

REPORT PARISH OUT OF DANGER

CONGRESSMAN SERIOUSLY HURT IN AN AUTO ACCIDENT NEAR ROBY; TO WICHITA FALLS

STAMFORD, TEXAS, March 15.—Congressman Lucian W. Parish, injured in an automobile accident near Roby last night, is practically out of danger, attending physicians announced here today. He is resting well, has maintained consciousness virtually all the time since the accident and will be taken to Wichita Falls tonight by his brother, Frank Parish, who is with him at a local sanitarium. Parish was examined by a physician at Roby last night, who reported that the congressman suffered a compound fracture of the jaw, but that there was no injury to the skull, as at first feared. MAKE PUBLIC THE REPLY OF ALLIES TO DEMANDS OF U. S.

PARIS, March 15.—The text of the collective reply made by the cabinets of France, Great Britain, Belgium and Italy to the demand made by the United States for consideration of the cost of the American occupation troops on the Rhine was made public today. The reply, which is not a party, makes acknowledgment of the assistance given by the loyal citizens from every quarter of the union. Peoples of all shades of political conviction, says the statement, will be astonished to see the government suppress "what undoubtedly has to have been a social revolution by bolshevik, international and socialist and communists."

TROOPS ENJOINED FROM INTERFERING

NEWPORT, KY., March 15.—In the Campbell circuit court today Judge A. M. Caldwell temporarily enjoined Colonel H. H. DeHart and his officers from sending troops stationed here on strike duty from interfering with the meetings of the strikers at their headquarters. The soldiers are also enjoined from intimidating and threatening and from removing any property from the headquarters of unionists.

SULTAN ANNOUNCES EGYPT INDEPENDENT DISORDERS FOLLOW

CAIRO, EGYPT, March 15.—A receipt issued by the sultan, Ahmed Fuad Pasha, last night announced that Egypt had become an independent and sovereign state and that the sultan will assume the title of king of Egypt. REPORT DEMONSTRATIONS FOLLOW DECLARATIONS. LONDON, March 15.—An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Cairo says the declaration of Egypt's independence was followed by several demonstrations in Cairo, the crowd smashing street lamps and uprooting trees. Egyptian cavalry was ordered out to restore order.

COMPROMISE SOLDIER BONUS INTRODUCED IN HOUSE OF CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, March 15.—The compromise soldiers' bonus bill, as finally revised, was reintroduced today in the house by Chairman Fordney, who submitted a majority report from the ways and means committee claiming these "advantages in plan of the bill." "First—No new taxation, no increase in new securities is at present required. "Second—It provides for the veteran in a need of method of obtaining the bonus. "Third—The amounts required each year after July 1, 1922, are small compared to those which have heretofore been paid and can be provided without any difficulties or derangement of our financial situation. "Fourth—The plan tends to promote saving habits among the veterans. "While perfect unanimity could not be expected as to all details of the bill," the report said, "the majority of the committee believe that the plan in general meets the approval of the veterans and of all those who are in favor of granting to them additional compensation in any form whatever. "After a session at which the report was formally approved with some changes from the original committee, the question of procedure in bringing up the bill in the house still was undecided. One committee member thought it was about "50-50" whether it would be taken up Monday under a suspension of the rules or later under a special rule. The majority report, in discussing the objections raised to the bank loan provision of the adjusted service certificate plan said the majority of the committee was of the opinion that the amount that would be borrowed from banks on the certificate would be "comparatively small." "Although they constitute ideal securities for the banking institutions," the report said, "it is seen fit, in view of the necessity of making the loan before it is made, and it is believed a majority of the committee believe that it is expedient to provide for the loan upon the certificate unless they have special need for the money." "The question of the committee and the treasury will take the certificate plan, assuming this to be correct, the amount that could be loaned by the banks, if all apply for loans, would be \$50,000,000. "Fifty signatures would be necessary for the calling of the conference. The action taken by the conference would not be binding on the members when the measure came up for consideration on the floor. Several former service men, members of the house, have signed the petition and in addition other members who have been counselling delay in taking up the bonus bill have attached their signatures. He told the jury to summon all persons who had any knowledge of the organization, and to tell what he may know concerning the same. Those refusing to answer questions as to his membership in the organization, but must tell what he may know concerning the same, or who refuse to testify, are subject to jail sentence for contempt of court, Judge Mullally declared. LAREDO OFFICERS REQUEST THE KLAN NOT TO PARADE. LAREDO, TEXAS, March 15.—Notice calling upon the Ku Klux Klan not to stage a parade here Sunday morning was issued by Sheriff and city marshal in an afternoon paper today, the notice asserting the organization is "organized for unlawful purposes" and that officers are "bound to uphold the law." Earlier in the day officials received letters signed by the Klan, in which they requested a parade by the local Klan Sunday.

