### FOUR POWER TREATY IS OF TEMPORARY NATURE

Will Yet Take Our Place in the "Brotherhood of States," He Says.

By COL. EDWARD M. HOUSE. (Copyright by Public Ledger Co.) PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 8.—Of the accomplishments of the Washington conference, it may be that history will accord first place to the Root proposals regarding the limitation of the uses of submarines.

The four-power treaty and the reduction of capital battleships are valuable in themselves, though they are of a temporary nature, and not derived from other treaties and agreements in the past which have served their purposes to be later displaced by others of similar character.

If we are to have international peace, we must have an international code of laws; and the Root proposals are a good beginning toward restoring that lost instrument.

One of the indictments which justly may be made against our civilization is that we never have been willing to construct and conform to an international code of laws which was in any way comparable in its moral standard to the code we have constructed and found necessary for personal and intra-state control.

The world has condoned and even applauded acts done in behalf of a state which, if committed by an individual, would have meant public and social ostracism.

But this cannot be done through treaties and agreements among a few nations; it must be done by a code of ethics accepted by all nations.

It is useless to contend that such a code would be broken in time of national distress, and therefore could not be accepted by all nations, or that no nation will agree to surrender any part of its sovereignty.

These assertions are as fallacious as those declaring that individual liberty of action must not be curbed. We do curb individual action wherever it conflicts with the rights of others, and likewise we must accept some restriction of national action when necessary to bring the world under the reign of law and order.

### DECLINE OF \$6.09 IN PER CAPITA IN CIRCULATION 1921

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Per capita circulation of money in the United States declined \$6.09 during the past year, according to a statement issued today by the treasury.

On January 1, 1922, the per capita circulation was \$53.07, based on a total of \$6,775,406,315 and an estimated population of 127,917,000, as compared with a per capita of \$59.17 on January 1, 1921, based on a total of \$4,246,436,118 in circulation and an estimated population of 107,249,000.

The reduction in the amount of money in circulation was accounted for mainly by the decrease of nearly \$1,000,000,000 in federal reserve notes, the total on January 1, 1922, being \$2,445,789,735 in circulation as compared with \$3,445,339,117 on January 1, 1921.

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**BANKING FUND MAY BE USED TO LOWER CITY'S OVERDRAFTS**

**PLAN IS SUBMITTED AT MONDAY NIGHT'S SESSION OF COUNCIL.**

**REFUNDING BONDS IS PLAN SUGGESTED**

**Council Discussed Street and Water Department Improvements This Year.**

A proposal that the city "borrow money from itself" by issuing refunding bonds, buying them with sinking fund money that is available, and use the proceeds to wipe out a substantial portion of the city's floating indebtedness, was presented to the city council Monday night by Mayor Chino, who indicated that further action on the matter would be taken before the close of his administration.

Such a procedure would not increase the tax rate, the mayor pointed out. It is his hope to go out of office with the city's finances in good shape, and the plan discussed Monday night, he believes, is a feasible one.

The city has about \$160,000 which has accumulated in various sinking funds for retirement of outstanding bonds, and this money can be used to buy refunding bonds with which to clear up the floating indebtedness. Under the plan the money cannot be applied directly to any other purposes than those for which the bonds were voted, but there is no restriction on the manner in which it may be invested while lying idle. The mayor's plan proposes that the city shall use it to reduce the overdraft which has accumulated in recent years.

**Water Improvements.** The council also discussed some improvements on the 1922 program, for which the city is authorized to pay. With \$50,000 remaining in the street bond issue it was pointed out that a considerable amount of paving could be done, and the need of paving on Eleventh, Burnett and other streets was discussed.

Another scheduled improvement is at the water plant, where F. N. Watson, water department manager, stated Monday night it will be necessary to enlarge the filtering facilities; last summer, with a daily consumption of 4,000,000 gallons, the filtering facilities were not sufficient. During the 16 months since the city took the water system over, it has made a net profit of \$154,000, which amount will not be adequate for the improvements required, which include some important extensions.

Commissioner Bonner is working on a plan whereby sewer rentals can be used for water extensions, and he expressed the belief Monday night that with the aid of the city would be able to get by on the improvements planned.

