FRANCE TO PAY ALL HER DEBTS

PARRISH'S CONDITION VERY ENCOURAGING; IN A LOCAL HOSPITAL

Congressman Lucian W. Parrish was resting nicely early Friday afternoon at the hospital of the Wichita Falls Medical and Surgical clinic after his trip here from Stamford Thursday night and the setting of his fractured jaw Friday morning. His injuries were not so serious as first reports indicated and consist of a simple fracture of the jaw, the loss of one tooth, a molar, bruises upon his face and an abrasion upon the ear.

Mr. Parrish was accompanied from Stamford Thursday night by Frank Parrish, his brother, Dr. A. K. Edwards, his brother-in-law, and Dr. Q. B. Lee of this city. Dr. Lee Friday morning issued the following bulletin on Mr. Parrish's condition:

LEADERS OF BOTH PARTIES IN SENATE ENDORSE DEMANDS

DECLARE U. S. SHOULD INSIST ON PAYMENT OF GERMAN BILL; HUGHES DRAFTS NOTE TO ALLIED GOVERNMENTS

WASHINGTON, March 17.—Declaration that the United States should insist upon payment of its bill of \$241,000,000 for keeping American soldiers in Germany, were made in the senate today by both party leaders. Senators Lodge and Underwood, and Underwood of Alabama and Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, Mr. Underwood urged appointment of an American representative on the allied reparations commission.

HOUSTON PLANS A STATEWIDE FIGHT ON PHONE COMPANY

HOUSTON, March 17.—A statewide fight on the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company was planned today by the city council of Houston, Mayor G. F. Holcomb, city attorney Sewell Meyer and C. K. Kelley, telephone rate expert of Chicago in the employ of the city of Houston, will go to Fort Worth next Monday night for a conference with Fort Worth officials Tuesday. They hope to line up a number of the leading cities of the state for a fight on both station and long distance rates.

JUDGE DISPOSES OF 114 CASES DURING THE TERM; 105 PLEAS OF GUILTY

WACO, TEXAS, March 17.—Judge Duval West disposed of 114 criminal cases during the term of the United States district court here which closed February 27. Of these 105 were pleas of guilty. Nearly all of the cases were for violation of the federal prohibition law. Only one contended case failed of conviction. Court will be resumed here September 11.

OBENCHAIN CASE IS NOW WITH THE JURY

LOS ANGELES, March 17.—The case of Mrs. Madeline Obenchain, charged with the murder of J. Belmont Kennedy, was ready for the jury at noon today when Judge Reeve finished reading his instructions. Judge Reeve then directed the jury to elect a foreman, after which it was to be taken to jail before beginning its deliberations.

ASSURANCE GIVEN BY PREMIER TO CORRECT AN IMPRESSION THAT U. S. COULD NOT COLLECT A SOU

PARIS, March 17.—Premier Poincare told the finance committee of the senate yesterday that France will pay all her debts, as has been her custom. This declaration is interpreted by the press as intended to correct the impression made by Louis F. Loucheur's speech in Lyons last month in which he said it was his belief that France would be able to pay a sou of her debt to the United States.

OPERATORS REFUSE TO MEET MINERS IN WAGE CONFERENCE

WASHINGTON, March 17.—Secretary of Labor Clegg today announced that he had refused to meet with the United Mine Workers to consider a new working agreement to replace that expiring March 31. The only exception to the general refusal of the operators, the secretary said, was demonstrated by the wage conference on a basic coal operators association, he added, but tentatively agreed to the joint conference proposals but later had withdrawn from the conference.

TWO BURN TO DEATH IN FIRE IN EAST ST. LOUIS

EAST ST. LOUIS, March 17.—Hermon Nelson, 24, of Belleville, and "Chief" Howell, 23, of DuQuoin, were burned to death today in a fire which destroyed a shed behind a soft drink parlor at Edgecumbe near here. Two men were arrested for questioning in connection with the fire.

FIND CLOTHING AND JEWELRY OF WOMAN MURDER IS FEARED

DALLAS, March 17.—The sheriff's department today was seeking an explanation of the discovery late yesterday at an hotel spot near here of a woman's dress, slip, underclothing and articles of jewelry. The clothing apparently had been washed with a knife and the condition of some of the jewelry, including a broken ear ring, led officers to believe there had been a struggle. The articles were reported in a newspaper dated March 11. Some officers expressed the belief that a woman had met with foul play.

AUSTIN, TEXAS, March 17.—Public Commissioner J. B. Copeland and F. G. Reynolds, clerk of a local fraternal organization were adjudged to be in contempt of court by Judge J. H. Hamilton of the criminal district court for refusal to answer questions asked them by the grand jury. Judge Hamilton imposed a fine of \$100 on each of the defendants and ordered them remanded to jail until they paid the fine.

