LEVEE BREAKS AND 25 BLOCKS OF CITY UNDER FOUR FOOT OF WATER

TWO SOLDIERS DEAD NINE MORE INJURED RESULT EXPLOSION

SAN ANTONIO, April 11.—A faulty rocket which fell back and ignited three large piles of pyrotechnics was the cause of the explosion and subsequent death of two men and serious injury of 11 others at Camp Bullis, 25 miles north of here, last night.

The men were unable to get out of the pit during the explosion of the rockets and illuminating shells and the men were badly burned and died immediately while another lived until this morning.

The injured are Adolph Alaira of Orange, Texas; Harry Smith of Detroit, Robert Muir of Washington, Ike S. Leman of Port Arthur, Texas, Ernest Hann of Dallas, Ala., Matthew Vandover of Wilmington, Fla., Catchings of San Antonio, and Antonio Duarte of New Bedford, Mass.

Private Robert Green, address not given, and Frank Walker, Norman, Okla.

BEARDSTOWN, ILL., April 11.—Blown into a fury by high wind, which sprung up this morning, Beardstown levee gave way at 11:10 o'clock, driving all workmen away and burying 25 city blocks under a four foot sheet of water.

FREEZING TEMPERATURES ADD TO DISCOMFORTS

TOPEKA, KAN., April 11.—Freezing temperatures throughout the greater portion of the state last night, accompanied by a cold west wind, brought added discomfort to the thousands of persons who were forced from their homes by one of the worst general floods in the history of eastern Kansas.

ST. LOUIS, April 11.—With the Mississippi and Missouri rivers continuing to rise more than 10 families residing near here were reported as having to leave their homes and more than 12,000 acres of farm land were said to be inundated.

BODY OF RANCHMAN BURIED AT AMARILLO

AMARILLO, April 11.—W. G. Ivy, 22, Quay county, New Mexico, ranchman, who was stabbed to death Sunday afternoon on his ranch near Glen Rio, was buried this afternoon. His wife, who is a Taumehart, N. M., is reported as suffering a slight cut on the hand, and will be in the custody of the sheriff and will be given a hearing at Taumehart tomorrow.

67,000 MEN WOULD REDUCE U. S. NAVAL RATIO BELOW 5-5-3

WASHINGTON, April 11.—Reduction of navy personnel to 47,000 enlisted men as provided in the naval appropriation bill now being considered by the house would reduce the American navy below the 5-5-3 ratio established by the arms conference and "would be most injurious to the prestige of the United States," Secretary Hughes today wrote Representative Ford, republican, Massachusetts.

PORTUGUESE AVIATORS LEAVE FOR SAO THIAGO

LISBON, April 10.—Captains Coutinho and the Portuguese aviators who were attempting a flight from Portugal to South America, have left St. Vincent island for the island of Sao Thigo, the southernmost point of the Cape Verde group, whence they will start Wednesday on a flight to the island of Fernando Noronha, off the Brazilian coast.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RESUMES INQUIRY INTO MINE CASES

INDIANAPOLIS, April 11.—Attorney General Daugherty was to resume today the investigation of the pending cases in federal court here under indictments returned more than a year ago against 25 coal operators and miners. He planned to leave here late today.

It was believed that the attorney general would resume conferences with Judge A. B. Anderson and Homer Elliott, United States district attorney, with whom he conferred yesterday. At his conference with the attorney general it is believed Judge Anderson declared he would not permit dismissal of the indictments under pending cases prohibit participation in any wage conference with miners.

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ELEMENTS ASSUME CALMNESS AFTER DAY OF ROLICKING

After pitching and tossing like the prize bronco, the elements assumed a calmness Tuesday morning and gave indications that the "truff stuff" was over. The north winds, which were responsible for the blustery day Monday, did not succeed in bringing temperatures down to the freezing point locally during the night. The lowest point reached was 49 degrees. Texline and Forgan, however, had a damaging frost according to the reports Tuesday by the local dispatchers' offices Tuesday morning. The temperature at the former place fell to 28 degrees and at Forgan to 22. Amarillo reported a low mark of 40 and Childress 46. Snow fell at all points north and west of Amarillo Monday morning and afternoon. All reports Tuesday morning, however, contained the words clear and calm. The high winds succeeded in destroying the wire service on the Wichita Falls and Northwestern Monday afternoon but normally was restored early Tuesday morning.

