Identification of the actual slayers is imminent, the police said, as the relentless drive against those responsible for the recent disorders was continued.

MILTON DRURY GETS LIFE TERM FOR THE MURDER OF MOTHER

PLEADS GUILTY IMMEDIATELY FOLLOWING SELECTION OF JURY.

MOTHER WAS FORMERLY RESIDENT WICHITA FALLS

Body of Mrs. Thomas P. Converse Found Near Hazelhurst, Miss., in February.

HAZELHURST, MISS., May 12.—Milton Drury, 34, pleaded guilty on trial today on a charge of having killed his mother Mrs. Ada Drury Converse, formerly of Wichita Falls, Texas, whose charred body was found on a lonely road here last February, and sentenced to life imprisonment. The plea of guilty was made after an agreement was reached between Drury's counsel and the district attorney and came just as the trial was completed. Drury heretofore had declared his innocence, less than a week ago he entered a plea of not guilty when arraigned. His step-father, Thomas P. Converse, husband of the slain woman and a half a hundred witnesses from Converse's home, Wichita Falls, Texas, the former home of Mrs. Converse, and other points were present at the trial. The entire day was devoted to selection of the jury which had been completed when the unexpected plea of guilty was made. Drury was arrested in Alabama shortly after the discovery of the body and brought here and placed in jail. The body of Mrs. Converse was found in a ravine close to a road near Hazelhurst, Miss., and had been shot and her body saturated with oil and partly burned and covered with brush. It was believed by officers that she had been dead a month before found. Walter Drury, another son of the slain woman, identified the body as that of his mother.

GENERAL CHANG TO HAVE INDEPENDENT CHINA GOVERNMENT

By Associated Press. An independent government has been set up by General Chang Tso-Lin, defeated military governor of Mukden. A declaration of independence issued from his headquarters at Lunshow, says that having been directed by the president of authority in Manchuria, Mongolia and Jehol, he henceforth repudiates all instructions from the president and all treaties negotiated by him. The declaration sets forth that Chang intends to make favorable treaties with friendly nations in the name of the region annexed and will assume responsibility for the protection of foreign lives and property there.

CHICAGO, May 12.—Two men armed with shotguns today walked into a barber shop in the north side Italian section and opened fire without warning, killing the proprietor and a man who entered her room at the front of the hotel where she was talking with her housekeeper last night. Welch, proprietress of a local hotel, was held up and robbed of two diamonds valued at \$4,000 and then brutally beaten over the head with a revolver by two unmasked men who entered her room at the front of the hotel where she was talking with her housekeeper last night. Two men are being held.

EXPECT TO RECOVER MORE THAN COST IN 'WAR FRAUD' CASES

WASHINGTON, May 12.—The amount the government will recover from alleged war fraud cases will be many times the amount granted to defray expenses incident to their prosecution, the house appropriations committee declared today in a report on the bill carrying \$500,000 for use by the department of justice as a special investigating and prosecuting fund.

INDEFINITE DEADLOCK ON THE BILL TO CREATE MORE FEDERAL JUDGES

WASHINGTON, May 12.—An indefinite deadlock on the judges bill to create a score more federal judges was reported yesterday by the senate and house conferees. The principal obstacle reported to be over proposals to authorize an additional judge for New York and another for the middle Tennessee district. The senate amendment for another judge in New Mexico, in behalf of which Senator Bursum, republican, of that state, appeared yesterday before the conferees.

COURT AT GENEVA NOW THROWN OPEN TO ENTIRE WORLD

GENEVA, May 12.—The court of international justice yesterday afternoon was thrown open to the entire world when the council of the league of nations decided that any nation could bring cases before the court provided they previously had agreed to accept its decision and to decline war over the dispute in question. These nations were the only ones to which the court had not previously been available for the settlement of disputes.

