TURN OVER IRISH GOVERNMENT TO THE NEW CABINET

DISABLED VETERANS CHARGE NEGLECT OF MEN IN HOSPITALS

TERM IT BLACK REPROACH ON THE HONOR OF THE NATION.

MEMORIAL PRESENTED TO PRESIDENT HARDING

Charge Gross Neglect, Indifference And Profiteering By State Institutions.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—Asserting that the more than 3,500 mentally disabled former service men now placed in state institutions were victims of such "gross neglect, indifference and profiteering" as constituted a "black reproach on the honor of the nation," the disabled American veterans, of the world war in a memorial presented today to President Harding urged immediate action by the government looking to the treatment of all such cases in federal institutions.

Neglect of these cases in state institutions, the memorial said, is committing to permanent insanity many of the veterans who through treatment probably could be cured.

Describing the condition of "contract" cases in the state of Ohio as typical of those in practically every state, the memorial asserted the government "had turned out the ex-service men of Ohio to state asylums which are notoriously overcrowded, undermanned and inadequately equipped. It has not provided one federal institution for this purpose in the state. For example, the memorial said, although Longview is so overcrowded that 240 of the inmates sleep on the floor like cattle every night.

None of the institutions, it was further asserted, segregate their tubercular patients.

France intimated here last night that he would oppose the entrance of the United States into the four-power treaty with England, France and Japan.

DUBLIN, Jan. 16.—The governmental powers for Ireland as vested in the British authorities at Dublin castle was turned over today to the provisional government of Ireland as constituted last Saturday under the Anglo-Irish treaty.

The transfer was made by Viscount Fitz Alan, the lord lieutenant in the privy council chamber.

From an early hour this morning all approaches to the castle were blocked by good humored crowds watching for what was described as the "fall of Dublin castle."