GENERAL SEMENOFF NOW IN VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, B. C., March 15.—General Semenov, the Russian anti-bolshevik leader, who was allowed to land yesterday from the liner Empress of Russia on which he had come from the far east on a mission from his country to the United States, has taken up his residence temporarily in a hotel here. United States immigration officers are understood to have sent to Washington, D. C., a report of their inquiry into the purpose of General Semenov's visit and are awaiting word from there before taking further action in the case.

ALABAMA COTTON POOL OF 100,000 BALES IS PLANNED

MONTGOMERY, Ala., March 15.—An organization of a cotton pool in this state to consist of not less than 100,000 bales, were announced here yesterday by the Alabama farm bureau federation, to be known as the Alabama Farm Bureau Cotton Association. The plan of the organization will be similar to that created by the Texas farm bureau federation a year ago. It is planned to secure the minimum of 100,000 bales by June 15, this year, requiring signatures of 200 contracts by about 10,000 farmers.

FURTHER GAINS MADE IN CRUDE PRODUCTION IN THE UNITED STATES

NEW YORK, March 15.—An increase of 2,250,000 barrels in pipe line and tank farm gross crude oil stocks east of the Rocky mountains is indicated for February, according to the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute. This is the net change shown by 43 representative companies reporting to the institute. No changes are reported in the production of the United States for the week ended March 11 was 1,425,200 barrels, an increase of 215,000 barrels over the preceding week. Oklahoma production showed a gain of 2,300 barrels daily. There was a slight increase in Alaska (Texas) production, and the output of the Hayneville, north Louisiana, field increased 4,400 barrels. No changes are reported in crude oil prices, mid-continent being quoted at \$2 a barrel, Pennsylvania at \$2.25 and Gulf coast at \$1.25.

ORDER A FEDERAL INVESTIGATION OF ERIE SHOP DEALS

CHICAGO, March 15.—Federal investigation of the Erie railroad's action in leasing its shops and contracting shop work to the Meadville Machinery company of Meadville, Pa., was ordered by the United States railroad board today. No decision has yet been rendered by the board and, meanwhile, the Erie contracting has proceeded unimpeded by outside concerns instead of shops under their control and subject to wage and labor regulations applying to general railroad service, occasioned general satisfaction today among railroad union officials here.

HOUSE PASSES MEASURE PERMITTING 2400 ALIENS OVER QUOTA TO REMAIN

WASHINGTON, March 15.—The house today passed a resolution which permits approximately 2,400 aliens admitted temporarily to the United States prior to March 7 in excess of the three per cent quota of the restrictive immigration law to be permitted to remain in this country permanently. The measure now goes to the senate.

NO DECISION BY THE JUDGE AT AUSTIN ON 'KLAN' QUESTIONING

AUSTIN, March 15.—Judge James R. Hamilton took no action in the criminal district court here this morning on the motion of the grand jury citing Police Commissioners J. D. Copeland and F. G. Reynolds, clerk of a fraternal order, for contempt of court for their alleged refusal to answer questions before the grand jury concerning the membership and the membership of others in the Ku Klux Klan. The indictment was returned against the grand jury investigation of the killing of Feeler Clayton here the night of December 8 last.

COMPLETE INQUIRY INTO ALLEGED BUCKETING BY THE COTTON EXCHANGES

NEW YORK, March 15.—Chief City Magistrate McAdoo today completed his "Joe Doe" inquiry into the charges of alleged bucketing by members of the American cotton exchange, and announced that he would make known his findings and conclusions not later than tomorrow morning. George Gordon Battle, counsel for a committee of members of the exchange, and Albert Massey, attorney for the exchange itself, asked that if a complete inquiry were conducted against the defendants that they be given the privilege of a hearing in a magistrate's court instead of a grand jury action. REED'S OPENING BLAST REGARDED AS WEAK

Poor Strategy Was Used by Democratic Forces, Says Mark Sullivan.

WASHINGTON, March 16.—It cannot be said that the bottom is out of the fight on the four-power treaty, but it is clear that opposition is not going to be any stronger than it now is and that the treaty will be ratified by a small but safe margin.