OUTLINE POSITION OF ITALY REGARDING STATUS OF FIUME

By Associated Press. ROME, March 17.—The position of the Italian government in regard to the status of Fiume after the recent overthrow of the Zanelli government was outlined yesterday in the chamber of deputies by Foreign Minister Schanzer. Recalling that Italy by the treaty of Rapallo was pledged to respect the independence and liberty of the free state of Fiume, he declared that if she failed to meet this obligation she would lose her place in the ranks of the great powers. He traced the events in Fiume since the installation of the constituent assembly and referring to the recent coup which overthrew the legal government, said there had been fantastic stories of train loads of fascists leaving Trieste for Fiume. This was an absurd exaggeration, he declared. Actually, there had been a very small influx of fascists who had entered separately. Their exclusion was difficult in view of the geographical position of the town and the fact that the government disclaimed responsibility for their entrance. Signor Schanzer condemned the conduct of all who applied to usurp powers of state by disposing of the destiny of Fiume against the will of her legitimate representatives, thereby exposing the whole Italian nation to the gravest perils and impending the economic resurrection of Fiume itself. Italy's duty, said the foreign minister, was to save Fiume from certain decay by energetic action. He insisted that the only stable government possible in Fiume was one expressing the sincere free will of the people. Such a government Italy promised economic and moral support.

FOUR ARE WOUNDED IN CLASH STAGED AT CORK

CORK, March 17.—Four persons were wounded in a clash early today between republican police and members of the procession ignored orders to disperse and shots were exchanged. One of the wounded was a policeman.

DR. WIEDEFELD MAY BE THE NEW GERMAN AMBASSADOR TO U.S.

By Associated Press. BERLIN, March 17.—Chancellor Wirth's long search for a man to fill the post of ambassador to the United States appears to be nearing an end. Although at the foreign office yesterday it was stated that "no choice has yet been made" the chancellor's efforts for the last week are known to have been centered on Dr. Otto Ludwig Wiedefeld, a leading member of the Krupp directorate and one of the foremost German industrialists and economists. Dr. Wiedefeld, who left for Essen last night after a consultation with the chancellor and Foreign Minister Rathenau, declared he had not given the subject final consideration. While Dr. Wiedefeld is known to be acceptable to the government, whose confidence he enjoys, strong efforts are being made by circles outside the cabinet to persuade him to remain at home where it is argued would be of more urgent need. Dr. Wiedefeld in the last year has repeatedly represented the government in the United States in connection with the reparations discussions. Prior to leaving himself with Krupp he occupied important ministerial positions in the home office where he attained high rank as a civil service official. He spent three months traveling in the United States shortly before the war.

SMALL QUANTITY OF WHEAT IS STORED IN THE UNITED STATES

WASHINGTON, March 17.—Stocks of wheat in country mills and elevators March 1 were estimated at 22,544,000 bushels by the United States department of agriculture. This is the smallest quantity in the record of reports made to the department for that date during the past 10 years, with the exception of March 1, 1918, when the abnormally low stock of 24,000,000 bushels followed the small wheat crop of 1917. Exports of wheat from the 1921 crop have been heavy and country mills and elevators possess only nine per cent of that crop. This is the smallest percentage for these stocks in the same month in ten years. The highest record is 14 per cent. Average wheat stocks in country mills and elevators March 1 during the past 10 years were about 25,000,000 bushels. The stock this year was 28 per cent less than the year average. Wheat stocks in country mills and elevators were as much as 154,000,000 bushels in 1915, or 113 per cent more than the 1921 figures.

FULLEST CO-OPERATION IS PLEDGED THE LEGION BY SECRETARY DAVIS

WASHINGTON, March 17.—"Fuller cooperation" with the American Legion in its "employment day" drive next Monday to find jobs for 700,000 unemployed veterans of the world war, was urged in a statement issued today by Secretary of Labor Davis. "During our emergency," he said, "they served us, offering their all, and placed the national interest above their own. It is now the duty of all good American citizens to see that they are provided for. They ask no charity, but only a chance to render further service in honest employment. Work makes the flag fly. Help the American Legion hang it as high in peace as in war."

KING OF EGYPT IS CONGRATULATED BY VISCOUNT ALLENBY

By Associated Press. CAIRO, EGYPT, March 16.—The proclamation of the king, Fuad, as king of Egypt today, was accompanied by the firing of salutes of 101 guns in Cairo, Alexandria, and Port Said, and of 21 guns in all the other provincial capitals. Field Marshal Viscount Allenby, hitherto the British high command, accompanied by members of his staff, called at the royal palace and congratulated King Fuad, whom he addressed as "your majesty."

