"BLOOD CLOT ON THE BRAIN OF BODY POLITIC," HE DECLARES.

STATEMENT STARTLES CAPITAL POLITICIANS

Ford's Paper Follows With "Cheap Gold" Cry and Bryan Campaign Possible.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 17.—On a recent day in this town there were two signs of the times. In the morning at our homes, a good many of us received through the mails a pamphlet whose vivid cover shrieked out the subject, "Common Sense, or the Clot on the Brain of the Body Politic," by the author of "Coin's Financial School," and then, a few hours later, at the morning news, we found the SULLIVAN newsguy selling Ford's weekly paper, the Dearborn Independent, the cover of which he thought would read "Cheap Gold, the Money-Mystery."

Mr. Ford and his ideas are recent and familiar, but who now remembers the author and propagandist of the other pamphlet? To those whose memories are long enough it recalls the early Bryan days, when heaven only knows how many copies of "Coin's Financial School" flooded the farms and the question-and-answer form in which its catechism on money was phrased provided the substance for thousands of debates in country school houses and millions of oracular declamations from the cracker barrels of cross road stores. Looked at from the distance, it has the glamour of romance, the echo of vivid and stirring days. Probably most of us had thought that the author was the christened William H. Harvey, but came to be called "Coin" Harvey, the name of the "Coinless Jerry" Simpson, Mary Ellen Lease, Carrie Nation, the bewhiskered Peffer and all those other whose possessions contributed the picture-essay drama of the day's news to those peaceful days in the '90s before even that bush-league war we had with Spain was dreamed of. And now "Coin" Harvey turns up still in the flesh, living at Monte Ne, Benton county, Arkansas; and once more some crisscrossing instinct tells him that again the time has come for him.

I don't know what it portends; but a good many of the persons who know most within the field of financial theories, coinage and the like laughed at the suggestion that it means anything. When we first went into the war and began financial operations attending it, plenty of persons expected that we were in for thorough going inflation all the way up to the dizzy top, and that in the reaction, we should have to face all the chaos that attends such a course and the horrors that arise out of the combat. But we didn't let our inflation go on to the wider heights. We began to check it in the summer of 1919 and the body thought we were saved from the consequences of a monetary jamboree.

Another sign to "Battle Coming" Who could have foretold that an administration in power with an electric "think" in a few months would have the courage to be in contention with all its pains and unpopularity. This and other aspects of the management of our great war finance are the subject of President Wilson and Secretaries Glass and Houston constituted one of the finest examples of intellectual integrity and courage in our history. It is chiefly this we shall have to thank if we get through without a serious contest with financial heresies. Most persons think we will escape, but who can be sure that what is going on in several of the countries of Europe will leave us completely immune? There is no likelihood of its affecting our governmental or business practices, but can we be sure it will not infect the minds of the dreamers, the enthusiasts and the fanatics? Can we be sure we will not have a political campaign with something like the battle of "18 to 1" fought over again?

There is no denying the alluring, seductive quality of monetary heresies to mind and heart. It is clear thinking or otherwise touched with inexactness. Probably the answer lies where most answers lie in the question of whether a leader shall appear. If anyone should turn up with the picturesque and magnetic personality that Bryan had in those early days, and with an ambition to be president of the United States we might well have 96 and some variation of "sixteen to one" all over again. Henry Ford is a very different personality from William Jennings Bryan, and yet, he has the same characteristic of being led on by instinct and dominated by inspiration from within himself.

Furthermore, while he has none of that richly flowing magnetism that made Bryan so fascinating to multitudes of people, there is nevertheless, no denying that nearly

FACTORY HAND BY CHOICE SAYS HEIR TO THE DODGE MILLIONS

DETROIT, Feb. 17.—Found—the most remarkable multimillionaire in the world! He is Horace Elgin Dodge, 24-year-old heir to a large interest in the Dodge Brothers Motor company here. Dodge is remarkable because he doesn't follow any of the rules movie producers have laid down for young millionaires. It doesn't spend the afternoon looking out of the windows of an exclusive club. Or the evening at the latest musical comedy. He doesn't "laugh his way through life," as the sub-title writers put it. Up Every Day at 6. Instead he's up every morning at 6. And at work by 7. And he spends the day toiling at a machine as a common worker in the motor plant his father founded.