CONSIDERABLE PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT WORK IN TOWNS OF WEST TEXAS

STAMFORD, TEXAS, April 11.—Considerable public improvement work is now under way and is to be continued for throughout west Texas. Data assembled by the west Texas chamber of commerce recently shows accumulative increase in public projects. On April 11 Ballinger will vote on two bond issues, one for \$50,000 street paving and the other for \$25,000 of water works extension. At Burley, Ward county, on April 12, contracts will be let for the construction of 13 miles of hard surfaced road in Ward county. On April 15 at Pecos Reeves county, contract will be let for the construction of all concrete structures of 22 miles on highway No. 1, Coleman county is now constructing approximately \$400,000 of permanent highway. And Potter county is now building \$100,000 additional highways. Recently Potter county first two millions in the construction of asphalt rock highways. Memphis, Anson, Winters, Tahoka, Lamesa and Snyder are outlining plans for street paving.

JURY FINDS PARDY GUILTY AND GIVES ONE YEAR SENTENCE

After deliberating throughout the night, a jury in the 59th district court Tuesday morning returned a verdict of guilty in the case against Ralph Parody, charged with violation of the state liquor law and assessed his punishment at confinement in the state penitentiary for a term of one year. Parody was charged in an indictment as having sold whiskey at the filling station on Indiana street last December, where it was stated he was employed as a bartender. This was the third trial that defendant has had within the last month. The first trial resulted in a hung jury and the second resulted in an acquittal. He stood charged under three indictments all alleging the same offense. D. M. Perkins, a member of the present special grand jury, was called as a witness in the case after Charles Bryan, state witness, had testified that Mr. Perkins was with him when he made a purchase of whiskey. Mr. Bryan had made the purchase for the purpose of obtaining evidence. Mr. Perkins testified that he accompanied Mr. Bryan at the latter's request, and that he purchased and drank a bottle of soda pop.

PARTIAL REPORT CONSISTS OF 13 INDICTMENT BILLS

A partial report made by the special grand jury of the 78th district court Tuesday morning consisted of 13 true bills of indictment. The jury reported to Judge Napier that it had not concluded its work and returned to the grand jury room to proceed with its work. Only one of the indictments was made known Tuesday morning as the other defendants named were either out on bond or had never been arrested. Arthur Gray, negro, was indicted on a charge of burglary and re-arrested within a few minutes after an indictment against him on a similar charge had been quashed in the 59th court. The motion to quash set up that the indictment alleged that the offense named had been committed in "December" county, state of Texas.

MAN CHARGED WITH ASSAULT GOES ON TRIAL BEFORE JURY

J. A. Richards, charged under indictment with the offense of assault with intent to commit a statutory offense went on trial in the 59th district court before a jury Tuesday morning. It is charged that on or about June 1, 1921, he assaulted a little girl under the age of 15 years. The defendant was placed under arrest a few days after the alleged offense and is said to have been committed to the county jail. Richards is about 45 years of age. The charges against Ed Byers and John Hinton, charged with assault with intent to rob, were set down for trial for Thursday. John Hinton, charged with theft of property over the value of \$50, will face trial Wednesday morning.

HOUSE ON PRINCETON STREET DESTROYED BY FIRE TUESDAY

A small one story house at 2213 Princeton street, occupied by S. L. Smith, was destroyed by fire at 6 o'clock Tuesday morning with a loss of about \$500. The flames started in the roof and had spread over the entire structure before firemen could get to the scene. Members of the Smith family, aided by neighbors, removed practically all the furniture from the building before it was burned. Firemen at the central station were called out of bed a few minutes after midnight Monday when some one pulled the alarm box at Fourth and Lee streets. A thorough search of the neighborhood revealed no trace of a fire.

URGES VETERANS TO GO TO HOME TOWNS AND SECURE A JOB

APPEAL IS MADE BY THE NATIONAL COMMANDER OF LEGION.

TOO MANY CONGREGATE IN THE LARGE CITIES

Legion's Effort to Find Employment is Gaining in Effectiveness.

