



Amarillo's Radio Station KGNC is celebrating its 50th anniversary this month, and the rebasing of the station's history is creating a wave of nostalgia across the Golden Spread. KGNC has definitely been a driving force in the development of this area, and has been looked to for many years to supply this area with news and entertainment, as well as the promotion of a great agricultural area.

One of our early recollections of KGNC is of Uncle Jay (Johnny Lynn) reading the funnies on Sunday mornings. Since we lived in the country and didn't always have access to a Sunday paper, this served a vital purpose, and adequately filled the time while preparing for Sunday School.

Uncle Jay was also the farm newsman, but did not achieve the stature as did the late J. Garland (Cotton John) Smith, about whom the Sunday Globe News said this week "The Country folks set their clocks by his daily 6 a.m. report, and parked their tractors early to catch the latest High Noon Farm Report."

Cotton John logged many miles in his coverage of High Plains agriculture. He came to Friona for agricultural meetings, both to sneak and to cover the news. He also was instrumental in getting a spot on his TV "Farm & Home Show" for Frionans each year to plug Maize Days activities.

We heard another familiar voice on the special interviews last week. It belongs to Wes Izzard, the dean of Panhandle newsmen. Many newcomers may not realize that Izzard, who is editor and publisher of the Amarillo Daily News, spent over 20 years lending his talents to KGNC as newscaster from 1926 to 1947.

His pleasing, authoritative voice is the first we can recall giving the news each day. He's still tops in our book, and he began practically before the word "newscaster" was coined.

We remember our grandfather once telling us, about the time we were starting to school. "Son, if you'll pay attention to this, you'll learn more than you can from books." He was referring to a Wes Izzard newscast.

Unfortunately, we can't recount to you memories of the entire 50 years of radio broadcasting in this area—but most of you no doubt have your own memories.

However, we did come along in time to get in on most of the leading adventure programs, presented in serial form each day after school. These included such programs as Jack Armstrong (The All-American Boy), Tom Mix, Superman, and the Lone Ranger.

Perhaps there were others which you "town boys" got to hear. Since we had to ride a bus for about an hour after school, we may have missed three or four of those 15-minute delights.

We didn't, though, miss out on very many of the "boxtop and a dime" offers, which would bring you no end of secret decoders, badges, rings (some that glowed in the dark), and many, many others.

You housewives probably remember "Portia Faces Life," "One Man's Family," and "Helen Trent," which undoubtedly would hold their own against "As the World Turns" and "Days of Our Lives."

We agree with those who contend that television robbed us of being able to use our imagination while listening to those great old radio programs. Somehow, Fibber McGee's Closet, in the mind's eye must have been a lot worse than it could ever have been portrayed on TV.

Remember those fine old detective stories on Sunday afternoons? Then there were Fred Allen and Allen's Alley, Jack Benny, Amos 'n' Andy, etc., etc. (These may not all have been on KGNC—if so, we digress).

And Amarillo had the likes of Cal Farley, Stuttering Sam, and Monte Rosewald and his man on the street interviews.

The advent of television caused radio to change its format, and in a way, we're sorry.

len and Carolyn Murphree. Carolyn Martin will give the invocation, and Troy White will give the benediction. White will also present the class gift.

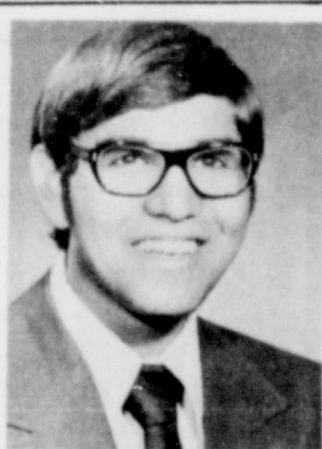

# Little League To Begin Season Mon.

A jam-packed six weeks worth of Little League baseball will be kicked off next Monday, when four games will be unreeled on two parks here.

Mayor R.L. Fleming will toss out the first ball at both parks to officially inaugurate the season. He will officiate at the ceremony at the little park (Minor League) first, and then go directly to the big park to throw out the first ball there.

Boy Scouts will also present a flag-raising ceremony in conjunction with the opening game. First games in the Minor League pit Piggly Wiggly vs. Tasty Cream in the 6 p.m. game, to be followed at 8 p.m. by the Hi-Pro vs. B-J Bees contest.

Other Monday games include Friona State Bank vs. Reeve Chevrolet in the Major League, and Bengier Air Park vs. Cattle Town in the Senior League. Games will be played on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays in all leagues. In ad-

dition, the Senior League will play Saturday double-headers on three dates in June. Complete Little League schedules are presented in this issue of the Star.

A total of 16 teams are competing, in four leagues this summer. It is the first time that all leagues are officially sanctioned by Little League.

