## Wheeler is Invincible As Spudders Cop Odd Game of Bear Series

SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS, May 27.—"Rip" Wheeler was in fine form here Friday and led his mates to a 7 to 2 victory over the Bears in the third and final game of the series. The Spudders hurled the locals in complete subjection all during the matinee and was never in danger of losing. The Spudders, on the other hand, had Cheney and McQuaid hard in the pinches. Fred Beck increased his home run lead by socking out the eighth of the season while White also belted one out of the lot. White contributed his with one aboard but the corners were empty when Beck patted delivered. Buddy Tanner held down third base in Tex McDonald's absence and his fielding was flawless. Larry Cheney was Hub Northern's first selection. He was forced to retire, however, after two innings had been completed. Homer Summa hit one through the box in the second chapter which Cheney stopped with a finger on his pitching hand. He managed to wobble through the rest of the inning, but was unimpaired thereafter. He pitched well, recently obtained from the Pacific Coast league, finished, but didn't possess anything to fool the invaders.

Wheeler's exhibition of hurling was one of the best witnessed here this season. Eight hitters were victimized by his wiles and his control was excellent. The first run scored off him came in the opening canto on a triple and single and the catcher collected them in the final chapter on a single and double. "Rip" also kicked in with a timely single which clinched his own game.

The Salmites allowed the Bears to hold their own run lead, marked up in the first, only until they came to bat in the next period. The score was 2-0 when Beck slapped a safety to center and touched all the bases on White's wallop over the right field barrier. The visitors then waited until the sixth before increasing their total. Summa pried the hit out of the round with a double to left and Cheney followed with a single into the same territory. Booe's accurate peg to the plate held Summa at third, but enabled Miller to reach second. After Beck and White had been retired without advancing the runners, Blachoff drew four wide ones, making an ideal setting for the Spudders. "Rip" was equal to the occasion and shot a safety to center which sent Summa and Miller over the platter. Blachoff easily reached third on the hit and when McQuaid threw Booe's relay wide to McKee he romped home.

Bob Becher was responsible for the next tally. White one away he doubled to right. He hit out for third immediately afterwards and continued to the plate when McQuaid uncorked a wild pitch. Beck opened the eighth with his wallop over the wall and that ended the Spudders scoring.

## MRS. MALLORY TO MEET SUZANNE AGAIN

Mrs. Mollie Bjurstedt Mallory, the American woman tennis champion, has gone to England, with a dual purpose.

She will be a participant in the British championship tennis tournament at Wimbledon, June 1. She hopes decisively to defeat Miss Suzanne Lenglen, the French champion.

If she succeeds in attaining these two objects she will be the unquestioned and unquestionable supreme champion at the game.

It will be recalled that Mrs. Mallory and Miss Lenglen played at Forest Hills last summer and that Mrs. Mallory was winning, when, in the midst of the contest, Miss Lenglen went all to pieces, between a violent and prolonged attack of coughing, and, so it was said, of hysterics, took to her bed.

This gave the victory to Mrs. Mallory, but winning by default wasn't very satisfactory, especially as Miss Lenglen had previously beaten Mrs. Mallory in Europe.

Miss Lenglen certainly did have a cold, but there were people unkind enough to say that she had shed her health to get on playing. If she had been on the winning side, her own manager was one of those who outspokenly inclined to this view.

The French woman is said to be in tip-top form at present. Mrs. Mallory hasn't played much during the winter, but she has had some practice in the past few weeks and expects to get more in the minor British tournaments prior to the Wimbledon match.

There's a chance, however, that there'll be no Lenglen-Mallory meeting. Miss Lenglen is once more reported to have had it with some ailment upon her doctor's verdict whether or not she gives up the sport.

With Mrs. Mallory already at sea in the French star, playing at Brussels, defeated Miss Elizabeth Ryan of California, 6-3, 6-2, for the international hard court championship.