That's not because a stern parent is keeping the young man busy to keep him out of mischief. His heir Dodge died recently. His heir's hard work is self-imposed. After his graduation from military academy and a course in college Dodge married Miss Virginia Knowlson, Detroit society girl, last June. As they left for Europe on a honeymoon Dodge announced that on his return he'd start in as a laborer in the Dodge factory to learn the auto business from the bottom up.

When he came back in October he made good on his promise. He's been working ever since. Every morning Dodge's alarm clock rings at 6. He gets a hasty breakfast at his residence in Grosse Pointe, exclusive Detroit suburb. He jumps into his touring car and hurries to the automobile plant—7 1/2 miles because the plant opens at 7 a. m. He punches a time clock at the employe's entrance of the wood and metal pattern department.

He puts on a workman's rough apron. They wear aprons instead of overalls in his department. Then he works until the whistle blows for lunch. He lunches in the plant cafeteria. Pats in Fall Days. When the 45-minute lunch period is over, he goes back to his machine everything he does from day to day catches the imaginations of thousands, who come to think of him as a man who makes automobiles cheaper than anybody else, who is raising his wages when others are reducing them, who buys a broken-down railroad and makes it go when others have failed, who provides the extraordinary and unprecedented spectacle of the interstate commerce commission refusing his application to reduce freight rates, an application made at a time when other roads are striving to maintain their rates against public clamor for reduction, who promises the farmer cheaper fertilizer than he ever had before, and whose every action in the public view manages to convey the sinister hint that he is the superman, who, if he but had the power could manage the world as he manages the Ford factory and bring about the economic millennium of lower prices for the product and bigger wages for the worker.

ARBUCKLE DEFENDS REPUTATION OF THE LATE MOVIE VICTIM

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 17.—The American public is ardent in its hero worship and quite as ruthless in destroying its idols in any walk of life. "It elevates a man more quickly than any nation in the world, and casts him down as ruthlessly and quite often on surmise of a mere hunch. This latter disposition, so curiously at variance with the American tradition and ideal of justice, is just now being driven home particularly to the motion picture people of Los Angeles on the head of Billy Taylor's mysterious murder."

Such was the comment today of Roscoe Fatty Arbuckle on one afternoon with the head of the picture director's association in his home here on the night of February 1. He was deploring certain inhumanities cast upon William Desmond Taylor, his life and his relationship with women screen stars. Arbuckle had just returned to Los Angeles from a tour of duty in deal in connection with the death of Virginia Rappe in San Francisco.

"It is the general inclination, when trouble happens to strike in film circles, for the thoughtless to whisper, malign and gossip and speak with such poor decency of the times of the 'inside dope' and 'the low down,'" Arbuckle continued. "This was brought out quite forcibly in my own case and has been accentuated in the case of William Desmond Taylor. 'That I will acquit myself I am quite sure, but poor Billy is here to defend himself from speculations which have no basis in fact. 'Taylor lived as he died—a square-shouldered, absolutely level with his fellow beings, charitable and kind. His death removed from the motion picture industry one of its outstanding sterling characters. To this hundreds who knew him best testify. 'I'll never sit at an executive desk until I've learned all mechanical operations by actual contact. Thus far they've only let me work on a few machines, because my boss is afraid I might get hurt. 'My father could run any machine in this plant as well as any workman. When Dodge has learned all the can about the wood and metal pattern department, he'll move on to another department. For the present the young millionaire, 'boss' is K. C. Babo, head of the pattern department. Babo occasionally has to 'bawl out' the millionaire workman—but only because of the young man's desire to work on machines that are forbidden to him, to do more than his allotted share. 'In point of efficiency and promptness Dodge is the best workman in the department, Babo testifies. 'He's got the right stuff in him—there's no denying that,' Babo says. 'The patterns he's turned out are unusually good. 'Consistent, too. 'And he's one of the most conscientious workmen in my department. He won't even lay off when he's ill—he once even disobeyed his doctor's orders to get to work! 'Dodge draws paychecks regularly. He says he's going to have the first one framed. 'The hardest job of all is rolling out of bed in the morning,' Dodge smiles. 'My plan is to do it somehow. 'I've found my life work. It'll take a lifetime to master everything, there's no doubt about this plant. You know it covers 100 acres of floor space. 'I'm beginning to look on my work as play nowadays and I have lots more fun than I would if I tried to pull through life doing nothing.'"

