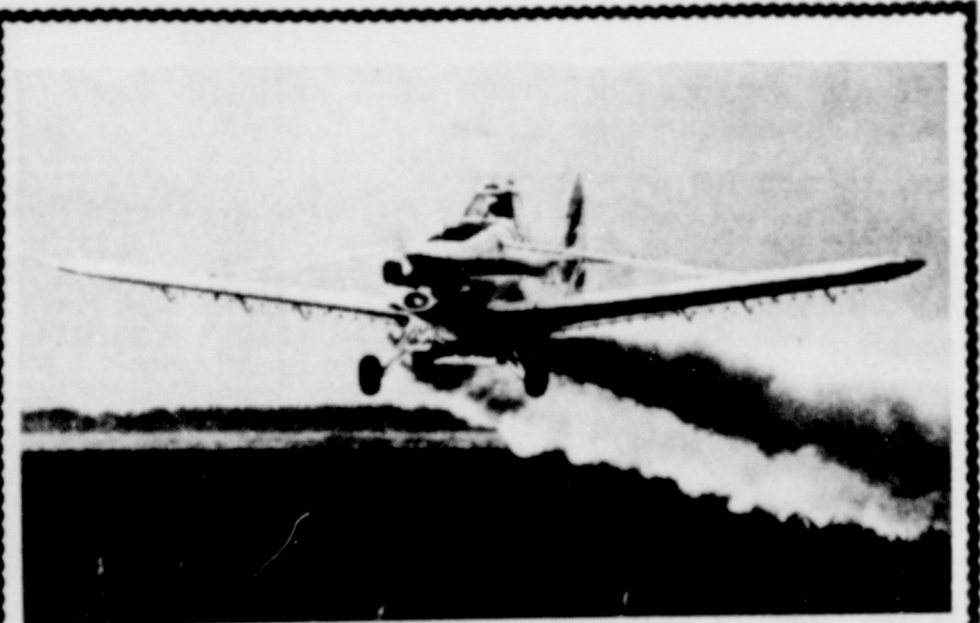

Black returned to Friona earlier this year after serving a tour of duty with the United States Armed Forces, which ended with duty in Vietnam.

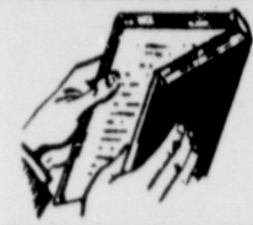
### Club Installs New Officers

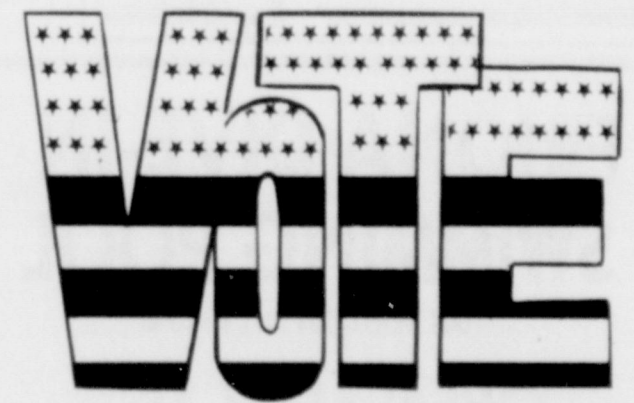

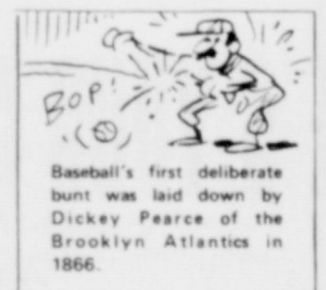
Mrs. Stanberry is a 1969 graduate of Friona High School and has lived in Phoenix three years.