BEGIN WACO TRIAL OF THREE NEGROES, RANGERS ON GUARD

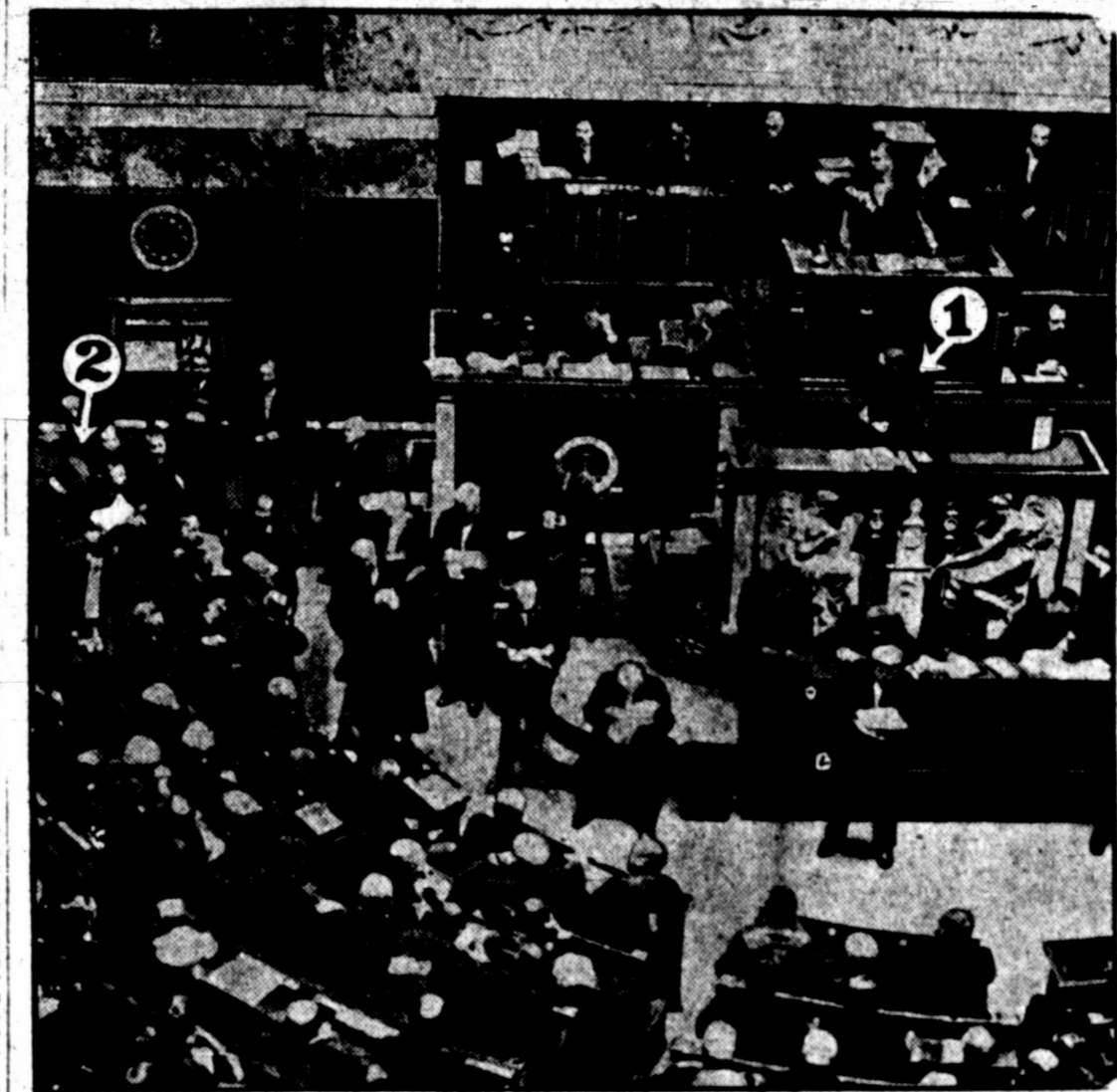
HOOVER RESUMES EFFORT TO SETTLE WAGE CONTROVERSY

GRAND JURY IN PARTIAL REPORT RETURNS 2 BILLS

ONE INDICTMENT AGAINST ALLEGED CHECK ARTIST IS MADE KNOWN.

PARTY NAMED IN OTHER BILL NOT UNDER ARREST

Grand Jury indicated that it would make final report on Wednesday.

Two bills of indictment were returned by the grand jury at 10:30 a. m. Monday morning, in a partial report. One of the bills was returned for publication while the other was withheld as the party named is not under arrest.

M. S. Sauter, alias J. G. Holt, alias J. G. Haskell, was indicted on the charge of forgery and passing a forged instrument. Sauter is now in jail at Teague, Texas, where he is being held pending trial there on a similar charge and on the promise that he would be returned to Wichita county when called for.

Holt was arrested in Okmulgee, Oklahoma, by Deputy Sheriff J. H. Boyd, who trailed him to that city after he had secured the signature, by alleged fraudulent means, of a check on the bank of this county on a check for \$22,500.

The check at that time, it is stated by officers, was deposited at an Iowa Park bank where later Holt secured a cashier's check for \$30,000. This cashier's check was cashed in Wichita Falls and a draft was sent through for the balance.

An investigation made immediately led to the man's arrest. It was indicated by the grand jury that it would make its final report on Wednesday morning. Some of the members expressed themselves in open court that they could conclude the work Monday while the majority favored remaining in session for another day.

THINGS THAT MAKE "A CITY GREAT" IS SERMON SUBJECT

"Except the Lord keep the city, the watchman waketh in vain," was the text of an eloquent sermon Sunday morning by Rev. J. W. Lovins, pastor of the First Baptist church, on the theme "Some Things That Make a City Great."

"Any officer who denies or ignores the fact of God is a detriment and disqualified as a constructive factor in making our city great," said the pastor. "Search the history of the past and you will not find any great nation or city that ignored or disregarded God."

A second element in the real greatness of a city is clean, just government, or administration of law.

The speaker discussed the delays and postponements in court trials as a procedure that hindered rather than helped law enforcement.

"The practitioners of the law are tremendously potent in the matter of making a city great. Let them honor their office and keep it clean; let them stand four-square for the right and always, against the wrong, and they can mightily set forward all that is worth."

Dr. Lovins spoke of the part that the newspapers, the homes, the schools and the churches must play in making a city.

WHAT BECOMES OF CAPTURED BOOZE, PASTOR INQUIRES

Taking Moses' commission to Joshua, as found in Joshua 1:4, as the text Sunday morning, Dr. T. S. Pittenger preached on "Civic Responsibility and Law Enforcement," as requested by state and city authorities and civic bodies.

Commenting upon the text, the pastor said there is not a law in this land but that is founded upon some Mosaic or other Biblical law or commandment, and that if more of these laws were enforced strictly, civilization would be much better and more prosperous than it now is. He stated that there may be some who think that it is the best thing for building this city, but all will agree that a careful building of Christian character will have helpful influence in making it what it should be.