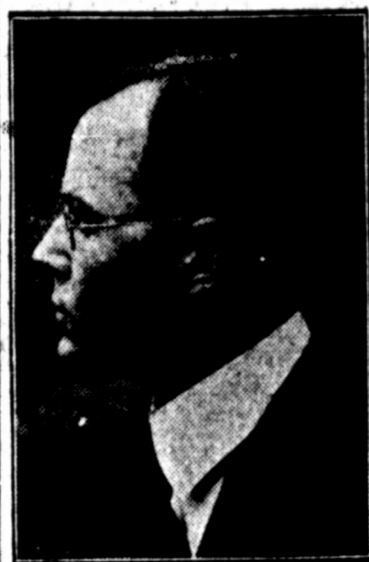
INDIANAPOLIS, April 11.—Ex-service men of the country were asked to go back to the home town and get a job, in an appeal which Hanford MacNider, national commander of the American Legion, today asked the Associated Press to broadcast to jobless veterans who he said are congregating in large cities where unemployment is becoming worse.

The legion's effort to find employment for the 700,000 jobless ex-service men began three weeks ago, is gaining in effectiveness, Mr. MacNider said. "I cannot emphasize too strongly," he said, "that the first obligation of a community is to the men who claim that community as their home."

"The drifter who has not thought enough of any community to become identified with it and assume his fair share of the obligations of citizenship and community responsibilities has no reason to believe that community to be under any obligation to him now."

Here unemployment is at its worst. He is a poor man indeed who in his own home town has not a job waiting for him if he will

put himself in the way of getting it. The legion's advice is: "Get back home. Get back among your own comrades. Other things being equal, the boy from home will always be preferred and the stranger will be passed by."

LAW ENFORCEMENT DISCUSSED BEFORE BAR ASSOCIATION

OPERATING DIRECTOR OF CRIME COMMISSION IN CHICAGO SPEAKS.

SAYS CITIZENS LOSING RESPECT FOR COURTS

States Trouble is "Nabby-Pabby Sickenening Sentimentality For Convicted Outlaws."

CHICAGO, April 11.—Lawyers are one of the most important factors in the suppression of crime, suggested Henry Barrett Chamberlain, operating director of the Chicago crime commission, in an address today at the second session of the committee on law enforcement of the American Bar association. He dealt principally with "Citizens are losing their respect for the courts," he said. "This is because they hold the bench and bar responsible for the abuses which they believe is their duty to correct. In Chicago they know that last year less than one out of four of the defendants tried for murder in Cook county was convicted and of the 6,721 defendants actually tried in the criminal court for felony that only 1,674 paid any penalty. They know that out of that number only 157 received penitentiary or reformatory sentences. They also know that during the same period 625 defendants after being found guilty were placed on probation. They know that during the same period 218 prisoners were released from Joliet on parole and that 140 were released on parole from Pontiac. All that they consider is the net result which shows that 757 convicted of crime were sent to Joliet and Pontiac during the same period, that 993 obtained their freedom in Cook county by either probation or parole. In other words, the operations of Chicago's legal machinery, controlled by the bench and bar, placed on the streets of Chicago, 236 more criminals than the same machinery sent to prison last year. Knowledge of this fact brings dismay to responsible citizens and rejoicing to the hearts of the crooks."

Mr. Chamberlain declared that "part of the trouble is the nabby-pabby, sickening sentimentality for outlaws convicted of crime."

NEW YORK, April 11.—August Probst, Swiss butler, who declared he had been kidnaped by members of the Rolling Rock club at Ligonier, Pa., when they learned that a member's daughter was in love with him, is suffering from a queer mental malady, Dr. Menas Gregory, alienist, said yesterday.

Through counsel for the butler Dr. Gregory said he had found Probst suffering from imaginative unrequited love—a form of insanity for which there is no classification.

WALSH SPEAKS IN OPPOSITION TO A WAGE REDUCTION

REPRESENTS THE RAILROAD MAINTENANCE OF WAY EMPLOYEES.

AVERAGE WAGE IS \$70 PER MONTH HE STATES

Charges Existing Pay Does Not Afford the Necessities of Life.

CHICAGO, April 11.—Any further reduction in the wages of railroad maintenance of way employees "would doom to still further degradation the families of 500,000 track and shop laborers, who are at present receiving such low wages that it is impossible for them to secure proper food and the other bare necessities of existence," declared Frank P. Walsh, counsel for these employees in a statement today before the United States railroad board, opposing wage cuts. "The majority of these employees," continued Mr. Walsh, "are now receiving an average wage of only \$70 per month and within the past year have suffered a reduction of almost 20 per cent. "Economic and medical experts have demonstrated scientifically that twice this amount and more is necessary to maintain a family at even the lowest level that can be conceived of at the minimum permissible to the household of an American citizen."