"Never in history, perhaps, have men and women been so quickly elevated to prominence as have the successful folk in pictures. That is because of the millions before whom they appear on the screen almost nightly. Their names become household words. Their features widely familiar. They are virtually next door neighbors to everyone in the land. 'The man and woman who thus accept as worthy of esteem this fitful and neighbor should do himself or herself the moral honor of refusing to accept tattle and shoulder-shrugs in place of fact—as he undoubtedly would in the case of his respected physical neighbor.'"

STRONGER "BLOC" PURPOSE OF LABOR FARMER MEETING

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—The election to Congress this fall of senators and representatives sympathetic to the needs and demands of agriculture and labor—not the organization of a third party movement—is the end sought by the "progressive" conference to be held in Chicago, Feb. 20. That a third party movement ultimately may grow out of the situation developed by the Chicago conference is recognized as possible. But that is wholly a secondary consideration. "We need quick action. We want results at the election this fall," declares William H. Johnston, president of the International Machinists union, chairman of the committee issuing the call. "That means we have to make use of those constructive forces already in existence and by co-operation bring about a political unity that can elect to congress men who love their country more than a dollar. Among those asked to attend are men and women representatives of organized labor, organized farmers, the non-partisan league, the farm-labor party of 1920, the socialist party and the consumers' league. IRISH FREE BILL HAS A SECOND

DEFEAT AMERICAN CHANGE IN BOUNDARY

CHANGE IS PROVISION IN BOUNDARY

Government Provision in Boundary

By Associated Press LONDON, Feb. 16.—The House of Commons today passed its second reading of a bill to amend the boundary of the United Kingdom.

The bill, which would give effect to the provisions of the 1924 Anglo-Irish agreement, would transfer to the United Kingdom certain territory in the north of Ireland.

The bill was passed by a vote of 102 to 66. It is expected to pass the House of Lords without amendment.

The bill is expected to receive royal assent in the next few days.

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IRISH FREE STATE BILL HAS PASSED A SECOND READING

DEFEAT AMENDMENT FOR THE CHANGE IN PROPOSED BOUNDARY.

CHANGE IS PROPOSED BY CAPTAIN CHARLES CRAIG

Government Gives Assurance the Provision in Question Will Be Eliminated.

By Associated Press. LONDON, Feb. 17.—The bill establishing the Irish free state passed its second reading in the house of commons today after the amendment offered by Captain Charles Craig, leader of the Ulster unionists, for altering the boundary commission provisions of the Anglo-Irish treaty had been defeated by vote of 202 to 80.

With the amendment decisively defeated, the second reading was adopted with a division. The amendment thus disposed of stipulated that in view of the fact that the treaty provided for the creation of a boundary commission and that such a provision was in direct derogation of Ulster's rights as secured by the government of Ireland act of 1920, and a breach of the pledge given by the prime minister, the house declines to proceed with the second reading until the government had given assurance that the provision in question would be eliminated, or that any decision of a boundary commission should not take effect after approval of the northern parliament had been given.

CHURCHILL URGES EARLY VOTE ON FREE STATE BILL

By Associated Press. LONDON, Feb. 16.—In moving the second reading of the Irish free state bill in the house of commons today Winston Churchill, secretary for the colonies, stressed the necessity of giving effect to the treaty by clothing the provisional government as the treaty provided with lawful powers and enabling it to hold an election at the earliest moment.

The object of the proposed election, added the secretary, was to obtain an adequate constituent assembly in Ireland.

