## COUNSEL FOR THE OVERRULE MOTION FORT WORTH HAS 35 MISSING AND 29 INJURED IN HOSPITALS; TRINITY RIVER IS RECEDING

FORT WORTH, April 26 .- Recovery from its disastrous flood, extensive repairs, preparation for better protections and searching of the inundated portions for refugees and bodies of victims began today, as Fort Worth emerged from the high waters of the Trinity river and its tributaries.

One of the victims reported missing was accounted for this aft ernoon, reducing the estimated death toil to 35. Twenty-nine injured persons are in the hospitals.

DALLAS, April 26.-Forty-six persons were unaccounted for or were reported known dead today, as a result of the floods, and wind storms in Texas in the past 24 hours. The list was:

Fort Worth, 35 missing; Breckenridge, three reported drowned; Grand Prairie, two missing: Palmer, two reported drowned: Waco, one reported drowned; Sonora, one drowned; Belton, one drowned; Mountain Creek, near Cleburne, one man reported killed in wind storm

Actual casualties will be known only after the flood waters go and the lists of the missing and reports of drownings can be verified.

FORT WORTH, April 26 .- Fort Worth today was surrounded on three sides by the sheet of water, extending over an area estimated at 25 to 30 square miles. The exact area of the floaded area has not been determined, there being none who have crossed the area to the city limits.

On the north the water extends from the court house to its of North Fort Worth, about two miles. The eastern area is from the Rock, Island tracks to Riverside, about one mile. This area is about 30 blocks from the business district of Fort Worth. The water on the western boundary of the city extends from the Van Zandt viaduct, about 14 blocks from downtown, to the Van Zandt school, a distance of about one mile.







When cars are improperly parked, an officer fastens to the machine, in a conspicuous place, a large printed sign bearing the words, "The driver of this car has parked it in an unlawful manner, and with a selfish disregard for the rights of others."

No summons to police court is issued and no other steps are taken. The sign is usually placed on the rear of the car, where it is visible from the street, and where the driver, entering his machine from the sidewalk is quite apt to overlook it and drive away with the sign publicly advertising his shame.

### LOANING MONEY TO LEARN ON

The action of the University club Tuesday, in voting to set aside funds to loan young men and women in getting an education, sets an example for other civic organizations to emulate. There is no more worthy purpose to which money can be put.
