Remember, we advertised for good weather here in this column last week -- and lo and behold, the weather was the best in a number of years.


It was another fine show, and the cooperation by the weather capped off everything.

.... A lot is being written and said lately about the subject of "no fault" insurance. This type of insurance is being considered for the state of Texas, for automobile owners. With "no fault" insurance, a person's company would pay his losses, without any consideration of who was at fault in the accident.

However, a national insurance expert, David Sargent, argues that "no fault" insurance is not fully meeting public acceptance.

Sargent participated recently in a debate sponsored by the State Bar of Texas on the subject of "no fault" insurance. "Your insurance commissioners here in Texas have estimated that rates would double or triple under 'No-Fault', " commented Sargent, "When you have some of the lowest rates in the nation, why experiment with something totally unproved? Your bodily injury, or fault, rates in Texas have gone down 10 per cent over the last four years. Your property damage rates, which are 'No-Fault' have gone up over 50 per cent in the same period."

Most people only make resolutions on New Year's Day, but the Parmer County Heart Association wants everybody to resolve daily to protect their hearts against heart attack.

The Parmer County Heart Association proposes that all citizens of Friona reduce their risk of heart attack by taking the following steps:

*Eat foods low in saturated fats and cholesterol,

*Control high blood pressure, "Don't smoke cigarettes. •Maintain normal weight, and *Exercise moderately and

regularly. The more risks aperson has,

warns the Heart Association, the greater the chance of suffering a heart attack.

Should heart attack occur, the symptoms may vary, but these are the usual warning signs: *Prolonged, heavy pressure

or squeezing pain in the center of the chest, behind the breastbone.

*Pain may spread to the shoulder, arm, neck or jaw.

*Pain or discomfort is often accompanied by sweating. Nausea, vomiting and shortness of breath may also occur.

The decision to obtain help should not be left to the patient alone, but is also the responsibility of his family or friends.

The need to act promptly when symptoms occur is urgent, save the Heart Association, since most of the 674,000 annual heart attack deaths occur outside the hospital before the victim receives medical treatment.

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Out of the many very wonderful experiences that I had in England, one that stands out very prominently was my visit to Westminster Abbey

I have mentioned before, some of my excitement at looking at the burial markers of some of the world's greatest in all areas of culture and achievement.

There were some who stood out in my own memory with historical significance (my history Prof probably never thought I retained it) especially in the areas of literature, government and religion.

It was on one of my trips through the Abbey that I noticed a marker that I had not seen before and the word inscribed is worth sharing with you.

You remember the missionary to Africa who spent his life in the midst of the deceased and dealt with the social ills of a continent that had remained almost as dark as its skin pigmentation, in a cultural and intellectual sort of way?

The man was David Livingston and his healing word and patient concern went a long way toward the answer that in some respect, is still needed in that area of the world. And ours? But his was a beginning and it was a glorious beginning.

His last words are inscribed on his marker and read; "All I can add in my solltude, is, may heaven's blessings come down on every one, American, English or Turk who will help to heal this open sore of the world."

"And whosoever shall compel thee to go a mile, go with him twain." St. Matthew, 5:41.

These New Testament words came to mind as President Nixon's plane rolled to a stop at Peking's Airport.

There comes a time in the life of a nation or a person when the highest and mightiest have the responsibility of making the first move toward establishing understanding.

Undeniably our President has, to some extent, humbled himself and his fellow citizens by making this trip.

But what's wrong with humility?

Does not the Christianity we have spent years attempting to mpose upon Oriental thinking teach that "the meek shall inherit the earth ?"

Mr. Nixon did not go hat in hand as a vanquished foe nor as one begging favors from the Chinese.

His toast to the heads of state, while not belligerent, was a forthright statement of past and present conditions, tempered with an honest plea for cooperation in achieving world peace. We in our western civilization must understand something

of the Oriental's philosophy if we are to comprehend our President's willingness to take this initial step toward lessening friction between nations

Whereas we are taught from Holy Writ the beauty and value of compassionate action the Oriental is brought up to "save face," everything else is secondary.