Mr. Walsh said the labor board had been requested to summon experts to support this contention, but he added that "it needs no expert to tell us that \$70 a month is below the breaking point."

He suggested that this amount is less than the ordinary middle class family, living frugally, spends for food alone.

"Evidence shows that existing wages do not permit of proper nutrition of children and cause high rate of infant mortality," declared the counsel. "Our figures show that the infant death rate is horrifying among these low paid workers. A further decrease in wages by the board would amount to an act of wholesale infanticide. This is unthinkable in our day of civilization."

VOLUNTEER TEACHERS NUMBERING 2000 IN SERVICE IN ARKANSAS

BIRMINGHAM, ALA., April 11.—Volunteer teachers, numbering the most 2,000, are carrying on the work of eradicating adult illiteracy in the state of Arkansas, according to E. B. Tucker, field worker of the Arkansas illiteracy commission, who today addressed the illiteracy conference of southern states. The conference opened this morning and will continue throughout tonight.

Mr. Tucker said that in response to Governor T. C. McRae of Arkansas, club women, ministers, laymen and business men in all walks of life have volunteered to teach in the schools for adult illiterates and by their influence and financial assistance are maintaining these schools.

STATE FAILS TO PROVIDE SPECIAL APPROPRIATION

BIRMINGHAM, ALA., April 11.—Difficulties encountered in Georgia in carrying out plans to teach adult illiterates were reiterated by M. L. Brittain, state superintendent of public instruction, of that state, before the illiteracy conference of southern states here today. Failure of the last general assembly to provide a special appropriation for this work caused state-wide efforts that were begun in 1918 to be discontinued, Mr. Brittain said. Schools for unlearned adults are being conducted at some places by local funds.

CONSENT FOR OPENING WHITE HOUSE GROUNDS FOR EASTER EGG ROLLING

WASHINGTON, April 11.—President and Mrs. Harding have given their consent for the opening of the "white house grounds Easter Monday for egg rolling, a time-honored custom to which the children look forward annually. On these occasions the president and the first lady of the land usually entertain friends on the south portico where they can watch the children. Each year thousands of children, with baskets filled with vari-colored eggs, throng the grounds and eagerly watch for the president.

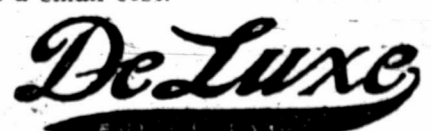

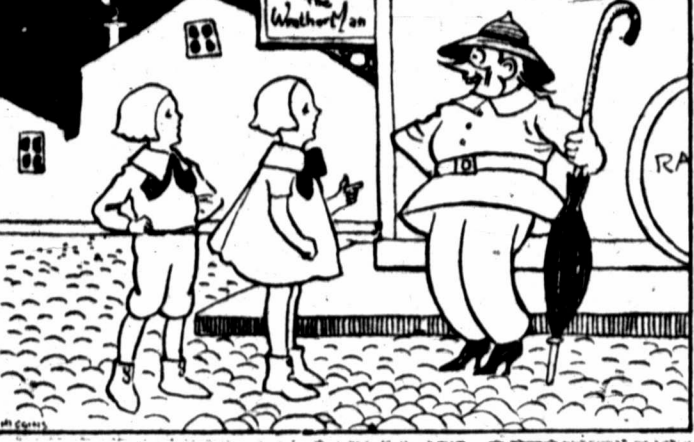

INFLUENCE OF UNION ORGANIZERS FELT IN NON-UNION FIELDS

THOUSAND MEN QUIT AND LEAVE EIGHT PLANTS GREATLY HAMPERED:

WILL SEND ADDITIONAL ORGANIZERS TO FIELDS

District President Charges Operators Are Importing Gunmen.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., April 11.—Influence of union organizers and the strike are being more strongly felt in the coke regions of Pennsylvania where nonunion labor is employed, events of yesterday demonstrated.

Approximately 1,000 miners in the Conneville region quit their work and left eight of the U. C. Frick Coke company plants idle or greatly hampered.

The United Mine Workers also announced their determination to send additional organizers into the territory.

