CENTRAL CHINESE LEADER REPORTED KILLED IN ACTION

BRAZOS RIVER ON WILD RAMPAGE; COLORADO IS HIGH

HOUSTON, May 3.—With the Brazos river on the wildest rampage since last September, and the Brazos breaking records of many years, scattered thunder storms last night and early today with heavy rains at some points added to flood dangers.

The Houston and Texas Central railroad tracks six miles north of Hempstead are under water and trains for Austin were being detoured via Brenham on the Santa Fe. Fears were felt for some of the railway bridges over the Brazos.

On the lower Brazos the weather bureau reported higher water than recorded early last month. The Trinity river continued flooded from Dallas to River Side and at Liberty.

Accompanied by a 45-mile wind a blizzard storm of much violence struck Houston about 3 o'clock this morning, awakening the populace and causing some damage to property. Only 48 of an inch of rain fell, but the wind was heavy.

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FIRE DAMAGES THE TREASURY BUILDING ESTIMATE \$75,000

WASHINGTON, May 2.—For the second time this year, fire broke out early today on the roof of the treasury building, causing a blaze which for a time threatened the city, and seemed destined to reach huge proportions, but was brought under control by the excellent work of firemen, with an estimated damage of about \$75,000.

Immediately after the arrival of the firemen a cordon was formed completely around the building by police reinforced by marines, sailors and soldiers, and representatives of the press and public alike were denied admittance.

The roof of the blaze, together with the alarm whistles, awoke President and Mrs. Harding, who dressed and watched the blaze from a window.

Officials of the treasury department were on hand early today to take charge of the protection of the building.

The blaze was such like that which broke out during office hours early in February last.

Treasury officials later put the loss at about \$15,000 at the outside. They were still at a loss to account for the origin of the blaze, although an investigation was under way.

No plans for soldiers' hospitals or other government construction work were seriously damaged, and none of the government's building projects would be held up.

TWO INTERNATIONAL CROOKS ARRESTED BY THE FRENCH POLICE

PARIS, May 2.—With the arrest of John Pincoff and Arthur Ernest Cox, the French police claimed today to have put an end to the activities of two international crooks.

The arrest was made at the request of the American embassy.

They were located in the most expensive suite of the fashionable Hotel Carlton, where they were negotiating the sale of a large Texas ranch, larger than the principality of Monaco and as profitably, was the way they described it to prospective purchasers.

BOSTON MAN KILLS WIFE AND SUICIDES

Dun and company, shot and killed his wife and himself last night, was still lacking today. A cordon of police was maintained about the Powell mansion throughout the night.

The Powells had been in their summer home only a day. Servants were said to have heard a slight quarrel yesterday. Shots were heard last night, the servants rushing to the library to find their mistress dying on the floor, and her husband leaving the room. An automatic pistol found in the library proved to be jammed and Powell apparently went to his own room upstairs to get another weapon. He killed himself with a revolver, found near his body.

MAN SHOT TO DEATH BY WIFE DURING A QUARREL

WASHINGTON, May 2.—The New Orleans, Texas and Mexico railroad was authorized today by the interstate commerce commission to issue and sell \$2,000,000 in six per cent first mortgage bonds for the purpose of procuring funds for its treasury. By another order of the commission, the Midland Valley railroad, Texas, was authorized to issue bonds for \$14,000 to cover expenditures already made by the road.

REPUBLICANS AT ODDS OVER CHANGE IN FOREIGN POLICY

ILLINOIS CONVENTION IS FOR "HANDS-OFF EUROPEAN AFFAIRS"

HARDING MAY ADOPT AFFIRMATIVE PROGRAM

Easily Apparent Something Important Just Ahead in Foreign Problems

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 3.—It is easily apparent that something important is just ahead with respect to the foreign policy of the United States to Europe. On the one hand the presence of the leading banker of the United States, representative of the principal federal reserve bank at the meetings of the reparations commission may be "unofficial," but no one familiar with the way such things come about would regard it as accidental. That it is the first step in some kind of affirmative program is a fair inference.

