

T. & P. WILL DRILL ANOTHER TEST IN ARCHER DISTRICT

The Texhoma Refining company's No. 29 on the Gose tract in Archer county is standing with 1,000 feet of fluid in the hole from the sand at 1,112 feet. Preparations are being made to drill in within the next day or two. From present indications the well is good for 150 barrels. The shallow well of Dyeus-Miller north of Archer City, after being put on the pump, increased the production from 15 to 25 barrels. The location for No. 2 is made just south of No. 1 with material on the ground.

HOUSTON WOMAN MAKES APPEAL TO THE GOVERNOR

AUSTIN, TEXAS, May 4.—Mrs. F. Feagin of Houston called at Governor Neff's office this morning to see him in regard to the death of her 14 year old son, Karl, in Houston last November. Mrs. Feagin wants to present additional evidence to the governor. The boy was supposed to have been killed while playing with his brother. Mrs. Feagin believes that her son was killed by other parties. She said affidavits for help in Houston proved fruitless. She will wait over to see the governor tomorrow, when he returns from his north Texas speaking tour.

MOORE APPOINTED ON WARFARE RULES COMMISSION BY U.S.

WASHINGTON, May 4.—John Bassett Moore, former counselor of the state department and now a member of the newly created international court of justice, has been appointed to represent the United States on the rules of warfare commission authorized by the arms conference.

STREET CARS TIED UP AS RESULT OF STRIKE

STEUBENVILLE, OHIO, May 4.—All traffic on the Steubenville, East Liverpool and Beaver Valley Traction company lines, factoring local city lines, was suspended at 10 o'clock this morning when the men ran the cars into the barns here. Their action followed a vote not to accept the company's offer of a 10 per cent wage reduction and non-recognition of the union.

THIS CITY HAS PLENTY OF PARACHUTE JUMPERS, TEN SEEK JOBS IN LEGION SHOW

Wichita Falls has plenty of would-be parachute jumpers, according to A. L. Taylor, manager of the aviation meet scheduled for Saturday and Sunday. Since last Monday, four women and six men have applied to him to be allowed to make parachute jumps from airplanes, and he is beginning to wish for a plane big enough to take them all up at once. Plans for the carnival are going forward steadily, with numerous bookings, and many additional bookings are being made.

HADLEY RECAPTURED AT TUCSON, ARIZONA

TUCSON, ARIZ., May 4.—Local authorities today confirmed reports that Paul Hadley, escaped convict from the Oklahoma state penitentiary, had been recaptured here, but refused to give out information concerning the arrest, declaring that investigation of another charge would be hampered by the information Hadley, according to official sources, has been in custody about a week.

MUSKOGEE, OKLA., MAY 4.—Word was received here today of the arrest at Tucson of Paul Hadley, who escaped from the penitentiary at Muskogee, Okla., for the murder of Sheriff W. J. Giles of Jefferson county, Texas.

Mrs. Hadley, who, it was established, killed the sheriff while the latter was being taken on a train from Kansas City to Denton, was acquitted of the murder, but later was sentenced to ten years' imprisonment on charges of breaking out of the county jail, on her request that she be sent to prison for that length of time in order to be with her husband. She was notified of the arrest today at McAllister.

SPEEDSTERS KIDNAP MOTORCYCLE OFFICER PISTOL BATTLE FOLLOWS

CANTON, OHIO, May 4.—Three automobiles, in which a motorcycle policeman attempted to arrest for speeding today, forced the officer to get into their machine at the point of guns, and speeded northward. They were pursued and overtaken by four automobiles filled with officers and a gun fight followed in which one of the fugitives was seriously wounded. The pistol battle late today was still in progress.

CHICAGO BOARD ISSUES NOTICE TO GRAIN TRADE

CHICAGO, May 4.—At a special meeting of the directors of the Chicago board of trade this afternoon the following notice to the grain trade was authorized: "The directors of the Chicago board of trade are warning the storage situation in Chicago closely and all parties interested may rest assured that the instant an emergency does exist and no storage is available, the rule providing for delivery of grain in car lots will be invoked."