MAN KILLED WHILE DRIVING INTO WAGO FURNISHES MYSTERY

WAGO, TEXAS, March 17.—The murder of W. W. Shropshire, a wood hauler, while he was driving into the city with a load of wood last night, is so far shrouded in mystery. Two men are held as suspects, but nothing tangible has developed as to the guilty parties. Officers are working on the theory that he was murdered by a wife man. Shropshire had seven bullets in his back when found dead sitting on his load of wood. His team was standing in the road inside the city limits but it is believed the shooting took place before he reached the city. He was shot with a shotgun, as evidenced by buckshot taken from his wounds.

CHAIRMAN KAHN IS AGAINST PROPOSED ARMY LIMITATIONS

DECLARES PLAN ALTOGETHER TOO DRASTIC AT THE PRESENT TIME.

SAYS FALSE ECONOMY IS POOREST ECONOMY

Wants Provision Made For at Least 150,000 Men and 13,000 Officers.

WASHINGTON, March 17.—Warning members of congress that "false economy is the poorest kind of economy," Chairman Kahn of the House Military Affairs committee declared today during consideration of the army appropriation bill that reduction in the number of the regular army to 115,000 enlisted men and 11,000 officers, as proposed in the measure would be "altogether too drastic a cut at the present time."

The California representative said that any provision should be made for 150,000 men and 13,000 officers during the present year, as requested by the war department, or congress were determined to direct a reduction in the interests of economy that the enlisted strength should not be decreased below 140,000 men.

"Safely it has seemed to become profitable on the part of a good many of the men in congress to insist on cutting down the allowances for our army and navy," Mr. Kahn said. "Economy is the watchword of a good many legislators. But let me call the attention of the house to the fact that false economy is the poorest kind of economy."

Reviews Situation.
Reviewing the military situation prior to the entrance of the United States into the world war, the chairman asserted that by reason of our lack of preparedness, we were compelled to expend during the nine-month period of the war the startling sum of \$24,000,000,000.

When compared to the expenditures of the American people for pleasure or nonessential commodities, the outlay for military purposes "sank into comparative insignificance," he contended, as he cited a variety of statistics.

During the fiscal year 1921, the house was told, when appropriations for the regular army, national guard and the organized reserves aggregated \$415,000,000, the public spent \$97,000,000 for admission to theatres, concerts, cabarets, baseball games and other entertainments; \$1,151,000,000 for tobacco and related materials; \$250,000,000 for candy and chewing gum; \$124,000,000 for soda and confections, and \$959,000,000 for personal adornment.

Comparing the expenditures of the United States during 1920-21 on its army with that expended by other nations, Mr. Kahn said the British "standard" expenditure totaled \$41,155,202, or \$22.22 per capita, while those of the British empire, exclusive of dependencies, amounted to \$142,122,000, or \$12.15 per capita; France \$923,327, or \$22.52 per capita; Italy \$246,981,200, or \$47.70 per capita, and Japan \$189,082,900, or \$2.18 per capita.

"These figures show that we are exceedingly mindful of the welfare of our people in keeping down military costs and expenditures," declared the speaker.

Contrast is Made.
Contrasting with other leading powers the size of the army in comparison with the population, Mr. Kahn said that for the years 1921 the number in the American army was 1.42 per 1,000 population, while the number in Great Britain was 1.24, France 14.47, Italy 3.17, Japan 1.5 and China 4.02.

"A comparison of our national health with the number of soldiers is maintained in the regular army," the house was informed, "shows that each soldier is charged with affording protection and national security to \$1,745,537 of the \$28,000,000,000 total of our national health."

"Each of these soldiers is at the present time protecting some 25 square miles of territory of our mainland and dependencies and with living 143 of our people a guard against foreign interference with their constitutional rights in their pursuit of health, happiness and lawful gain. All this at a cost of \$2 per capita of population."

The army appropriation bill which still is in the hands of the committee, Mr. Kahn is chairman, was framed under the new rules of the House, by a subcommittee of five members of the appropriation committee, headed by Representative Anthony, Republican, Kansas.

A movement to aid unemployed ex-service men in Wichita county will be launched next Tuesday by an announcement made today by Dr. L. J. Lucey, post adjutant of the Pat Carrigan post. Detailed plans have not yet been worked out by Legion officers, but a survey to determine the number and location of unemployed ex-service men will be the first thing undertaken.

A bureau will be established in the business section of town, Dr. Lucey states, and all soldiers, sailors or marines who saw service in the world war will be requested to register. From this the unemployed men can be picked.