**Engineer on Part Time.** A proposition from City Engineer Julian Montgomery that he be employed hereafter on a part time basis, with a salary cut of approximately 50 per cent, was accepted by the council Monday night. It has been under consideration for several weeks. Owing to the fact that the major portion of the city's improvement program has been completed, members of the council believe that the city will not need the full time services of its engineer for a while.

The deputies in the county towns also started work Monday afternoon.

**ALL PATIENTS TO GO TO CALL FIELD AFTER FEBRUARY 1**

Believing that the contract for the erection of the addition to the Wichita General hospital will be let on January 24, the date set when bids are to be received and that work will be begun in a short time afterwards, the county commissioners recommended Monday afternoon that after February 1 all patients be sent to the Call Field institution, which is now under county and city supervision.

**MANY PREMIUMS FOR VERNON POULTRY SHOW**

VERNON, Jan. 10.—No poultry show in the state has offered more special premiums than will the one being staged in Vernon January 12, 13 and 14, according to sentiments voiced by those who have it in charge. The exhibition here will be further reaching and will cover a much wider scope than ever before.

Most of the towns in this section will be represented. Strenuous efforts have been made by the Wilbarger County Poultry association to interest the county school children. A heavy list of exhibits is expected from local fanciers.

The Wilbarger show is being promoted with the end in view of stimulating the poultry industry in this county. Wilbarger conditions, it is said, are practically ideal for raising chickens on a large scale.