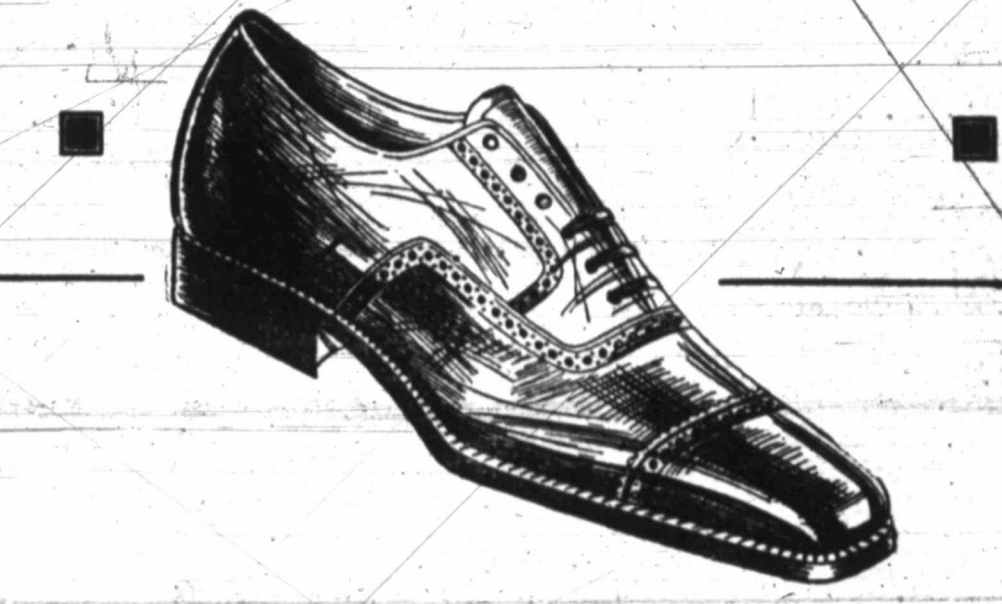

RUSSIANS TO TAKE FULL ADVANTAGE OF THE GERMAN 'PACT'

HOPE TO FORCE REST OF EUROPE TO AGREE TO RUSSIAN TERMS

FRENCH FAIRLY INSANE WITH ANGER AT OUTCOME

See a Deliberate German Policy of Cheating Them Out of Money Loaned Russia

GENOA, May 4.—Before Lloyd George left London for Genoa, he made a speech in parliament outlining his plans. One of the opposi-

tionists remarked that in attempting to bring the Russians back into the family of nations, the premier was embarking on a dark and difficult mission.

There is reason to believe that Lloyd George now knows how exactly true that prophecy was.

It is doubtful whether he would have made the attempt in just the way he has if he could have known that he would have to face a German-Russian combination.

Germany's rear against a French attack.

An attack has developed, the British premier has been put in a most critical position in his career. He has gone too far to turn back.

Slipping Toward War. Now he must successfully conclude a treaty with Russia in which other European powers will join.

The alternative is not only personal defeat, which would probably cost him the premiership, but Europe as a whole will be further from permanent peace and normal industrial life than at any time since the war.

This last is not a loose statement, made for the purpose of sensation. It is a literal fact.

Two of the highest officials of the British government, speaking with authority to Americans and British newspaper men, have pointed this out as the irremediable logic of the situation created by the German-Russian treaty and the German-Russian attitude, since the treaty was signed.

Russians the Cause. This attitude, even when the treaty itself, is what is causing the allies to take such a grave view.

Up to the time the treaty was signed, the Russians seemed to be in a very reasonable, even conciliatory, mood. And the Germans were so quiet that it looked as though it would be a comparatively simple matter to line up the whole of Europe on a sane program of peace and reconstruction.

Since signing the treaty with Germany, the Russians have entirely changed their attitude, and there seems to be no doubt that every move they make is the result of definite decisions between themselves and the Germans. They have made definite proposals to the allies—and then withdrawn them. They have made direct answers to the allied proposals—and then insisted upon fantastic interpretations of these answers.

The Russian policy seems to be to take the fullest advantage of the position which their alliance with Germany gives them and to force the rest of Europe—through fear of future German-Russian military aggression—to make a treaty with them on Russia's own terms.