The pastor stated he did not want to criticize justice in this sermon, but was compelled to say some things that might not be pleasing to some people. His sermon followed:

"Any city that does not control its own inhabitants, whether permanent or transient, has failed to do what it should do and Wichita Falls would be a better city if the police officers would enforce the laws as they should be enforced. Mosaic is a bright and shining example of law enforcement and the results of it. For 12 months men have been arrested with stills and booze here and a large amount of this booze has been 'lost' without anyone's paying the penalty. Men have been taken to the city hall with booze and have been free the next morning, but the booze has disappeared, while the streets are carefully marked for parking purposes and traffic regulations are strictly enforced. There ought to be more rigid enforcement of the law regarding traffic, but booze ought not to be confiscated on one side of the tracks and turned loose for bootlegger distribution on the other side of them."

"If 'higher ups' order policemen to 'go slow' in the enforcement of the booze laws, the people of this community ought to get back of the executive officers and prevent a lot of things that are going on here at the present time. An official that ought to know his business recently asked the pastor if it were any use for him to arrest bootleggers when nothing is ever done with them at the city hall. Law enforcement lays the foundation for an invisible organization for enforcing the laws."

"Punishing at law breaking, making jibes at the church and caricaturing the Protestant ministry will not make for better civilization. Things that tend to destroy manhood, break up the home, corrupt morals and make light of modest womanhood are frowned on by the people of Wichita Falls have shown that they do not approve of such things, do not want the things they hold sacred made light of, and do not want to play God. God does not forget insults to Him."

"An immodest dress Wichita Falls

is just keeping pace with other cities, and some women here might well hearken to the advice of the Women's clubs of America, who are fighting this evil."

"In conclusion, let us not forget that honest men in every walk of life, clean men and women, morally and physically, and clean childhood, at work with an idea of building, will make our fair city, what it should become."