SPECIAL LIQUOR COURT TO TRY THOUSANDS OF CASES ON THE DOCKET

CHICAGO, March 17.—A special liquor court for the trial of thousands of cases that now are cluttering the dockets of federal and state courts was being planned today by State's Attorney Robert E. Crowe. This action followed the request of local federal officials yesterday that the state take jurisdiction in some 2,900 cases pending in federal courts.

The request for the transfer of the cases was made by United States District Attorney Charles E. Cline and it was believed here that the move was part of a nation wide plan. United States Attorney General Daugherty has recently made it clear that he wanted state courts to handle their share of liquor prosecutions and that there was no intention that all such cases be sent to federal jurisdiction.

SEIZE VESSEL WITH CONTRABAND LIQUOR 30 SHOTS ARE FIRED

NEW YORK, March 17.—Fifteen special revenue agents today arrested 24 men after a pistol battle aboard a two-masted schooner, said to have been loaded with contraband liquor in the East river. More than 30 shots were exchanged. The schooner, whose cargo of liquor was said to be worth nearly half a million dollars, was seized.

RETAIL FOOD PRICES DECLINE IN JANUARY

WASHINGTON, March 17.—Retail food costs for the average family in the United States during February were 8.3 per cent less than they were during January, according to the compilations made by the United States department of labor today. This decrease, combined with others that have occurred since February 15, 1921, made the total reductions for a year average eleven per cent.

Wholesale prices during February however, showed a tendency to increase. Since February a year ago, the bureau estimates, wholesale prices have declined 9 1/2 per cent.

MANY CHIHUAHUA MINES REOPENING

State Will Soon Be Back to Normal Output Before The Revolution.

EL PASO, TEXAS, March 17.—Mines in the state of Chihuahua, Mexico, are opening up at the rate of almost one a week, according to mining men here, and that state will be back to mining as fully as it was at its best before the revolutions in Mexico in a very short time.

Plenty of buying is going on in the state, it is reported, the people are optimistic and big holders have confidence in the state and national governments. The miniature revolution suppressed a few weeks ago, which ended when the commander and his second in command were arrested in Texas, has in no way dampened the spirits of business men, it is said.

One of the men interested in Chihuahua is Dr. Edward Auer, German, Italian, French and English, as well as Americans are investing heavily in Mexico and in the mines of Chihuahua. He said: "All these persons investing their money are hoping for recognition but are not waiting for it. Many people waited for months for recognition and did not go ahead. They waited for recognition to obtain recognition stand in the way of business opportunities. When recognition does come many additional millions will pour into Mexico, helping all the countries."

Dr. Auer is interested in a company which is planning to inaugurate a private airship service between the mines in the Sierra Madre and Chihuahua City. He hopes to have freight carrying planes to carry supplies and ore. As it takes a week to make the trip and an airplane only two hours, he hopes to secure a large amount of traffic.

REQUIRE TEXAS ROADS TO REDUCE THE RATES ON SUGAR IN THE STATE

WASHINGTON, March 17.—Railroads in Texas under an interstate-commerce commission order issued today will be required to reduce rates on sugar moving entirely within the state of Texas from refineries at Sugarland, Texas. The federal commission some time ago held that the Texas state railroad commission could not make rates within the state of Texas which were lower than interstate rates existing after the rate increases of 1920. Sugar was included in this ruling but later, according to the terms of the order issued today, the railroads voluntarily reduced their rates on sugar from Louisiana and Gulf coast refineries into Texas.

This later action of the railroads in reducing the interstate rates, the commission said today, made it necessary that refineries at Sugarland be given opportunity to compete for state business on a parity of rates with the refineries in other states and it consequently withdrew the requirement of the general that sugar rates within the state be increased.

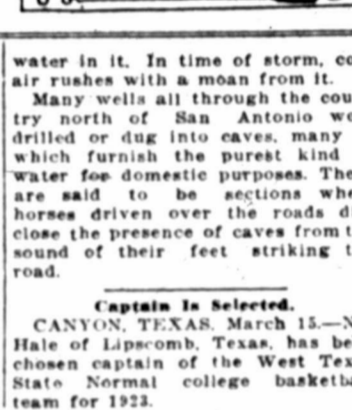
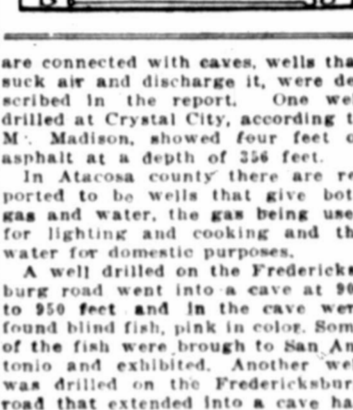
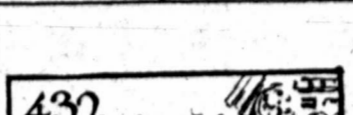

TWENTY KILLED AND THIRTY WOUNDED IN EAST AFRICAN RIOTS

By Associated Press.
LONDON, March 17.—Twenty natives were killed and thirty wounded at Nairobi, British East Africa, yesterday in fighting which followed demonstrations over the arrest of the Indian agitator Thuku, says a Central News dispatch.