These terms, so far as they can be deciphered from Russia's various proposals, answers and propaganda, include full recognition of the soviet and the granting of large credits to other European nations in return for which the soviet agrees to recognize pre-war debts, payment to be deferred 20 years without interest.

"They insist upon having all their war debts wiped out and are very heavy as to how they will pay foreign nations for property which they have confiscated since the revolution.

The Russians' whole idea now seems to be that by shrewd diplomacy and the German alliance they are in a position to dictate terms to the rest of Europe, and especially to Great Britain.

French Fairly Mad. The French reaction to this may be imagined. The French see in it a deliberate German policy of cheating them out of money loaned to Russia, driving a wedge between France and England, and finally a coalition of eastern Europe against them for military aggression.

The French are fairly insane with anger, one of the evidences being the speech of Premier Poincare at Bay 16 Day.

The British, on the other hand, while fully appreciating the gravity of the situation and their responsibility in calling the conference, are determined not to break with the Russians if there is any possibility of avoiding it.

They frankly say they consider it a matter of life and death between Germany and Russia and the rest of Europe is so necessary to future peace that they are willing to concede every point to the Russians.

Let there be a point beyond which even the British will not go. That point is to make a treaty with Russia on the same terms as the one which, at the same time allowing her to repudiate her debts.

It is pointed out that even if the allied delegates at Genoa make such a treaty, no allied parliament would ratify it.

Even now public opinion in both France and England is becoming increasingly antagonistic to the Genoa negotiations with the soviet.

When Lord Birkenhead, chancellor of England, said the situation was never more delicate he was not overstating the case. It is tragic as well as delicate.

GOLDSTEIN APPOINTMENT MAY DRAW FIGHT

WASHINGTON, May 4.—Senate republican leaders are prospects of a fight today over President Harding's nomination of Nat Goldstein of St. Louis to be collector of internal revenue for the first Missouri district. Opposition to confirmation of Mr. Goldstein, it was said, would be based on his acceptance of \$2,500 when a candidate for delegate to the Chicago republican national convention as a supporter of former Governor Lowden of Illinois.

The senate finance committee, to which the nomination was referred today, deferred action to await the opinion of Senator Reed, democrat, Missouri, a co-member, who is reported to oppose the nomination.

GERMANS HAVE DERAILED THE LLOYD GEORGE "SPECIAL" FOR THE RESTORATION OF EUROPE

By HARRY N. RICKY. GENOA, May 4.—The Germans have derailed the Lloyd George "special" for the economic restoration of Europe.

The British premier is working as hard as he ever worked in his life to get the train back on the track and under way again. But it looks like a bad smashup.

Up to the time the Germans threw the derailling switch it seemed that the train would reach its destination on scheduled time—another Lloyd George achievement.

Everything was proceeding fairly smoothly and everybody was pleased with the conciliatory spirit in which

the Russians were meeting allied proposals. Negotiations reached the point where the Russians were given the lowest allied terms upon which commercial treaties would be made.

These terms in brief were that Russia agree to pay pre-war debts and agree in principle to pay her war debts and debts resulting from confiscation of property after the war. It was understood that pre-war debts would be deferred and that the amount of war debts and post-war debts would be subject to negotiation, the allies virtually conceding that they did not expect to collect.

The Russians asked for time in

which to consider the final proposals and it was fully expected they would accept. This meant that commercial treaties between Russia and all European countries would follow and the first step taken toward European reconstruction.

Then, without warning the Germans got busy and signed with the Russians a commercial treaty wiping out all Russian debts.

Declaration of War. The German-Russian treaty was virtually a declaration of economic war against the rest of Europe. That it may result in military war in the not far distant future is the fear that hangs over the allied delegates.

A German-Russian combine is the thing western Europe has feared ever since the end of the war. One big object of the Genoa conference was to prevent it. Instead it has precipitated it.

It seems impossible that any effective plans for European reconstruction will result from the con-

ference. Such plans require good faith and confidence, which have now vanished.

Europe is Divided. Smaller nations are already lining up on either side of the big divisions and Europe as a whole is split worse than ever. Lloyd George may be clever enough to hold the conference together for a time and have it go through the motions of doing something—but these will be only motions.

Europe is still under the spell of the old diplomacy and racial and national hates.