John Broppy, president of No. 2 district of the mine workers' organization, yesterday sent a letter to Governor Meritt of this state asking his "intervention on behalf of the 22,000 organized miners of central Pennsylvania and their families in the manner in which the state police are handling the strike."

"Union miners who were following the course of action guaranteed by the federal and state constitutions," the letter said, "have been ridden down by the police while on their way to work."

The letter charged the operators with importing gunmen to intimidate the miners and otherwise allege unfair discrimination against them and their families.

U. S. COURT INJUNCTION TO BE TESTED IN COURTS

CHARLESTON, W. Va., April 11.—A federal court injunction issued by District Judge George W. Clinton yesterday against officials and members of the United Mine Workers of America for the purpose of enjoining them against further attempts at organizing the miners and to abolish the tent colonies in Mingo county after 30 days, will be tested in the courts.

W. Houston, counsel for the union, announced that an appeal would be taken to the circuit court at Richmond immediately.

Sixty-three coal companies signed the petition out of which the injunction grew, the issue being known as the Borderland Coal company case.

HOUSE LABOR COMMITTEE ENDS HEARINGS ON STRIKE

WASHINGTON, April 11.—The house labor committee today has concluded its general hearing on the national coal strike, for a time at least. Announcement that the committee had no plans at present for further investigation of the strike was made by Chairman Nolan yesterday after several labor spokesmen had been heard at the final session in a general denial of charges by operators that contract breaking by the miners had been a factor in the walkout.

The committee, however, will hold an executive session tomorrow to consider action on the bill which would set up a federal coal commission to deal with such situations as the present strike. Meanwhile,

WASHINGTON, April 11.—Steamship traffic in the north Atlantic will be moved 60 miles south of the present double steamship line through the ice danger zone to the Grand Banks under advisory instructions sent out by the hydrographic office. The east bound traffic to Europe made the change effective last Saturday. The west bound lane will move April 15. The season when the horses break loose and sometimes force their way into the ordinary lanes of steamship travel is near at hand.

The coast guard cutter Tampa on international ice patrol duty off the Grand Banks at present has not reported the presence of more than one berg in the vicinity of the steamship lanes within the last ten days.

By Associated Press. CORK, April 11.—The city corporation today decided by a vote of 18 to 15 to grant Henry Ford the site of his tractor factory here in fee simple.