On the other hand, the opposition which any such program will encounter is illustrated by something that happened in Illinois last week. The Illinois republicans held their state convention. Ordinarily such a convention of the party in power would be expected to "point with pride" to the principal achievements of the party in power. The principal one of these achievements, as everybody knows, is the Washington conference and the treaties that came out of it. But the Illinois state republicans did not point with pride nor endorse, nor even mention the four-power treaty.

Such an omission alone would be pointed. But the Illinois state republican convention went even further. They adopted a plank which in effect formally disapproves the appointment by the Harding administration of any representative of the United States on any one of the commissions arising under the treaty of Versailles or the league of nations.

Here you have a head-on collision between two schools of thought within the republican party. On the one hand, there is the official pronouncement of the party organization in the third largest state calling for a continuance of isolation and the policy of "hands off." The action of the Illinois republican convention is probably to be attributed to the senior senator from that state, Medill McCormick. Senator McCormick was one of the two or three most aggressive leaders of the irreconcilable faction in the senate during the league of nations debate.

For Hands Off Policy. In the more recent controversy over ratifying the four power treaty Senator McCormick voted in favor of ratification, but it is generally understood that he did so with some doubt. In any event it will be an exponent of that school of thought within the republican party which believes in the "hands off" policy as regards Europe. It can also be taken for granted that this policy continues to have a considerable following among the republican senators.

Aside from that faction in the republican party which successfully opposed American ratification of the Versailles treaty, there is a considerable group including republican business men as well as republican leaders, who hold the position that the United States can, as they express it, "get along without Europe."

Their slogan is "give us a high tariff and stay out of European entanglements, and America can be prosperous as a self contained nation."

The moral duty of America to take account of the unhappy state of Europe and do something about it on grounds other than America's own commercial prosperity is a separate question. With the aspect of the problem these republican leaders refuse to have anything to do whatever.

This is a situation which probably exceeds in importance any other aspect of American politics or indeed, of the world situation generally. If the Harding administration is determined to do something about Europe, that fact must have more weight in the world situation than any other one factor. Even if America did not have the clear public evidence that the Harding administration is maintaining its thinking of action in regard to American relations with Europe, that step would be easily foreseen, from the factors inherent to the situation.

REVERSE THE CASE OF WOMAN AGAINST THE WACO SHERIFF

AUSTIN, TEXAS, May 3.—The third court of civil appeals today reversed and remanded the case of Bob Buchanan et al. vs. Mrs. Inez L. Crow, from McAllen county, and ordered the district court to try the case.

In this case Buchanan sought an injunction restraining the district clerk from moving the records in the case to Bell county as ordered by the district judge on a change of venue. The change of venue was ordered by the district judge after an attempt to select a jury from over 600 veniremen had failed.

The appellate court held that a judge cannot on his own motion order a change of venue in a civil suit in this case neither case asked for it.

Mrs. Crow is suing Buchanan for \$50,000 damages growing out of the death of her husband, Louis Crow, killed when Buchanan as sheriff attempted to stop a Ku Klux Klan parade at Lorens.

AN INVESTIGATION DEMANDED BY THE FRESNO, CAL., KLAN

FRESNO, CAL., May 3.—Leaders of the Fresno Ku Klux Klan, in a signed statement published by the Fresno Evening Herald, demand a grand jury investigation of their activities.

They said in part: "We desire to state that we court the fullest investigation whether before a grand jury or any other lawful tribunal, and in fact we demand an immediate and further investigation before the grand jury."

"The order does not countenance violence under any circumstance and does not demand interference with any person. We think we have important law missions to perform."

FORMER POSTMASTER OF PADUCAH CHARGED WITH EMBEZZLEMENT

SEVERAL ALLEGED DOPE DEALERS ARE INDICTED

To Date 43 Informations Have Been Filed With the Clerk of Court

Eleven bills of indictment were returned in open court by the grand jury of the United States district court at noon Wednesday. Included in this number was a true bill against Edmond L. Wheeler, former United States post master at Paducah.