It is well for America that she is not represented here. America would be powerless to help. She might lose much, with no chance to gain anything except enemies. Secretary Hughes was far-sighted when he refused to send delegates to Genoa on the ground that the conference was political and not economic.

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ANOTHER BIG DRIVE IS MADE BY POLICE WITH 42 ARRESTS

Forty-two arrests were made by city police Wednesday and Wednesday night, records obtained Thursday morning showed. This surpassed by some the total for Tuesday, when 33 girls were found their way into two churches of the law.

The Thursday morning police court session was one of the heaviest experienced in months, about 25 cases being aired out before the judge. Fifteen convictions and fines were obtained, several vagrants were sent back to jail, one young man was ordered sent to the county farm

for treatment when it was found that he was diseased, unable to work and had been habitually loafing and loitering about public dance halls and several other cases were set for trial at a later date. No traffic of any kind was reported during the night, officers declared.

NEW YORK, May 4.—Field Marshal Earl French, commander in chief of the British armies during the world war, arrived today on the Homeric for his second visit to America—a purely personal visit, he explained, without a mission of any form. He was greeted at the pier by a group of British war veterans. He exchanged radio greetings in midocean with Marshal Joffre, returning to France.

It is claimed that the position of the citizenry has been determined and that sentiment is overwhelmingly in favor of tariff protection.

The association is concerned mainly in taking the tariff out of politics. It is claimed and is endeavoring to align both democrats and republicans in the movement looking toward this end.

A delegation of peanut men headed by N. L. Haskins of DeLeon and J. H. Fleming of Weatherford, representing the Southwestern Peanut Shellers association will attend the congress tomorrow, according to headquarters of the tariff association in the City National Bank of Commerce building.

The peanut men are up in arms against a joker in the tariff measure now before congress which permits the free importation of vegetable oils for soap making purposes and are expected to have a strong voice here in reference to the matter.

Petitions are being received at the tariff headquarters from citizens in Elliot Point, Henrietta and other places favoring a tariff on agricultural, pastoral and mineral products and endorsing the efforts of the association for its efforts in behalf of productive industry.

J. A. Arnold, manager of the Southern Tariff association, has been in the city several days in connection with the congress and John H. Kirby of Houston, presiding, is expected to arrive early Friday and will preside at the meeting.

The session will be held at the Kemp hotel, beginning at ten o'clock and will continue throughout the day. The principal speaker of the congress will be given by John H. Kirby Friday night at the opera house at eight. Other speakers on the program will be N. A. Shaw of Texasarkana, president of the Texas division of the Southern Tariff association, Geo. W. Armstrong, chairman of Fort Worth, and Ed Woodall of the Texas Cotton Crushers association at Hillsboro.

ROTARIANS HEAR SEVERAL SPEAKERS ON SCHOOL NEEDS

An explanation of the coming school bond issue, and the purposes for which the proceeds will be used, was given the Rotary club at its luncheon Thursday by E. S. The statement issued by Mr. Bullington seeks to make it plain that he is running as an independent.

An explanation of the coming school bond issue, and the purpose for which the proceeds will be used, was given the Rotary club at its luncheon, Thursday, at the Goodner, a member of the school board. Mr. Goodner urged that, in spite of the lack of opposition to the bonds, Rotarians and the citizenship generally support them actively.

"The time has passed," Mr. Goodner said, "when people come here just to make money. Wichita Falls is now attracting people here as a good place in which to live. By building up our educational system we can make it still more desirable."

The increase in taxes will be only 25 cents on the \$100, Mr. Goodner pointed out, declaring this amount to be negligible in view of the benefits to be attained.

Notice was served on Rotarians that their oratorical powers will be tested in the "back to school" campaign which the club will wage before the end of the school, as a number of the members will be asked to make talks in the various school buildings on this subject, urging boys and girls not to fall to avail themselves of the educational opportunities afforded.

SEVERAL PAY TRIBUTE TO WORK IN THIS CITY

Musical and Literary Program Preceded Farewell Ceremony at Theater.

A very delightful program was held at the Wichita theater Wednesday afternoon in honor of the silver jubilee of Father Boniface, who is leaving the city for a much needed rest and travel in Europe, and upon his return to take up his duties in another parish.

