### MORE DRASTIC PENALTIES FOR BOOTLEGGERS.

Any man who drinks the bootleg whiskey that is being sold in Texas, takes his life in his hands. The stuff is deadly poison," says David H. Morris, prohibition director for Texas.

Much of the stuff that is labeled "bottled in bond," Mr. Morris says is only the concoction of bootleggers and is dangerous. It is likely either to kill or to make the drinker blind, he warns.

In view of the activities of bootleggers and the poisons they sell, the Houston Post is urging more drastic penalties for them. The Post says:

"The harvest of death from the operations of the bootleggers during the holidays emphasizes anew the serious menace the distiller and vendor of spurions liquors constitute to the communities in which they ply their nefarious business.

"Many of those who are secretly making liquor today know little of the processes for making pure liquor, and the result is the stuff they put out is rank poison. If it does not kill within a few hours, it undermines the health quickly and promotes a whole series of physical disorders and ailments, including blindness and insanity. The crime of the man who distributes poison of this sort is not mitigated in the least by the fact that there are many people eager to buy his wares. Their weakness, incurred perhaps through years of indulgence, does not excuse him in morals, no more than it excuses him in law.

"The menace of the bootlegger is something that nust be met with sterner action by the authorities. Fines may be reasonable for the victims of strong drink caught occasionally with liquor in their possession for their own use, but prison sentences should be meted out to the full limit of the law to those who deliberately concoct and distribute their oisonous wares among their victims, for the sole purpose of making profit.

Fines in the cases of the professional bootleggers and distillers are merely license fees. They can pay them and resume business. The prices they charge are high enough to enable them to pay fines readily.

"Bootlegging is essentially a predatory crime, and s all such crime flourishes in proportion that it is profitable, making bootlegging unprofitable by stiff prison sentences for those engaging in the traffic There's time enough for that, I say, when all his boywill do more to discourage it than anything else. Those who maim and kill with poisonous liquor should be made to pay the penalty for assault or murder."

### WILL PARENTS EVER LEARN

Because people continue to use tallow candles cotton and other inflammable materials the joyous Christmas period every year is saddened by tragic

One of the most heartrending of these accident was reported from Galveston last Sunday. Five children were burned to death in the home of a Galveston citizen. They had been left in a room with a Christmas tree. It is believed that one of the children attempted to light a candle on the tree and that fire caught in the cotton laid at the foot of the tree in imitation of snow. The flames swept up the little fir tree, dry as tinder after having stood for a week, and the five children were burned to death almost in their tracks.

Will parents ever learn the lesson of these tragdies not to endanger the lives of their little ones with tallow candles, inflammable cotton and such materials? Better far to have no Christmas tree than to imperil the lives of children either in the home or at church or school.

### PUBLIC AWAKENING TO TARIFF ISSUE.

John Henry Kirby, representing the Southern Tariff association, told the senate finance committee Monday that the south was waking up on the tariff issue and was no longer following the "old southern politicians any more."

The south is, indeed, awakening to the tariff issue along with the rest of the country. It is seeing how much fake and fraud there is in the tariff and outhern farmers along with farmers in all sections are seeing the folly of being the tail of somebody's tariff kite.