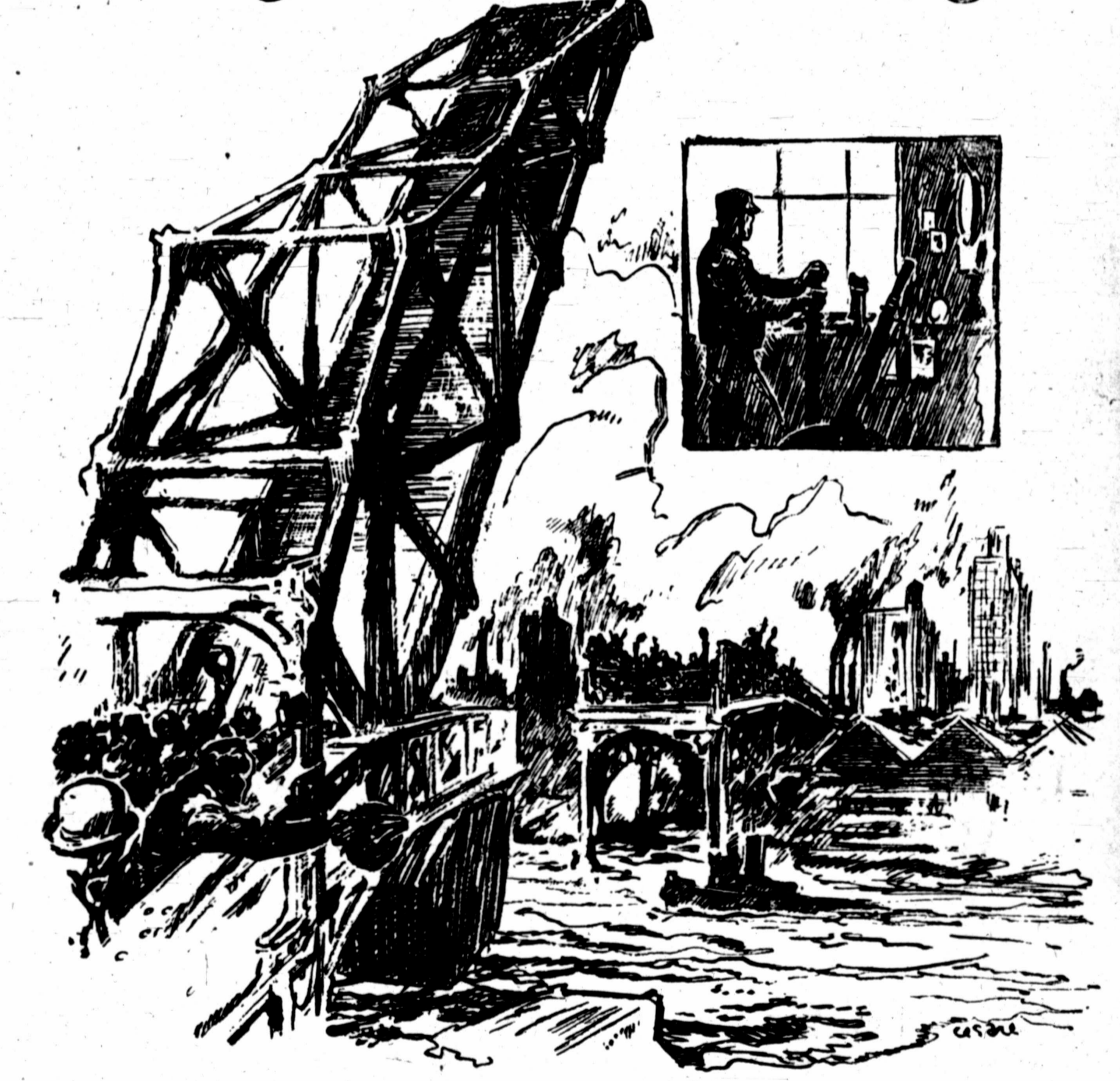

Winter Sport With Wings



A NEW thrill has been added to ski jumping—already one of the most dangerous and sensational of outdoor sports. By the adoption of a new device the jumper can feel for a brief, dizzy moment the sensations of a swooping bird. This principle, whereby the jumper becomes a human airplane, was invented by a Norwegian professional and almost revolutionized the sport last year. It has now been imported where the apple-cheeked girls of America's snowy stretches had already been using sails in their skiing. From present indications it seems likely that they will be equally quick to take up this newest feature of the sport.

This newest device whereby the sport of skiing becomes something of a venture in aeronautics consists of two light planes of the biplane type which are fastened to the body by means of a heavy belt. A hinge arrangement under the arms permits one to hold the plane at any angle desired. When gliding down the slide these wings can be held so as to offer the least resistance to the atmosphere. At the take-off they can be used to obtain a greater lift with the result that this season's jumpers—like the dashing young woman in the Dan Smith drawing—reach dizzy, breath-taking heights.

The planes also enable the jumper to balance, steer safely, make an advantageous landing and a quick recovery of equilibrium.

PUSHING AID ON THE SOUTHERN FARMER.
 The keen faced boys are at it. They are going to help the Southern farmer in spite of himself. If you don't believe it, listen to this. Senator Gooding of Idaho has proposed to the senate finance committee a tariff of five cents a pound on short staple raw cotton.

Senator Gooding, living in Idaho, knows, of course, just what the southern farmer needs. He may know the difference between a boll weevil and a buzzard, and may think a cotton gin is a place where southern moonshine is made. He may not know that about seventy out of every one hundred bales of cotton grown in this country must find a market abroad. He may believe that a tariff on raw cotton would benefit the southern farmer as much as a blitzard at the north pole.
 We can't answer just what is in the mind of the Idaho senator but we'll bet he does know that if a tariff is levied on cotton there will be a tariff on cotton goods with a good compensatory tariff added for whatever rate is levied on raw cotton and that that much will be added to the price the southern farmer will have to pay for his shirt next summer when he bends under the hot sun between the cotton rows.

COMMON SENSE WAYS TO KEEP WELL
STOMACHACHE

Stomachache, like headache, is always a symptom. In young people the chief cause is indigestion in diet. Eating too much starchy food that is often imperfectly digested or eating indigestible food, pastry and concentrated sweets, as candy, causes an excessive flow of gastric juice. The drinking of a large amount of ice water may check digestion.
 Aside from simple indigestion, stomachache may be caused by gallstones colic, ulcers of the stomach, or even cancer, though in many cases of cancer there is no pain. Pain in the large intestines may feel like a stomachache.
 We should often be cautioned to be careful in eating. Form the habit of chewing your food carefully and thoroughly. Never eat immediately following an emotional strain. Anger, fear and worry cause indigestion, chronic constipation and severe attacks of stomachache.
 There are a multitude of ill-effects may inflame our stomach before we get as far as a stomachache. When a stomachache follows a heavy meal it is fairly certain that it is due to indigestion.
 Relief will come when the stomach is emptied of its contents, undigested food and toxins, by forced vomiting.
 Persistent, recurring stomachache that does not yield to simple treatment such as the correction of diet should be carefully investigated by a stomach specialist.