## Shooting Leaves One Dead, One In Custody

A 23-year-old Friona man, Billy Falford, was in jail this week charged with murder in the shooting death of Robert Walker, 47, early last Saturday morning.

Parmer County Deputy Sheriff Garland Freeman said Falford turned himself into Ronnie Mitchell, Bovina officer, at the officer's home about 5:40 a.m. Saturday. He was carrying a .22 calibre rifle.

Walker was shot in the head. Falford told officers that Walker came into the Falford residence, which is across from Hi-Plains Feed Yard, and "wouldn't leave." After many attempts to get Walker to leave, Falford got his rifle, he told officers.

Bail was set at \$10,000. Falford is employed by John L. Ray, and lived in Ray's renthouse about five miles northwest of Friona.

Funeral services for Walker were held at 3 p.m. Tuesday, at

the Calvary Baptist Mission, with Rev. I.S. Ansley, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Friona Cemetery, under the direction of Claborn Funeral Home.

Survivors include the wife, Louise; nine sons: Robert

Lee, Jimmy Earl, Ray Lee, Freddie Gene, R.M., Jerry Wayne, Larry, James Elvin and Charles Edward; four daughters, Brenda Joyce, Glenda Joyce, Dorothy, and Barbara Ann, and five grandchildren.

Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr says that the school administrative offices and tax office will be closed.

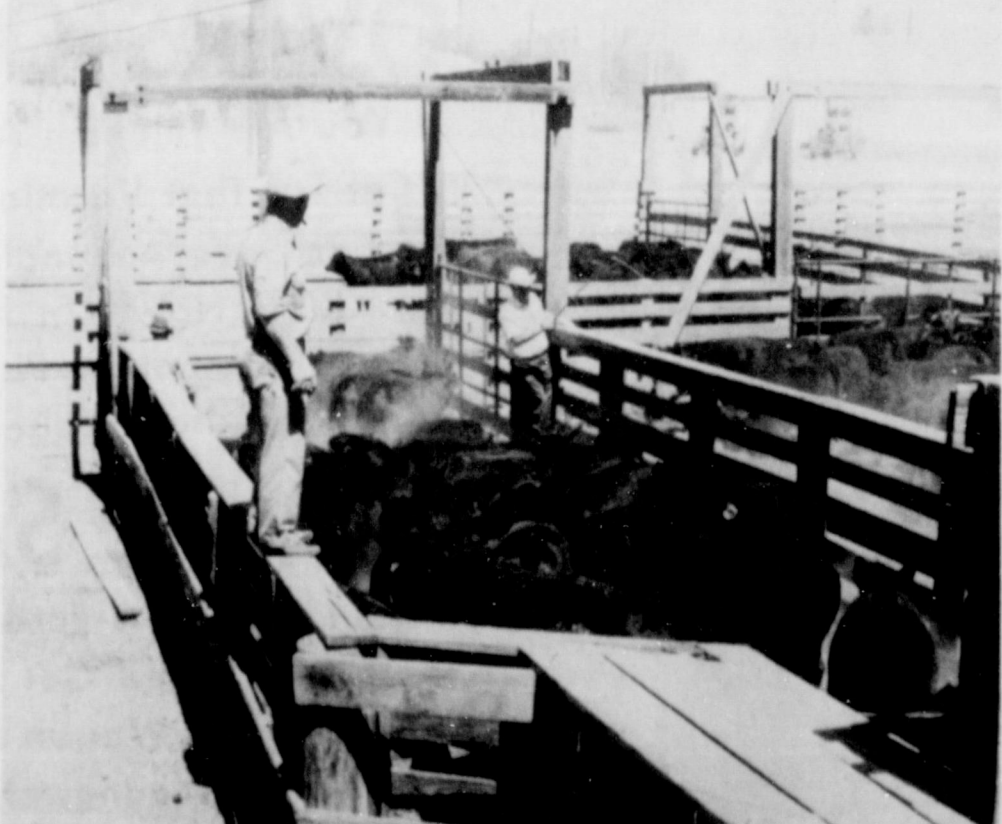
## Absentee Voting Now Underway

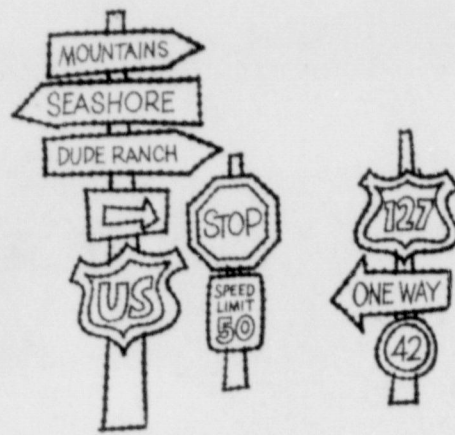

### At Home In Parmer County

Have you ever noticed your child not responding to your requests?