The opposition has not been able to start any measurable momentum either in the senate or in the country. It is more important, however, that the country is overwhelmingly in favor of ratification, and the opponents of the treaty in the senate have been discouraged by their inability to start even the faint beginnings of any such movement of public feeling as was worked up against the league of nations.

In the senate debate the friends of the treaty have done much better than its opponents. Lodge made a good presentation of his case and came out of the heckling which the democrats had prepared for him with so much credit as to have worked up against the league of nations.

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ORDER TRUNK LINES TO GIVE FREIGHT TO THE M. & N. A. ROAD

WASHINGTON, March 16.—Trunk railroads associated with the Missouri & North Arkansas in handling through freight were ordered today by the Interstate Commerce commission to allow that railroad to resume operation.

The Missouri & North Arkansas suspended its railroad transportation service last year. The receiver appointed by the court having claimed that it was impossible to continue with existing rates.

An appeal was made to the Interstate Commerce commission asking that road be assisted by a government loan, and further by an increased development of joint rates.

After hearing in which the objections of the trunk line railroads were considered, W. A. Cullen, director of finance for the commission, recommends that the claims of the road for the increased volume be granted and the commission now has approved the recommendation.

Have a Machine To Measure The 'Kick' In a Kiss

SAN FRANCISCO, March 16.—Kisses, some of them, kick up your blood pressure.

So says J. V. Bretzweiser of the University of California's department of education. He has measured the "kick."

Given one man and one woman who will kiss, Bretzweiser told the San Francisco Advertising club he would measure the linear extent and millimeters of blood receding from:

The mistletoe kiss. The stolen kiss. The expert kiss of the finished flirt. The soul kiss.

Bretzweiser said the instrument he uses is so sensitive it will register the domestic kiss, the degree of frigidity in kisses one woman gives another she does not like, and so forth throughout all grades of occupation.

Bretzweiser calls his instrument the kismograph. He gets a man and woman who will kiss; he attaches wires to them; they kiss. The machine acts automatically. He also said there is no difficulty in obtaining couples to carry on the experiment.

The instrument is an adaptation of the sphygmograph which is a machine psychologists use to detect lies.

PARTY STRIFE AGAIN THREATENS TO DRIVE FIUME INTO ANARCHY

By Associated Press. FIUME, March 16.—Party strife again threatens to plunge Fiume into anarchy. Immediately after the fall of the Zanella government partisan feeling subsided, all joining in choosing Major Giovanni Giuriati as head of the government, but now that he has refused the position each party is again rivaling the other for control of the city.

To prevent disorder, Lieutenant Cabrana, commander of the armed forces of the city, has proclaimed the committee of public defense dissolved and has assumed full powers himself so as to organize a legal government speedily.

Lieutenant Cabrana's troops took full possession of the city, placing machine guns at the government palace, the municipal buildings and the post and telegraph offices. He issued a manifesto informing the people of his intention of prohibiting the use of automobiles, lorries and motorcycles by any other than the military.

GREEK SHIP SEIZES AN ITALIAN VESSEL PASSENGERS HELD

By Associated Press. CONSTANTINOPLE, March 16.—The Greek torpedo boat Naxos, while patrolling the Black sea with other units of the Greek fleet, seized the steamship Africa, flying the Italian flag, off Ineboli.

The African was taken to Mudana, where after a three-hour search of the vessel, the Turkish passengers including the personnel of the Turkish sanitary corps, were declared prisoners of war.

CONSIDERABLE EXCITEMENT IN ITALY OVER SEIZURE

By Associated Press. ROME, March 16.—Considerable excitement has been caused here by the news that Greek warships had stopped and searched the Italian steamships Umbria and Abdalia, detaining the latter.

The Messenger observes that Italy, notwithstanding the Greece-Turkish war, has never recognized one right of Greece to institute a blockade or to search ships, nor did France, who experimented a similar incident in the seizure of the steamship Espoir.

The French steamship Espoir recently was released by Greece after a sharp protest from France. The Greeks, however, retained the cargo which they maintained was contraband of war destined for use of the Turkish nationalist army with which Greece is at war.

The newspaper declares the present case is more serious than that of the Espoir, while with the news that Greek warships had stepped in Greek territorial waters, as the Italian steamships were boarded, it is alleged on the open sea.