Of the present Irish parliament, Mr. Churchill declared that it was not chosen because of the fitness of its members to govern, but because they were most obnoxious to Great Britain. The Irish minister must know where he stood. The sooner an election was held the better. The success of De Valera at the election he characterized as an ugly hypothesis.

Aluding to the report of a coup d'etat to overturn the provisional government, Mr. Churchill said: "There are those who think the present Irish government may be overthrown by a coup d'etat and a red soviet government set up. The British government does not think that at all likely, but if it were it would be quite clear that a soviet republic would ruin the Irish cause for a 100 years while not in any respect impairing the foundation of the British empire or the security of Ulster."

BIRMINGHAM, ALA. HAS BIG FIRE LOSS

Fourth of Block in Downtown Business Section Of City Destroyed.

BIRMINGHAM, ALA., Feb. 17.—Fire originating at 3 o'clock this morning wiped out one-fourth of a city block at Twenty-first street and Fourth avenue in the heart of a downtown business district. It was believed the fire was under control at 7 o'clock. Included in the burned area was the Oster Brothers Furniture company. First estimates place the loss above \$250,000.

Special to The Times. SEYMOUR, TEXAS, Feb. 17.—G. B. Morris, pioneer citizen of Seymour, died this morning at 7 o'clock from internal injuries received at 3 p. m. yesterday while assisting in the loading of some livestock at his ranch about 10 miles northwest of this city.

Deceased was 68 years of age and was born in West Virginia, coming to Baylor county in 1885. He was the father of 14 children, 11 of whom are living and reside in this city. His prominence in highway activities was shown by the fact that he was active vice-president of the Ozark Trail association for many years.

Deceased was a member of the city council of Seymour at the time of his death and was active in Seymour's street paving progress.

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WARNING TO TEXAS SHIPPING INTERESTS

Suit Upon Claims Under Federal Control Should Be Filed Before Feb. 28.

DALLAS, Feb. 17.—Warning to Texas shipping interests that suits upon claims arising from federal control should be filed before February 28, 1922, was issued today by F. A. Leffingwell, transportation manager of the Texas chamber of commerce.

The transportation act of 1920 provides that actions at law, suits in equity and proceedings in admiralty against the federal government may be brought within the period of limitation prescribed by state and federal statutes, but not later than two years from the date of the passage of the act.

Where the administration agrees with the claimant prior to March 1, 1922, that a certain amount will be paid in settlement of the claim, the fact that the settlement is not consummated prior to March 1 will not prevent the railroad administration from completing its agreement to settle, but in all other cases claimant should file suit to protect himself.

What was it? asked Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCormick, daughter of John D. Rockefeller, at the conclusion of the address. "That the kaiser said about my father? Do tell me even though it was unfavorable." "My dear lady," replied Noah Webster's great grandson, "I can only repeat that it was unfavorable. Other than that I remember nothing in that part of the interview. And every single copy of the interview was taken 600 miles out in the Atlantic ocean and there burned by a picked detachment of German naval officers, who spent the day in the furnace rooms of a warship to do it."

NOTED HUNTER HAS MYSTERIOUS MALADY

Intestines Full of Shot He Had Swallowed in Eating His Kills.

ASTORIA, ORE., Feb. 17.—John H. Bell, a locally noted hunter of wild fowl, was seriously stricken a week ago with a mysterious malady. Examination by X-ray disclosed that his intestines were full of shot and that lead poisoning had resulted. Physicians removed more than 200 of the shot but X-ray yesterday showed more than 100 shot left. 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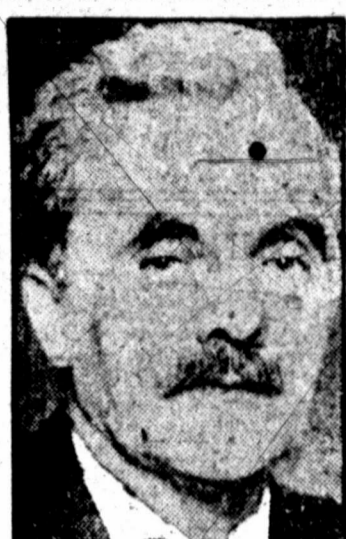
THESE FOUR MEN ARE PRINCIPAL FIGURES IN FARM BLOC STRUGGLE

By HARRY HUNT
WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—Continued assaults by administration and old guard leaders on the agricultural bloc in congress will bring one of two results, disinterested observers are convinced.
One—Either recognition and acceptance by party leaders of the necessity of dealing as helpfully with agriculture as with manufacturing, transportation or finance, or...

