the toll of the disaster—the greatest in the history of American aero-mautics—at 34 dead, eight injured. and three practically unburt. Of the dead 30 had been identified al-though many of the bodies of those saught in the interior of the ship when she crashed were burned, blackened and charred almost beyond recognition. These dead in-cluded some of the air service's most gallant officers and men, the list containing the names of Major John Thornell, commander of the ship at her christening in December at Washington, and Captain Dale Mabry, her commander during yesterday's ill-fated flight.





He reported on behalf of these two officials that they would name only such men for their deprtles as were approved by Governor authorities.





"This law is unfavorable to con-solidated schools, because of the provision that before any move-ment for consolidation can be effected each of the districts voting apon it shall vote in favor of it," mid one official in the state de-partment of education. 