CONVINCED CHICAGO \$8,000,000 FIRE OF INCENDIARY ORIGIN

CHICAGO, March 16.—Several separate investigations of yesterday morning's disastrous fire which swept a city block and burned buildings in two others with a loss placed by insurance and property experts at \$8,000,000, were continued today. Sherry T. High, city fire attorney, expressed conviction that the conflagration, the most serious since that of 1871 which virtually destroyed Chicago, was of incendiary origin. A negro employe of the cotton gin, which was among the first to go up in flames, was sought. He was named by a fellow worker who was arrested but denied connection with starting the fire.

A German general said that the chief reason American soldiers were good fighters was because they hadn't been trained to retreat.

Trench warfare was doomed as soon as Americans got into the world war. It is not American nature to sit in the mud patiently for two or three years.

Americans, most nervous race so far in history, want constant action. They either go forward or are carried off the battlefield feet-first.

The war department now wisely issues orders to corps area commanders, that our soldiers are to be trained primarily to attack the enemy instead of merely holding their ground.

There is a success tip that you may turn into money. All business, all participation in the great industrial machine of civilization, is a form of warfare.

You see the law of "survival of the fittest" working in trade associations. Jobbers or manufacturers hand certain ends. Easy to keep them together when times are good.

Then depression arrives, members get restless, soon desert the association and begin cutting each other's throats.

Every man should consider himself a warrior, battling to attain the victory of a fair share of general prosperity, up to the point where his takings cut into what belongs to others.

To be successful—and this is especially true of salesmen—you must be constantly up on your toes, fighting hard by putting the very best of yourself into what you are doing.

At the end of each day, ask yourself: "Am I making progress toward my goal, or am I just standing still?" The man who is standing still is getting ready to go backward.

Letting well enough alone is like holding the trenches. It wards off defeat but doesn't bring quick victory. The man who mechanically handles the work that is shoved before him, and keeps yearning for quitting-time, will never be a Napoleon.

Promotion, riches, success, the top rung of the ladder—these come to the man who puts more than average energy and brains and care into his immediate tasks.

Hard work is the eternal key to wealth. There are skeleton keys—windfalls—but they are freaks of chance.

A certain man was convinced he was a master actor. He couldn't get a try-out. So he plugged along in burlesque, doing the job better than he really had to. One day David Belasco dropped into the theater and saw this actor work. Belasco gave him a chance. He made good. The actor's name is David Warfield.

NO BONUS TO BABE RUTH. Miller Huggins, manager of the Yanks, has upset a lot of dope by a plain denial of the rumor that Babe Ruth's contract provided for a bonus of \$500 for each home run swat of the bambino.

We are glad to hear this denial. Ruth's contract provides a straight salary that makes him a large income tax payer and which ought to be considered ample compensation for any ball player. This salary ought to be an incentive for Babe to deliver his best which no one doubts that he does every time he comes to bat.

In sports, as in other lines, too many people have the idea that a bonus ought to be paid for a man's best efforts and that such efforts cannot be obtained without a bonus. It is certain if that attitude were to be taken toward all ball players they would soon become so demoralized that a bonus would be required to make them put forth any effort whatever.

As said, we are glad that the rumors of a bonus to Ruth have been denied. We believe that he will hit as many home runs and probably more without a bonus for the performance than with one.

AN INTERESTING EXPERIMENT. Now we have the explanation that President Harding did not leave Washington and go to Florida because he wanted to escape the worries of Washington but that he did so to leave full responsibility for legislation upon congress and wished congress to realize its responsibility.

Congress has been disposed to put over a bonus bill and other measures which have not received the approval of the president. Mr. Harding is said to have taken the view that as long as he remained in Washington and attempted to compromise or harmonize conflicting views his interpositions were expected as a matter of course and it was difficult to make congress see its duty.

Well, Harding has washed his hands of responsibility and has renounced any desire for leadership, if this is true, and the responsibility is in congress. This is the first time in a great many years that an American president has renounced leadership and the people will watch with interest how the experiment turns out. That was not Theodore Roosevelt's or Woodrow Wilson's way.

Current Comment

WEST TEXAS FOR IRRIGATION (Fort Worth Record) Twenty-six men identified with the irrigation problems of Texas and hailed from as many parts of the state who recently met at Austin to take cognizance of a growing opposition to irrigation recognized in the west Texas chamber of commerce.

A mighty ally whose devotion along the lines of irrigation have been sincere and purposeful and turned over to that great regional organization authority to deal with situations as they may arise in the course of the development of irrigation throughout the state.

Though the west Texas chamber of commerce was created for the specific purpose to develop west Texas and to smooth out all inequalities and otherwise establish that great empire of the state before the eyes of the world, it has never failed to render aid to the remainder of the state when by doing so it has advanced its own constituency.