"That was the kind of talk they had been handing us fellows who proposed the measure," Kenyon said afterward. "I couldn't resist passing it back to them.
The truth is that the administration and alleged party leaders have been doing everything possible to belittle the members of the so-called bloc and discredit it with the people.
The very term 'bloc' was originated to set us aside as a special group, striving for special consideration for agriculture. Of course we're doing nothing of the sort.
We're no more of a bloc in that sense than those representatives who have sponsored specific manufacturing, shipping or financial measures are a bloc of 'industrial blocs' or 'railroad blocs' or 'banking blocs.'
The self-interest of agriculture is vital not alone to agriculture but the interests of the whole nation.
Would Belittle Bloc.
'Now they are setting up the cry that someone in the agricultural bloc wants to be president. That is just another attempt to belittle and discredit those who are fighting for a square deal for agriculture.
'I know nothing of any plans for organization of the third party. That appears to me unnecessary. The bloc appears to be doing very well and support for it throughout the country is growing.
'If the republican party is wrecked, it won't be by members of the bloc but by those leaders who refuse to heed the needs and demands of the majority.'
'They pick them off, singly or in groups, by the trading support on pet measures or otherwise placating them.
The talk that the bloc, as such, will form a third party is nonsense. Really, there is not any bloc.
Voting Lines Shift.
'The lines change and shift on every measure. The real resentment and hostility has been created among the farmers by the attempts of the administration to sidetrack and defeat legislation designed to give the farmer the same degree of assistance given other industries.
What that may result in no one can forecast.
Action by the agricultural conference, called by President Harding, adopting a resolution 'commanding and approving' the work of the bloc was a distinct shock to administration leaders.
Inasmuch as the president, in his opening address to the conference, deviated from his set speech to take a slap at the bloc, it would appear to indicate rather definitely the way the wind is blowing.
Carefully watching for signs of division in the G. O. P. because of bloc activities are Senators W. E. Borah and Hiram Johnson. Both are much more ready to forecast the birth of a third party than is any member of the agricultural group.
Whether the third party will come however, as a result of division over agricultural questions, or over the question of over the nation's foreign policy, or otherwise, they are not ready to predict.
'There is no doubt,' Borah declared, 'that there is deep and widespread dissatisfaction with both old parties. We are in such the same situation as existed in 1852.
'Nobody knows just when or where a party is born. There are half a dozen authentic birthplaces of the republican party.
'But we do know something of the conditions out of which they are born. And in the present situation in this country, the appearance of a third party should occasion no surprise. It not only appears possible, but almost inevitable.'
VERDICT FOR \$40,000 IN BREACH OF PROMISE SUIT
COLUMBIA, S. C., Feb. 17.—A verdict for \$40,000 was awarded to Mrs. Lyde McDonald today in her suit against Howard S. DePortes, prominent Columbia financier, for breach of promise.
Mrs. McDonald sued for \$150,000, alleging that she and Mr. DePortes had lived together as man and wife for 20 years. Mr. DePortes is director of a large bank here, owner of large properties in the city and is a member of a prominent family.

EXPERT TELLS WHAT THE GENOA CONFERENCE MEANS TO THE U. S.

