Amarillo's Radio Station KGNC is celebrating its 50th anniversary this month, and the rehashing of the station's history is creating a wave of nos-

talgia across the Golden Spread. KGNC has definitely been a driving force in the development of this area, and has been looked to for many years to supply this area with news and entertainment, as well as the promotion of a great agricultural area,

One of our early recollections of KGNC is of Uncle Jay (Johnny Lynn) reading the funnies on Sunday mornings. Since we lived in the country and didn't always have access to a Sunday paper, this served a vital purpose, and adequately filled the time while preparing for Sunday

Uncle Jay was also the farm newsman, but did not achieve the statute as did the late J. Garland (Cotton John) Smith, about whom the Sunday Globe News said this week "The Country folks set their clocks by his daily 6 a.m. report, and parked their tractors early to catch the latest High Noon Farm

Cotton John logged many miles in his coverage of High Plains agriculture. He came to Frions for agricultural meetings, both to speak and to cover the news. He also was instrumental in getting a spot on his TV "Farm & Home Show" for Frienans each year to plug Maize Days activities.

We heard another familiar voice on the special interviews last week. It belongs to Wes Izzard, the dean of Panhandle newsmen. Many newcomers may not realize that Izzard, who is editor and publisher of the Amarillo Daily News, spent over 20 years lending his talents to KGNC as newscaster from 1926 to 1947.

His pleasing, authoritative voice is the first we can recall giving the news each day. He's still tops in our book, and he began practically before the word "newscaster" was coin-

We remember our grandfather once telling us, about the time we were starting to school-"Son, if you'll pay attention to this, you'll learn more than you can from books," He was referring to a Wes Izrard news-

Unfortunately, we can't recount to you memories of the entire 50 years of radio broadcasting in this area -- but most of you no doubt have your own memories.

However, we did come along in time to get in on most of the leading adventure programs, presented in serial form each day after school. These included such programs as Jack Armstrong (The All-American Boy), Tom Mix, Superman, and the Lone Ranger.

Perhaps there were others which you "town boys" got to hear. Since we had to ride a bus for about an hour after school, we may have missed three or four of those 15-min-

We didn't, though, miss out on very many of the "boxtop and a dime" offers, which would bring you no end of secret decoders, badges, rings (some that glowed in the dark), and many, many others.

You housewives probably remember "Portia Faces Life," "One Man's Family," and "Helen Trent," which undoubtedly would hold their own against "As the World Turns" and "Days of Our Lives,"

We agree with those who contend that television robbed us of being able to use our imagination while listening to those great old radio programs. Somehow, Fibber McGee's Closet, in the mind's eye must have been a lot worse than it could ever have been portrayed

Remember those fine old detective stories on Sunday afternoons? Then there were Fred Allen and Allen's Alley: Jack Benney: Amos 'n' Andy, etc., etc. (These may not all have been on KGNC -- if so, we di-

gressed). And Amarillo had the likes of Cal Farley, Stuttering Sam, and Monte Rosenwald and his