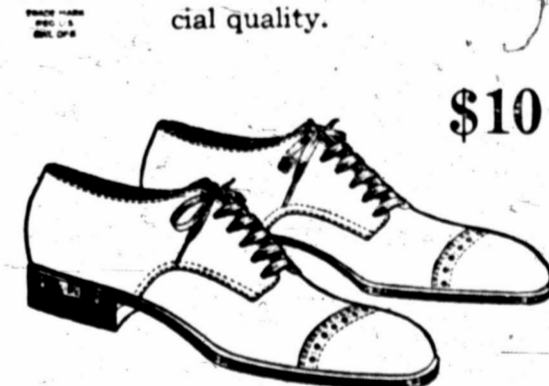

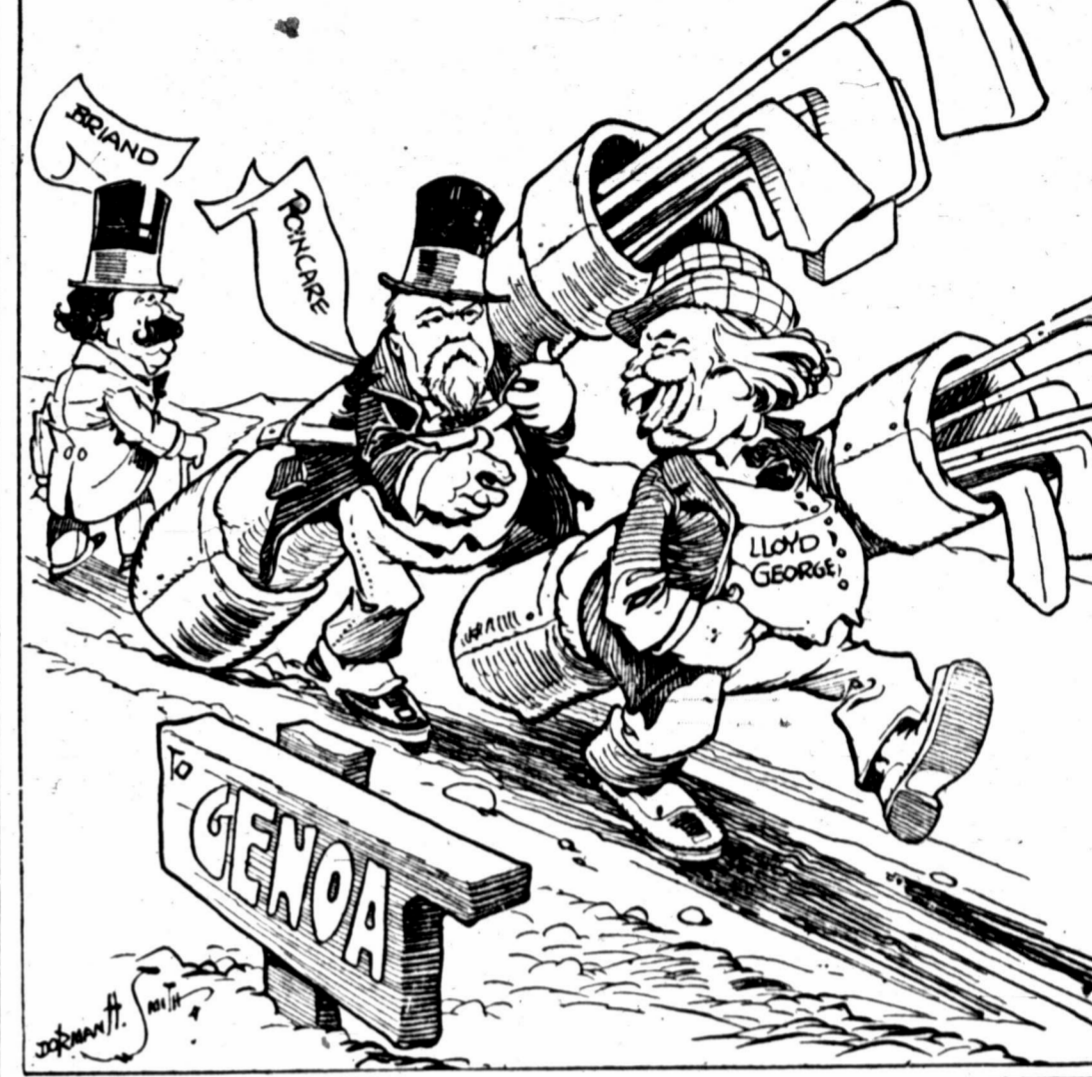

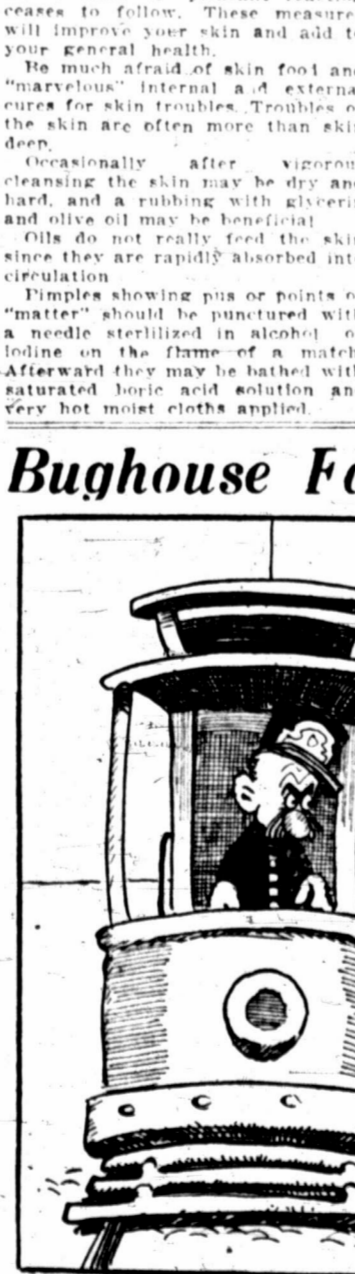

SINGING CONVENTION IS HELD AT ENGLAND, IN BAYLOR COUNTY



protective act—and Underwood laws, wherever feasible. The ad valorem rates in the Fordney measure are based on American valuation, but they are used here in the comparison. Experts attached to the committee say that 25 per cent, American valuation, is generally equivalent to 50 per cent foreign valuation.