Thuku was arrested Wednesday and trouble immediately followed. About one thousand natives armed with sticks assembled before the police station and demanded his release, but were dispersed by police forces who used their bayonets.

Early yesterday a strike of house boys and other native workers was announced and further disturbances occurred in which large numbers from the surrounding district participated. Mobs pelted Europeans and forced all Europeans to alight and walk. The effort of armed police to clear the streets failed.

When the situation became menacing the riot act was read and the demonstrators were exhorted to disperse quietly. Instead they advanced toward the police, waving flags and shouting. Women were used as shields by the men to delay the police fire.

Meanwhile military forces had arrived. When the mob attempted to rush the palledo the troops were ordered to fire. Seeing fifty of their number cut down by the bullets, the remainder of the mob stampeded. The demonstrations then ceased.

ARRESTED IN CONNECTION WITH THE MINE STRIKE

JOHANNESBURG, UNION OF SOUTH AFRICA, March 17.—Joe Thompson, president of the augmented executive board of the South African industrial federation, has been arrested in connection with the mine strike. The rebel leaders, Fisher and Spendiff, who were found dead in Trades hall at Johannesburg after the bombardment of the city by government forces, committed suicide, according to an official statement. The body bore surgical marks, but it is thought these were caused after their death.

SHOW IMPROVEMENT IN THE EMPLOYMENT SITUATION IN U. S.

WASHINGTON, March 17.—Reports from widely separated states from Michigan to Texas and from New York to Kansas, show an improvement in the employment situation, according to Colonel Arthur Wood, chairman of the emergency committee of the president's conference on unemployment.

MURDER CHARGE FILED IN CONNECTION WITH KILLING

EL PASO, March 17.—Charges of murder were filed today against Fred McChurd, formerly of Cleveland, in connection with the death of Miss Louise Frenzelt, 22, of El Paso.

The young woman's body was found near her home last Monday night with a bullet wound in her head. Her parents told city detectives that she had gone to fill an engagement with McChurd the evening she was killed.

WOMAN KIDNAPS HER TWO CHILDREN

Were In School in Oklahoma With Father—Wins Race With Officers.

ARDMORE, OKLA., March 17.—Kidnaping her 13 year old daughter and her 10 year old son as she met them on their way to school at Madill, near here, yesterday, Mrs. C. A. Allen of Denison, Texas, bundled the children in a service car and escaped across the Red river into Texas in a race with a sheriff's posse, according to reports to county authorities. Mrs. Allen and her husband, C. A. Allen, a Madill business man, are said to have been separated for some time.

In breaking off marital ties it was said to have been agreed that each parent was to have custody of the children for six months of each year. August the father was to bring the boy and girl to Madill and placed them in care of relatives and started them to school.

When the six months had elapsed Allen is said to have refused to permit the children to return to the father. According to William Dickerson, one of the sheriff's force, Mrs. Allen came to Madill yesterday, hired a service car, stopped near the Allen home and as the children came out on their way to school, induced them to get into the machine and then fled. Habeas corpus proceedings to obtain the return of the children are said to have been instituted in Denison by Allen.

LEAVES DENISON WITH CHILDREN FOR HOUSTON

DENISON, TEXAS, March 17.—Mrs. C. A. Allen of Houston, Texas, who is alleged to have kidnaped her 13 year old daughter and 10 year old son from their father, C. A. Allen of Madill, Okla., yesterday, left here with the children for Houston, the police department states.

No attempt was made to apprehend Mrs. Allen who was given complete custody of the children by a divorce decree granted several months ago in Houston, officers say. According to Chief of Police Russell, Mrs. Allen told him that Allen had visited her in Houston several days and with her consent had "borrowed" the children for an hour. When he failed to return them Mrs. Allen came to Denison, where she took a service car to Madill. She found the chief stated, that Allen had placed the boy and girl in a school there. Stopping there while they were on the way home from school, Mrs. Allen placed the children in a Denison service car and drove here. Along the way she was stopped by deputies and constables but the divorce decree secured her passage into Texas, the chief said Mrs. Allen told him.

