

Christmas is coming when we grow tolerant; when our wasting jealousies are woven into love and helpfulness.



When every man is at his best every day in the year and not just one day in the year, when we LIVE as Christ taught us to live, then will Christmas come.






Christmas is coming when frail human moths are no longer lured to flutter about false lights and drop at last burned and bruised, on the cold, gray stones of dissipation.

When every man is at his best every day in the year and not just one day in the year, when we LIVE as Christ taught us to live, then will Christmas come.









MAKING CHRISTMAS FIREPROOF.

These instructions begin with the setting up of the Christmas tree and we quote them as follows:

"In the first place the tree should be set up seurely so that it will not easily topple over, and it should be located several feet away from any heating or lighting fixture. Metal tinsel with flake asbestes and powdered mica make excellent materials for snow effects and will not burn. Cotton and paper, on the other hand, are highly dangerous. The tree should never be illuminated with candles. There is some danger from the widely sold colored electric light assemblies due to insufficient insulation and other causes, but the hazard is small beside that of the lighted candle.

"On one recent occasion a woman living in a New York apartment climbed upon a chair to light the candles on a large Christmas tree in order to entertain her little daughter and a neighbor's child. While reaching for a candle at the top of the tree, she accidentally touched her lighted match to a colpred paper chain, which blazed up and ignited other decorations. The woman tried to snatch some of the burning papers off the branches, but lost her balance and fell against the tree, pushing it over on the floor. When she regained her feet her dress was on fire and she ran, screaming, out into the hall of the apartment house, fanning the flames until she uccumbed to the flames,

"An extremely hazardous plaything of comparatively recent development is the home motion-picture projector using celluloid film and often illuminated with a flimby calcium carbide lamp. It would be difficult to place a more dangerous combination in the hands of children.

"If the call for Santa Claus is a crying need that will accept no substitute, the impersonator should avoid long cotton 'whiskers' and should keep away from lights and open fires. As an additional protection, the costume used may be partially fireproofed with the following solution: Two ounces of carbonate of soda; two ounces of ammonia carbonate; two ounces of boric acid and five gallons of water. The mixture should be allowed to come to a boil and should then be strained and sprayed upon be a season of unmixed cheer and happiness, is the material to be protected. "All the precautions that have been mentioned for the home should be strictly observed at public celebrations and, in addition, thought should be given to the matter of clear and adequate exits in case of fire. The hall or room selected for the occasion should be upon the ground floor and should be ample to accommodate the expected audience, without

"In the department stores and other shops which are dangerously crowded during the holiday season, it is especially important that Christmas decorations of an inflammable nature should be avoided and that all temporary wiring for electric lighting or power should be installed by expert electricians and inspected by the underwriters. All circuits should be properly fused and should not be overloaded. The greatest care should be exercised to prevent incandescent lamps from coming into contact with either natural or artificial leaves, paper ofnaments and streamers or other inflammable materials. Paper shades should never be used. This is true of window decorations as well as of those inside the store.

"Accumulations of holiday packing materials hold dangerous fire possibilities, and all scraps should be removed twice a day. 


