counter is illustrated by something that happened in Illinois last week. The Illinois republicans held their state convention. Ordinarily such s convention of the party in power would be expected to "point with pride" to the principal achievements of the party in power. The principal one of these achievements, as everybody knows, is the Washing-ton conference and the treaties that came out of it. But the Illinois state reublicans did not point with pride nor indorse, nor even mention the four-power treaty.

Such an omission alone would be ointed. But the Illinois state republican convention went even fur-ther. They adopted a plank which in effect formally disapproves the appointment by the Harding admin-listration of any representative of the United States on any one of the ons arising under the treaty of Versailles or the league of

Here you have a head-on collision between two schools of thought within the republican party. On the one hand, there is the evident disposition of the Harding administra-tion to take account of the state of Europe and do something about it. On the other hand, there is the offi-cial pronouncement of the party or-ganisation in the third largest state calling for a continuous of itselecalling for a continuance of isola-tion and the policy of "hands off." The action of the Illinois republican convention is probably to be attributed to the senior senator from that state, Medili McCormick Sena-tor McCormick was one of the two or three most agressive leaders of the irreconcilable faction in the

senate during the league of nations In the more recent controversy over ratifying the four power treaty Senator McCormick voted in

favor of ratification, but it is genarally understood that he did so with some doubt. In any event it can be taken for granted that he is still an exponent of that school of thought within the republican party which believes in the "hands off" policy as regards Europe. It can also be taken for granted that this policy continues to have a considerable following among the republican senators. publican senators.

Aside from that faction in the republican party which successfully opposed American ratification of the Versailles treaty, there is a considerable group, including republican butiness men as well as republican leaders, who hold the position that the United States can, as they ex-

press it, "get along without Eu-rope."

Their slogan is "give us a high tariff and stay out of European en-tanglements, and America can be prosperous as a self contained na-

ake account of the unhappy state of Europe and do something about own commercial prosperity is a sep-arate question. With the aspect of the problem these republican leaders refuse to have anything to do

This is a situation which probably

exceeds in importance any other exceeds in importance any other aspect of American politics, or indeed, of the world situation generally. If the Harding administration is determined to do something about Europe, that fact must have more weight in the world situation than any other one factor. Even if America did not have the clear public evidence that the Harding adlie evidence that the Harding administration is beginning to think of action in regard to American relations with Europe, that step would be easily foreseen from the factors inherent to the situation. The Genoa conference can have only one of two outcomes: One is failure and the other is success. No matter which of these two is the cutcome, it will be easily apparent the instant after the Genos conferunited States to do something. 

SAPANESE TORPEDO BOAT DESTROYERS TO TIEN TSIN.

HONOLULU, May 3 .- Three Japaness torpedo boat destroyers sta-tioned at Port Arthur have been endered to proceed to Tien Tsin to protect Japanese citizens and prop-erty jeopardized by the Chinese evil war, according to a cable re-ceived by Nippu Jiji, a Japanese language newspaper, today.

E. B. MAYFIELD SPEAKS HERE IN BEHALF OF CANDIDACY FOR SENATE

SAYS FREIGHT RATES ARE BAR TO BUSINESS

Would Repeal Esch-Cummins Act and Would Limit Tax Free Securities

Labeling the freight rates of the country as one of the chief causes of business depressions; declaring himself as believing in America for Americans only and for the English speaking race only; advocating a binding covenant that will insure the eradication of wars for all time to come; and uring an open market so that a farmer will be insured a reasonable return on his investment were the points that were discussed by Earle B. Mayfield, candidate for the United States senate in an address delivered before a large au dience in the court room of the court house, Tuesday night,

"We need men in congress today to correct conditions," the speaker urged. "Many measures and condi-tions were made necessary during d war that were of much benefit then but which are not prac-tical now. These must be corrected and not permitted to stand as they have been since the war ended."
In denouncing the present freight

rates, Mr. Mayfield enumerated in-stances to bear out his contention that the rates were more than the that the rates were more than the traffic can bear. He stated that Texas rice growers were able to ship rice to Holland and then back to New York City at a less cost than sending it direct to New York. Cabbage in south Texas is being plowed under, they stated because they are unable to pay the \$300 in advance which it costs them to send advance which it costs them to send a \$75 car load to the eastern mar-kets. He also told that it cost road builders in Teague, Texas, six times the cost of a car load of stone shipped from Austin on freight.