TO FILE HABEAS CORPUS PROCEEDINGS AT MADILL

MADILL, OKLA., March 17.—Habeas corpus proceedings will be filed in the district court by G. A. Allen, local merchant, according to his statement, today to obtain custody of his young son and daughter who was taken into Texas yesterday by their mother, after she had induced them to enter an automobile here. Murray county authorities also have sought aid of Texas officials in locating Mrs. Allen and the two children, it was said.

NEGRESS REPUTED TO BE 122 YEARS OLD IS DEAD

MOUNT VERNON, ILL., March 17.—Margaret Edmison, a negress reputed to be 122 years old, is dead at her home here. She was almost blind and very feeble for several months before her death.

FRENCH SHIP WITH CONTRABAND OF WAR SEIZED BY GREECE

ATHENS, March 17.—News has been received here of the seizure of another French steamship alleged to be carrying contraband of war destined for the Turkish nationalists.

Greece appears to have reached a deadlock with France over the case of the steamship Espoir, which was seized last month but released March 2, the cargo being held.

SEIZURE OF VESSELS IS COMPLICATING SITUATION

ROME, March 17.—The situation created by the seizure of Italian ships by the Greek government is becoming more complicated. It is said today the Greeks, besides seizing the steamship Africa, had not given a satisfactory explanation of the Abbaia, which was seized a few days ago on the ground that she was carrying contraband of war for the Turkish nationalists, with whom Greece is at war. An explanation of this seizure was asked by the Italian minister at Athens.

FRENCH CANADIAN IS HELD IN FORT WORTH; CHARGE THEFT OF MAIL

FORT WORTH, March 17.—C. H. Bourbeau, young French Canadian, who speaks and writes four different languages, including Latin, was arrested by federal officers today on a charge of stealing mail from a locked box and of writing letters—part of one in Latin—with the intention to defraud.

Officers declare Bourbeau found the key in the box of an oil paper. It had been left there by the office boy. Opening the box, he took out the letters and opened them it is alleged. He spent the money and preserved the checks, according to the federal officers. Then he wrote a letter to the publisher declaring he would burn the checks immediately unless he was sent \$100, said the arresting officers. Part of this letter is said to have been written in Latin.

FORMER U. S. ATTORNEY FOUND DEAD IN SPOKANE

SPOKANE, WASH., March 17.—Oscar L. Cain, former U. S. district attorney for the eastern district of Washington, was found dead in the bathroom of his residence last night with his throat slashed.

"THE KINGDOM" IS BISHOP MOUZON'S MORNING SUBJECT

PREACHES TO LARGE CROWD AT FLORAL HEIGHTS REVIVAL SERVICE.

IMPRESSIVE PRAYER SERVICE FOLLOWS SERMON

Special Address to High School Students to Feature Friday Night Meeting.

The first morning service at the Floral Heights revival was held at 10 o'clock Friday morning. Bishop Mouzon spoke on the subject, "The Coming of the Kingdom." He made a very strong appeal to those present for high and purposeful living. He spoke in part as follows: "My text this morning is Math. 6:10 and also Math. 6:33: 'Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness.' Jesus taught more about the kingdom of God than anything else. It is said that every great prophet and teacher has a key word for his message. With Moses it was the law; with Jesus it was the kingdom of God; with Mohammed it was God; with Jesus it was the kingdom of God. My text is the central petition of the Lord's prayer: 'Thy kingdom come.' He concludes the exhortation in this sixth chapter of Matthew with the words, 'Seek ye first the kingdom of God. This means—first to advance the interests of the kingdom of God, as well as to seek to get into the kingdom of God yourself. This kingdom was not temporal but spiritual. The Jews thought it was temporal and hence were disappointed in Jesus and put him to death. Many people today, looking for a temporal kingdom, misinterpret the Old Testament scriptures. Again, his kingdom is a present reality. It is already here, but for its entirety we wait and look forward. John the Baptist said, 'If ye hear at hand' Jesus said, 'The kingdom is within you, just as the kingdom of Great Britain is in the hearts of the people, so the kingdom of God is in your heart and mind. The kingdom of God is that new order of society in which God is recognized as Father and our fellow-men as brothers. What I am in Wichita Falls for is to try to help Christ get into human society. 'What is Jesus program? You will find it in the Bible, in the words of Jesus himself. He says the spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor, to heal the broken hearted, to set at liberty them that are bruised, to preach the gospel to the poor, to heal the broken hearted, to set at liberty them that are bruised, to preach the gospel to the poor, to heal the broken hearted, to set at liberty them that are bruised. John the Baptist had doubts, after he was cast into prison, as to whether Jesus was the Son of God and the promised Messiah. So he sent messengers to Jesus to know whether or not he were the Christ. Jesus answered: 'Go tell John that the blind receive their sight, the deaf are raised and the poor have the gospel preached unto them. The words of Jesus are his credentials. So the credentials of Christianity are the program and works of Jesus. 'One hears a great deal these days about social problems. It is the theme of many sermons until one is led to believe that Christianity itself is a problem. I want to say that Christianity is the solution of all problems. The only hope of the world is the religion of Jesus Christ. The world would not be what it is for the work of Christ and his church. Christianity is not a problem, not even a matter of theology, but it is, first of all, a matter of personal surrender to Jesus Christ. 'Let us look into this prayer of Jesus a little more fully. Hallowed be thy name—let God's name be holy, in our homes, in our schools, in our legislative halls, in our business, everywhere. Give us this day