Death Rate Takes Slump

Nineteen twenty-one was the healthiest year in the United States and Canada yet recorded. This, according to statistics compiled by one of our greatest life insurance companies having nearly 14,000,000 industrial policy holders.

This group constitutes approximately one-eighth of the total population of the two countries and probably not less than one-quarter of that in the cities.

The death rate attained the low figure of 8.54 per cent lower than the 1920 death rate which in turn marked the minimum recorded up to that time.

It is 31.9 per cent lower than was the rate for 1911. Just what this figure means in actual saving of life is best shown by the fact that if the 1920 death rate had prevailed in 1921, 18,400 more would have died; if the 1911 death rate had prevailed, 54,942 more deaths would have occurred.

The decline in the 1921 death rate was accompanied largely through reductions in the death rates for tuberculosis, pneumonia and influenza.

Some of the best reasons for this are: a) a general improvement in the health of the people; b) the decline in the death rate of tuberculosis has been cut in half.

There has been a drop of virtually one-third in the death rate in the 11-year period.

This is a magnificent promise for the future. Humanitarian, philanthropic, public health workers can see in the crystal of these statistics the great reward for years of discouraging efforts at health conservation.

Many years of tireless work in this direction is bearing fruit. And the more encouraging fact about the whole thing is that public health work has by no means exhausted its possibilities for life saving.

Some of the men who are doing the most important causes show marked capacity for further decline.

YOU AND I. MAYBE. Dr. Octavio Felix Pedrosa, young Brazilian scientist, arriving in New York claiming he can do these four things:

1. Bring the dead back to life under certain circumstances. Change a negro's black skin to white. Reduce the human life span. Reduce the necessary sleeping period from eight hours to one.

2. The death rate for cancer says he can accomplish these marvels by what he calls "blood irrigation." That is, lapping blood from the body, running it through a device that treats it with serum and electricity, then pumping it back into the body.

3. WHISKERS. After centuries of popularity, whiskers suddenly become unpopular. France, Dapper France, is shedding their beards. All because "Bisebeard" Landru had a magnificent display of whiskers of pine and fawn variety which he went to the guillotine.

4. BUSINESS. A leading chain of stores reports its business is the biggest ever experienced at this time of year. Price at present is the key to success.

Later on, when another boom comes and brings general prosperity to people who are busy buying now, will again become reckless with their money.

Maybe perpetual prosperity would be best. But, maybe a wise providence sends hard times to sober us financially and restore our sense of values and conservation of wealth.

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### POLICE COURT NO TERROR TO THOSE WHO FIGHT CASES

CITIZENS ASSOCIATION REPORT SHOWS BIG PERCENT OF ACQUITTALS.

### APPEALS NEARLY ALWAYS RESULT IN DISMISSALS

Law Methods of Keeping Records Are Mentioned in Document Prepared.

The police court has no sting for those who fight their cases or who, after conviction, appeal to the county court, according to the report prepared for the Citizens Association. The report was prepared in order to obtain information on local law enforcement conditions.

Four out of five cases where defendants hired attorneys resulted in acquittal; practically every case that was appealed to the county court resulted in acquittal or dismissal. The report also states that subsequent installments of the report will give figures for the justice, county, district and federal courts. The police court report follows:

Note—In a total check of more than three hundred (300) vagrancy cases, I find eighteen per cent plus convictions, and eighty-one per cent plus dismissals where defendants were represented by counsel. And the reverse was true where no counsel appeared for the defendant. Indicating either a lack of prosecution by the city or a certain fear of defense attorneys.

In one instance of record shows eighteen dismissals under same charge, fourteen of which were represented by the same counsel, while remaining four of the eighteen were represented by other counsel. It is explained that this occurred during absence of the regular judge.

The record further shows an appeal bond to the county signed by the recorder, approved by himself, bearing his own signature as one of the sureties.

There are several instances in which the records fail to show the charge against the defendant, some where no disposition is shown, and others where fines have been assessed with no check on record.

In the matter of cases appealed to the county court, I was unable to find a single conviction which was explained by the county prosecutors as being caused first, because of improperly prepared papers resulting in their being quashed when

brought before the court; second, on account of failure of the city to be present with witnesses and assistant in any prosecution.

There have been a number of "whiskey cases" made by department and I found in the possession of the department receipts for the whiskey transferred with the prisoners.

I find in my investigations no grounds for making any deductions questioning the honesty of any person, but a careless and indifference which if allowed to continue might produce the same results, as there is but little difference between results produced by carelessness and dishonesty.