Whatever the outcome of Mr. Nixon's trip, and it will be a long time before the final results are known, he must be given credit for taking the first step which in this writer's opinion is a far more important step than that taken by the first men on the moon.

. . . . Other symbolic occurrences associated with the plane's landing must be remembered.

It could have been a war plane treacherously laden with atomic bombs.

Thankfully it landed smoothly; more like a dove of peace than a war eagle.

The words and figures emblazoned alongside the cockpit meant nothing to the ranks of Chinese soldiers forming the honor guard, but to the better educated the legend, "Spirit of 1776," may have been a reminder that the United States is not now, nor has it ever been, a "paper tiger."

Only the most learned of those in the reception committee could have caught the significance of the President's arriving on the weekend of George Washington's birthday!

The most cheerful optimist or the most fervent patriot among us will not assume that a twenty year old cold war will be thawed by the smiles of two so vastly different diplomats.

There are too many bitter memories of Chinese aid to the North Viets.

Mao's Little Red Book is still being waved aloft by too many young people who have been born into Communist slavery. These are just a few of the reasons for respecting our President's willingness to humble in the cause of "peace on earth, good will toward men" for which our Savior was crucified. After all several other Presidents before Nixon had the same opportunity!

When a crop is ready to harvest and ship, time is of the essence, and the breakdown of shipping facilities can be ruinous. If transport is not available, delivery can't be made on time,



It is not right that thousands of farmers, who have no opportunity to be a part of the negotiations, should have to suffer from the actions of labor groups and go bankrupt because their markets are closed,"



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need .- the man -- his action -- the response of the world and the situation today. ... or look at any portion of the world with its needs and "open sores" festering to revolt, revolution and large amounts of distrust.

We still have need of the "rich blessings of heaven to come down on everyone" directing us into various avenues of concern.

You have probably shared with me this week in praver and gratitude, the trip of the President to China, I think of this as being one of the "open sores" of our world. Undoubtedly all kinds of political assertions and denials will be directed toward the effort but world peace is worthy of any effort -regardless of the political party one might favor.

May "heaven's rich blessings come down on the effort." Of course I could mention other "open sores" that are worthy of God's attention -- they all are -- but this is a special week for us because of the current events.

Gee, if I keep this line of thought up you will suspect that there is a note of preaching mixed in somewhere .- and you would be right.

But just how do we mix into all of this? Well, I have the feeling that the many great gifts of God are somehow, man directed, and we then deal with them in ways we think are right -- (7) -- no, not really. Rather, we deal with them in ways that we want to, right or not.

That isn't really a very pretty picture, is it? But I do think it is realistic and since we are in Lent and are making our spiritual preparations for Easter, we do need to examine ourselves and see just how we stand in God's presence. (Understand of course, spiritual preparations for the acceptance of the truth revealed at Easter is a year-round growth but we do emphasize it a little heavy as the church year lends itself to such an environment.)

There is a current youth program I know about entitled, RAPITOUT .- which is RAP IT OUT, meaning "let's talk it over." It deals with the understanding and concern about the Christian Faith and its place in life. It becomes very personal as they seek to deal with the situation in a very personal way.

And that's my word to you. It needs to be a personal relationship and we need to do some "rapping" with God and I somehow see all of this related -- even to and especially for my desire that "heaven's blessings come down on you" --I hate to conclude on this note but I sometimes feel that we -you and me .- may be some of the "open sores" God wants to heal .-. You think so?


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

What Does The Bible Say?

there criteria Are which the church of the New lestament may be distinguished from religious orders in general?

There are many things which distinguish the New lestament church from religious orders in general. One such criterion is the place of its beginning. Isaiah (2:2-4) says that "the word of the Lord shall go forth from Jerusalem." Luke 24:47 says that "repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his (Jesus') name among all nations beginning at Jerusalem." Jesus commanded the apostles not to "depart from Jerusalem, but wait for the promise of the Father" (Acts 1:4). 



Secretary of State Bob Bul lock said today that despite some newspaper articles and radio bulletins to the contrary, voter registration did not end on January 31.




can register any time during the year. However, persons must register at least 30 days prior to an election, to be able to vote in that election."
