





#### WHERE ARE WE HEADED?

At Nashville, Tenn., Walter Gibbs was killed while trying to defend Joel Harris, a 65 year old man from masked men who were attempting to Beverely.

At Dallas masked men entered the home of F. H. Etheridge, knocked down his daughter when she sought to prevent them from dragging off her father, took him to the outskirts of the city and beat him unmercifully.

At Beaumont a party of men seized J. A. Pelt on the porch of his home after they had beaten his home every shade of opinion and every sort of him over the head with a revolver and had knocked decent thinking folks—the man with an open mind, down his wife. They took him into the country where they whipped, tarred and feathered him. Pelt is 63 years of age.

These incidents were reported in Tuesday's Times. Similar incidents are being reported every uplifting. day. They have become so common as to lose some of their news value. There is scarcely a community in the state that has not had its whipping and tarring party. And one such party has been followed by others. At Dallas there has been a reguar epidemic of them. Men everywhere are setting themselves up as judges over other men and convicting them of misconduct and are themselves, under cover of masks, inflicting punishment. Rights man can know when he may become the victim of

It has been said that these masked parties have not given any punishment that was not deserved. This may be true. It may be true also that some good men have taken part in these whipping parties. But they are outrages nevertheless and violations of orderly justice. They preach that might makes right and that what can be gotten away with is right and proper. They are an incentive to criminal instincts wherever these instincts exist. Their logical development is a state of terrorism, anarchy of a mind. and crime. WHEAT FIRST IN EXPORTS (Dallas News)

uff the other day when it heralded the department of agriculture's statement that the exports of wheat and wheat flour were of greater value last year than gestible over a long period than chocolate cake, the exports, of cotton. It had never happened before since the government began to keep tab on such things. Cotton has always been the country's chief foreign-money getter, and was even during the two years immediately following the war, when Europe had to give first claim on a depleted purse to its food

In point of volume, however, there was an increase in the exports both of wheat and cotton last year, compared with the exports for the year before, circumstance that may be taken as evidence of Europe's recuperation, and in something like the same ortion. In 1921 the exports of wheat amounted to 279,949,000 bushels, as against 218,287,000 bushels in 1926, while, as for cotton, the exports were 6,678,000 bales in 1921, as against 6.359,000 bales in 1920. It is evident, therefore, that it is partly because of a greater increase in the price of wheat than in the price of cotton that, last year for the first time, it secame the country's foreign-money getter.

Not less noteworthy are the facts concerning rice, as given in the department of agriculture's statement. 