Wheeler is charged with embezzlement of post office funds in the sum of \$1,607.80. The alleged offense is said to have been committed on or about February 13, 1922.

Several alleged sellers of morphine and cocaine were also indicted. To date a total of 43 informations have been filed with the clerk of court, all of which are alleged to be violations of the national prohibition act.

Two of the indictments returned are alleged violations of the prohibition act but are considered felonies inasmuch as the defendants were once before found guilty of a similar offense.

The indictments which were made public are:

James C. Galloway and J. E. Smith, alleged violation of the narcotic law.

Joe Parker, alleged to have received and concealed property which was stolen while in interstate commerce.

Bue Lee, alleged to have in his possession and to have sold morphine and cocaine on or about March 31, 1922.

Cecil B. Kelly, charged with selling three grains of morphine to L. B. Tomk, transporting, possessing and selling whiskey, charged with having been convicted on a charge of violation of the prohibition law on December 15, 1921.

Scott Mitchell, charged with possessing, selling liquor and possessing a still. Alleged to have been convicted of violation of the prohibition law on October 6, 1920.

PLAN RIGID INSPECTION OF DRINKS FOR RODEO CROWD

Cold drinks and food stuffs offered for sale at the rodeo grounds during the next three days will be entirely wholesome and sanitary, according to officials of the city health department. Operators of the stands have all been required to pass a personal health examination and have had to satisfy the inspectors that their stands are erected and maintained in proper condition.

Only bottled and package goods will be sold, no bulk matter being permitted.

About a dozen permits have been issued for the maintenance of stands, according to reports.

NEGRO FINED \$10 AND COSTS FOR GAMING

Earl Day, negro, was found guilty of the charge of gaming by a jury in the county court at law Wednesday noon and fined \$10 and costs. It was charged that he was wagering money at a game of dice, commonly called craps.

45 COMPLAINTS ARE FILED DURING APRIL FOR "FAST" METERS

Forty-five complaints charging gas meters with running at too great speed were filed against the North Texas Gas company during the month of April, according to a report made Wednesday by Dr. A. H. Douglas, head of the city health department. Dr. Douglas has had charge of investigations of individual complaints made against the corporation.

Two complaints were filed against the city water department on similar charges, the report stated.

Other work of the health department during the month, as indicated in the April report, included 29 food establishment inspections, 27 daily inspections and a collection of \$401.88 for various services rendered. Only a small amount of food was condemned as being unfit for use.

Dr. L. I. Lucey, city food and dairy inspector, stated Wednesday that enforcement of the law requiring all public cafes to be properly screened during the hot weather would be started in the near future. Warnings were being sent out to the proprietors of such places Wednesday morning.

Incidentally, the health officer announced that it would now be well to screen private residences as the open season on flies is now at hand.

Filipinos Want Copy of Booklet Local Man Wrote

A request from the library of the Philippine University at Manila, for a copy of his booklet, "How Libraries Advertise," has been received by Hubert M. Harrison, general manager of the chamber of commerce.

The booklet in question was printed about a year ago by the Dallas Public Library from an article prepared by Mr. Harrison when he was on the staff of the Dallas News, for that paper. Since then many libraries have asked for copies of the volume which has had a very wide distribution. Mr. Harrison will make an effort to comply with the request from the Philippines, if he can locate a spare copy of his work.

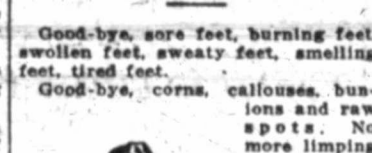

ZWEIFEL FAVORS ENFORCEMENT OF DRY LAW BY STATE

SHOULD NOT BE LEFT TO FEDERAL COURTS, SAYS U. S. ATTORNEY

SPKES - WEDNESDAY BEFORE LIONS CLUB

Discusses Tariff and Takes Issue With Democratic Views on Subject

The enforcement of federal prohibition laws and prosecution of violations of such laws should be left entirely in the hands of local and state authorities rather than to United States officials, according to Henry Zweifel, United States district attorney, who advocated such a policy in an address before the Lions club Wednesday noon. Mr. Zweifel dwelt at some length on the prohibition question and also devoted considerable time to the protective tariff issue, which he strongly favored. In commenting on prohibition enforcement the speaker declared that federal dockets were so congested at present as to make it impossible for the courts to try more than 10 per cent of the liquor cases listed, even should they devote all their time to such prosecutions. This was the case in the district courts and made a local issue.