This is the second of two articles by a recognized expert discussing the coming world economic conference at Genoa.
By J. W. T. MASON
Expert on International Relations.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—The European nations want the United States to attend the Genoa conference for the purpose of helping Europe before Europe knows what kind of help it wants.
So much confusion reigns in the European confederacies and embassies among the allies themselves are developing so rapidly that Europe wishes Uncle Sam to become an international Judge Landis.
Genoa has been picked as the place for America to summon the Babe Ruths of the European leagues for judgment.
But, the Europeans want to reserve the right of rejecting America's findings at will. Uncle Sam is desired to invent a new kind of arbitration that will make every body a winner and nobody a loser.
The United States has no power to enforce verdicts in European affairs. America has no more influence in Europe than any other nation. There is no such thing as American world leadership.
The United States, in an active role at Genoa, would make enemies faster than it made friends, if it started to make the mistake of trying to find a way out by means of a general resumption of international trade and slow recovery of prosperity all around.
This is the way nations have had to save themselves in the past. It is the way Europe eventually must take. But, America cannot force the pace over there.
America learned about the obstacles of Europe at the Washington conference, when land armaments came up for discussion. What couldn't be done at Washington can't be done at Genoa.
'Watchful Waiting' Needed.
All the United States can do is to wait until nature takes its course. That is to say, until the continental powers of Europe learn by experience how disastrous is their policy of keeping alive war animosities.
The United States is as helpless at present to do anything for Europe's general recovery as Great Britain is.
If Germany and Russia were encouraged to get back their economic strength, as the Genoa conference originally intended, there would be less unemployment in America.
Germany and Russia would be able to buy more goods from the United States and Americans would find work to do. For that reason, America would have an important interest in the Genoa gathering if there were any hopes that common sense would prevail.
But, that hope became dim when...

BEAN BALL DOESN'T APPEAL TO JOHNSON

Famous Pitcher Never Resorts to Unfair Methods to Achieve Success.

What do you think of the system devised by some of the pitchers of throwing the ball close to the batter's head in an effort to intimidate him and thereby make him much easier to pitch to?

"Dusting the batter off" as such practice is called by us players, has never had the slightest appeal to me.
During my entire career as a pitcher I have always been blessed with good control. It didn't take me long to realize that in intimidating the batsman was not part of my program. When they stepped to the plate against me they did so with confidence because they knew I would never resort to such tactics.
Players on my team, after some ordinary hits, would get one or two, would walk over to the pitcher's box and say to me:
"Dust a few of those fellows off, Walter. Don't let them get a toe hold. Throw a scare into them. If you had your stuff that lucky stiff wouldn't make a foul off me?"
My teammates had no desire that I try to hit anyone, they simply thought I was giving the batter too great an advantage because he knew I wouldn't resort to unsportsmanlike conduct.
Ever since have started pitching I have always thought if I couldn't win without throwing at the batter's head, I would quit.
A few years ago when I was saying my troubles winning with my usual regularity, some of the boys insisted now was the time for me to dust a few of them off. They figured I was slipping and that I could prolong my career by such tactics.
There was never a fear on my part that I might kill a batter. With the great control that I have always had, I could have intimidated the batter without entailing any danger.
I have never used the "bean ball" simply because I don't believe in such tactics to win. After all, there is something besides mere victory in sport, the spirit of fair play.

Billy Evans says

It placed a premium on hustling from the start of the season to the finish, thereby covering himself in much tactics to win. After all, there is something besides mere victory in sport, the spirit of fair play.

Under the new conditions a team, after it has lost its chance to win the pennant, still has second or third place to shoot at. Finishing third meant about \$500 extra to each player last year. That sum of money at the close of the season is a real incentive to hustle all the way.

The new system of dividing the world series spots, while taking care of the teams finishing first, second and third, made no provision for a player on a second division club who stood out as one of the most valuable men in the league.

What is where the new prize of \$1,000 is going to go a lot of good. It is going to be added incentive to the star ball player who is unfortunate enough to be on some weak aggregation.

At the start of every season it is possible to figure some club out to win, almost to a certainty. To the players on such teams there is no hope for them to receive a reward at the close of the season.

The \$1,000 prize will be something for every player to shoot at regardless of where his team finishes. Often on a club that finishes last, some player stands out as the most valuable in the organization.

Just go back to the old days, when Washington had last place in the American league clinched before the season opened. In those days Walter Johnson was the sensation of the American league. He surely would have been picked as the most valuable man at that time.

A commission of newspaper men will make the selection. That makes it certain that no partizan will be shown. There will be one man from each city in the circuit.