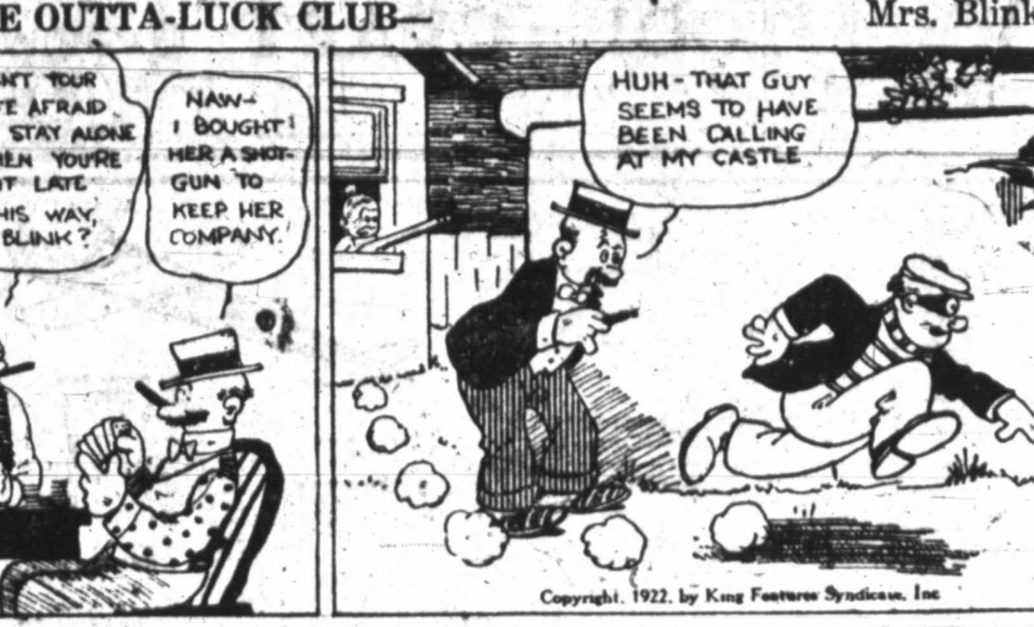

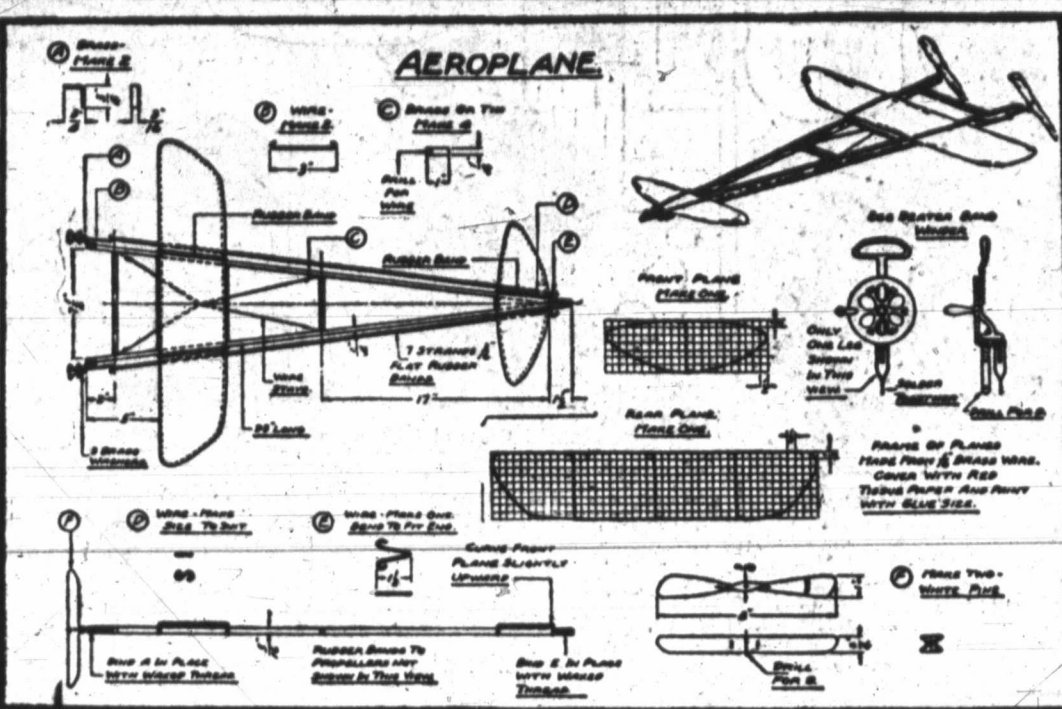

AND HERE'S HOW YOU MAKE IT. Every boy, I think, dreams of the time when he can take a ride in a real airplane. Airplanes are not so common now, yet, however, so we'll save to content ourselves with building small models of big planes and trying them ourselves.

The construction of the frame is easy. Fasten the cross-pieces in place with small brads, first placing in position parts C, of which there are four. When you wish to wind the rubber bands place the wire hooks, D, to which the rubber bands are fastened, in the holes and operate the beater in the usual manner.
