

Another thing that seems to trouble Mr. Bryan is the fact that I told him that his teach-ings were "atheistic" rather than the teachings of evolution. I had a real meaning and purpose in thus calling the attention of Mr. Bryan definitely and sharply to the religi-ous harm that may come from his teachings.



WOULD GOVERN MEN'S BELIEFS BY STATUTORY ENACTMENTS.

A bill introduced in the Kentucky state legisla ture to prevent the teaching of the theory of evolution in the public schools of that state has gained considerable support. It is claimed by the proponents of the measure that the theory of evolution is causing the growing generation to lose their faith. And like men have been since the beginning of time there are some who would regulate what men think and believe by law.

Many of our accepted principles in science and ligion and politics have won their way through long years of repression by the laws of church and state. Not so many centuries have passed since the rack and the torch were the instrumentalities by which men sought to bring their brothers to conform with their own belisfs and practice. We have made some progress since that time for now, as evidenced by the proponents of this law for Kentucky, we propose to substitute the jail and fines for the hideous instruments of old.

Error sometimes survives a long time even when it is not supported by civil or church law but truth will prevail. There were once statutes against the teaching of Newton's law of gravitation. There were even laws against the teaching of the theory that the world was round. The theory of evolution, if true, will stand against all the laws that may be enacted against its teaching. If not true, all the laws that might be enacted to support it by the state or by any church could not make it prevail.

It is hard to believe that the proposed law can get through the legislature of the state of Kentucky. Centucky was one of the first states to be created ifter the American revolution. It was settled largely man. by the people who fought in the American revolution. The great thinkers and men who drafted the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States were yet alive when Kentucky came to the Union. They were men who knew that the eliefs of their fellow men could not be regulated by statutory enactment. Their thought and influence was very active when Kentucky was settled and became a state. If their spirit yet survives Kentucky will not enact the proposed law.