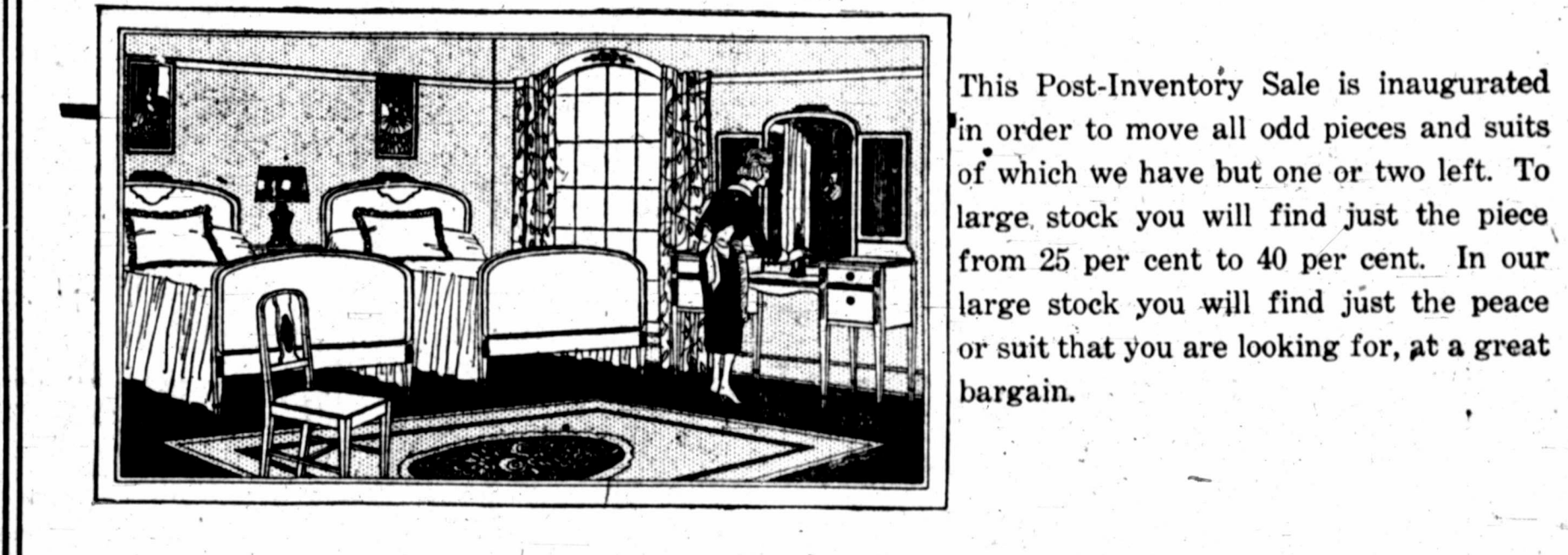

## SEASONS PARTY HONORS MISS BAGGETT MONDAY

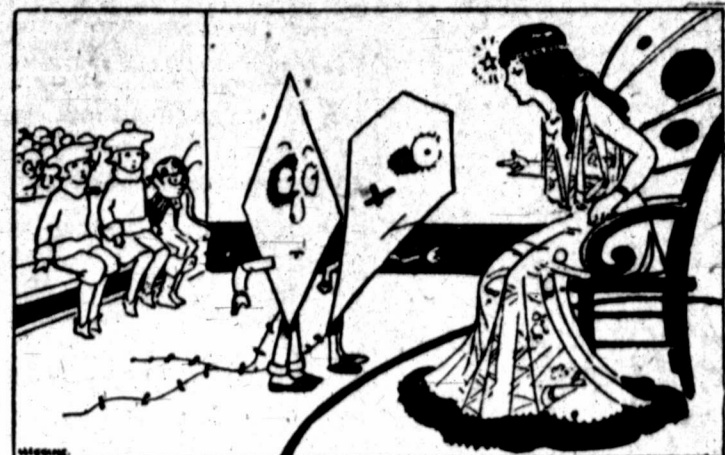

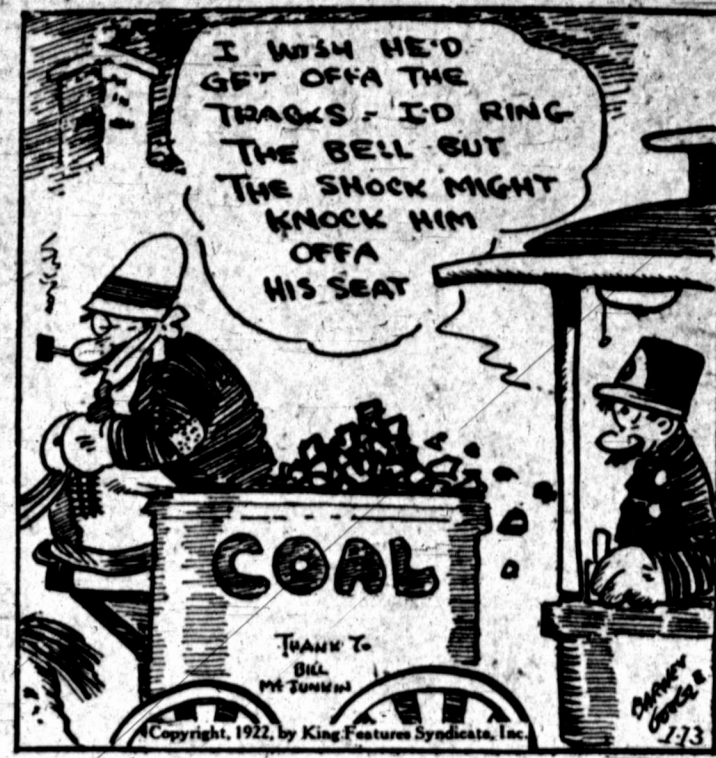

THE modern bootlegger is proving himself a much more dangerous individual than his predecessor in the old days of license. While the former was guilty of a crime against morals and against the law, the quality of the goods he peddled was usually of a higher standard from the standpoint of chemical purity, than the illicit liquor of today, and the consequences of his crime were not so disastrous.

FINES in the cases of the professional bootleggers and distillers are merely license fees. They can pay them and resume business. The prices they charge are high enough to enable them to pay fines readily.

BECAUSE people continue to use tallow candles, cotton and other inflammable materials the joyous Christmas period every year is saddened by tragic accidents.

ONE of the most heartrending of these accidents was reported from Galveston last Sunday. Five children were burned to death in the home of a Galveston citizen. They had been left in a room with a Christmas tree. It is believed that one of the children attempted to light a candle on the tree and that fire caught in the cotton laid at the foot of the tree in imitation of snow.

WILL parents ever learn the lesson of these tragedies not to endanger the lives of their little ones with tallow candles, inflammable cotton and such materials? Better far to have no Christmas tree than to imperil the lives of children either in the home or at church or school.

JOHN Henry Kirby, representing the Southern Tariff association, told the senate finance committee Monday that the south was waking up on the tariff issue and was no longer following the "old southern politicians any more."

THE south is, indeed, awakening to the tariff issue along with the rest of the country. It is seeing how much fake and fraud there is in the tariff and southern farmers along with farmers in all sections are seeing the folly of being the tail of somebody's tariff kite.