The sheriff's department of this county and the officers at Dallas, Thursday morning made an exchange of arrests. The sheriff's department here arrested a man alleged to be charged with the offense of murder at Dallas and the department of that city arrested a man wanted here in connection with the sale of a car load of oats on a fraudulent bill of lading.

### FALSE TEETH, DRESS SUITS ALIKE USEFUL IN NORTH CAROLINA HILLS—PASTOR

An opportunity for real service is to assist the mountaineers of North Carolina," declared the Rev. C. McCoy Franklin in a splendid talk given at the First Presbyterian church last evening. "Those mountaineers can use anything from a set of false teeth to a dress suit."

Mr. Franklin came with a message full of real value concerning the mountaineer people of the section of western North Carolina, known as the Grandfather Basin. Mr. Franklin is strictly a self-made man; had no education up to the time he was 21 years of age. Since that time—and he is now 21 years old—he has worked his way through the graded school, high school, college and theological seminary, and is now back among those mountaineers teaching them the gospel of truth and spreading educational work among them that he said they so thoroughly sought after.

In a charming way, he spoke of his early life in the mountains of North Carolina. He was one of 15 children who lived in a two-room cabin with a small attic. He knew nothing but hard work, for his father did not believe in education, but his own mind was preparing itself for better things, and he made up his mind that when he became a man he would go away to school whether his father wished so or not, and he said the day he was 21 was one of the happiest days of his life when he went up into the small attic of his humble home, got out his old wooden trunk, filled it with love letters and a pair of knitted socks and made his way 52 miles to the nearest railroad. He said his father did not want him to go to the city to be educated; that he had saved for the boy and wanted him to settle down on a farm and be a real honest-to-goodness hard working man the rest of his days; that if he went to the city and learned city ways he would likely land in the penitentiary.

Mr. Franklin said when he arrived at the school in Kentucky at the age of 21, he was asked to add 12 and 16 and could not do it, and he was asked to find the verb and noun in a simple sentence and he could not, because all the education he had in the mountains of Kentucky was about 10 days out of each year, and the school he attended was taught by an old rheumatic school teacher. He spoke of his hard work to earn his way through school, working many an hour for seven cents husking corn and delivering papers, and never a time, he said, did he call upon any outsider for help.

He worked his way through theological seminary and is a most polished person in deed and in truth. Mr. Franklin spoke of the wonderful opportunity for service among those mountain people. He said that in place of the old cabin school where he attended 10 days out of each year, there was now a \$20,000 modern school building with 25 teachers.

It was interesting to hear him tell what they do with old clothes, which are so eagerly sought by those mountain people. They pay all their school expenses and other expenses through the sale of cast off clothing sent to them through charitable people. Mr. Franklin said they could sell anything, and mentioned about a mountaineer woman who bought a pair of false teeth that had been shipped in with some toys and paid 25 cents for them. She said she never had teeth and would try them out. She took them home and boiled out the "vulcanizer" for three hours and, of course, rinsed them. Another case of where a young fellow wore a cast off dress suit at a ball game because he liked to see the coat tail flap in the wind.

"But in spite of it all," declared Mr. Franklin, "those people are eager to learn; to become something."

Mr. Franklin did not make any appeal for funds, but did say he would be grateful for old clothing if sent to him at Sprucepine, N. C., as they could make so much good use of what was sent him. It was indeed a treat to hear from one who is doing a real service.

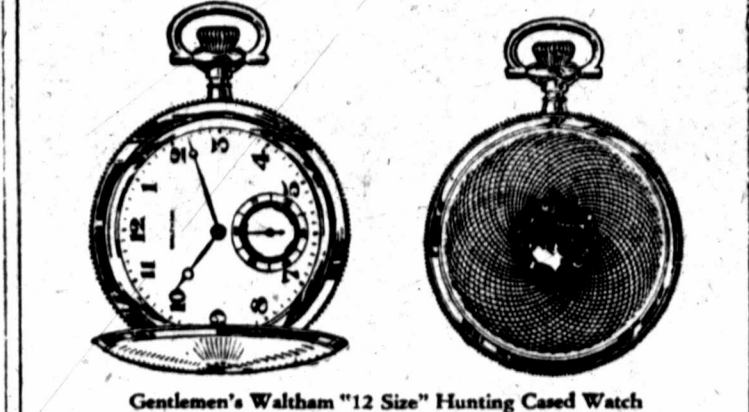