Try listening to yourself and to your child.

Parents who stop now and then to listen to themselves understand why some ways don't work.

If you find yourself saying "If I've told you once, I've told you a dozen times," then this method isn't working. It may be wise to try something else.

Listening gives you an opportunity to check yourself and your actions. Paying attention to what children say gives clues about what they've been learning. Adults are often surprised to discover that children learn something different from what parents think they teach.

Try keeping a record for one day of the things you say to your child when it's time for bed or when you want him to do a good job. And write down what you say when you want him to turn off TV or to change his behavior.

How many times a day do you say the words "no," "don't," "stop," or "quit"? You might be surprised. Write down the number of times you say these words.

If you find that you use such words often, why not try stating your requests in a more positive manner.

How About Building Washability and Adjustability Into Child's Room?

Easy care and growing quality make good sense. Children seem to pop out of everything, from their first crawlers and soft shoes to blue jeans and sneakers—even their bedrooms. Growing happens and clothing must be replaced. But a room is something else. Carefully planned, it can grow with the child and involve few major changes.

One criterion for creative, easy care decorating should be washability. Then both mother and child can be more relaxed about activities that take place in the special hideaway. A youngster's bedroom is like a home within a home. It's a place for more than sleeping. Playing, studying, day dreaming, listening to records, nibbling, and rapping with friends are all a part of the bedroom scene during the growing years.

A second criterion is adjustability. At all ages and stages, a child's room should be sized

for his needs with furnishings at the right height to develop good habits of neatness, cleanliness, and grooming. Properly chosen accessories—toy and book shelves, rods and pegs for clothing, a mirror for those initial efforts at grooming—can be placed low to serve the toddler and be adjusted upward as he or she adds inches. Be sure to include a good-sized bulletin board for showing off artistic efforts—and later given over to savables—pictures and momentos dear to a teenager's heart.

Stackable furniture is a good choice. Pieces can be added as the child and inevitable collections grow. Brightly enamel-painted and top-coated with polyurethane, the furniture will be cheerful, scuff and stain-resistant and suds washable. There are also furniture lines that feature tough, washable laminated plastic surfaces.

Easy washing, no-iron fabrics are best for window treatments, bed coverings and pillows. Pattern themes are almost limitless and materials provide the most economical way to change the entire atmosphere of a room. Thus, while the major expense items such as furniture and flooring are simple and suitable for years, fabrics used can easily take on the decorative task of creating room personality. Simply use the look from the A.B.C.'s of nursery to ballerina or car racers or some popular motif in early school years. Then as youngsters get older, they want very much to do their own rooms.

Flooring should not be overlooked in planning. Because children of all ages spend much time on the floor, playing, studying, visiting, floor coverings should be easy to care for, safe, warm and attractive. The newer durable and scrubable carpetings are worth considering. Vinyl in combination with washable scatter rugs is a good choice.

Whatever the final scheme is, some pre-thought with an eye to growth possibilities, easy upkeep, and the activities the room will serve is likely to result in greater satisfaction for all concerned.