our daily bread—not simply food to eat but the bread of life which we bring about such a condition of society as that there may not be anywhere a widow who is hungry or a little child crying for bread. Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors. Not only do we wish the forgiveness of our own sins but we want to help God make a community of brothers and sisters in which love is the dominant note. Lead us not into temptation—does not mean that we are to be content with what draw ourselves from things that contaminate and damn our children, but it means that in addition to keeping ourselves clean that we will ask God for moral courage to see to it that the cesspools of iniquity and vice be cleaned. 'How can we help to answer the prayer—thy kingdom come? We cannot make it come unless we love our fellow men, and men as well as good men, the unlovable as well as the lovable. We need to pray that the love of God may be shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost. You cannot be interested merely in the souls of men but must be interested in their bodies as well. We do not have the headache I would not be interested in reading Tennyson's 'In Memoriam.' If I had the toothache I would not be interested in Beethoven. There are multitudes in our hearts who are sorely pressed. Of course they ought to go to church, but if they do not the church most certainly ought to go to them. Ben Adhem got his name on God's honor roll by loving his fellow men, and so you and I can help make the kingdom of God to come by loving men in this meeting. At the conclusion of the sermon the bishop asked all persons praying for some loved one or friend to come forward and kneel in the chapel for a prayer. 'Let us pool our prayers this morning' said the bishop. A large number gathered in response to his request. It was quite evident that the sermon of the morning had stirred the hearts of all present. Those in charge of the meeting expressed themselves as highly pleased with the large audience. The auditorium was more than half full for the first morning service. Methodist ministers from all over Wichita Falls district have been invited to attend the meetings and will be entertained free by the members of the Floral Heights congregation and several of them are availing themselves of the privilege thus afforded. At the conclusion of the service it was announced that Friday night would be high school night, at

which time Bishop Mouzon will speak especially to young people. His subject will be "Ministry in Manhood." Announcements of this service were made in all rooms at the high school and also in some of the grade schools. Parents of all students are cordially invited to come with their children to the service. "Bishop Mouzon is unusually strong in his appeal to young people," says an announcement. "It is not often that the young people of the community have the opportunity to hear so distinguished a man with a world outlook in a local pulpit. The bishop has planned this service for Friday night in order that the students will not have work to detain them at home. It is freshly predicted that the auditorium of the church will be taxed to seat a large number of students who will desire to be present in addition to the usual congregation. "One of the special features of the service will be a male quartet, 'He Lives on High.' Mr. Von Allmen taking the solo part, assisted by Messrs. Evans, Rhoda and Pease. The children's service will be held at 4 p. m. as usual and the evening service at 7:45.