The first part of the program was of a musical nature, the numbers being arranged by students and the Sisters of the Academy of Mary Immaculate. Special mention might be made of the pleasing address by Miss Katherine Sullivan, recitation and song by Miss Ruth Harrison and chorus and the farewell number.

After the musical program, J. L. McMahon, in a delightful address, presented Father Boniface a check for \$1,500 from Wichita Falls people in recognition of the love and esteem he is held by the community, non-Catholic, Jew and Gentile as well as those members of his parish. Father Boniface responded: "The token you have given me is a token in cold cash and represents warm hearts. I will remember you for good. I have spent five years of toilsome labor among you, but this labor was gratifying because I had the whole-hearted co-operation of my congregation. May I be excused from pride when I say that we have done great things in the five years, but it was due to our co-operation, not one, not the other, but the two powers working hand in hand. I will ever retain a warm spot in my heart for Wichita Falls and the Sacred Heart parish of this city. Wherever I may go, my prayers will go up to God for the friends and parishioners I leave behind. I can say with gladness, 'Lord, five talents has thou entrusted to me; I have gained five more,' for the congregation of the Sacred Heart today has more than doubled itself, yes, tripled and more than that. Wherever I may be on my trip to various places, I will put in a word for my former parishioners of Wichita Falls.

Judge Kay was then called upon for an address, and in his charming manner spoke of Father Boniface and his work. His opening remarks are based on the story of the Irish man who was going away, and in bidding his friends good-bye at a meeting he said: "I am glad to see so many of you here to welcome me going away." Continuing, Judge Kay said:

"There are many touching things in the life of a priest. He comes to a place and he says this is good soil; this is a good town; there are good people; the trees are green and the flowers bright, and here I will make my home; but the Master says otherwise so that he must be continually in the attitude of the children of the Crusades, moving from one place to another, so no priest or preacher can pick his town and stay to himself. This is Jerusalem and this is my home, because he has no abiding city. What does it mean to you and me when the ministers of God lay aside means that might make success in many avenues of life; lose their opportunities as we call them; almost lose their identity in order that they might serve humanity? It is a consecration for which the most of us have no conception, and how does the church work? The church does not work indiscriminately. The church can only work and thrive where conditions are favorable. It is one of the fundamental doctrines of the Catholic church to work through human agencies. Have you supported your pastor like you should? Have you been a devout, faithful, consecrated member devoted to the service of the Master? If that is true, the work of the preacher is easy and his burden is light; otherwise not. The only time the Savior stood naked and helpless was in the presence of the fig tree, in his going away I would not ask that he go into a primrose path, but that he may come into the presence of suffering and of need and hear the great heart beat of the world in its desire to know the life of the church."

Ex-Mayor Walter Cline spoke fittingly of Father Boniface as a neighbor of his. Though coming from Methodist stock, friend Cline could not help but pay warm respects to Father Boniface for his feeling as a neighbor and friend. "We are all working for one aim, regardless of creed, and it is time to lay aside propaganda talk and get down to business and make this country a place worth while spiritually and otherwise."

The Rt. Rev. Joseph P. Lynch, bishop of Dallas, spoke very fittingly of Father Boniface and "Americanism." He is a brilliant talker and thinker and left many good thoughts. We quote in part: "We are very glad to assemble here this afternoon—Catholic, non-Catholic, Jew and Gentile—to hear tribute to an eternal truth long ago recognized that the golden thread of moral trend must be woven

through a coarse fibre in order that cultural life may bless home and nation." Rev. Lynch spoke of the part the Catholics played in the history of America—Clark, Washington, Rochambeau and the leading events of American history that have made the United States of America the leading nation of the world today.

"And why all these historical facts?" declared the bishop. "That there might arise a number of states where there would be government by law and not by the whims of men; where there might be liberty without license and authority without autocracy. This is the type of Americanism you and I stand for. The priest of the hour, and our honorable friend, stand for these traditions, the ideals, the inspirations that were begotten by our ancestors in the long ago, and it is on this occasion that I am glad to come here; I am glad to meet you one and all."

Father Boniface is leaving, this community respected by all non-Catholic people as well as those of his parish. He has been untiring in his efforts in many things and certainly the well-wishes of the citizens of Wichita Falls go with him on his journey.