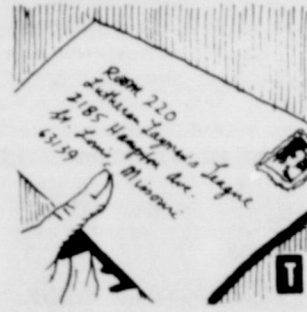

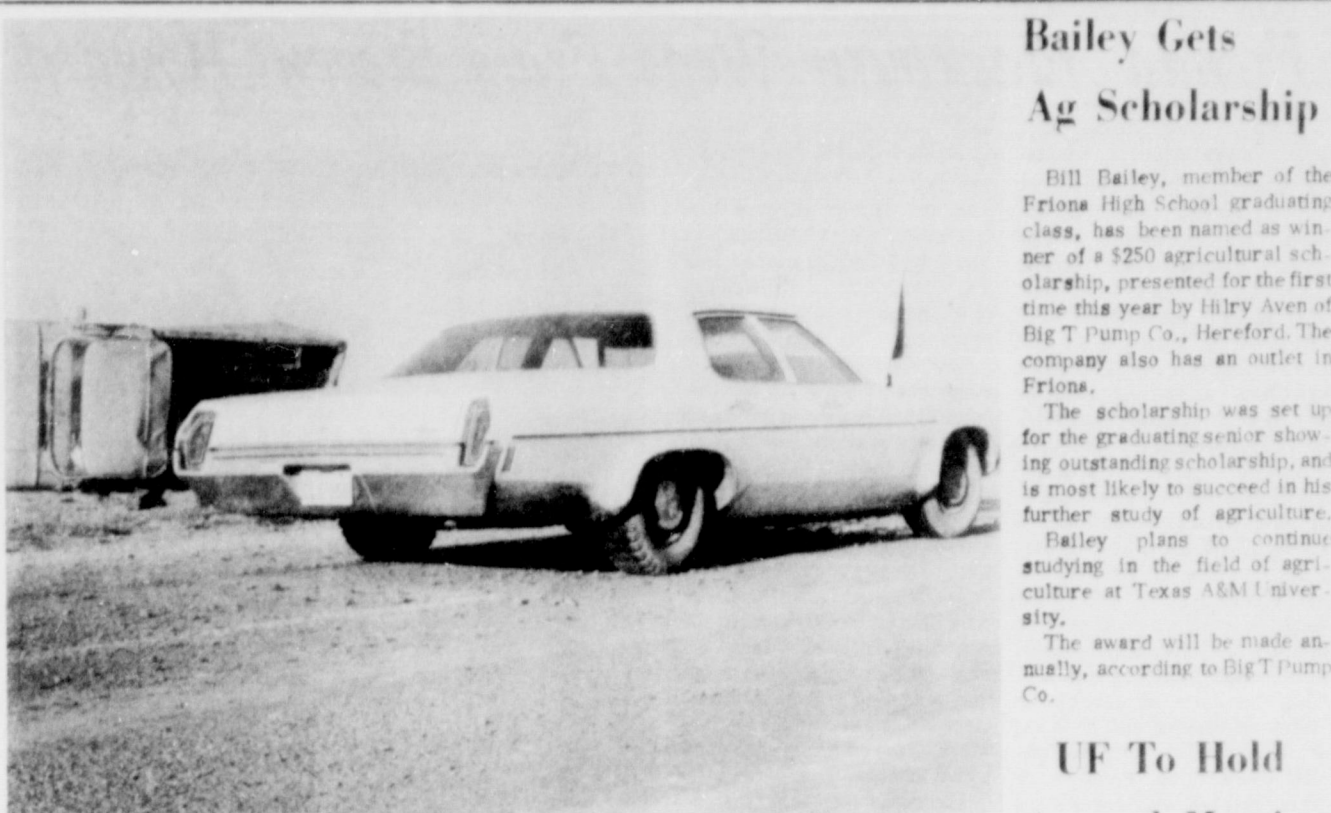

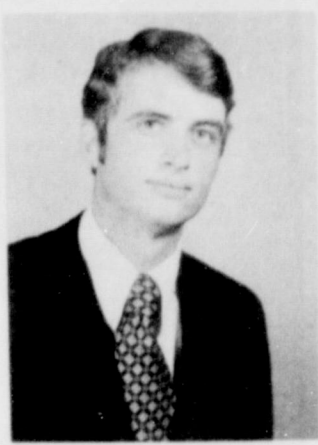
### Michael Riethmayer Is Awarded Master's Degree

## IN 1916 First Class Had Five Graduates

Thursday's graduation exercises for the Friona High School seniors will be quite different from the first graduation ceremony ever held by the school. That was back in 1916. There were five members of the class. Graduation exercises were held in a 24 x 30-foot auditorium, a part of the three-room school building that burned about 1919.

Class members were Fred White, Clyde Goodwine, Edwin Glaschier, Ethel Sutton and Emory Wain. White and Goodwine stayed in Friona. White operated an electrical business for many years, selling it only a few years ago to James and Dale Cunningham. Goodwine owns farmland just south of Friona, where he still lives, on the original Goodwine place.

The other class members sought their fortunes elsewhere. Wain, a Certified Public Accountant, was in business for himself for several years in Amarillo, and also did tax work for Shamrock Oil Co. He is now retired.

Edwin Glaschier has lived in California for most of the intervening years. He was insurance salesman for several years, and managed a motel prior to retiring a year or so ago. Glaschier is the brother of Luella Masner and Viola Treder, who still live in Friona. Ethel Sutton is now Mrs. George Moyer and lives in Santa Cruz, California. Her husband worked for the State of California inspecting weights and measures. Mrs. Moyer had her own real estate agency for a time.

White was the class valedictorian in 1916, and Ethel Sutton was salutatorian. Immediately following graduation exercises, a reception was held in the Friona Hotel, located on the site of the present hotel, though it was a different building.

Goodwine recalls that he started to school here in the fall of 1909. The school had been organized and opened for the first time in the fall of 1908. Ethel Sutton attended the "Mauser" school, located north of Friona, before transferring to the Friona school.

The Friona faculty consisted of three members in 1916. They were W. H. Saffold, who also was superintendent, William Sport Younger, who served as principal in addition to his teaching duties, and a Mrs. Glenn Carter.

In 1916, the school was on a ten-year basis, with eight years of elementary school and two years of high school.

It was customary for students to come back for a post-graduate "refresher" course, if they wished.