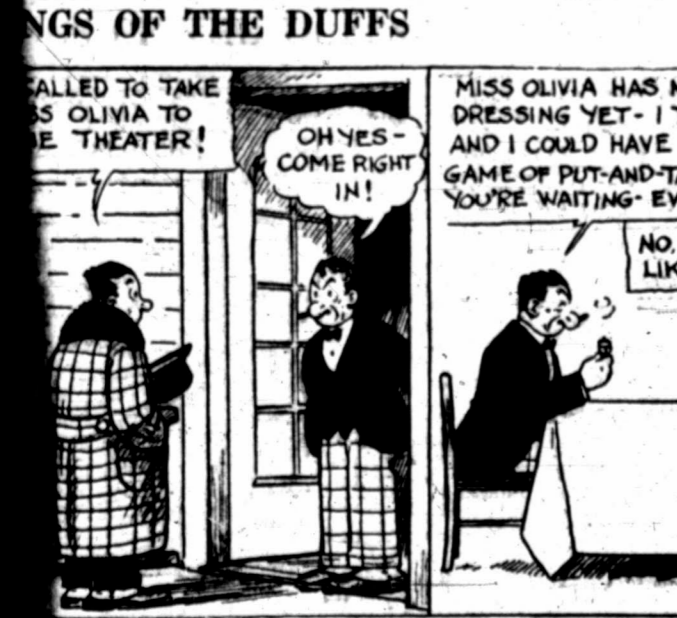
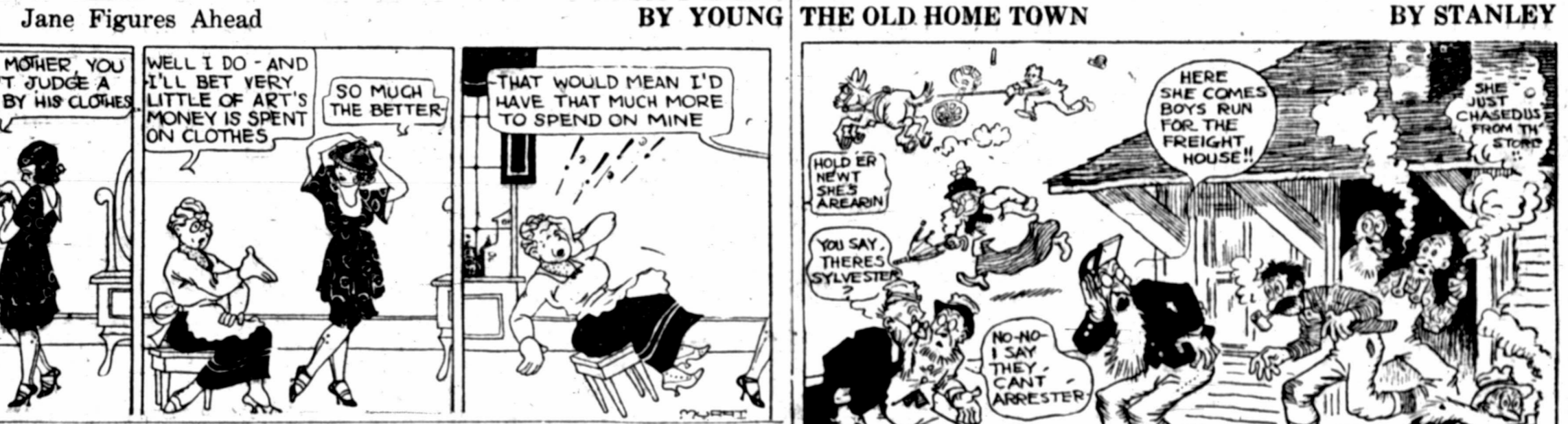
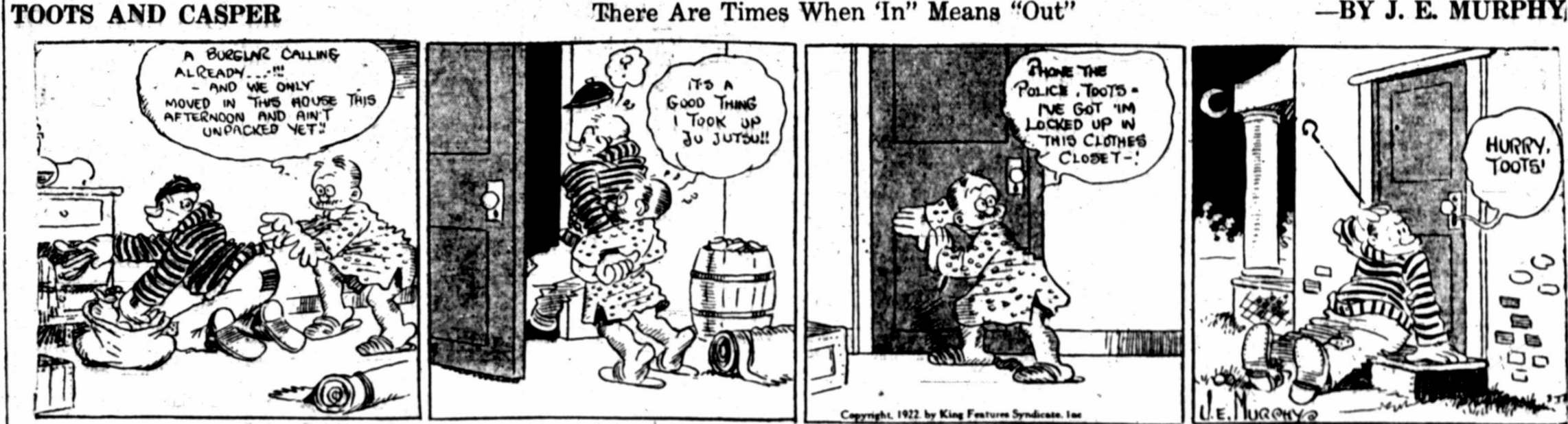
