WASHINGTON, March 8 .- Termination of the Anglo-Japanese alliance and substitution of a political system actuated by peace in the Pacific was described in the senate today by Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, the republican leader and the American arms delegation, as the "main purpose" of the four power Pacific treaty, The Anglo-Japanese arrangemen Senator Lodge declared, was regard ed by the delegation as the "most dangerous element" in this governnent's relations with the far east He asserted that if the four power pact with its clause abrogating the illiance failed, the naval limitation eement, also would be endan-ed, resulting in "failure of the greement, also would be



As it stands today, the over-whelming bulk of the republican party is favorable to ratification. Many of the republican senators have doubts, but these doubts are mostly of a kind that can be satisfied by reservations of one or another. Only four republican senators are

definitely in opposition: They are:
Borah of Idaho, LaFøllette of Wisconsin, Johnson of California, and
France of Maryland. Incidentally,
the last three of these come up for
renomination and election the comrenomination and election the com-ing-summer. Johnson, for example, will need to satisfy the voters of his state that he is right at pri-marles that come in August and the election in November. France will need to do the same thing in September and LaFoliette in the

same month.
Aside from these four, there are Aside from these four, there are three other republicans who are nearer the area of doubt than any others. These are: McCormack of Illinois, Moses of New Hampshire, and Brandegee of Connecticut. No one of these three has made any public statement of his attitude, but persons who talk with them privately get strongly the idea that privately get strongly the idea that their present disposition is to ac-cept the general favorable point of view of the country, and "go along" with the party.

Aside from these seven, the en-tire republican majority is in one degree or another favorable to ratification. Only some expected development during the debates, or some obvious change in the present at-titude of the public would lead to further defections among the re-

As to the democrats, there are about half a dozen who are impladefinitely and strongly favorable to it. But the bulk of the demo-cratic party is on the fence and the cratic party is on the fence and the attitude of the party as a whole will be determined by events which are in the making this week. The thing is clear: Underwood is not able to deliver his fellow democratic senators as a party. Hardly any of the democrats will be determed in his position, or even in any segree influenced by the fact that Underwood is for the treaty. If Harding thought he was insuring democratic support by making the democratic leader of the senate one of the participants in the conone of the participants in the conference he will be disappointed.

This thing that may be called the sentiment of the country is what will really determine the question. 

PRESIDENT DECLARES PROGRESS MADE WITH AGRICULTURAL PLANS

WASHINGTON, March 5.—Declaration that "we are making splendid progress toward dissipation of our agricultural difficulties" is made by President Harding in a letter to Eugene V. Meyer Jr., managing director of the war finance corporation, made public today at the white house.

English newspapers, just arrived in the mail, say that "Bluebeard" Landru had an unfair trial in France-that the judge repeatedly taunted himthat it is difficult to believe that such a farcical trial could take place in any modern civilized

In following Landru's trial, you may have noticed that the prosecut'on did not produce the body or skeleton of any of his alleged victims.

Fragments of charred bones were found under his country residence, buried in the cellar. Experts expressed the opinion that these were the bones of

That sort of evidence wouldn't have carried much weight in America.

In France, they have the Napoleonic criminal code. By it, the accused is presumed guilty until he proves himself innocent.

In America, a defendant is presumed innocent until proved guilty. In giving a presumed criminal the benefit of the doubt, we even go as far as to say

that his wife cannot be made to testify against him. We go further and decree that anything confided in a professional capacity to his attorney, physician or clergy cannot be admitted as legal convincing

This is the rule, throughout the whole of the North American continent, except in the province of Quebec, Canada, Like France, Quebec has the Naroleonic criminal code.

By curious coincidence, it was claimed at the last moment that two of Landru's alleged victims had been found buried in Montreal, Quebec. The discovery was cabled to France, but it didn't hait Landru's execution.

Observe that Landru was beheaded without ac tual proof that any of his alleged victims were dead. That couldn't happen in our country.

Landru's head has been chopped off, and technicalities of court procedure no longer interest him. But it may be that, of all things happening on earth in the year 1922, nothing will be remembered 10,000 years from now except Landru's death. He may become a mythological character, a folk-lore






