Largest Single Item in The Fund For Interest on The Public Debt.

Estimates for independent agencies include: Federal trade commission \$94,500; interstate commerce commission \$4,955,240; housing corporation \$1,247,000; labor board \$398,650; alien service custodian \$398,450; civil service commission \$555,595; and employee compensation commission and compensation fund \$2,798,000...

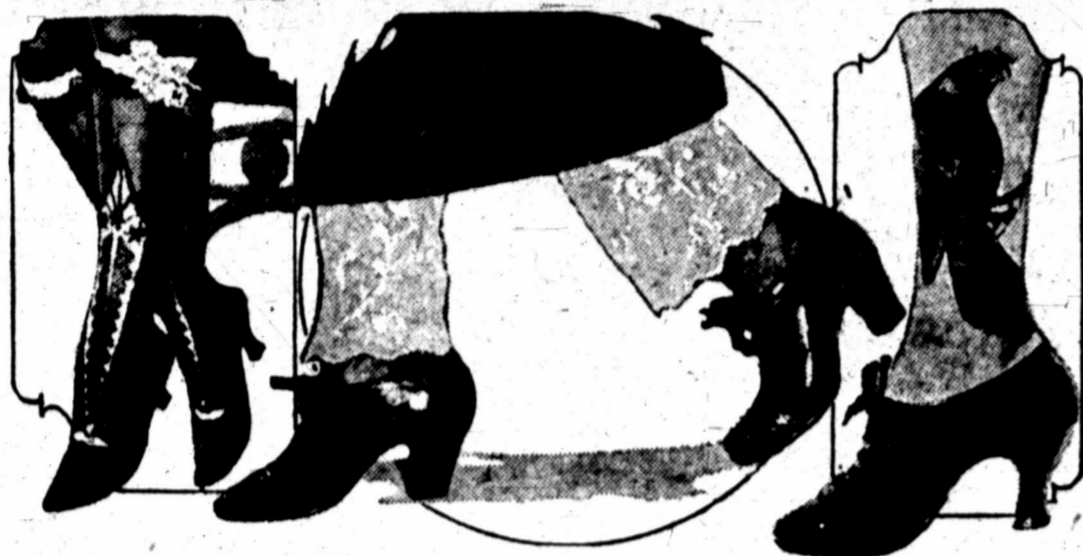

DAINTY CHRISTMAS CAKES

Every hostess wants something a bit special for tea during the holiday days. Tea and toast and fancy Christmas cakes surely add much to the hospitality offered to the chance visitor.

In many families there are recipes that have been handed down from mother to daughter for these little cakes and the baking of tea cakes was as serious a proceeding as the fruit cake itself.

These rules are all revised for up-to-date use, but the cakes have unusual charm and delectability.

Drop Plum Cakes.
Three eggs, two cups brown sugar, two-thirds cup butter, four cups flour, one-half cup sweet milk, one teaspoon soda, one teaspoon baking powder, one cup seeded and chopped raisins, one-fourth cup shredded citron, one teaspoon cinnamon, one-half teaspoon cloves, one-half teaspoon allspice, one teaspoon nutmeg, one-half teaspoon salt.

Cream, butter and sugar. Mix and sift flour, salt, baking powder and soda. Beat eggs with milk. Add dry and liquid ingredients alternately to first mixture. Add spices and fruit and mix thoroughly. Drop from the tip of the spoon onto a buttered and floured baking sheet. Bake in a hot oven.

Aunt Thankful's Seed Cakes.
Three-fourths cup butter, one and one-half cups sugar, three eggs, one-half teaspoon cinnamon, one-half teaspoon nutmeg, two table-spoons caraway seed, three cups flour, one-half teaspoon soda, one-fourth cup boiling water, one-fourth teaspoon salt, four table-spoons milk.

Cream butter. Add sugar and spices. Beat eggs well and beat in gradually to the first mixture. Add the flour and salt. Add soda dissolved in boiling water and milk. If necessary, to make the right consistency, to drop from the spoon. Drop from a teaspoon onto buttered paper and bake in a moderate oven.

FIVE DIE IN MYSTERY HOUSE

LONDON, Dec. 5.—The house of death! Under that name a lonely, abandoned house is known to every resident of the Strandham district. But they all remember when the "house of death" was the home of a gay family, bright and cheerful, like any other London home. That was before. A young son of the family secured a military aviator's commission in 1917. Before leaving for the Flanders front, he flew home. His leave over, the young birdman started away. He rose 500 feet in the air. Then trouble developed. The plane, a mass of flames, dropped directly in front of the house. In the sight of his frenzied parents he burned to death. The family moved away. Finally another family moved in. It consisted of Ernest Coates, 47, his 43-year-old wife and her two children, by a previous marriage—a son, 25, and daughter, 23. Neighbors saw little of the newcomers. Finally they ceased altogether to see them. The police forced their way into the house. They found the whole family dead in their beds! On their living room table were empty champagne bottles, relics of a feast. In them were traces of cyanide of potassium. Officials say Coates had poisoned himself and the entire family. He started a robbery, the police say, because of misappropriation of funds. And he knew the family might perish if his support were withdrawn.

STEAL BAKERY SAFE, LOOT ITS CONTENTS, CHECKS RECOVERED

Police were continuing a search Monday for thieves who some time Saturday night forced an entrance to the Natlager bakery, 1907 Travis street, carried away the company safe containing approximately \$500 in cash and checks, and abandoned it after rifling the money drawers of their contents. The safe was found Sunday afternoon, the door broken off, near the county farm. A boy scout appeared at the police station Monday morning with a leather money bag containing checks totalling \$200, these having been found, he said, several miles from town on the Holliday road.