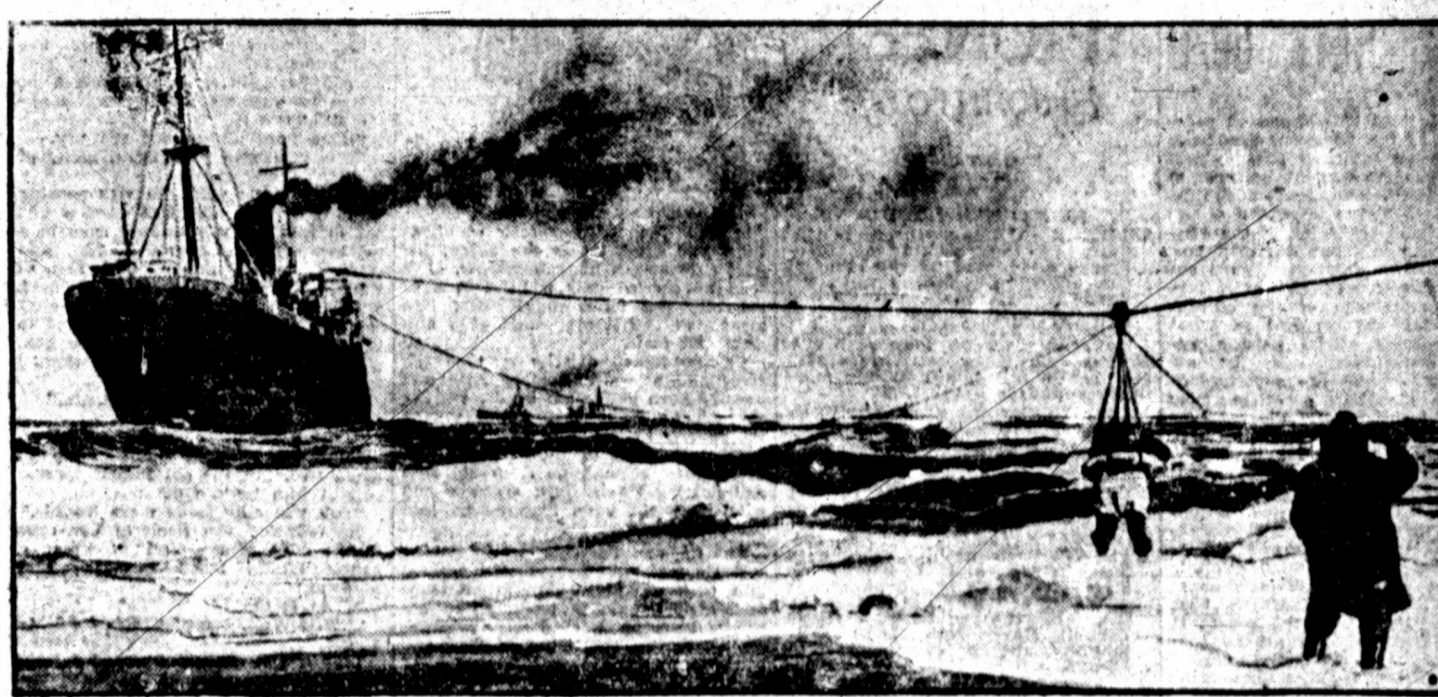

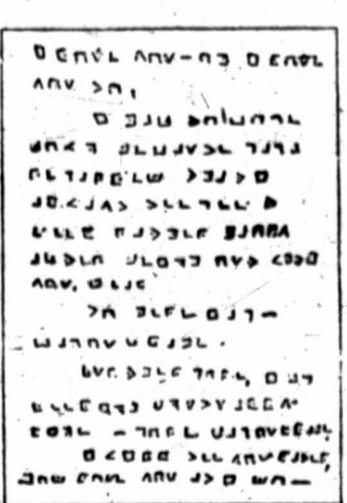

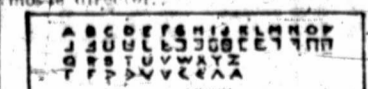