Local federal officers are anxious and willing to do all in their power to enforce laws, Mr. Zweifel said, but he believes that a more speedy and satisfactory solution of the troubles could be reached if your local courts were given complete jurisdiction in the matter. I believe your citizens should urge such a policy on your officers.

Incidentally, the speaker gave Mr. Zweifel credit for being a constructive statesman in that he brought into being a gigantic and flourishing industry. The tariff question was dealt with exhaustively by Mr. Zweifel, who went into its various aspects with enthusiasm. Of chief interest in his discourse on this was the statement that a time had now arrived when man should support or condemn the tariff according to their own convictions rather than hold the latter up simply because the democratic party had always rejected it.

The talk had a decided interest for the Lions, since they had heard a lengthy address several weeks ago in which the tariff was roundly assailed by Joe B. Hatchitt, local attorney. The conflicting views of the two men presented both sides of the question in an able manner.

Walter Curlee, representing the executive committee of the local prohibition council, appeared before the club with an announcement concerning the scout summer camp and requested certain assistance from the club. This was referred to a committee for action.

Entertainment was provided by Miss Erue Dickson, who gave three delightful readings that were heartily received. L. R. Buchanan served as chairman of the day.

SHAM FOR HOME NOT SUFFICIENT TO CALL IT HOME

JUDGE JACK OVERRULES MOTION TO QUASH INFORMATION IN LIQUOR CASE

FIVE MEN SENTENCED BY COURT WEDNESDAY

All Liquor Cases Will Be Called for Trial Thursday Morning, It Is Announced

A mere sham to make a place appear as a residence when in fact it is only being used as a screen for some other purpose, is not sufficient to call it a private residence, was the comment made by Judge G. W. Jack of the federal court here in overruling a motion to quash an information on the grounds that no search warrant was had to search the house.

The motion was filed in the case against Eunice Perkins, who was arrested in the fall of 1921 after a raid had been made on a shack across the tracks. A still was found at that time. The defendant claimed that it was his home, but the officer testified that there was only two stoves, no clothing, a few pieces of furniture and one bed.

There was some hearsay testimony that the presence of a still was discovered by fumes that were coming out of the street. There was no direct testimony on this point. Judge Jack stated that if the fumes were detectable on the street that this gave the officers the information that a crime was being committed, that it would not be necessary to have a search warrant. The court stated that he would be open to more testimony on this point when the case was called for trial on its merits. The overruling of the motion was only temporary, he said.

All liquor cases will be called for trial Thursday morning at 9 o'clock, it was announced by the district attorney.

Paul A. Adams, who entered a plea of guilty of possession of whiskey in a cold drink stand was fined \$250.

E. D. May was sentenced to 90 days in the county jail on his plea of guilty to two sales of whiskey.

Jim Barker also drew 90 days on the charge of possessing a still.

A. C. Richardson and Mose Preston, who have been in jail 30 days on charges of possessing a still, were fined \$100 each.

OVER 2,000 FIGHT FANS WITNESS FIVE BOUTS IN BURK TUESDAY NIGHT

BURKBURNETT, May 2.—Five fast bouts were staged at the Liberty Athletic club here last night in the presence of over 2,000 fight fans. The card was held under the auspices of the American Legion to increase the fund for the legion hall.

The main event, between Sailor Williams of Lawton, Okla., and Lee Morrissey of Salt Lake City, came to an abrupt ending in the third round when Williams was floored for the count of nine and asked that the bout be postponed to a future date. Williams had won all his fights here until last night and entered the ring a great favorite. He had a badly damaged ear, however, when he crawled through the ropes, and it was on account of this injury that he asked for a postponement. Morrissey readily consented to meet him again at some future date.