Because entirely different classifications have been used in drafting the wool schedule in the new bill, no comparison of rates in that schedule with those in the famous schedule E of the Payne-Aldrich bill is undertaken. The raw wool rates in the senate measure are about equal to those in the Payne-Aldrich law, however, and Senator Smoot of Utah, who drafted the schedule, says some of the other rates are as high as corresponding provisions in schedule K, while others are lower.

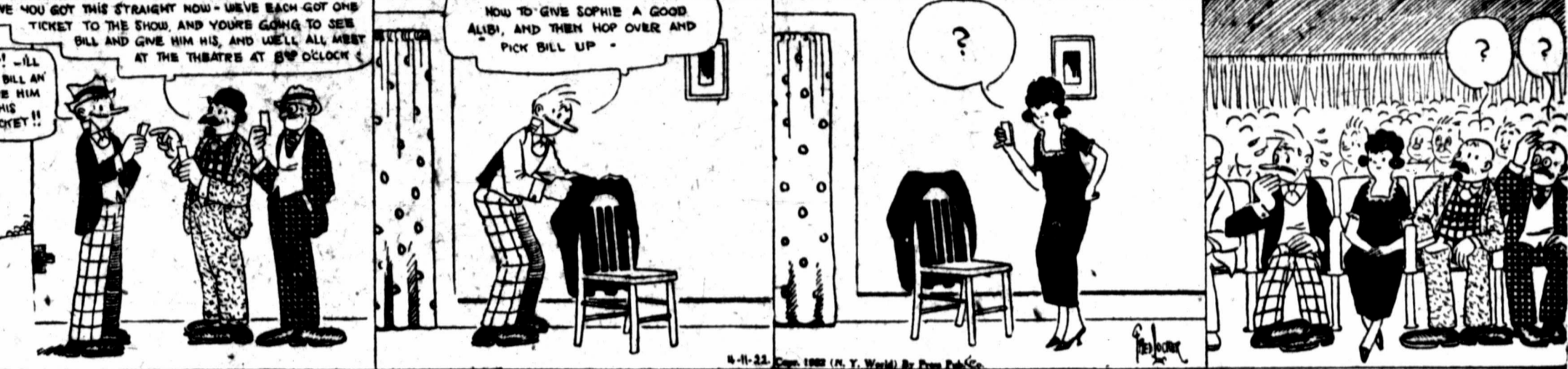

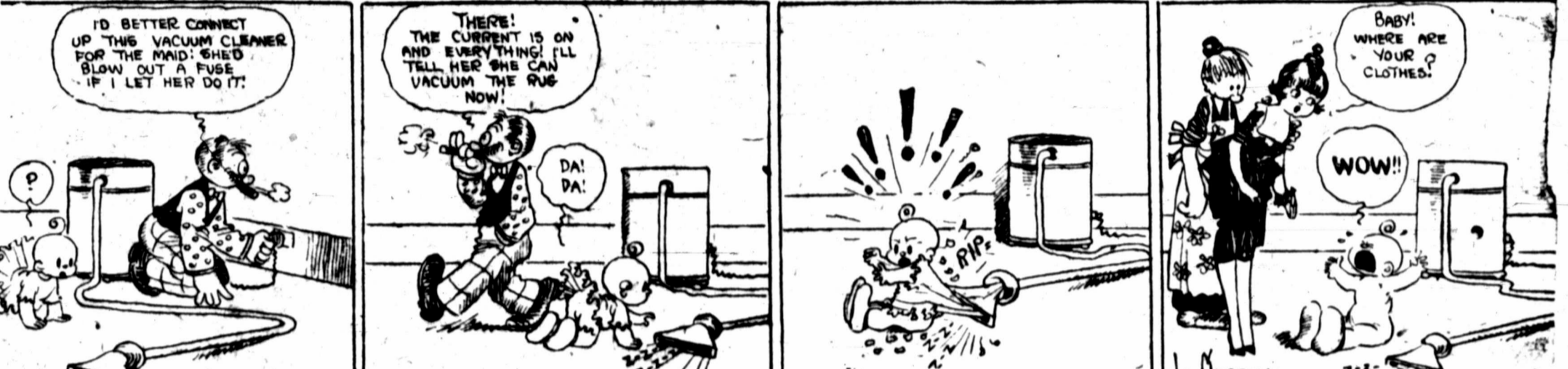
